D. J. Reynolds was here from the Mullin country one day this week, meeting with his friends and transacting business.

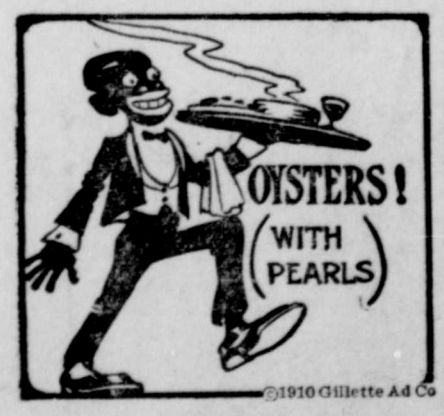

In an auto accident in Waco Saturday night the superintendent of the water works system of that city was instantly killed and members of his family were injured.

Villa says he will no longer protect foreigners in Mexico. They will not lose much, seeing they have never had protection in that country since Madero's time.

A white man claiming Oklahoma as the state of his residence reported to the Dallas police Monday night that he had been robbed of \$1125 by two negro women, who he said held him up near the Union station.

A meeting of the national Democratic executive committee has been called to meet Dec. 7 in Washington, D. C., to determine the place for holding the next national convention. Chicago, St. Louis and Dallas are all candidates for the convention and the indications are that Dallas has a mighty good showing to win.

After experimenting with the republican form of government for a few years the Chinese empire has decided to return to a monarchial form. Some of the powers have endeavored to induce a delay of the change until the close of the European war, but the "flowery empire" makes the announcement that a delay is not desired.

It is announced by one who claims to speak with authority that Joseph Bailey, who was at one time a member of the senate, will be a candidate for senator in 1918 to succeed Senator Sheppard. It was also stated that Mr. Bailey would move to Texas from Washington in time to make the race. There are still many who doubt that any man will attempt to defeat Senator Sheppard, who is likely the strongest man politically in the state of Texas.

A large number of the claims for damages because of the gasoline explosion in Ardmore some weeks ago have already been settled by the Santa Fe railroad company. President Ripley having accepted full responsibility on the part of his company for the disaster. So far no court proceedings have been had and the claimants have not even employed attorneys. It is believed the aggregate claims will amount to a million dollars.

More than 500 students in the Southwestern University at Georgetown have enrolled as members of an anti-mob association. This is said to be the first society of its kind ever formed by students in a university and the plan is to endeavor to have other colleges and universities co-operate in the formation of these anti-mob societies. The scheme is a good one and will work all right as long as "times are good," but when some fiendish act is committed like that of the black brute who entered the Grimes home near Temple some months ago the society pledges are all off and everybody wants the fiend punished before some legal technicality can turn him loose, or before some misguided sentimental persons can make a hero of him.

The anti-alien law of Arizona has been declared unconstitutional by the supreme court of the United States. Much attention was attracted to the case because several foreign governments had protested against the law and because of its similarity to the land legislation in California which restricts the ownership of real estate by Japanese. The Arizona law was enacted by the initiated vote and made it unlawful for any employer of more than five persons to employ less than 80 per cent of qualified electors or citizens of the United States. The case passed on by the court was one in which an Austrian waiter in Bisbee, Ariz., sought to enjoin his employer and the State from enforcing the law as to him. Justice Hughes, in announcing the court's decision, said it had already been established that aliens in this country were entitled to the equal protection of laws.

"Liberty Bell" will reach Los Angeles Nov. 15th and remain seven hours, then proceed to El Paso and perhaps to other points in "The Lone Star State."

The school children of California have sent an invitation to President Wilson to visit California. The exhibitions and Los Angeles will cause, we hope, the nation's chief executive to plan an early marriage and a honeymoon journey to this land of beauty, where lovers are said to grow more loving, for the spirit of love pervades the air. Out on the rolling hills the wind sings sweet songs. Down in the valleys that answer to the magical touch of man's hands with a rich harvest is the spirit of love that leads on to the rainbows and since President Wilson has fallen a victim to "Cupid's darts from a fair suffragette, he has announced himself for Woman's suffrage. Following this announcement Los Angeles suffragettes took steps to publicly express appreciation of the president's espousal of the cause. On the following Saturday a suffrage luncheon was given at the Alexandra and was practically converted into a suffrage public meeting. President Wilson was made the toast of the luncheon.

