Items Culled From the Leading Local
Papers.

BROWNWOOD.

Jno. F. Day, who has recently sold his interest in the Zephyr Mirror, is again in Brownwood and has bought the second hand furniture business of Chittum & Snapp.

A number of Brownwood friends of the family have received an invitation to attend the marriage of Miss Nora Hotchkiss, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Milton S. Hotchkiss, at Waco, November 9th, to Rev. James Oscar Leath.

The biggest and jolliest doctor

in all the crowd attending the meeting of the medical association was Dr. J. G. Townsen, of Star, Texas. This gentleman weighs only 280 pounds. He enjoyed the ride over the city and was perfectly at home at the banquet. When asked concerning Brownwood he said: "It takes a fast town to get ahead of Brownwood, you can bet on that."

Dr. Thomas Paul Doole and Miss Mamie Francis Milton were married at Fort Worth on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, October 25, at the home of the bride's mother at 111 Essex street. They left that city for their home at Fredonia, McCulloch county, Texas, yesterday and spent the night in Brownwood last night en route to that place. Dr. Doole was for a long time a citizen of Brady and Miss Melton formerly resided in Brownwood. She is the daughter of the late Col. W. T. Melton, known throughout this section of the state.

COMANCHE

The roof and east wall of the new K. of P. building at Dublin, gave away at a late hour last Thursday evening, damaging the building to the extent of \$2,000 or \$3,000 and injuring two workmen employed in laying concrete walks.

Last Friday and Saturday the Frisco sold excursion tickets to the fair from Brownwood for \$3.60 for the round trip, while Comancheites were forced to pay \$4.40, or forego the pleasure of attending.

Upon going to press we learn that Mr. Julius Brin died at his room at the Colonial Hotel, at 5 o'clock this morning. He had been sick only a few days, suffering from a complication of diseases, caused from the kidney trouble. The body will be taken to Terrell for interment. Mr. Brin, with his sons, Jake and Harry, have been engaged in merchandising in this city for the past ten years.—Exponent.

Mrs. Gus Ford of Antelope Gap and Miss Dasie Lucker of Sonora who have been visiting the family of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Dockray have returned to their homes. Henry Harned of Llano bought from William Griffay, 513

acres of land on the Colorado river southwest of town near Rattler at \$7 per acre. Mr. Harned will stock the ranch with horses and mules.

Upon good authority it is reported here that oil has been discovered in Lometa and in the western part of Lampasas county. A well some 200 feet deep produces water so tainted with oil as to render it unfit for man or beast.—Star.

HAMILTON.

We learn with deep regret just as we go to press of the death of J. W. Porter, at his home near Carlton, which occurred yesterday afternoon about four o'clock.

Miss Hallie Kinsey, who has been a teacher in the Hamilton public schools for three years past has given up her position in the school here to accept another at Fort Worth.

Martin Knorzer met with painful accident while driving with his wife and children last Sunday. The buggy seat gave way, throwing him out and the wheel ran over his arm, and one rib was broken by a kick from the horse.

The Texas Central had a wreck Tuesday night between Hico and Alexander. An engine and one car were running up to Cisco to carry out an excursion train when the engine jumped the track and the west-bound train that night was turned back.

Last Wednesday the north-bound train on the S. N. & S. T. flew the track about six miles from Hamilton and the engine

and one box car were thrown over the dump. The fireman, Mr. Ferguson, was the only man hurt, his injuries consisting of a bruised head and a dislocated shoulder. The management at once secured an engine from the Texas Central and sent it down Wednesday night to the scene of the wreck. By Thursday afternoon the train was started, but the engine and one box car are still lying lop-sided by the track.—Herald.

LAMPASAS.

District court adjourned for the term Wednesday evening.

Dr. W. D. Francis is home from Brady, where he attended the fair and visited friends. He entered his fine young horse, "Symbol Flint" in a number of event, and divided the purse in each entry with one exception and is that he saved the entrance fee, thus not losing in any event.—Leader.

A Bohemian farmer fell from a load of hay near Taylor Saturday and his neck was broken by the fall.

The prohibition election at McGregor last Saturday resulted in a majority of 106 for prohibition.

A life insurance company with a capital of \$300,000 was organized in Amarillo this week.

