MORE CORRUPTION.

CHEROKEE ALLOTMENTS ON THE STRIP FRAUDULENT.

The Treaty Whereby the Lands Are Ceded to the Government Is Violated In Many Instances-Held by Mere Babies and Nonresidents.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Sept. 6.—Recent developments confirm the statement made two weeks ago that a large portion of the Cherokee allotments on the strip are fraudulent and a gigantic steal was being perpetrated on the government. The treaty whereby the Cherokees cede the strip to the government provides that certain Cherokees who may have lived upon the strip prior to Nov. 1, 1891, had made improvements and were actually conducting farms were to receive these farms as allotments, each receiving 160 acres, the total number of allotments so made not to exceed 70. The bill providing for the opening of the strip contained exactly the same provisions.

In August, 1891, a large number of Cherokees visited Arkansas City, Kan., and from there drove into the strip and staked off claims near Kildare and along Shikasia river, and when Alloting Agent Duncan came to make his allotments last month he allowed every one of these Indians the land so staked off as an allotment, though not one of them had ever lived there a single day. No improvements had been made and no attempt at farming. Here was direct violation of the treaty and the provisions and a clear steal of \$100,000. Now come still more startling facts. At Stillwater, O. T., application was made in the district court and guardians appointed for 18 minor Cherokees. The order was issued, and now these guardians, who are the attorneys of Robert L.
