### Good Roads.

The Commercial club has taken up the work of securing good roads for the county and the members of the commissioners court are giving hearty co-operation and the time is not far distant when the entire citizenship of the county will take interest in the subject. There is no public work that will be so universally beneficial to the citizenship of the county as road building. The farmer is benefited if the road is improved so he can haul larger loads over it. The property owner is benefited if the road is improved, for his property values are increased. The merchant is benefited by the improvement of the roads, which makes his place of business more accessible to the general public. All classes are benefited by good roads in the county and all should be interested in plans for the betterment of the public highways.

The city council has also taken up the work of improving and opening streets and alleys and the Commercial club is giving hearty support to this work. As the farm lands are benefited by good roads, so is the city prop-

erty made more valuable by the improvement of the streets and alleys.

### Commercial Club Meeting.

The Goldthwaite Commercial club met in regular session Monday night.

A motion to have a committee to appear before the city council at once and advocate the opening of Parker street and one or more streets in the northern part of the city from Fisher street to the Brownwood road was unanimously adopted by a rising vote. The following committee was appointed by the chairman: L. R. Conroy, W. E. Miller, W. C. Dew, E. M. Boon, Walter Weathers, John Little and R. M. Thompson.

A committee composed of P. M. Coones, H. G. Bodkin and E. M. Page was appointed to make preparations for a parade for Trades Day, provided a parade is desired by the business men. The committee was also instructed to ascertain the cost of having the band furnish music on Trades Day.

Road committee reported that corrugated iron flumes would be better and more lasting than wooden culverts. An extended report on the condition of the roads and the work necessary

for their betterment.

The committee appointed to solicit contributions for cyclone sufferers at Zephyr report having collected and remitted \$879.70, after having paid for provisions sent from Goldthwaite the morning after the disaster. Of this amount Big Valley contributed \$61.50; Caradan \$11; Center City \$7. Mrs. W. E. Miller reported the collection by the ladies of bedding and clothing to the value of \$235.

This was one of the most interesting meetings ever held by the association was made.

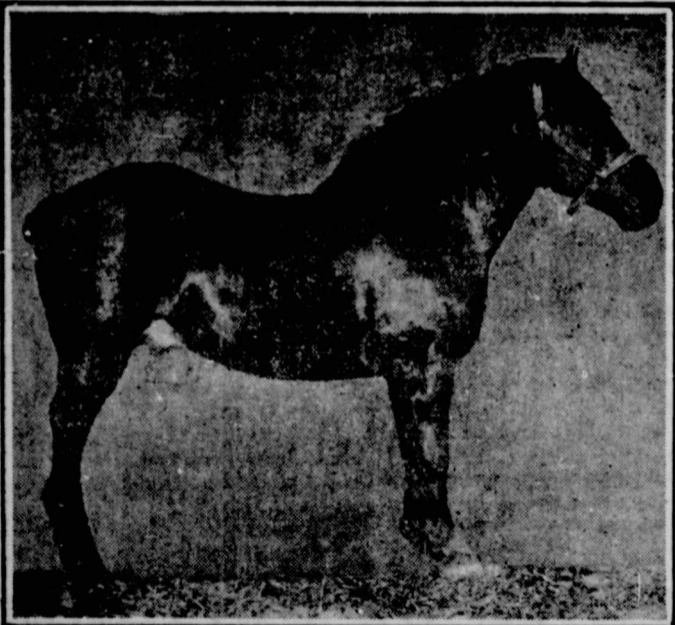

### City Ordinance.

CHAPTER XXX.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, ordering that Parker street, as now shown on the map of the original plat of the city of Goldthwaite, made by A. S. Hayne, engineer, be extended at the width of 80 feet, north 19, to John Little's lot, and ordering that the land over which the said street runs be condemned for the purpose of a street, and ordering that the said extension of said street shall be known as Parker street; and said street is ordered opened as per the survey made by F. M. Long, surveyor, and this ordinance confirms all other ordinances, and all other orders made at previous meetings of the city council of said city of Goldthwaite.

ARTICLE NO. I.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, that Parker Street, as it is now shown on the map of the plat of the city of Goldthwaite, Texas, made by A. S. Hayne, engineer, be opened, and that same be extended north 19 west, to John Little's south line, and the land over which the said street passes is herein ordered condemned, as required by law, and said Parker street shall be opened to a width of 80 feet, and said Street shall be opened as per the survey made by F. M. Long, county surveyor of Mills county, Texas, which said survey made by F. M. Long, county surveyor, of Mills county, Texas, is as follows to-wit: Beginning at Matthew Rosch's north east corner, same being the north west corner of Parker street, as same is now shown on the map of the plat of the city of Goldthwaite, made by A. S. Hayne, engineer. Thence north 19 west crossing Phil H. Clement's lot at 182 feet. Thence north 19 west crossing Will Marshall's lot at 182 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing Will Ondon's lot at 182 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing D. H. Trent's land at 285 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing Mrs. M. M. Grundy's lot at 132 feet. Thence north 19 west crossing Sam Woody's lot at 80 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing J. T. Prater's lot at 107 1/2 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing A. T. Pribble's lot at 111 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing Edgar Martin's lot at 111 1/2 feet. Thence north 19 west, crossing R. S. Crane's lot at 311 1/2 feet to John Little's south line for north west corner of Parker street. Thence east with John Little's south line 80 feet for north east corner of Parker street. Thence south 19 east 311 1/2 feet crossing R. S. Crane's lot. Thence south 19 east 111 1/2 feet crossing Edgar Martin's lot. Thence south 19 east 111 feet crossing A. T. Pribble's lot. Thence south 19 east 107 1/2 feet crossing J. T. Prater's lot. Thence south 19 east 80 feet, crossing Sam Woody's lot. Thence south 19 east 132 feet crossing Mrs. M. M. Grundy's lot. Thence south 19 east 285 feet crossing D. H. Trent's lot. Thence south 19 east 182 feet crossing B. A. Harris' lot. Thence south 19 east 182 feet crossing J. D. Urquhart's lots, to the north east corner of Parker street as it is now shown on the map of the plat of the city of Goldthwaite, made by A. S. Hayne, engineer. Thence west to the place of beginning. And it is ordered by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that the said street as ordered opened, shall be known as Parker street, extending Parker

street north 19 west to John Little's south line.

ARTICLE NO. II.

Be it ordained by the city council, of the city of Goldthwaite, that all orders, decrees and ordinances heretofore made by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, be and the same are in all things confirmed, and the said ordinances, decrees and orders are made a part of this ordinance, and reference is here made to same for proof of the said orders there made, and for proof of the order made, authorizing F. M. Long, county surveyor of Mills county, to survey out the proposed extension of Parker street, and for the order, authorizing Robert S. Grant, city attorney, to take the necessary steps to open said street, and he is now authorized to take such steps as are necessary to open said Parker street, and that said Parker street be opened at once, as per the survey made by F. M. Long, as shown by the plat filed with the secretary, and the city secretary shall record this ordinance as a part of the minutes of his record of this meeting.

This ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and publication, as required by law.

Passed, approved and adopted, this the 7th day of June, A. D. 1909, by the city council, at a regular meeting of the city council of Goldthwaite, Texas, by unanimous vote, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times, being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept as chapter 30, ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite, Texas.

Which ordinance, passed and approved as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved, and signed, and ordered kept by the secretary, with the records of his office, when not used by some officer of the city of Goldthwaite.

A prohibition campaign was inaugurated in San Antonio last Sunday with the battle cry: "Texas is going dry."

The annual encampment of the Texas volunteer soldiers will be held at Austin July 6 to 15. Full 3000 soldiers are expected to be in attendance.

It is claimed that domestic troubles caused Mrs. J. M. Green to kill her three children and then take her own life at the family home near Corsicans.

Winters is arranging to celebrate the arrival of the railroad with a big celebration on July 3. It is said the railroad will be completed to the town within the next ten days.

The Eagle fully appreciates the kind invitation of the Hamilton Rustler to attend the picnic at that place this week. The picnic was a grand success and much of the credit for it is due the Rustler.

Mills county is not the only place where the subject of good roads is being agitated. Some of the surrounding counties have issued bonds in large amounts for road building. No better investment could be made for a county than good roads.

Judge W. A. Blackburn died at his home in Burnet a few days ago. He was district judge for twenty-five years and served in that capacity in this section in pioneer days. He is kindly remembered here by many.

In the prohibition elections last Saturday Comanche and Smith counties remained in the dry column by large majorities. Dallam county remains in the wet column as a result of the election on the same day.

In a prize fight in Austin last Friday night one of the contestants was so badly hurt that he died soon afterwards. The sheriff of the county, several state rangers and other officers witnessed the fight without an attempt to stop it. The surviving combatant was arrested and the affair is being investigated.

A woman who was masquerading in Fort Worth as a crippled girl soliciting funds to secure an education was arrested in that city last Saturday. It was found that she and her husband were stopping at a fashionable boarding house, that they possessed valuable diamonds and had considerable money in banks and that she was not crippled at all.

Albert Patrick, convicted for the murder of W. M. Rice, a Texas millionaire in New York, has been denied a writ of habeas corpus releasing him from Sing Sing prison, where he is serving a life sentence. He claims that the Governor of New York had no right to commute his sentence from death to life imprisonment and that, therefore, he is unlawfully restrained of his liberty. He has made a desperate battle for his life and liberty and it is said that a relative has spent a fortune in his defense.

