

Goldthwaite And Its History

Edward Geeslin had an ice house and bottling works where the present City Utilities are located on Fisher Street. The old blob-topped bottles used by that bottling works are now a collectors' item. Ben Geeslin operated a general mercantile store.

L. E. Miller bought a store from Dr. Logan where the present Hudson Drug now stands and remodeled it. Dow Hudson bought the store about 1920 and L. E. Miller kept a jewelry shop on the south side of the store, while Dow Hudson ran a drug store and soda fountain in the remainder of the building. Later, a brother to Dow, Blake Hudson, returned to Goldthwaite and went into business with him. Dr. Joe Townsend, father-in-law of Dow Hudson, had an office in the back of the drug store. Dow Hudson, prior to buying his own drug store, worked in the Clements drug store. Julian Evans started working for L. E. Miller in 1917, and worked in the store with Mr. Hudson for the next thirty years. Julian has made uncountable ice-cream sodas from "the best ice-cream in the world", or so the younger set thought about 1930.

The first bank in Goldthwaite was located on the east side of Fisher Street in the same block that Steen's Hardware is located today. It was called D. H. Trent, Banker. The name was changed several times, and later moved to the north corner of Fisher and Fourth Street where Stacy's Insurance is located and was called The Trent State Bank for many years.

Another bank existed in Goldthwaite for a long time. This bank was housed where Head Insurance is located on Fourth Street, and was called The Frist National Bank, with W. E. Miller as president.

L. J. Gartman was an early piano and organ salesman in Goldthwaite and operated a music store here for many years.

The last blacksmith shop Goldthwaite was to have was run by W. H. Linkenhogor in the building the Ford Garage had just vacated on Fisher St. It was later moved to Parker Street where Carl Letbetter's Welding Shop operated for a long time.

The "Village Blacksmith" was as necessary to a community as the doctor, dentist or minister in the early days. He labored from morning till night over the hot anvils pounding away at chains, horse shoes, branding irons; repairing plows, wagons and all kinds of farm equipment.

Mr. Linkenhogor was quite a craftsman with making things, both large and small. He invented a disc-plow that protruded some distance to one side for the purpose of cultivating fruit trees so that the team of horses could go around the outside of the tree and the plow reach underneath to do the plowing. He also made for the Methodist Church, though he was a Presbyterian, all the little trays that clamp on the communion rail and hold the Holy Sacraments.

Mr. Cryer ran another blacksmith shop on the west side of the square and he invented an eccentric windmill that was very unusual. This windmill was made so that it would not freeze in winter; and he also put the first oil boxes on windmills here and had both these patented. When his patent expired, other windmill companies started using the oil boxes.

J. C. Evans and G. W. Jackson were partners in an early invention to try to rid the county of the destructive and dreaded boll weevil. They devised a cultivator with pans on each side which were filled with coal oil. There were stiff brushes that rotated through the coal oil, brushed and punctured the cotton bolls, and hopefully killed the boll weevils.

Another Goldthwaite man, John G. Schooler, invented a fire extinguisher which used carbon tetrachloride - made especially for fire in oil tanks. If the fire could be caught in

its early stages, this invention, which held a charge of black gun powder, could be thrown into the tank causing it to explode and the carbon tetrachloride extinguished the fire.

Wellie Saylor was, by nature, a lover of the soil. He owned a sandy track of land on the southwest corner of town and established the first fruit tree nursery and orchard in the county. When problems arose with trees and fruit, farmers went to him for advice. He blazed the trail for orchards in Mills County.

As much a fixture on a town's main street as the general-mercantile store was the barbershop. Here a man could go to relax in a cushioned chair, have a massage on his face with steaming towels, get a ten cent shave and a two-bit hair cut. A barber was judged by the number of personal shaving mugs on his shelves, as well as his ability to handle a straight-edged razor. The barbershop visit could be finished off with a hot or cold bath in the rear of the establishment. No bathtubs were available at home, other than the no. 2 washtub, so these barbershop baths were a luxury to the men of the town. Barbershops could be located along the street by the red and white striped poles that stood outside their doors. Some of the early barbers were: Buck Rudd, Jim Faulkner, Hugh Nelson, Henry Featherston, and Shorty Horton.

