Four Days Left To Purchase 1976 License Stickers

Mills County residents have four more days left in which to purchase their 1976 license stickers, according to announcement by H. G. Brooks, county tax assessor-collector. Deadline for purchasing the stickers is Thursday, April 1.

Persons wishing to purchase license plates' stickers should bring the proper forms with them to the tax office. All that is needed to purchase the plates is the special three-part license form which all vehicle owners should have received through the mail from the Texas Highway Department.

All vehicle owners who did not receive the proper licensing forms from the highway department are advised to bring

the auto title papers and current registration receipts with them when they purchase their stickers.

The county tax assessor-collector's office is open each weekday from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Approximately 4,400 vehicles are registered in the county.

"Time To Run" To Be Shown Saturday

"Time To Run", a film that is a mixture of problems and solutions, will be shown at the Youth Center of the First Baptist Church on Saturday, March 27. The feature, filmed in Eastmancolor by World Wide Pictures, will be shown once beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Museum Applies For National Historic Register Listing

Application is being made to the Palmer Building, home of the Mills County Historical Museum, placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The National Register includes not only properties of national significance, but those on the local state levels, and serves as an authoritative guide to be used to identify properties which should be protected from destruction or impairment.

In 1893, the Palmer Building is one of the first buildings to be built in Goldthwaite and an excellent example of the simple style of early commercial stone structures.

At its Thursday, March 18 meeting, the Mills County Historical Museum Committee decided unanimously that the building will be used solely as a museum.

The committee scheduled a inventory of the present museum in order to develop an exhibit plan which will tell the story of Mills County, with appropriate items already in the museum and those which will be donated or loaned as museum grows.

The group voted to give maximum assistance to the Historical Commission's Country Fair at the May 29th Bicentennial Celebration and Old Soldiers' Contest. Proceeds from the Country Store will go to the Museum Fund.

Herbert Cooke, Committee Chairman, reported that dona-

tions to help pay for the museum building are still coming in, and he praised the citizens of Mills County and other interested donors for their support of "such a worthwhile project as the Museum". The Way It Was Goldthwaite And Its History

PART III

A description of the early town square should make us realize how much progress our little city has made in a time so short. The first town square was a small city of tents in the beginning. A tiny one-room jail was built west of the location of the present jail to suffice until a permanent one could be constructed in 1888. There were a few tents housing groceries, a saloon, a drug store, and space for a barber shop.

Goldthwaite, as all frontier towns, had to have a well and a place to water the many horses that stood hitched to rails in front of businesses and around the square. A well was dug by hand labor north of the square, but tragedy struck in the digging, and a life was lost. A Mr. Peyton was suffocated by poisonous gases when he entered the well too soon after a dynamite blast. The well was located several feet into the street and a horse watering trough was built close by.

At that time the square was much smaller than the present courthouse lawn. Two octagon shaped watering troughs were later built in the street - one not far from the location of the present Yarborough's store and the other in the street to the northeast of the square.

On September 4, 1889, Commissioners Court met to consider bids for the construction of a courthouse. Bids were opened and John Cormack of Lampasas got the bid for the construction cost of \$27,500. The courthouse was to be burned on May 5, 1912, and the present courthouse was built and moved into in December of 1913. No county records were lost in the burning. Several years after the courthouse was finished, a concrete bandstand was built on the northeast corner of the courthouse square and many early-day bands played there. It was also used for rallies, speeches, sermons and various other public affairs.

Business houses and dwellings began to spring up over town, and the one person most sought after was the good rock mason. Most business places were built of rock and mortar, and every house had a fireplace which also called for a rock mason.

Goldthwaite's earliest good rock mason was John Henry Potter whose handiwork can still be seen over town in the many old buildings and fireplaces in the older homes. Later he was joined in this work by his two sons, John and Bart Potter. John Potter lived in the western part of town and the three Potter men built a beautiful rock fence that stands today very much as they built it before the turn of the century. It is on the property of Raymond Burdett and is to the back of the Kellis Landrum home. John Henry Potter and his sons also helped build the first permanent school structure - The Ella Goldthwaite Academy. Mr. John Fulton was another early-day stone mason in Goldthwaite and helped build many of the first old buildings in town.

The first school was private and taught by Mrs. Fannie Pugh in a small building on Fisher Street. The late John Hester attended that school. The first public school was located on the Littlepage residence lot, with two rooms. Then followed the purchase of the old McAlpiper Hotel, a two-story structure located on lots now belonging to W. P. Woody. This was soon outgrown and a struggle began to build a permanent school building, and James Rahl took the lead in this movement. He soon had enough signers on a note to persuade The Trent State Bank to loan \$3,000 to

start construction. But money was still hard to raise, so Joe Goldthwaite, for whom the city was named, donated the corner lot on Fisher and Fourth Streets to be auctioned to benefit the school as a gratuity for naming the town for him. Bonds were voted, passed by a narrow margin, and the building was finished. It was named The Ella Goldthwaite Academy in honor of Joe Goldthwaite's twelve-year-old daughter, Ella, and was a stone structure on the west part of the present high school grounds.

As time marched on, new businesses sprang up. There was the J. D. Urquart "Racket Store" where children loved to go. J. C. Evans moved his grocery and put in the first modern grocery Goldthwaite was to see. Everly Bros. operated a general mercantile store on the west side of the square and one Mrs. Everly was a doctor while the other Mrs. Everly had a millinery shop. She was followed by Mrs. Oscar (Ethyl) Holland, who sold hats to ladies in Goldthwaite for many years. Ladies loved to wear hats in the early days, and didn't feel properly dressed for an outing without one. The hats were securely fastened to the hair with long jeweled haps that also made dangerous weapons if a lady had an occasion to use them. Other millinery shops were owned by Myrtle Harrison, whose shop was in the Henry Martin Dry Goods, and Mrs. Addie Smith Bodkin.

