The Way It Was A Flood

(Note by Appreciation Ch.) People along the Colorado ex-

pect their river to rise at intervals. They know the floods will rise as surely as the sun will rise, so they recognize the signs and prepare for them. They also know and accept the fact that they are forever in danger of their property being flooded or washed away and know the devastation of a big flood. But no one expected, or even dreamed a flood could be so great as the one they experienced on the Colorado in 1936. As the waters crept higher and higher, people placed markers at the edge of the rising water to measure the speed of the rising. This is a common practice with the river folk. Marker after marker disappeared beneath the murky waters. Finally, as the water reached record heights, lands never before flooded became muddy seas. Houses, barns, farm machinery and animals were seen floating away. Wet and bedraggled chickens and turkeys went down stream perched atop houses and debris. The main stream of the river broke across fields and laid waste to vast acres of fertile soil. Homesteads that had stood on the river banks for decades were gone with the vicious current. Such is the way of life along the Colorado River. Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Bell have told of their experience as an example of what happened during the 1936 flood, and a short history of how they happened to live beside the river.

to strike the Bells, as well as everyone else along the Colorado, that will never be forgotten.

The Bells built a new rock house that year from stones found on their place and still live there today. On September 20, 1936, only two weeks after they had moved into their new home, the river began to rise. As the water crept closer and closer, the Bells became alarmed and built a dam around the new house. But soon the water came pouring over the dam and on into the house. Mr. and Mrs. Bell and some of their neighbors, stayed far into the night putting their possessions in the attic. Windows were opened to let the water flow through. As water poured into their basement, a little daughter, Vera, cried, "The water is getting into my playhouse." The piano was jacked up to the ceiling, but water eventually covered the foot-pedals. The daughter, Vera, now Mrs. Jack Simpson, still has the piano in good condition.

Mrs. Bell cooked supper in her flooding home that night on a wood-burning stove, wading in water, for all those helping. Soon the neighbors began warning the Bells that they should leave before someone was drowned. As they left the house, Mrs. Bell was carrying a coal oil burning lantern so everyone could see. As she stepped off the front porch, water came up to her shoulders. The river finally rose to sixty-seven feet, and was forty-two inches above the floor level of the Bell home. Mr. Bell made a mark on the rocks on the side of the house showing the height of the water.

When the water began to recede, Mr. Bell returned to the house to sweep the water away, carrying much of the mud out with it. He later stated he felt so lonesome in the house with all that mud and water that he got a neighbor, Charlie Griffith, to help him. When the flood went down, three inches of mud stood under the beds. Many people asked the Bells if the water got in the basement, as if by some way it wouldn't. The floors were made of hardwood and they didn't build a second floor under the top floor as some people did. Some of the boards buckled, but the same floor is used today. The absence of the second floor probably saved the floor, because it finally dried out. They had wallpaper on most of the walls, but in a short time even the water line faded away, and visitors could not believe the wallpaper had been through a flood.

When O. B. Bell's brother, Dee, who lived in DeLeon, heard of the devastating flood, he and his wife Minnie started to the Bell place. When they reached the Pecan Bayou they couldn't cross and returned home. A short time later, Mr. Bell's father said he knew a way to get there, and they came by way of Mullin and through the back pastures to finally reach the Bell place. When he got there, Mrs. Bell and her daughters began to cry. He said, "Don't cry. We are just glad you are alive."

The river has never again reached the Bell house; however, it came into the field again in 1938, and we hope to never, never, have another flood like the one that swept through the beautiful lands along the Colorado River in 1936.

The Bell Story

In 1922, O. B. Bell and his father, Richard Bell, drove to Goldthwaite from the home in DeLeon looking for land to buy. In Goldthwaite they heard about a place for sale on the Colorado River. They drove to Jones Valley (Ratler), looked over the land, and talked to the owner, J. W. Hill. That night, Mr. Hill went back to DeLeon with the Bells, and Richard Bell agreed to trade the merchandise in his general dry-goods store for the land. That night, before the contract was signed, Mr. Hill loaded his car with goods from the store and took them back to Goldthwaite. That was in those 'good ole days' when a man's word was his bond.

On February 27, 1922, O. B. Bell, with his wife Anna Mae and daughter, Grenetta (Mrs. J. D. Berry) moved all their possessions in a horse-drawn wagon to their new home on the Colorado River. They soon heard stories about the runnages of the river and how it could get out of its banks, and these stories became a reality to the Bells the very first year. The river got up in their garden, and when it began to recede O. B. Bell found a fish lodged against his garden fence. His father, Richard, had a good time telling everyone in DeLeon about his son catching a fish in his garden. But an unbelievable flood was

Commissioners' Court Votes To Redistrict

Mills County Commissioners Court unanimously voted to redraw precinct boundaries according to registered voters and miles of roads maintained. Precinct 4 Commissioner Hawley Jernigan made the motion which was seconded by Commissioner Ray Lindsey, followed by unanimous vote.

