THINGS IN GENERAL.

Evidently Texas is not the only state in the Union which is suffering from faulty growing and marketing methods. It is plain to be seen that there should be some sort of a national crop and market commission to figure out the needed amount of production of any article according to the supply and demand requirements of the nation and the world, and also as to proper and wide-spread distribution of same, giving a fair living price to producer, dealer and consumer alike. Producers and consumers in Texas would often like to know where the "nigger in the woodpile" is, that both are hard hit as to price, while wholesale and retail dealers, and railroad and express companies wash their hands, as did Pilate, declaring their innocence and hold up their hands in horror at the insinuation that they are getting more than the most meagre profit for their services.

Political failures are more damaging to our prosperity than crop failures, for man is a more powerful agent for progress than nature. Wild ideas sown in the seed-bed of state choke down industry; the hot blasts of hate blight the tendrils of confidence and suspicion creeping through the land scatters pests of discontent. A glance at the roster of incoming legislators indicates that we will have a bumper crop of statesmen this year as well as other useful commodities, but we are entitled to a good year. We have many men in the legislature big enough for the United States Senate and tall enough to see into the twentieth century. A good political crop means more factories, more railroads, more farms, more mines and industrial enterprises, and Texas is badly in need of them.

We are fast getting in the smoke column in Texas. According to the last federal census report our manufacturing capital increased 82 per cent over the previous decade. We now have \$216,876,000 invested in 4,588 manufacturing enterprises. We

are building a factory per day and it is quite a common occurrence to break dirt for a million dollar concern. The emergence of this great element of civilization has been painfully slow but with the intelligent attitude we now occupy toward industry and the advantages accruing from the opening of the Panama canal, there is no reason why we should not become the factory site of the universe.—Commercial Secretaries.

An Associated Press special from Madrid Spain, says: "Jose Canalejas Mendes, the prime minister, whom Spain has regarded as one of the greatest of statesmen, was shot and killed today by Manuel Pardo, a young anarchist. The assassin attempted suicide and it was first thought that he was dead, but when he had been carried to the hospital, he was found to be living. No event since the throwing of the bomb at the carriage of King Alfonso on May 31, 1906, while the king was returning from the church after his marriage, has caused such general consternation and such public sympathy. So far as can be learned at present the assassination seems to be in no way part of a widespread political plot or revolutionary movement, but an isolated crime for which the exact motive remains obscure. The assassin, who was of Spanish birth, came recently from Buenos Ayres, by way of Paris. Practically nothing is known about him.

The petition of the Retail Merchants and Jobbers association for a hearing to consider the matter of adoption of a rule prohibiting the sale and peddling of fruit and vegetables from railroad freight cars was denied by the railroad commission. The commission found this to be a controversy between retailers over which it has no authority. It declined to take a part in the row.

It is now believed to be certain that the Democrats will have charge of the United States senate as well as other branches of the government during the next four years, or for two years at least.

CITY ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the City of Goldthwaite, amending Art. 1, Chap. 11, of the Code of Ordinances of said city; prescribing the limits wherein hog-pens are prohibited, and providing how hog pens shall be kept and constructed, and providing a penalty for violating the provisions of said ordinance.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That Art. 1, Chap. 11, of the ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows: It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to have and use any hogs in a pen in the City of Goldthwaite without keeping same cleaned at all times. And that said pens are hereby required to be built with plank floor and so constructed as to have the floor of said pen slanting so that rain or water spilt or poured therein would drain off and not remain in such pen and create a stench. Provided, that no hog pens of any character of construction shall be maintained in said city which are large enough to cause a stench calculated to impair the health and comfort of the inhabitants. Provided further, that there shall be no hog pens whatever allowed within the territory bounded as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point, the intersection of Sixth and Reynolds streets, thence east along Sixth street to the intersection of Sixth and Reiley streets; thence north along Reiley street to the intersection of Fourth and Reiley streets; thence east along Fourth street to the intersection of Fourth and Rice streets, the southeast corner of Block 38; thence north along Rice street to the intersection of Rice and Second streets; thence west along Second street to the intersection of Second and Reynolds streets; thence south along Reynolds street to the place of beginning. Any person neglecting, failing or refusing to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a nuisance, and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and publication.

Passed, approved and adopted at a regular meeting of the City Council, all members present and voting for the same, held in the city of Goldthwaite on the 4th day of Nov., 1912. JAS. RAHL, Mayor. Attest L. E. Miller, City Secretary.





COUNTY COURT JURORS

Owing to the conflict in the time of the meeting of the district court and the county court on the second day of December the county court jurors are excused from attendance upon the court. S. H. ALLEN, County Judge, Mills County, Texas.

COMMISSIONERS COURT

The court has been in regular session this week, with all members present.

It was ordered that the court house yard be enlarged, the old yard being too small for the new court house.

The account of O. A. Watson of Austin for estimating the damage to the old court house by the fire of May 5 was allowed and ordered paid.

The quarterly report of S. T. Wells, county treasurer, was examined and found to be correct.

The issuance of \$55,000 court house bonds was ordered by authority of the election held Sept. 21. The bonds are to be payable in 40 years and are to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent, the interest payable semi-annually in April and October at the State Treasury in Austin, Hanover National bank in New York or the Trent State bank in Goldthwaite. A special levy of 8 cents on each \$100 valuation in Mills county was levied for the purpose of paying the interest and creating a sinking fund for the payment of the bonds.

The election returns were examined and the result declared by the court. The court was busy yesterday afternoon examining and approving the official bonds of the newly elected officers.

Allen received a communication this week from State Superintendent of Education Bralley complimenting Mills county on its continued improvement in school matters and stating that this county was far above an average in its advancement along this line. It is a splendid reputation we have gained and every citizen should be proud of it.

There are other improvements in an educational way contemplated in the county, among them the creation of an independent district and the building of a \$6000 school building at Star and some substantial improvements along the same line in Payne and Moline communities. Let the good work go on.

DEATH OF DR. BROCKENBROUGH.

Dr. Marias C. Brockenbrough, perhaps the oldest light house keeper on the gulf coast, died October 12, at his post at Brazos light at the mouth of the Brazos river. Dr. Brockenbrough was born in Virginia April 17, 1839, and moved to Texas while a young man. He served in the army under General Robert E. Lee. Soon after the war he returned to Texas and engaged in the practice of medicine at Goldthwaite, Mills county, until his removal to Velasco in 1893. Here Dr. Brockenbrough assumed the duties of light house keeper, and held the office until his death.

Dr. M. C. Brockenbrough joined Company "B" 1st La. Volunteer Infantry, C. S. A., enlisted Aug. 2, 1861, at New Orleans to serve one year. Was elected 2nd lieutenant on April 28, 1862. Served with the Command until July 1, 1863. At Gettysburg he was wounded (losing one eye and one finger) Was taken prisoner and held at Johnson's Island, Ft. Delaware, Point Lookout and Fort McHenry until Nov. 1, 1864. Was exchanged at Savannah, Ga., was furloughed for twenty days, at the expiration of which he was ordered by the department commander to report to the "43" battalion Virginia Volunteers for duty. Served with said command until disbanded at Salem, Va., in April, 1865.

Directly after the war he came to Texas and took up the study of medicine in Tulane University at New Orleans. After graduating from there he moved to west Texas and lived for many years in San Saba. In 1870 he was married to Miss Sallie Brown of that place. In 1896 he moved to Velasco, where he engaged in the Lighthouse Service, and remained until his death. He was born in Lappahannack, Essex county, Va., April 17, 1839.—Velasco World.