In 1900, the Santa Fe sent a special train to Galveston to view the wreckage brought to that city by a hurricane. All girls pre-school through kindergarten residing in Mills County are invited to participate.

the block where Steen's Hardware now stands once burned to the ground. The following notice appeared in The Goldthwaite Eagle: The National Association of Fire Volunteers have offered a reward of \$250 for the arrest and conviction of persons who burned the west block of Goldthwaite on February 14, 1898. The other major fire, other than the burning of the courthouse, was the loss of the First Baptist Church on October 26, 1948, with the loss of one life and several severe injuries.

J. C. Mullin operated an early-day variety store where the old Melba Theatre building now is, and later established a dry-goods business where the drive-in to the Mills County State Bank is now located. Mr. Mullin operated this store for some fifteen years, and was the father-in-law of another longtime dry-goods merchant in Goldthwaite, O. H. Yarborough. Mr. Yarborough went into business in 1919 where the

The night of April 9, 1976, on the Goldthwaite Eagle Field at 8 o'clock p.m., will be a special treat for the people of Mills County.

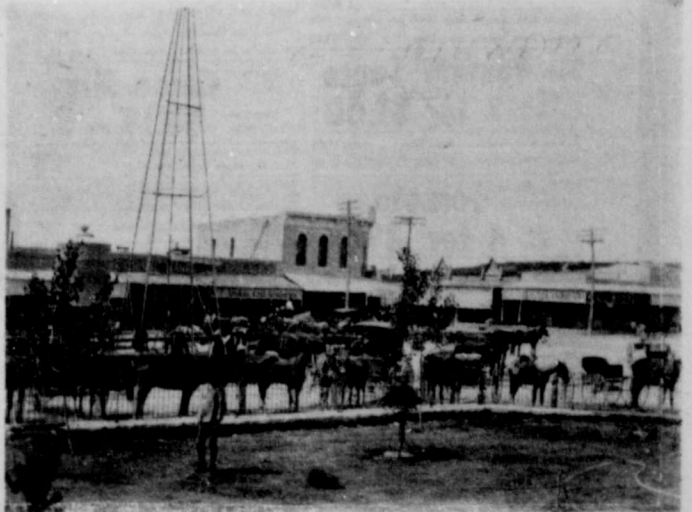

In hiring personnel, it has been the policy of the Board to employ the best applicants available regardless of local ties or wherever they may live. In the case of a person already in the system and doing a good job, he or she will be favored over someone else. This may mean employing a person, at times, with an emergency certificate. Efficiency and certification are not always correlated. Most everyone knows that a good teacher with a Masters degree was also a good teacher with a Bachelors degree. Academic achievements are achieved in the classroom rather than on certificates tucked away in some filing cabinet. Professional improvement, however, is very important.

I suppose every school system has some problems, and we are no exception. I am not a pessimist, but I can assure you that regardless of who sits on the Board or who the Superintendent is, more problems lie ahead for all schools.

The opinions mentioned above are my own and not necessarily those of the entire Board. I seek no credit for anything that we may have done right, but I am personally willing to accept my share and more of things that have gone wrong.

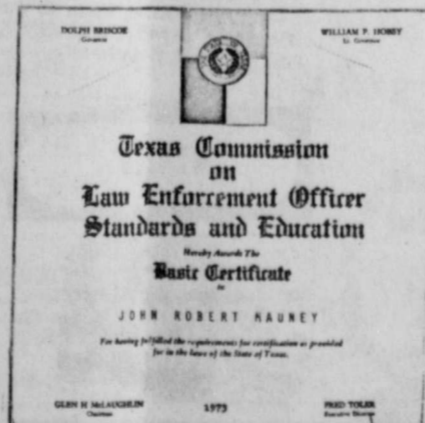

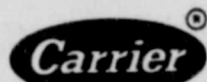

present store stands and is now operated by his son, Harold, and his grandson, Owen Yarborough. Previous to his entry into this business, O. H. Yarborough had worked in The Trent State Bank.

Sreet and Geeslin at one time operated a grocery store in Goldthwaite, as did Lee and John C. Hicks.

Dr. Brown operated a drug store where Yarborough's now stands, and had his office there. This building had a second floor with a banistered porch running across the front and along the west side.

El Archer arrived in Goldthwaite in 1898 and worked with Prock McCullough in their young days as 'hod' carriers, helping to build many buildings in town where brick and mortar were required. They helped build the little Baptist Church on Fisher Street in 1901.

Prock McCullough went on to become owner of Barnes and McCullough Lumber Company, which is today in the same family and operated by O. O. Smith, a son-in-law.

El Archer later became a groceryman in Goldthwaite, an occupation he was to pursue for the remainder of his life. He was a man with a pleasant personality and joking manner, and he and other businessmen of the town pulled many jokes on visiting drummers from the East. (All rights reserved.)

FROM THE COUNTY AGENT --

When pasture or hay do not provide needed nutrients, they must be supplemented. Ordinarily cattle do not store large amounts of protein, thus it becomes necessary to supply adequate amounts through supplemental feeds. For various reasons there are times when it becomes necessary to provide supplemental protein. Low quality hay, droughty pastures, etc. dictate supplemental protein feeds.

There are many kinds of protein supplements on the market. It is advisable that producers find those supplements which provide actual protein at reasonable cost.

Most studies show that synthetic protein sources often do not support animal performance on an equal basis with natural proteins such as cottonseed meal or high forage diets. The synthetic sources are important and should be considered when natural supplements cost 10-25 percent more per unit of protein.
