





MADE A BIG HAUL.

TWENTY MASKED MEN HOLD UP

the Express Car-It Is Estimated That They Secured \$250,000-They Make Good Their Escape.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The Lake Shore and Michigan Southern express, bound for New York was held up early vesterday morning near Kendallville, a small place 142 miles east of here, by a band of 20 masked robbers. The train consisted of 10 coaches, two express cars and a baggage car.

The robbers boarded the train at Kendallvilles but as it was no unusual occurrence for many people to get on there no attention was paid to their presence. The train had not more than started when the party put on their masks and two crawled upon the engine and ordered the engineer to stop. The engineer did not obey promptly and a volley of shots were fired directly at him. He was hit in two places and is now in a serious condition.

The robbers having stopped the train proceed to the express car. They ordered the messenger to open the door which he refused to do. They forced an entrance. The messenger fought bravely for the safety of the packages entrusted to his care, but was soon overpowered and received several

The express car was blown to pieces with dynamite and all valuable packages taken.

There is various estimates as to the amount secured but from all that can be learned the sum will not miss \$250,-000 far.

It is stated here that the safe which was blown open contained \$250,000 in gold, being shipped east by a Chicago bank. Superintendent Wygart of the United States express admits as much

COAL FAMINE THREATENED. A Vast Territory In the West Likely to

Suffer This Winter. DENVER, Sept. 13.-A coal famine is predicted for the coming winter which will add to the misery of the poorer classes in the present period of business depression. The country that will be most affected by a coal famine includes a great sweep from Nebraska on the north to the great is ior plains country of Texas on the outh. The fact is not generally known that fully one-half of Kansas and Nebraska are supplied with coal from Colorado, and the railroads find in this trade their

chief business for several months during the latter part of the year. In the past, in prosperous times, the business has been generally done by what is known as stocking orders. Coal dealers in the western parts of Kansas, Nebraska and Texas have stocked up during August and September preparatory for the setting in of winter. With all these precautionary methods there ing to snow blockades, strikes at the mines or other unforseen delays in the filling of orders, temporary famines

have ensued. This season, owing to the panic, no stocking orders have been placed with the coal companies of Colorado, and at the present time the coal supply for the farming discricts east of the mountains is only sufficient to meet present wants. There have been no advance shipments, and now, with winter close at hand, the coal trade is not flourishing, and only a moderate amount is being marketed. With the first cold snap thousands of tons will be wanted and the coal companies will be called upon to meet a sudden demand coming from 100 stations at once. It will be an utter impossibility to meet such a general and sudden demand, for the railroads are not prepared to furnish cars or motive power sufficient to haul the
