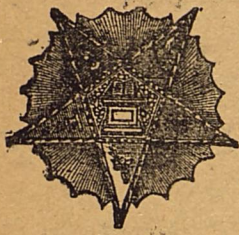

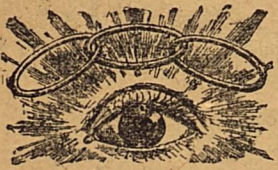

We regret to chronicle the fact that several people in Terry Co, are not taking the Herald: We appreciate those who do, and we want the Herald in every Home in Terry County.

The roof is on the walls, the walls on the sills, the sills on a good foundation or the whole building falls. So with the Commercial world, its all on the Farmer and if he has'nt got a good farm the entire business can't exist much. Terry county certainly has the foundation for the farmer. Other counties may have better auto roads, and prettier country, after a rainy spell, but here's a farmers foundation the year round.

A few days ago two very alert shrewd, sharp real estate men from some where further east than the plains reaches, came into town and examined the school land records, inquired about a certain four sections of land up in the edge of Yoakum county. Some of our real estate men covered them of course and offered them West Texas' best farming lands at \$4.00 to \$8.00 per acre: but no, they were smart, they could get land up in the edge of the county for almost nothing.

So they proceeded on their "gittin-rich" journey, and it come to pass about the close of day they come to the land of their four sections on which in abundance grew Terry and Yoakum counties most conspicuous and loftiest sand hills, hence these sharp pilgrims turned and with down cast prospects retraced their hasty made footsteps, and now they don't like the West at all, and no love is lost. We have no love to lose, and on our part he is as welcome to stay down East as the honest farmer is to come live with us.

Wind and newspapers never did build a railroad, and we know what it takes. We will say this we have as good or better chance for one sooner than most of our neighbors think for.

A citizen of our town has shown a letter from a friend who left Terry county last winter went southwest to get rich in lands; he is now ditching near Barstow, spent what money he had and writes in dives way advising his friends to come no further southwest than Terry County.

The attention of the United States, the admiration of Texas is cultured toward the West. 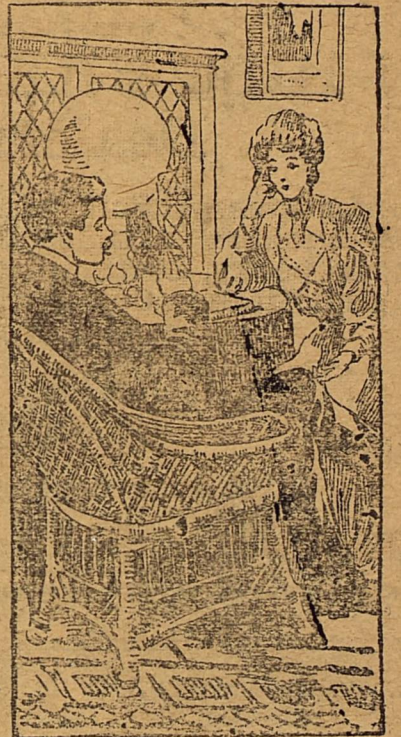