Just inside the barbershop, or occasionally outside on the streets in the summer, stood the shoeshine chair, and here young boys toiled away at this back-bending job trying to earn a little money. There have been many boys of the town that shined shoes and it is impossible to remember all of them. A few were Mohler and Walter Carroll, H. M. (Pinkie) Featherston, Charley McLean, Bobby and Jackie Burks, Max Shaw and Robert Henry Johnson.

When ladies first started cutting their long hair in the 1920's, they used hot curling irons held over coal oil lamps for heating, to do the waving. But it wasn't long until beauty shops became popular and women, as well as men, had a place to go, relax, and have their hair done. The 'marcelle' wave was first preferred, but then came the permanent wave that would keep the hair curly for weeks. They swept the country, and every woman had to have one. The permanent waving machines were clumsy electrical contraptions that sometimes left the hair scorched and scalps blistered. But the ladies would not be denied, and beauty shops are a part of almost every woman's weekly life today. Mrs. Ira Harvey had the first beauty shop in Goldthwaite, and Zella Hamilton had the second - The Rosebud Beauty Shop, and the name is still used today, more than fifty years later, by Mrs. Marvin Lindsay.

L. B. Walters (Cap) operated a tin shop on Fisher Street, which was later bought by Harry Allen, who ran it for many years.

Frank Taylor ran a bakery on the west side of Fisher, where Edna's Beauty Shop is located and Roy Simpson later bought it.

Bill Richard's Cafe was an institution in Goldthwaite. He was a portly man with a pleasant smile, and operated a cafe at many locations. His largest and best remembered restaurant was called "The Bar Cafe" because of the fixtures from an old bar he had installed there. It was located to the south of Steen's Hardware, and the food he served, especially his chili, was a delight. His last little cafe was located in a small building across Fisher Street from Blackwell's Warehouse, and was eventually torn down.

Audit Of County Books Okayed

Mills County Commissioners Court contracted Mrs. Iris Rudiseal, certified public accountant of Brownwood, to do an independent audit of the County books. The audit, to cover all of 1975 County business, was agreed on to be completed by June 14 at a cost not to exceed \$1800.

In other County business, the Commissioners accepted the bid from Landrum Ford Sales, Goldthwaite, for a new Ford pickup for Precinct 2. A bid of \$4389 was accepted. Other bidders were Lightfoot Motor Co., Hamilton, and J. B. Brumough, Hamilton. Lewis Watson is the commissioner of Precinct 2.

The Commissioners Court unanimously approved a salary increase for the Mills County Treasurer position. The salary

was raised from \$430 to \$475 per month.

All four county schools, Goldthwaite, Priddy, Star and Mullin trustee election votes were canvassed during the meeting and okayed as read.

Mills County Commissioners also okayed the quarterly treasurer's report as presented to them and divided the road and bridge money between the four precincts.

Judy Beavers, Ruth Sides and Charlotte Montgomery treated the County Commissioners and the City Council officials to homemade ice cream in the Commissioners' Courtroom to show their appreciation for the money donated to the Mills County Committee on Aging to be used toward the purchase of a projector.

Medallions On Sale Now

The Bicentennial medallions are now available at the County Judge's office and at Mills County State Bank. Since the arrival of the medallions, they have been "selling like hot cakes" according to Judge Herbert Faulkner.

The sterling silver medallions sell for \$25; the gold plate for \$7.50; and the bronze for \$5.00.

The medallion project is being sponsored by the Mills County Bicentennial Commission in order to benefit the Mills County Museum.

