## WEARY OF WAITING.

### An Oil Mill to Be Built by Home People.

The Goldthwaite business men have become weary of waiting on Mr. Bencini and his associates to build an oil mill here and many there are who doubt the intention of the company to build the mill this year. Believing that an oil mill will not be built in Goldthwaite unless it is built by home capital some of the business men have determined to take the matter in hand and build a mill, no matter how many outside companies make promises and pretenses. To this end Mr. Geelin, the president of the Commercial club, has called for a full attendance of the club at the meeting Monday night, at which time the matter will be finally settled and it will be determined what steps are to be taken.

There are not many enterprises that could and would yield as large returns for the investment as an oil mill and if the gin men, farmers and business men will join in establishing the mill here the benefits to the town and county will be great. If the shares are placed at \$10 or \$25 and every gin man, merchant, professional man and farmer who can spare the money made financially interested in the mill there will be no danger of a "squeeze out" by outside parties and the mill will be operated every year and good returns will be received by the stockholders and patrons.

Let the mill be built by home people and disregard promises from outsiders.

Thirty-five Alabama convicts were burned to death in a stockade near Centerville, which was set on fire by one the number in an effort to escape.

Ex-President Roosevelt attended the funeral of King Edward in London yesterday, as a special representative of the United States government.

Halley's comet has been charged with causing the rain and the drouth, the heat and the cold and in some cities the police believe the "influence" of the comet causes crime and drunkenness.

Dr. E. D. Mouzon, dean of the theological department of the Southwestern University at Georgetown, was elected bishop by the Methodist general conference in session at Asheville, N. C. this week.

President Taft has appointed Hon. S. B. Cooper of Beaumont, formerly congressman from that district, to be a member of the board of appraisers of the customs service in New York. The position is a life time appointment and ranks next to a cabinet position in political importance. The salary is \$7000 per annum.

The department of justice at Washington announces that the cases against Governor Haskell of Oklahoma and others in the "Oklahoma town lot" indictment will be tried in June. It is claimed by the governor's friends that the charges are for political purposes and because of political differences and that the executive is entirely innocent of intentional wrongdoing.

The Eagle has received an invitation from the Hamilton Rustler to be present at the annual May Picnic and Spring Carnival in that city next Thursday and Friday. Their is always "something doing" in Hamilton on the occasion of these picnics and the Eagle is sure that Mills county will be well represented there next week.

H. Bascom Thomas, senator from the second district, has sent his resignation to Governor Campbell, stating as his reason for vacating the place that he will be nominated for lieutenant governor in the July primary and he does not wish the district to have to pay the additional expense of another election, so he resigns in time for his successor to be nominated in July and elected on the regular ticket.

A report from Austin says that the state pension commissioner will probably submit to the thirty-second legislature a resolution calling for a proposed constitutional amendment levying a special tax of 5c on each \$100 valuation, the revenue derived therefrom to be used as pension money in paying the pensioners of the State. However, the Confederate veterans of Texas will first be asked to pass upon the matter at their annual meeting this summer at McGregor. According to the commissioner's figures, such a tax would raise a fund of about \$1,300,000 annually to be distributed among the pensioners, and instead of getting \$11.25 a quarter, as they are now getting they would receive something like \$10 a month.

**Campaign Dates.**

Following are the dates for elections, convention and other political gatherings in this state as well as the dates for attending to political business in Texas. Candidates, committeemen and others interested will do well to preserve this list:

Jan. 31.—Poll tax paying period closed.

Feb. 14.—At this term of commissioners court presiding judges for election precincts must be appointed.

March 10.—Last day for county tax collectors to certify to the county clerks number of poll tax receipts and exemption certificates issued.

April 1.—Tax collectors must deliver to election supply board names of the county's qualified voters.

May 10.—State executive committees of all parties having electoral strength under 100,000 and over 10,000 must meet to determine whether nominations shall be made by primary or convention vote.

June 6.—Last day for candidates for state officers to file with state chairmen requests for places on primary ballots. Last day for district candidates to file similar requests with district or county chairmen.

June 13.—State executive committees meet to certify candidates names to county chairmen and to fix place for state conventions.

June 18.—Last day for county candidates to file with county chairmen requests for places on county ballots.

June 20.—County executive committees meet to determine order of placing names of candidates on ballots.

June 23.—Primary election proclamation must be issued and posted.

June 27.—County executive committees meet to apportion election expenses among candidates and to appoint primary committees.

July 11.—County primary committees meet to make up official ballots.

July 23.—Primary election day.

July 30.—County executive committees meet to canvass returns. County convention day.

August 8.—State executive committees meet to canvass returns.

August 9.—State convention day.

August 13.—Second primary day for county candidates.

August 22.—Independent candidates must file nominating petition with secretary of state.

August 27.—District convention day.

October 9.—Election proclamation day. Secretary of state transmits to county judges all necessary blanks for election.

October 19.—This is the last day on which state, district and county nominees may decline nominations.

October 29.—This is the last day on which city nominees may decline nominations.

Nov. 3.—Chairmen of county executive committees must name election supervisors for precincts.

Nov. 8.—General election day.

**Supposed Suicide.**

Ephram Spivey, better known as "Bud Spivey," died at his home about two miles south of Indian Gap last Saturday morning under circumstances strongly indicating suicide.
