The Way It Was-

Goldthwaite Eagle - Then And Now

In the month of September, 1885, the first sale of lots took place for the building of a new town called Goldthwaite. At the time of the sale, the site was a village of tents, with one brush arbor sheltering saloons, grocery counters, meat hanging from open racks, shelves laden with drugs, and a barber shop. This little town of tents was destined to become the county seat for the county of Mills, and the future home of "The Goldthwaite Eagle."

After the sale of these lots, Goldthwaite was chosen as the county seat, and the village

immediately began to grow. Business houses were quickly established, churches were built, the courts and city government organized and set into motion, and the population of this teeming young town soon reached 1200.

When there is a new town, a new county seat and people, there must, also, be a newspaper.

Several attempts to set up a profitable newspaper for Goldthwaite failed until the year 1894, when Mr. W. H. Thompson (father of Scott Thompson of the Heritage Home), as editor, and his nephew, Mr. R. M. Thompson, as junior pro-

prietor, established a newspaper called The Mountain Eagle.

Both Mr. Thompsons were newspaper men from first to last, and their four-page weekly, published every Saturday, was quickly accepted by the people of the county. They printed, primarily, local news with a small amount of state and national news.

A deaf man, Jimmie McAlexander, was a reporter for R. M. Thompson around 1910. He was assigned duty at the Santa Fe Depot where he and his pen recorded visitors, their business here, and how long they would stay.

The subscription rate was

one dollar per year, and subscribers looked forward to its arrival, especially in the rural areas. The "Eagle" was their one means of knowing what was happening in the adjoining communities, what was advertised for sale in town, and their one small touch with the outside world. Few families subscribed to any paper other than the Mountain Eagle.

A Correction in The Mountain Eagle on January 17, 1895: "Will you please allow me to correct a grave mistake which came out in your paper. In speaking of the Mountain City Cornet Band coming to Mullin to the church supper given by the ladies of Mullin, you said the supper was free—that was all right; but when you said they set up the wine, you were sadly mistaken. The ladies had nothing to do with setting up the wine, nor did they know anything about it. I write this in defense of the ladies of Mullin; signed, J. W. Mangrem.

In April, 1896, The Mountain Eagle was sold by Mr. W. H. Thompson to his nephew, Mr. R. M. Thompson. Mr. R. M. Thompson changed the name of the paper to "The Goldthwaite Eagle" and the newspaper remained in his possession for the next twenty-six years; through the turn of the century; through the first World War; through floods and droughts; through good times and bad times.

It was difficult, in the early days, for a newspaper editor to receive news from outer communities, as the mails were uncertain and telephones were not yet installed. His best source of information was his twice daily visit to the depot to meet the train. There, people gathered from over the entire county at train time, and the Eagle Editor could interview the incoming and departing passengers and gather other items of interest for compiling his news. One of the engineers of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad once complained that Goldthwaite had a population of 1200, and all 1200 were at the depot every time his train rolled in.

The Goldthwaite Eagle was sold by Mr. R. M. Thompson to Mr. E. M. Wilson and family in November, 1920. Mr. Wilson changed the name-plate of the paper by adding a picture of an eagle. The newspaper grew to sixteen pages and two sections.

In 1929, Mr. Wilson sold the Eagle to Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Wilson. The paper continued to have eight pages under Mr. Wilson's ownership.

In 1950, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Wilson sold The Goldthwaite Eagle to Mr. H. R. Ekins. In May, 1950, a weekly newspaper, The Mullin Enterprise, was consolidated with the Eagle, making the Eagle the only newspaper in the county. The paper immediately jumped to sixteen pages. Mr. Ekins ran a column called "The Eagles Eye" and

Mills County Dove Season Begins Monday, Sept. 1st

The 1975 rendition of the Texas season on the mourning dove begins in Mills County on Monday.

Local Game Warden, Benny Schriver, stated Wednesday morning that the dove population hereabouts is relatively small compared to some previous years, but that the population in counties immediately north of Mills are heavily populated.

