History of North Brown Cemetery

The North Brown Cemetery was named by its location. A range of the Cowhouse Mountains extend through Mills County from northwest to southeast and North Brown Creek, which is a tributary of the Pecan Bayou, flows north to south. The road along which the cemetery is located follows this creek, north west to southeast. There were many springs in the creek which made for good campgrounds and were used by many homesteaders seeking land and homesteads. The little plot on the east side of the North Brown road, near an old campground, was used for a burying ground, and was located about two-hundred yards from a spring on the creek. Several graves were dug on this spot, but people would move on leaving only a rock for a marker. It has always been called North Brown Cemetery and was so deeded and on record in the Mills County Courthouse on June 4, 1895.

The North Brown Cemetery is located eight miles north of the present town of Goldthwaite in Mills County; however, the community was named before the county was formed. The community was originally in Brown County until 1887, when Mills County was founded. As the community grew, with several families filing on land and some buying land and making permanent homes, it became necessary to establish a community cemetery. Since there were already quite a number of graves on the hillside which was in the center of North Brown community, it seemed to be a desirable location for the cemetery. It was named North Brown Cemetery and there has never been a reason to change the name.

The first graves put in this cemetery were placed there, one might say, by fate. As people traveled through the county, hunting land and new homes, they camped along the way at night - and in case someone died they had to be buried where they were. The information has been told from one generation to another - and from family to family - that the first graves in this particular place were those of children. A child was stillborn in one of those camps, and was buried on the hillside east of the campground with only a rock for a marker - and the family moved on. Another child, a small boy with a caravan of campers, was killed as he fell beneath one of the wagon wheels. No one knows the names or date of death of those children, and there were several other graves that bear unknown facts. It is said that the hillside has been a burial plot since 1857.

When it was decided to organize a community cemetery, it was found that a plot was located on railroad land, which had been sold to Charles Nobles of Morristown, New Jersey. Mr. Nobles was contacted and asked if he would sell a five acre tract to be used as a cemetery. He agreed to sell the land for twelve dollars and fifty cents. A. A. Boulter, G. M. O'Quinn and J. S. Weatherby paid for the land and the court costs of securing the deed.

A. A. Boulter was the oldest son of James Bolter, who was born in London, England in 1776. James came to America with his young family and was a surveyor for the government and went to Texas in 1840 or 1850. A. A. Boulter was born in Alabama on August 1, 1825 and was married to Martha Jane Harper in Rusk, Texas, Cherokee County, on July 14, 1853. The Boulters had seven children when they arrived in Brown County. Mr. Boulter filed on land on the north flow of Browns Creek and in time had twelve children - always staying interested in the church and education. He helped build the North Brown schoolhouse and taught the school for two years. He died on May 8, 1895 and was buried in the North Brown Cemetery. Mrs. Boulter died on January 23, 1922 and was buried there, also.

G. M. O'Quinn was born in 1840 in Tennessee. His grandfather came from Ireland. Mr. O'Quinn married and brought his good wife and six children to Brown County - arriving at his homestead on Christmas Day, 1875. He filed on 500 acres of land, then known as the Caldwell County school land. The place was situated four miles north of the present town of

Goldthwaite, and three miles south of the North Brown Cemetery on Browns Creek. He had a large family of twelve children and he, also, was interested in the progress of the church and the educational institutions. He was an exhorter and leader of the Protestant Methodist Church. He helped build the North Brown schoolhouse and helped buy the land for the cemetery. Two of his sons taught in the North Brown school. He was the soul of honor and integrity. Mr. O'Quinn died on January 2, 1902 and was buried in the North Brown Cemetery, as was Mrs. O'Quinn, who died on May 13, 1913.

James Septimus Weatherby, the oldest son of Rev. Norman and Katherine Sims Weatherby was born on July 22, 1855 in Mississippi. He married Annie Catherine Brooker in Franklin, Texas, Robertson County on December 19, 1878. In that same month the young couple came to the North Brown community, joining his father and family who had settled there in the early 1870's. They filed on land eight miles north of the present town of Goldthwaite, then in Brown County, on Browns Creek just west of the North Brown Cemetery site. They had eight children. Mr. Weatherby welded an influence for good in the community and was one of the men who bought the land for the cemetery and also helped build the schoolhouse. One of his sons taught in that school. He died on February 21, 1896 and was buried on February 22, 1896 in North Brown Cemetery. After his death, his wife and mother as both mother and father to rear the family. She continued to promote the upkeep of the North Brown Cemetery as long as she lived. She died on July 7, 1937 and was also buried at North Brown.

The cemetery has always been used as a burying place for anyone. Most of the graves are those of the old settlers and their families. There are approximately two hundred and fifty graves at the present time - with the cemetery being used more in the last few years. In 1974, five people, two from the first generation of families, one from the second generation, and one from the third generation were laid to rest in this plot.

The maintenance of the cemetery has not been associated with a church, school, or with any one family; however, the schoolhouse was used not only for school, but for church services and on several occasions for funeral services. When the school was consolidated with a larger and better school, and was no longer used for community gatherings the two trustees, both in their eighties, offered the school land to the cemetery association. One stipulation was that the association would sell the land - put the proceeds into government bonds - and use only the interest for the maintenance of the cemetery.

The North Brown Cemetery had been in use since 1857 and the first cemetery association was organized in 1895. Mr. Charles Boulter, from whom the land was purchased, stipulated in the deed that O'Quinn, Boulter and Weatherby be directors or trustees of the Association with the purposes (now and hereafter) to be used for the interment of the dead of the community.

People of the community did all the work with hand tools and kept it in good condition through the years. When the older people became unable to do the work, and as the younger people moved away for better jobs, it became a chore to get the work done. The association has never sold a grave plot, nor have funds ever been assessed. All funds given for the upkeep have been voluntary. The association has been very concerned lately about a perpetual maintenance.

In late February, 1967, R. F. Daniel and W. A. Berry, trustees of the old North Brown School, offered the land and the school from the land within sixty days of the sale date. When the school was sold, the money received was to be placed in United States Government Bonds, using only the interest to help with the upkeep of the cemetery grounds. The committee realized the opportunity to start a perpetual fund for upkeep and maintenance. A meeting was called of the members of the association in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Weatherby, March 9, 1969. All board members and everyone interested in the old cemetery were

The schoolhouse and land were sold and sufficient funds raised for maintenance of the cemetery. The Bicentennial Celebration was discussed at a meeting and Mrs. Jewel Yeager moved that since the cemetery was one hundred years old a project called "A Face-Lift" for the cemetery should be started. The motion carried and again letters were mailed asking for donations. Plans were made to make repairs on the fence; to make the driveway wider and to pave it; to make the entrance wider and to grace the entrance with four red brick columns connected with a low brick fence and the name of the cemetery be made with white iron letters.

This work has been completed, and the Mills County Historical Commission has received conformation that the Texas Historical Marker was granted. It is now in hand and the dedication will be the second Sunday in June, the 13th, at 3 p.m. at the North Brown Cemetery.

Mrs. Susan Simms was the oldest person to be buried in the North Brown Cemetery. The North Brown Cemetery project has been community-wide for more than one-hundred years.