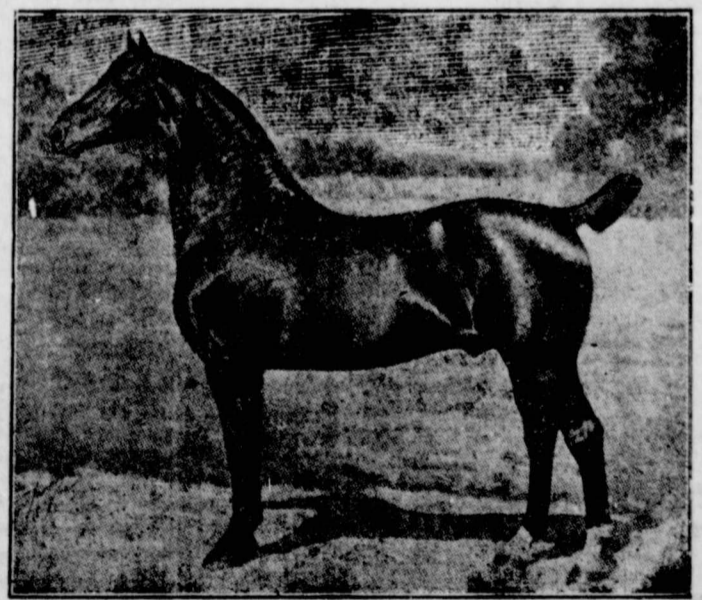

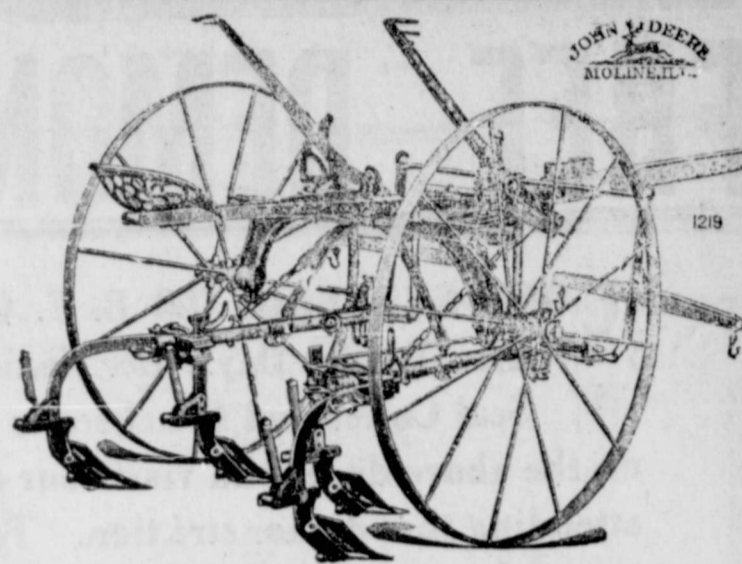

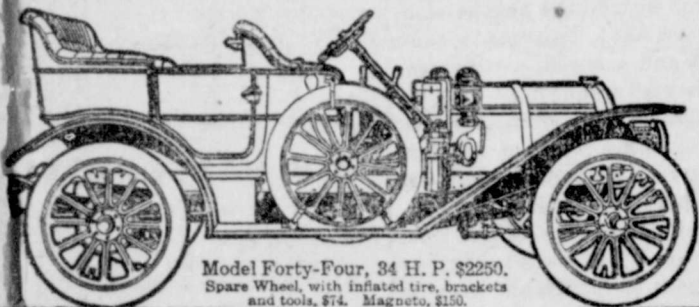

### HELPING THE NEEDY

Mills County People Contribute Liberally—A Delegation Visits Zephyr—More Supplies Coming.

The people of Mills county have responded liberally to the call for aid for the Zephyr people who lost their homes and household effects in the cyclone at that place two weeks ago. The Commercial club here appointed a committee to solicit contributions and that committee secured \$915 25 Of this amount the people of Big Valley contributed \$61 50, the Caradan people \$11, and North Brown \$10 After paying \$35 55 for supplies secured in Goldthwaite the morning after the storm and taken to Zephyr a balance of \$879 70 was left, which was remitted to the citizens committee at Zephyr for distribution among the sufferers.

The ladies committee, headed by Mrs. W. E. Miller, who was appointed by the Commercial club to secure clothing and bedding, collected a large amount of such articles as would be needed by the Zephyr cyclone sufferers. Goldthwaite ladies were greatly assisted by Mrs. J. E. Brooking of Star, Mrs. J. A. Hamilton and Mrs. W. G. Welch at Center City, Mrs. C. B. Mohler at Big Valley, Mrs. Jones at North Brown and others. These ladies all sent in valuable contributions to the committee here to be carried to Zephyr.