The hot weather the last few weeks has kept the birds north

of here, Schriver says, but in a couple of weeks the birds should move into this area. A good norther and some rain would make the season good.

Weather patterns have more to do with dove populations and migrations than most people think. There's usually plenty of food everywhere for the birds; they just like cooler temperatures.

The regulations for dove season in this north zone of Texas are basically the same

as in 1974. Daily bag limits are ten and you may have 20 in your possession. A standard Texas hunting license is required to hunt doves.

Hours for dove season range from noon until the officially set time for sunset.

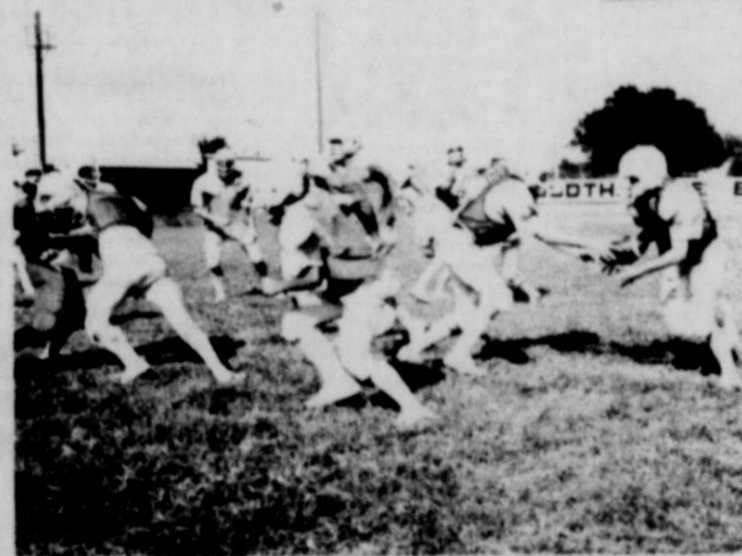

Football Ticket Sales Start Thurs. (Today)

Supt. Davis has announced that football tickets will go on sale Thursday, August 28, at 12:00 noon. Reserved seat tickets for all the home games will cost \$8.75. Tickets at the gate will sell for \$1.00, students; and \$1.75, adults.

Junior High and B team game tickets will be \$1.00 for adults, and 75 cents for students if there are three games and 50 cents for students if there are two games.

Projects involving the schools for the coming year were discussed, including a program for all four schools, to be developed later this year, with a patriotic theme.

Herbert Cooke reported that there have been over 800 visitors to the museum over the past two months, some of which have come from as far away as Germany. The museum's bills were discussed by the members, and reports on the Committee's budget noted that over \$300 has been contributed to the Bicentennial Fund by local organizations.

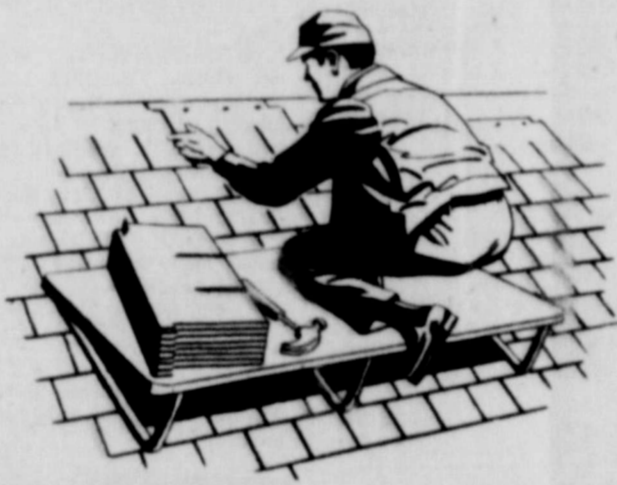

Mills County, has been executive director for the past several years. The Mills County HCCA Advisory Board is composed of the following: Judge Herbert Faulkner, chairman; Mrs. Charles Schrader, vice-chairman; Mrs. Athula Nichols, secretary; Horace Brooks, Mrs. Jewel Yeager, Mrs. Gloria Marler, Brian Smith, Mrs. Romona Corona, Mrs. Carrie Harper, T. J. Williams, Mrs. Lillian Stokes and Norman Duren.