The Commissioners have been elected for the past few years on an at-large basis, with all county voters voting on every commissioner.

County Judge Herbert Faulkner said the County would return to individual precinct Commissioner elections before the 1978 primaries. The court must follow guidelines set up by the Federal Government in regard to reason for changes,

boundaries, population information and public awareness.

Precinct 1, 2 and 4 will more than likely enter into the City of Goldthwaite and Precinct 3 will be subject to little change.

At present, the registered voter counts reveal the following percentage in the four county precincts: Precinct 1 - 53 percent; Precinct 2 - 14 percent; Precinct 3 - 25 percent; and Precinct 4 - 6 percent.

In other court business, the semi-annual revenue sharing funds were planned for use. They will be used for public safety, public transportation, library, and courthouse needs.

The county received \$16,473 for the period through December, 1976.

The court accepted the resig-

nation of Gladys Ratliff as courthouse custodian, and heard from Charles Studer and Troy Berry concerning the Resource Conservation and Development project for Mills County.

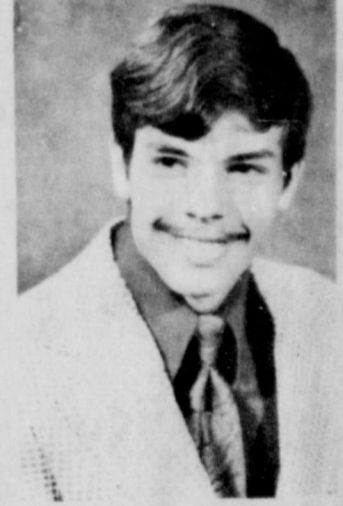

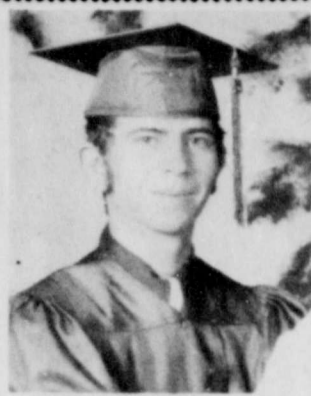
James Wells Attends FB State Conference

Farmers Urged To Fill Out Crop Estimate Reports

During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from W. H. Walther, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Tx. This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry - agriculture. The Texas Legis-

lature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and county totals.

From The County Agent

Protecting pecan trees from a host of diseases requires a carefully-timed spray program. Pecan scab and strick shuck are two serious diseases that can be treated with the fungicide Benomyl.

Pecan scab is a fungal disease which causes black lesions the size of a match head to appear on pecan shucks. It causes heavy pecan losses and premature loss of leaves.

The most effective treatment for scab is to apply Benomyl when the foliage is approximately one-third grown. Repeat the treatment in two weeks and continue treating once every two weeks during periods of intermittent rainfall.

Stricky shuck causes heavy pecan losses in late July and early August but does not affect the foliage. Black lesions from one-half to one inch on pecan shucks characterize the disease.

Applying Benomyl in late summer or at the beginning of the water stage of nut development deals effectively with this disease.

One way to cut down the incidence of these diseases is to grow resistant pecan varieties such as Choctaw, Cheyenne, Desirable, Mohawk and Stout. Susceptible varieties include Western, Burkett, Halbert, San Saba Improved, Mahan, Success, Wichita and Cherokee.

For susceptible varieties, controlling pecan disease effectively depends primarily on the timing of fungicide applications.

Tommy Head, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Brownwood, announced today that the Federal Land Bank's billing rate on rural residence variable interest rate loans would be decreased from 9 percent to 8 1/2 percent effective May 1, 1976. The billing rate on farm and ranch loans will continue at 8 1/2 percent.

The variable interest rate plan was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1968, with a billing rate on loans outstanding to follow the variations in the money market, and at this time, 79 percent of the Bank's portfolio is on the variable rate.

In making this announcement, Head stated, "This interest rate reduction follows the recent trend on home loans." The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout Texas and now has more than \$1.15 billion in loans outstanding. The local Association makes and services loans in Brown, Comanche and Mills Counties.

Funds Approved For Summer Youth Program

Judge Herbert Faulkner, member of the Central Texas Manpower Consortium Board, was advised by the Mills County Manpower Office of the funding of the summer youth program.