Work has been started on the new Santa Fe depot at Ballinger. The building is to cost \$28,000.

The militia man who killed the deputy county clerk in Dallas at the time of President Taft's visit, had an examining trial the first of this week and was remanded to jail without bond.

Hon. F. F. Hill of Denton states that one of the planks in his platform in the next campaign as a candidate for the legislature will be the abolition of the state ranger force.

A company composed of J. B. Gambrel, Geo. W. Stuart, H. Z. Duke and C. D. Fine has bought the Baptist Standard from Rev. Frank Norris, who recently accepted a call to the pastorate of a Baptist church in Fort Worth.

The Clem Oil company has filed a suit at Dallas against Receiver Eckhardt of the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. and two other oil companies charging violation of the Texas anti-trust law and conspiracy against his company. Mr. Eckhardt and representatives of other companies say the charges are entirely without foundation.

In the municipal election in New York Tuesday the Tammany candidate for mayor, Judge Gaynor, was elected, but the remainder of the Democratic ticket was defeated by the Republican-fusion candidates. W. R. Hearst, who was an Independent candidate for mayor was the third man in the race and Judge Gaynor's majority was large.

The Carnegie Hero Fund commission in session in Pittsburg, Pa., this week recognized the heroism of three Texans in a substantial way. John Lebus of Henrietta was awarded a silver medal because of the bravery of his wife, who lost her life while attempting to save two young ladies who were drowning. Jesse Stewart of Blanket was given a silver medal and \$1000 with which to buy a farm, because of his bravery in going into a well and rescuing two men who had been over come by gas. Mrs. Amelia Raif of Houston was given \$40 per month as long as she remains a widow and her two children were each awarded \$5 a month until they become 16 years of age. Her husband lost his life while rescuing a boy from a live wire in Houston the early part of this year. The Houston papers raised a subscription of \$2900 for the little family at the time.

A Lucky Man.

Thirty years ago a man in the state of Delaware went to a public auction. An old safe was put up and he bid on it for the fun of the thing. It was knocked down to him and he hauled it home and stored it away in his barn. A few days ago he concluded that he would open it and see what was in it. He found a bag of gold coin containing a good many thousand dollars, so he is provided for and can spend the rest of his days in comfort. This however, according to the Peoria Star, is not as bad as a man in New Jersey. Thirty-five years ago an old aunt died and left him a family Bible. He never opened it until the other day when he found hidden between the leaves \$5,000 in currency. He rejoiced in the fact that he has only discovered it, as he has spent his own fortune, and the chances are that if he had found this money in time it would have gone the way of all the earth with the rest of it.—Honey Grove Signal.

Preachers Placed.

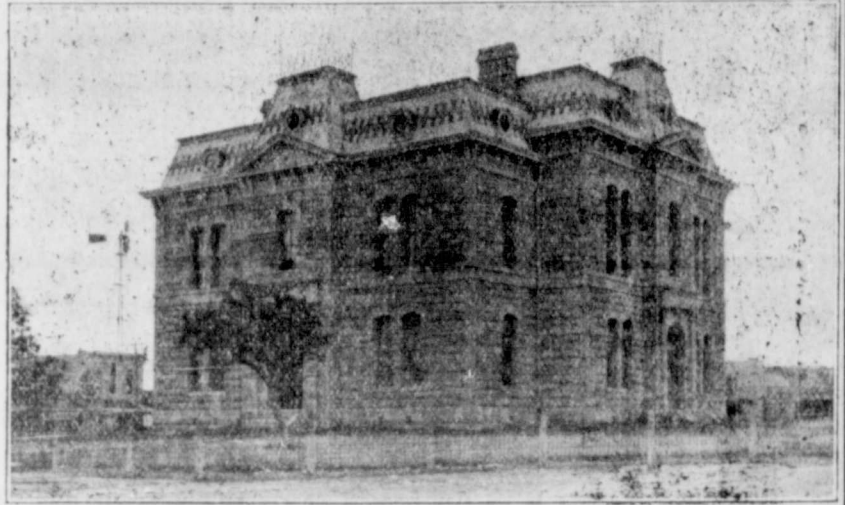
Following are the assignments of Methodist preachers for the next conference year, as announced by the bishop at the Uvalde conference:
