## Hunters Fined

Two separate incidents resulted in the fining of three out-of-county men over the weekend in Mills County.

Justice of the Peace Troy Williams fined two men for over-the-limit possession of quail. Quail season is not open in Mills County, but is open in San Saba County where these birds were allegedly killed.

Fined were John Nix of Texarkana and Edsel Nix of Bonham. They were fined a total of \$202.50 each for the possession of 93 quail. The legal limit for two men is 24 quail in possession.

Ronald C. Craig of Arlington was fined \$27.50 for not tagging his buck deer killed in the agency area. Justice of the Peace Ernest Thorne levied the fine on Craig.

Local Game Warden Benny R. Schriver was in charge of the investigations.

## 178 Deer Reported At Mills Locker Opening Weekend

Joe Langford, owner of Mills County Locker Plant in Goldthwaite, reported Monday morning that a total of 178 deer had been brought in Saturday and Sunday, the first weekend of

deer season. Last year a total of 154 were reported the first two days of deer season.

The buck with the greatest number of points was brought in to the locker by Bill Brown of Star at 8 a.m. Saturday morning. The buck had 11 points and was killed with a 30-30 rifle. Bill is a junior at Star High School.

The heaviest deer reported at the locker weighed 127 pounds.

Darleen McCoy, with a six-point, was the first to report a kill at the processing plant Saturday morning.

Three turkeys were received by the locker over the weekend.

The number of deer killed in Mills County so far this season is still considerably less than in previous years.

## The Way It Was Part II Fun Times In Goldthwaite

Three buildings were chiefly involved when people had fun times in Goldthwaite during the 1920's and 1930's. If the walls of these old buildings could talk, much of the history of the town could be told.

The old "Dixie Theatre", on the east corner of Fisher and Third St., was the scene of many movies, both silent and "talkie". Negro minstrels, dance and music recitals, graduation exercises, band concerts, variety programs, plays and courtships among the young are a part of its history.

When Rudolph Valentino was the idol of every young girl, Tom Mix and William Hart the hero of every young cowboy, and Mary Pickford gave older boys a heart-throb, the Dixie was in its zenith. There was an orchestra pit at the base of the stage, and it was sometimes called the "opera house" of Goldthwaite. Many programs were given on its stage, usually under the very competent direction of Mrs. John G. (Nora Hooks) Berry and Mrs. Sam (Leatrice Trent) Sullivan. The negro minstrels were the favored programs, and the ever faithful Nora Berry was always there to direct them.

Goldthwaite's local boys usually made up the orchestra, and in the very early days of the theatre, a few of the orchestra members were Kelly Saylor, Neal Dickerson, Claude Saylor, Sam Sullivan, Scott Thompson, Jim Kelly and L. B. (Cap) Walters.

Later the orchestra found Julian Evans at the drums, Fritz Rudd at the trumpet, Paul McCullough playing the piano, Jack Rudd playing the clarinet, and Bill Yarborough playing the trombone. These boys entertained at many functions such as school programs, Lions Club programs and many other events. The music of these young men still rings in the memory of every person having had the pleasure of hearing them play.

High School Graduations were held at the Dixie, and there are many of our present citizens who marched down its aisle to receive their diplomas. It was a custom at early graduations for friends and relatives of graduates to have bouquet after bouquet of flowers shipped in by train, and placed in piles at the feet of the graduates on this eventful occasion to end the program.

Many other plays were produced and directed at the Dixie by the capable and talented Norma Frizzelle Waler, who organized a Little Theatre Group in Goldthwaite. Miss Frizzelle was a graduate of The American School of Theatre Arts in New York City, the acting school from which the Barrymores, Colts, and other famous actors were graduated. These plays were professionally done, and greatly appreciated by the audience, some of them running for several performances. A few members of this Little Theatre Group were Raymond Little, Flora Wilson, Julian Evans, Emily Anderson Gilliam, Mary Florence McCullough Smith and Sophia Martin.

People were delighted with movies from their very beginning. Great were the days of Pearl White when she played in a serial called THE PERILS OF PAULINE, and the heroine was tied to the railroad track with the big locomotive bearing down upon her, only to have the hero dash up and save her just in the nick of time. The excitement of movies that held us spellbound, and the sound of children's laughter at the antics of Fatty Arbuckle, linger in our memories. But the ever popular newsreels were looked forward to most of all, especially by the adults.

It is hard for us to imagine today, with our present advantages, what little contact the

people of Mills County had with the outside world during these early days. With the introduction of the newsreel into theatres, a whole new world was opened to them. People were seeing fascinating places and eventual happenings they never dreamed of seeing. They watched General Pershing as he marched with his troops during World War I and cheered him wildly; they watched their dough-boys eat Thanksgiving Dinner on the battle front in France, and saw the ticker-tape parade on Wall Street that followed the Armistice. Fox newsmen showed them motorcycle races, dance marathons, and much of the mad world that followed the war; the crash

of Wall Street that started the great depression; the skyscrapers of New York City and the horrors of the burning Zeppelin. The news reels were truly looked forward to.

The Dixie Theatre building has been owned by the Jim Cockrum family since its beginning.

On most nights, when the movies had ended, the young people climbed a stairway which was just inside the theatre entrance and led to a large rooftop on the adjoining building to the north. This outdoor playground was sixty feet by one-hundred-fifty feet in size, and was enclosed with a wire fence, which is still in view today. Here almost every boy

and girl in Goldthwaite, at one time or another, either skated or danced the night away under the stars. Many other activities were held there, from cake walks to a greased pig contest.

Across the street from the Dixie Theatre, at the west corner of Fisher and Third, the Saylor Hotel was built between 1914 and 1916 by Jacob and Claude Saylor. This new hotel was one of the finest around, being built of reinforced concrete, with spacious rooms furnished well for the time and age, each room having its own water pitcher and wash basin. A large dining room was built on the front of the building, which later became the Saylor Chevrolet show room, and delicious meals were served there. A large ball room was built on the third floor, and for a while, well known orchestras were hired to come to Goldthwaite to play for these formal affairs.

These three old buildings stand today, very much a part of our past, but other buildings played their part, too. The famous Lawrence Welk of TV fame once played for a dance at the Henry Stallings Warehouse in Goldthwaite; now known as Hollis Blackwell Warehouse No. 3, and operated by Y. B. Johnson.

Julian Evans played with a very talented musician, Flake Phifer, a piano tuner by profession, and husband of Babe Morgan, an aunt of Jack Morgan of Goldthwaite. Flake and Julian played many times at a club room that was located over the present Kaubs Variety Store.

Goldthwaite's B Squad was defeated by DeLeon 35-14 in their final game of the season last Thursday night. Goldthwaite lost two of their players in the final two periods of play - Tommy Collier and Mike Williams - due to key injuries.

Collier took the pigskin in the first period of play for a 68-yard TD run. Mike Connolly passed to Williams for the two-point conversion. DeLeon came back and also racked up eight points in the first period of play, tying the score 8-8.

Williams passed to Dean Humphries for the second and final Eagle TD. The try for extra point failed.

DeLeon racked up another six-pointer before half time and made good the two-point conversion. DeLeon kept the lead after halftime and went ahead of the Eagles 35-14 in the next two quarters.

"The local B Team did a fine job this season and I have

really enjoyed working with them," commented Coach Perry Farley. "In the game Thursday night after losing Collier and Williams the going was pretty tough for the rest of the squad members."

Mrs. Parker studied art three years at the San Antonio Art Institute, one year at Cisco Junior College, and in summer classes at Instituto Allende in San Miguel, Mexico. Workshops she has attended include one in Ashiya, Japan, and others in Dallas, Fort Worth and Abilene.

Mrs. Parker has won numerous awards, including a first place in the Eastland County Art Exhibit. In the past she has won Best of Show ribbons in San Antonio and Midland.