Robbie Kerby To Receive Award

Robbie Simpson Kerby, as the 2000th visitor to the Mills County Historical Museum, will receive the two Bicentennial silver dollars awarded by Herbert B. Cooke, Museum Committee Chairman. Mrs. Kerby, Assistant Administrator of the Heritage Nursing Home, was the 2000th visitor in less than one year of the Museum's existence. E. M. Thorne, as the 1000th visitor, was the recipient of the first silver dollar awarded by Mr. Cooke. Everyone is invited to visit the Museum and observe its progress toward telling the history of Mills County from its beginning.

The recently purchased Palmer Building, future home of the Museum, is now paid for and there is a balance of \$77.55 in the Museum account at the Mills County State Bank. Donations and Memorials are still being solicited and gratefully received, as funds for the renovation and restoration of the building are needed.

One Act Play Presentation Monday Night

On Monday, April 19, at 7:30 p.m. in the High School Auditorium the Goldthwaite High School Drama Department will present "Scratch", their District winning One Act Play, for the general public.

The play, a new adaptation of the classic confrontation between the Devil and Daniel Webster, emphasizes American ideals with a theme that is especially appropriate in this Bicentennial year.

The play, by Archibald Mac-

Leish, is set in 1850 but has importance to all times. In order to preserve the union, Daniel Webster has voted for the abhorrent Fugitive Slave Act and put political expediency above human rights. Then in the magic of the MacLeish play, Jabez Stone, a desperate debt-ridden farmer who sold himself to the devil, or "Scratch" as he's called, for seven years of prosperity, appeals to Webster to save the soul he bartered away. An epic battle is

then fought in an old barn at night before a jury of American traitors and murderers summoned from Hell by Scratch (the Devil).

The production will last approximately 35 minutes. There will be no admission charge.

'76 Declared Bad Year For Screwworms

"This is starting out to be a bad year for screwworms in Texas. The warm winter left a large overwintering population of the livestock parasites in South Texas, and they are appearing now."

John Armstrong, first vice president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, carried this message to the organization's annual meeting in Galveston. He also said: "Sterile flies are only a tool; they can't do the job alone."

"The livestock industry will have to give the Screwworm Eradication Program as much support this year as it ever has, maybe more, if we aren't to have a disastrous year for screwworms."

March statistics point up the truth of Armstrong's statements. The 125 cases tallied in March compare to 101 in 1972 and is second only to 330 in March of 1962, the year the program started. In all, 25 Texas counties have recorded 225 cases the first three months of 1976.

Texas is the only state with confirmed screwworm cases so far this year.

No cases have been reported since January in Mills County.

The Skipplings were married in Brownwood by Rev. John Power in 1926.

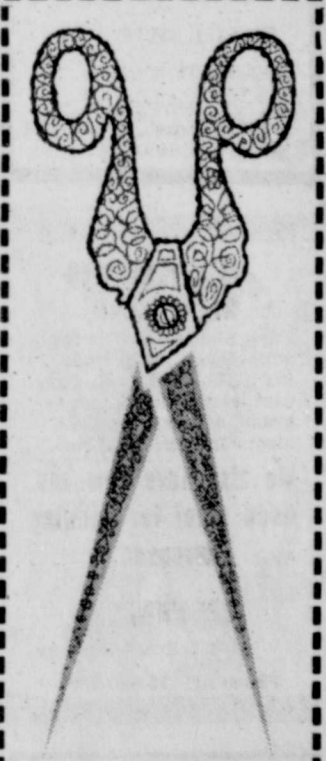

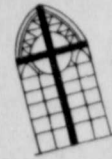

The word "Easter" is the English-ization of the name of the pagan love goddess Astarte. The sensuous festivals of this fertility religion were held in the spring of the year. As pagans were converted into the Christian Church, the word was such a part of their vocabularies and the season such a part of their lives, they carried over the name to the resurrection celebration that occurred at the same time of the year. "Easter" is used only once in the King James Version (Acts 12:4) but it is a mistranslation of the word "pasche" which means "Passover". IT IS THE WRONG WORD, BUT THE RIGHT TIME!