The many programs and services made available by HCCA to residents of Mills County are contributing much to the lives of many people.

HEAD START is a program authorized under the Economic Opportunity Act to provide comprehensive developmental services to disadvantaged pre-school children.

To achieve its goals, Head Start provides not only for the educational needs of the children, but also for their social, psychological, health and nutritional requirements. Recognizing the major role of the family in child development, Head Start has pioneered in the area of parent involvement . . . giving low-income parents an opportunity to learn about the needs of their children and to help plan and implement local Head Start programs.

Head Start for this county is funded for twenty children. Ten percent can be handicapped and ten percent over the income guidelines. An income guideline is used to determine who is eligible for the program.

A total of thirteen children are now enrolled in the Goldthwaite Head Start. Seven are now needed to fill the quota. Parents are urged to hurry and register their four year olds. This year the program is not registering five year olds.

The center hours for this year are 8:05 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. The bus students stay till 4:00 P.M. From 2:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. the staff will make home visits, plan the next day's program, keep records and clean the building.

The Head Start staff for this year are Virginia Coronado, teacher, and Grace Smith, teacher aid.

The FAMILY PLANNING program provides medical services, education and counseling to women and their families to help them deal with pregnancy, birth control and related areas. The staff can also refer participants to other social services they may need.

Funds for this work come through the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare. The private physician-patient concept of services is used. An appointment is made with the woman's chosen physician and services are provided by this physician. He receives reimbursement for these services in voucher form from our program and the pharmacist is utilized to provide medication in the same manner. A woman is seen once a year, if there are no complications, and on this yearly visit she receives a thorough physical exam, urinalysis, pap smear and blood test. In our county, cancer cases have been discovered in early treatable stages in women who might never have had the opportunity for a pap smear except through this program.

Initially, the low-income woman of child bearing age was the main concern, but as the emphasis on overpopulation and its accompanying extremes grow the agency serves all, regardless of age, sex, income, color or creed.

Your local Family Planning Outreach worker is Peggy Patterson who is ready to extend to you the services of this program.

THE RETIRED SENIOR VOLUNTEER PROGRAM is beginning its fourth year in the county. Cornelia Boykin is Director and Ruth Dumas county coordinator. The Mills Co. Advisor Committee is composed of John Davidson, chairman; Troy Williams, vice-chairman; Mary Lou Gallows, secretary; Julian Evans, Aneel Morgan, Mrs. W. W. Boykin, Judy Beavers, Miss Greta Sue Hines and Mrs. Gladys Cochrum.

Through RSVP the senior citizens are given an opportunity to contribute time, knowledge, experience, talents and interest to others in our own county. RSVP activities are as numerous and diverse as the senior volunteer. At present, Mills County has 185 volunteers doing varied activities, such as visiting the sick and lonely, sharing home baked goodies, providing transportation, reading, singing, providing entertainment, sewing, directing crafts and games, exercise, etc. The list of things to be done is endless.

The SENIOR OPPORTUNITIES & SERVICES is a program for people 55 years of age or older. We are fortunate

to have this program in our county since 35 percent of Mills County population is over 60 years of age.

One of the services provided is information and referral. Our office is happy to help you with information and referral to Social Security, Supplemental Security Income, Medical Equipment, State Commission for the Blind, State Library for the Blind, Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Texas Rehabilitation Commission, etc.

Probably our most popular program is the Senior Centers. Goldthwaite Center meets every second Wednesday for lunch and every other Wednesday at 1:00 P.M. at the Baptist Youth Center. The Mullin Senior Center meets every other Monday at Mullin Community Center. The Priddy Senior Center meets every 3rd Thursday at the Zion Lutheran Fellowship Hall. The Star Senior Center meets every 4th Wednesday at the Star Methodist Fellowship Hall. Everyone is welcome and urged to attend these centers.