26th—The halcyon days of this month are rapidly drawing to an end. The automobile and flower show is one of the striking events of October and the first day of the kind in this city. The floral exhibit was one of bewildering loveliness, to say nothing of more than a hundred motor cars on exhibit. "The International Flower Show at New York can't surpass it," says Mr. H. H. H. H., one of the judges at the last New York show. The wonder of it all is that nobody ever thought of it before. I wish I could reproduce on paper the beauty of that scene. His plan is to have each of the 80,000 automobilists to contribute one dollar.

THE END OF CHARLEY NOYES

Editor Austin American:
Dear Sir: In the column of "Lone Star Twinklings" in yesterday's Austin American, I noticed several paragraphs from the *Lone Star* and the *Waco Times-Herald*, with your own comments concerning the old-time circus man, C. W. Noyes, proprietor of "C. W. Noyes' Crescent City Circus."

The writer hereof also cherishes some more or less happy childhood recollections of the wonders of that circus, the first in her experience, way back somewhere in the late sixties or early seventies—recollections of Woody Cook and his trained horse "Whiffle," of Mile. Tourner, "the trapeze queen," and also of the elephants, lions, tigers and hyenas and how frightened was a certain tiny girl—so frightened that, she never, never again, for a long time, could be induced to go to another show.

The writer also can tell you what never before has appeared in print—the true story of the fate of poor Charley Noyes.

In the early fall of 1885 my husband, Dr. Thomas J. Pugh, concluded to locate, soon after we were married, at the new town of Goldthwaite, then in Brown county, now the county seat of Mills county. He was there at the auction sale of lots and I followed in a few weeks. Ours among the few dwellings built in the new town, and I taught the school—first in my own house, later in a building provided by the town people.

Dr. Pugh was one of the two pioneer physicians of the place. One day he was called in to see a charity case, an old man who came to Goldthwaite as a tramp, friendless and destitute, and too ill to give a very clear account of himself. My husband telling me about his case said, "The old man has pneumonia and is going to die. I wish you would go with me to see him and see if you can find out if he has any friends or relatives." He says his name is C. W. Noyes and that he was once the owner of a circus.

At once I recalled the name, "C. W. Noyes," and remembered it as the name of the proprietor of the wonderful circus of my childhood. Of course, I went to see him and talked with him. It seemed to please him that I had seen his show, and especially that I remembered the boy, Woody Cook, his favorite bareback rider. He said Woody was still riding in Europe somewhere. He was very ill—too ill to talk much, and not inclined to talk about his family. He said he had a married daughter in New York. I tried to get her address from him, but he could not recall it. He took a letter from under his pillow and told me to read it. It was from his daughter, but only her first name was signed to it, and no address given.

The other ladies of the town assisted me in making his last hours as comfortable as possible, but death claimed him in the back room of a store in Goldthwaite. Dr. Pugh and I were the only attendants at his burial, save the few men needed to lay him away.

There was no minister at Goldthwaite at that time, and no burial service was said over his remains. There was not lacking, however, the tribute of a sympathetic tear by his physician and the woman who as a little girl had seen the famous old circus with its funny clowns, its riders, its wild man without legs, captured in some far country, its fierce animals and its gilded cages and its pink lemonade. No other "greatest show on earth" has ever provided for her the keen enjoyment nor blotted from her memory the recollections of Charley Noyes and his Crescent City circus when it came up Black river on the old "Fairly Queen" and unloaded at Bird's Point, Ark.

Some effort was made by the county authorities to find his daughter, but so far as I know, without success. The fact remains that poor Charley Noyes sleeps in an unmarked grave at Goldthwaite, Texas.

WATER WORKS ELECTION

A Large Vote Expected—Much Interest Manifested By Citizens.

The election to determine whether or not Goldthwaite will have a system of water works will be held in this city Monday. Considerable interest has been manifested by the citizens and the indications are there will be a large vote and a good majority in favor of water works.