The boxes sent in from Star, Big Valley, Center City and North Brown contained bedding, clothing and provisions of every kind most needed and the supplies secured in this city were of the same sort. Everybody appeared to be glad to contribute liberally of the best they had and ladies who distributed the supplies in Zephyr Wednesday state that they were greatly pleased with the many nice things sent from Mills county. There was nothing shoddy or worn in the contribution and everything was nice and very acceptable to the people to whom they were presented.

The supplies sent in were valued as follows: Star, \$125; Big Valley, \$60; Center City, \$50; North Brown, \$10. This, the committee here believes to be an extremely low estimate and is confident the articles sent from the four places named could not be purchased for less than \$300. These supplies added to Goldthwaite's donation swelled the total to a valuation of approximately \$500, and makes a fine showing for the liberality of Mills county people. The ladies also received \$10 50 in cash collected by Mrs. W. G. Welch at Center City and this amount was also distributed to those who needed it most.

As an sample of the many nice things sent, there were 36 quilts, 14 feather pillows, 58 sheets and other things in proportion.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Randolph, Mrs. H. E. Brown and Carroll Lowrie visited Zephyr Wednesday and distributed a part of the supplies and gave orders for the delivery of the remainder. They found the people there had received a considerable amount of supplies, but were not as fully supplied with necessities as reports would indicate. Many of those who lost their homes are making an effort to rebuild and the money and lumber donated will aid a great deal, but will not be nearly enough to enable those to rebuild who have no outside means.

The citizens of this county are certainly entitled to much praise for the promptness and liberality in providing for the needy people. The total contributions

### City Ordinance.

CHAPTER XXXI.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, ordering that Little street, laid out by F. M. Long, county surveyor of Mills county, Texas, be opened to a width of 60 feet, and ordering that it be opened, taking 30 feet off of John Little's south line, and 30 feet off of R. S. Crane's north line, and extending from Fisher street west, to the Goldthwaite and Brownwood road, and ordering that the land over which the said street runs be condemned for the purpose of a street, and ordering that the necessary steps be taken to condemn the land over which the street runs, and this ordinance confirms all other orders, decrees and ordinances made at previous meetings of the city council be and the same are in all things confirmed and made a part of this ordinance.

ARTICLE I.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that a street running from Fisher street to the Goldthwaite and Brownwood road be opened, and said street is ordered open as per the survey made by F. M. Long, county surveyor of Mills county, Texas, which said survey, made by F. M. Long, county surveyor of Mills county, Texas, is in metes and bounds as follows to wit: Beginning at John Little's S. E. cor., which said S. E. cor., of John Little is on Fisher street. Thence north 19 west 30 feet for northeast corner of his street. Thence south 71 west

\$10 feet for north west cor. of this street. Thence south east John Little's south west cor at 31 6 10 feet. Thence south 31 6-10 past R. S. Crane's north west cor for south west cor. of this street. Thence east 19 north 930 feet to Fisher street, for south east cor. of this street. Thence north 19 west with Fisher street to the place of beginning. Said street is to be opened to a width of 60 feet, 30 feet to be taken off of John Little and 30 feet to be taken off of R. S. Crane's land, and it is ordered that the land over which the said street runs is to be condemned, and Robert E. Grant, city attorney, is ordered to take the necessary steps to condemn same for the said purpose of a street, and to have the said street opened at once.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that all orders, decrees and ordinances made by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite at previous meetings of the city council, be and the same are in all things confirmed, and the said street, as above ordered open, shall be known as Little street, and it shall be opened to a width of 60 feet, running from Fisher street to the Goldthwaite and Brownwood road, and all orders, decrees and ordinances of the city council, of the city of Goldthwaite, be and the same are in all things confirmed, and made a part of this ordinance, and reference is now made to the said orders, decrees and ordinances and to the record of the city secretary, for what these orders, decrees and ordinances contain, and the city secretary is now ordered to record this ordinance, on the records of said city secretary, as a part of the records of this meeting, and it is ordered that Little Street be opened at once, and that all necessary steps shall be taken to open same, and Robert E. Grant, city attorney is authorized to take the necessary steps to open said street.

This ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and publication, as required by law.

Passed approved and adopted, this the 7th day of June, A. D. 1909, by the city council, at a regular meeting of the city council of Goldthwaite, Texas, by unanimous vote, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept as chapter 31, ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, Texas.

Which ordinance, passed and approved as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved, and signed, and ordered kept by the secretary, with the records of his office, when not used by some officer of the city of Goldthwaite