Louise Long has worked as Director of Mills Co. SOS programs with Gladys Cochrum outreach aide, and Elva Niel as Vista worker.

Community Action also offers assistance in the form of Immunization Programs, Christmas for underprivileged children, etc.

Cattlemen in Mills County should be aware of the fact that the dreaded cattle disease anthrax has once again struck in a number of locations in the state.

Sporadic deaths have occurred in Harris, Tom Green, Victoria, Medina, Falls and Robertson counties in recent weeks. The deaths were reported by Dr. J. B. Young with the Texas Animal Health Commission after confirmation by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at College Station.

The most recent anthrax deaths occurred in five herds in the Marlin-Bremont area of Falls and Robertson counties. These and adjacent herds have been placed under state quarantine.

We wish to emphasize that there is no cause for alarm among livestock producers. Producers in the affected counties as well as those in neighboring counties should vaccinate their herds as soon as possible if they were not vaccinated back in the spring. This may or may not be a problem for us in Mills County. Local veterinarians should be consulted for advice on herd management for this particular disease.

Livestock deaths from anthrax can be quickly stopped

within eight days in almost all cases by prompt and proper vaccination with Sterne's strain vaccine.

Symptoms of parasitism in sheep and goats are not specific and may be confused with symptoms of other diseases. However, certain symptoms are common to all internal parasitisms - usually a lack of bloom, unthriftiness and weight loss. Some animals will develop diarrhea and an anemic condition as indicated by paleness of the mucous membranes of the eyes and mouth. Some animals may eat dirt. In advanced stages, they may develop a swelling beneath the jaws, referred to as bottle jaw.

Several animals showing one or more of these symptoms provide ample reason to suspect parasitism. Whenever diagnosis is doubtful, obtain the services of a veterinarian.

Fecal specimens that are to be sent to a laboratory for examination should be fresh and kept thoroughly chilled until they are presented to the lab. Small three ounce waxed cartons of the type used for

dispensing ice cream make satisfactory containers.

ATTENTION LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS!

The Mills County Program Building Committee is requesting the continued support of livestock producers for the operation of the County Trapper Program. The program is funded completely from donations made by livestock producers.

other entitled "The Eagles Aery."

In October, 1952, the paper was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Victor E. Koleber. The paper then had twelve pages. Mr. Koleber carried a weekly newsletter entitled "Inside Washington" and a short "Soliloquy" for his paper.

Frank Bridges, the present owner and Editor of The Goldthwaite Eagle, bought the newspaper in October, 1971.

Coming to Goldthwaite from the editorship of the Schulenburg Sticher, Bridges is a fourth generation Texas newspaperman. His great-grandfather, J. P. Bridges, founded the Luling Signal in 1875. H. Frank Bridges, his grandfather, was editor of the Nixon News for many years, and Frank's father is presently the owner and publisher of the Flatonia Argus. All have been small, rural newspapers.

But, because they're rural doesn't mean they're backward. The Eagle has installed modern offset printing methods and computerized typesetting into the operation of publishing.

We, the people of Mills County, are proud of our newspaper and its new face. Its circulation carries the news of our county to all parts of the world; to former residents, to people with relatives living here, to the young in colleges and universities, to the aged, to soldiers in far away places and to our next door neighbors.

The Goldthwaite Schools named all their athletic teams and their band after the "Eagle". An eagle graces the floor of our school gymnasium. When the word "Eagle" is mentioned, our thoughts turn to our newspaper and schools. State Senator Chet Brooks of Pasadena, Texas, was once an employee of The Goldth-

waite Eagle. The Goldthwaite Eagle is an independent newspaper, a member of the Texas Press Association, and has been published every Thursday in the Eagle Building on the corner of Fisher and Fifth Street since its origin eighty-one years ago. New machinery has been added from time to time; each new editor made his changes, but The Goldthwaite Eagle is still our paper to read and enjoy.