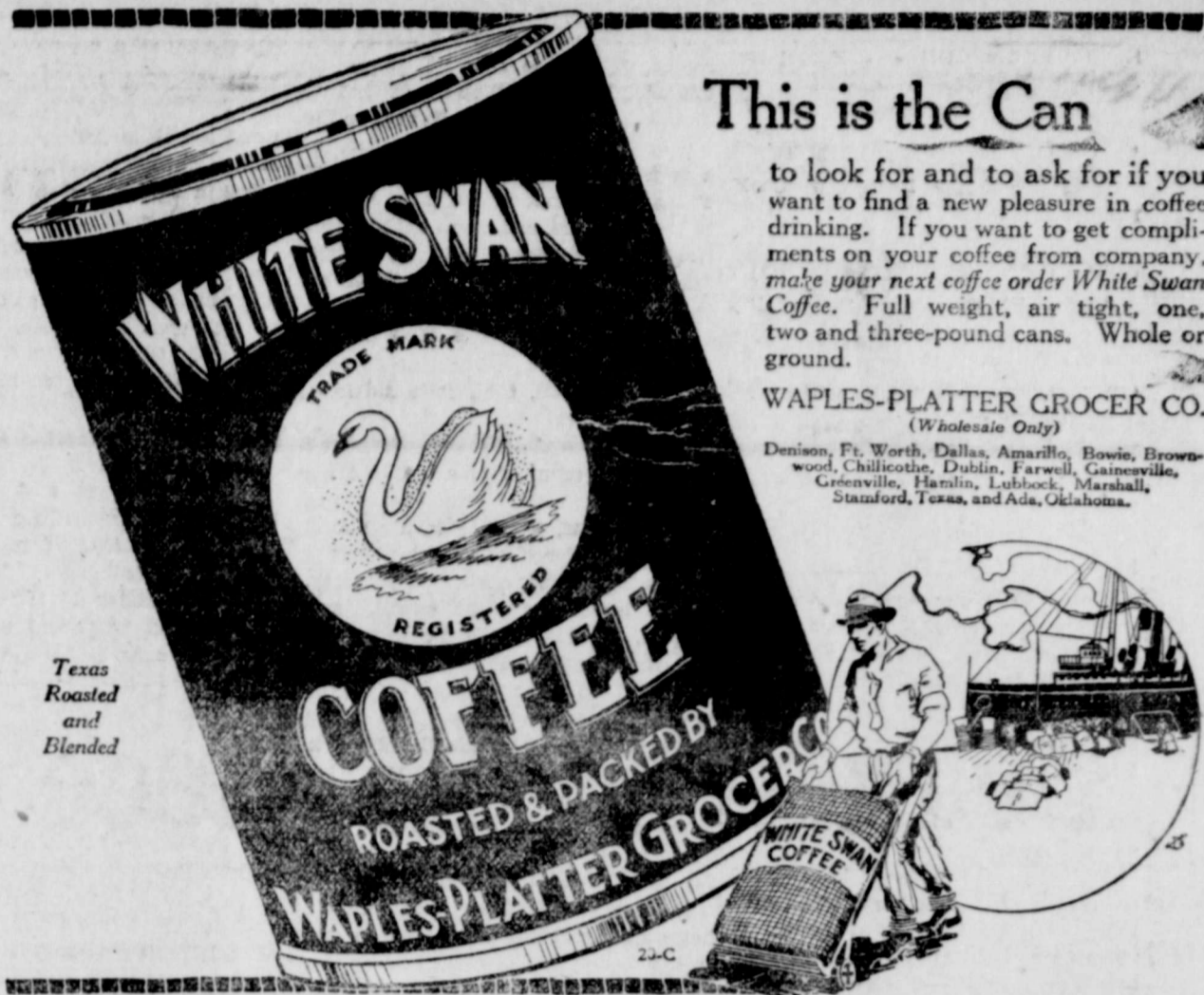

PRODUCTIVE CAPITAL

Capital is very essential in progressive farming. There was a time in this country when little capital was needed. Land was cheap, building materials very low and few implements required under existing conditions. That time has passed when farming could be done profitably with out considerable capital.

The lack of capital has kept many farmers from producing and marketing to advantage. This is to be expected. Those who have more land, more farming equipment and better facilities for marketing have the advantage of those who lack these things. The man with very little means for equipment must compete with the farmer who has all modern facilities for farming.

The best way to secure capital is to produce it on the farm. True this may be slow, but it is safe. The man who begins in earnest and is determined to succeed will find a way. He will anticipate his needs and as fast as he earns enough to buy an implement or machine needed in production investments will be made in equipment.

Livestock will be added as fast as means can be secured and the increase taken care of; buildings will be erected from time to time as this can be afforded.

Most business men begin in a very small way. Not a few of our most successful merchants were clerks in stores at small salaries a few years ago. They began for themselves in a very modest way and in a few years some of them own a large and prosperous business. Farm hands and tenants can do the same. If farms cost more now than they did a few years ago they are worth more. The equipment needed may be very expensive, but at the same time it enables the farmer to produce much more and is well worth his efforts to secure it.

It is generally advisable for those who begin farming to buy a small farm and equip it well, rather than a larger farm with little money left for equipment. A small farm well tiled is apt to be more profitable than a larger farm with little equipment and in hands unskilled.—Farm and Ranch.