But little does it matter . . . really! The crucial matter is that we mark well the event: the bodily resurrection of our Lord from the grave. The Bible is concerned with remembrance. The annual feasts were big in the life of Israel. Why the Passover every year? "Thou shalt remember that thou wast a bondman in the land of Egypt, and the Lord thy God redeemed thee" (Deut. 15:15).

Why an Easter every year? Because the early Christians inherited the springtime festival of the pagans? NO! It is a remembrance celebration of the bodily resurrection of our Lord. It reminds us anew that

At this meeting it was reported that the Mullin Methodist Church has been accepted as a marker. The marker is being given on the church organization. "Genetic Counselling" Topic Of Recent YH'ers Meeting

Kathryn Fuhrhof, the Central Texas Field Representative of the National Foundation of the March of Dimes, spoke to Young Homemakers on genetic counselling Thursday, April 1. She presented a very informative

program on the genetic causes of birth defects, an area in which March of Dimes sponsors much research.

Most normal people have at least eight defective genes but, since the chances are slim that the second parent has these same defective genes, these defects seldom show up.

She talked about genetic defects such as tay sachs, cystic fibrosis, sickle cell anemia and defects caused by broken chromosomes such as mongoloidism. She informed the Young Homemakers about genetic counselling available through March of Dimes for parents suspected of carrying defective genes or already having a child with birth defects. Plans for Healthy Baby Week, May 9-15, were discussed briefly.

Plans were made for the house-to-house cancer drive April 12. Jeanne Ratliff is chairperson.

Tom Keese operated the Purina Feed Store for years where Joy's Beauty Shop now stands. This store was later bought by Al Langford and moved to the old Santa Fe Freight Depot.

Omar Shaw operated a service station where Jack Earl Long's service station is now located. He later worked at the Dodge Agency, and was on the draft board in Mills County for twenty years.

Arthur Cline worked many years as a salesman for Kelly Saylor's Chevrolet, until he went into the Dodge Agency business for himself.

John G. Berry worked as supervisor of construction of the streets of Goldthwaite, and later became supervisor of highway construction when the Texas Highway Department was organized. He was to serve in this position for about fifteen years and strived to protect our landmarks and create new parks for the county.

Mekinley Corrigan had a large general mercantile store where "Patt's of Texas" is now located on Fisher Street. There were four departments in this store - a grocery, dry-goods, hardware and leather shop. Later the store sold out to Lee Jones and Ben Hurdle, and the store was known as Jones and Hurdle. Jones and Hurdle, after a few years, moved the store to the next building south and the present location of Steen's Hardware. A young man named R. L. Steen began working for Mekinley-Corrigan in 1914 in the leather shop, making harness, reigns, saddles and other leather goods. Tanned leather was shipped in 500 lb. rolls to be cut into strips and pieces with a gauge knife for cutting

straight pieces of leather for the products. A good leather workman was a valued person in a community, and R. L. Steen Sr. was a good one. Mr. Steen continued to work for Jones and Hurdle when they bought the store and in 1920 he bought the hardware and leather shop for himself. Jones and Hurdle sold the grocery store to Floyd Ligon and the dry-goods department to a Mr. Lippitts. In 1927, R. L. Steen was joined in business by his son, R. L. Steen Jr., who enlarged the store and operates it today.

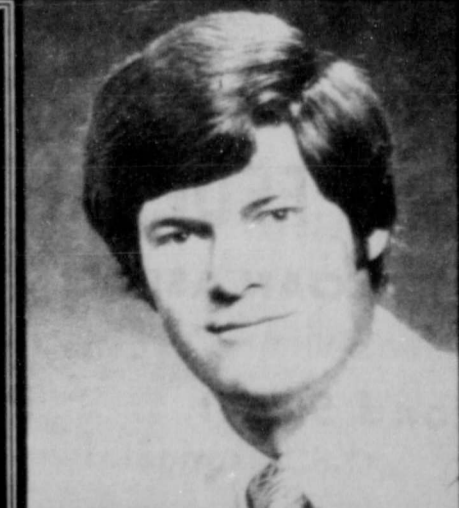
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
