SLATOR A CANDIDATE.

Judge M. D. Slator of Llano spent last Saturday in this city getting acquainted with the people and making known his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for congressman from this district. Judge Slator is a pleasant gentleman and is well posted in public affairs. He is at present district judge in the thirty-third district, which includes San Saba county, and is known to all the members of this bar and to some of the other citizens. Six of the counties in his judicial district are in this congressional district and he expects to carry those six counties in his congressional race and seems very hopeful of being successful in his campaign for the high office in which he aspires.

As Judge Slator is a stranger to a large majority of the voters in this county we give the following from his home paper, the Llano Times, in order that the people may know something of him.

WHO HE IS.

His grandfather, Matthew Moss, came to Texas in 1833, enlisted in the army of the Republic, and participated in the battle of San Jacinto. In 1836 Mr. Moss settled in Llano county, where he died, and the members of his family have since resided.

Matthew Dawson Slator was born in Gillespie county, but since his early boyhood his home has been in Llano county. When a mere lad his father died and his early youth was spent upon the farm and cattle range, except the months each year he attended the country schools, such as we had at that time. The wild freedom and reckless adventure of the cowboy's life of that day appealed strongly to the bold and ardent nature of this young westerner, and while yet in his teens the battle of inclination against ambition was fought, and he determined to become a lawyer. At once he gave up the life which he loved and knew so well, for that which was new and strange to him.

and after some necessary business arrangements, entered the South Western University at Georgetown, Texas, from which institution he graduated with first honors. Immediately afterward he became a student in the University of Texas, and, upon finishing his course there, delivered the class oration, and graduated with high honors in 1889.

At once he began the practice of law at Llano and was appointed district attorney, September 1890, to succeed W. W. Mastin, resigned. In November following he was elected to succeed himself and during his term of office discharged his duties with distinction, and to the entire satisfaction of the people. He did not offer for re-election, but returned to his private practice, in which he was successfully engaged until when he assumed the duties of district judge. During these years he acquired much of the good sound business management, has continued to be successful and profitable.

In 1898 he was elected district judge in which position he is now serving with marked ability and is receiving the hearty appreciation of a satisfied constituency. One of the best practitioners of the district was recently heard to say that Judge Slator came nearer being sternly judicial and absolutely impartial on the bench than any one before whom he had ever practiced.

ELGIN, OREGON.

Editor Eagle:

As so many of my friends have written to know about this country, I will try to inform them through your paper.

The city of Elgin is a town situated in Union county, has a population of 700, has fine schools and churches of several denominations, also the best of society. The town is surrounded by large farms on the east, west and north, and on the south by large bodies of fine timber, which is fine fir and tamarack. The timber is made into lumber by the seven saw mills, which are within eight miles of town. The tamarack is made into railroad ties and shipped to all parts of the land. The snow-capped mountains, covered with evergreen trees, make it lovely to the eye. The climate is mild in winter and in summer the breeze from the snow-capped mountains makes it cool, refreshing and beautiful. The cool streams that come down from the mountains, furnish an abundance of pure water. The Grande Ronde river, Indian creek and other small streams afford plenty of water to irrigate the large farms when necessary, which is seldom; it generally rains sufficient in summer, for the fine crops raised, which is wheat, oats, barley, rye, alfalfa and hay of every description. Fine vegetables of every description are raised, especially potatoes. This is a fine place to raise fruit of every kind, except peaches, which do not grow well in this valley. There is plenty of government land here to be taken as homesteads. Some of it will be good farm land. There is lots of fine school land that can be bought for \$1.25 per acre, besides the stone and timber claims that can be bought for a small sum. The hills are covered with bunch grass and makes fine range for the stock that winters out. Whitsa county, east of this county, is the stock county of Oregon, with 200,000 head of cattle, 100,000 head of sheep, 15,000 head of horses. The cattle and sheep are fattened on the grass in summer and shipped to the eastern markets in the fall. Come one and all, friends, to the west and get yourself a home.

Most everybody here is well fixed for another crop. Though we had a drouth last year, cotton made a bale to every four or five acres, corn made one-half bale per acre; some places none at all; wheat and oats were short.

This has been one of the most delightful winters we have ever seen—a little cold in December, but it has been warm ever since. Farmers are busy turning the ground fast, as we are likely to get a rain this year.

Stock is holding up well. No very great losses yet. Having smallpox is the order of the day now. It would break the county to quarantine. Seems to be in a mild form. No deaths yet, but several are pretty sick. It was scattered at dances during Christmas week and it is just getting in good headway now. I have six neighbors sick at the present and all the balance are exposed, though no one in my family has it yet.

Mr. Fisher, one of our best neighbors, was called to the bedside of his son, who is dangerously sick in Mexico. Most of those who took part in the dances during Christmas week are taking a rest now.

Good many weddings during the holidays. Everybody seems to be contented and there is plenty of money among the farmers. A good many people have had the grip and a few have had pneumonia—the others have a smallpox, so you see we keep the circulation going.

The chicken paddlers have been scarce lately in the community and this is one pest that we are rid of. This is a good country, situated between Abilene and Ballinger, and you can have just any old thing you want.
