Women immediately started spreading table cloths, fried chicken, beet pickles, potato salad, vegetables, pies and cakes until the table, usually made by pushing two long benches together, looked fit for a king.

There were always a few older men that gathered around the water barrel to drink from the dipper, shake hands with everyone that came by, and compliment the visiting preacher on his sermon. There were also older women that were not physically able to help with spreading the dinner, so they continued to sit on the benches and talk of their aches and their grandchildren. Their days of spreading dinners were past and younger women of the community had taken over. Children played along the edge of the rostrum, jumping on and off it, finally rolling and playing in the straw until the Blessing was said, then they made a dash for the table. The older women continued to sit until someone brought them a plate.

In the afternoons came the climactic end of it all when a baptizing usually took place - where depended on the denomination. Almost all communities had a baptizing hole, but if a community was unlucky enough not to have running water in August, a place was borrowed from a nearby community. At times, stock tanks were used. Methodist had no problems, because their people were baptized in the church. The baptizings were beautiful and impressive, wherever they were held - even though weather was usually broiling hot and creeks sometimes so low there was barely enough water for immersion. The baptizings will always stand out in our memories for the remainder of our lives.

We really can't remember just when the brush arbor meetings stopped, or the exact year we attended the last one. We only remember that they were a very special part of our early years, our religious life and our religious heritage.

Bicentennial Tributes Paid By 5000 At Mullin

The Mullin Bicentennial Celebration, held Saturday, June 19, lived up to all expectations, with a crowd of around 5,000 in attendance and a multitude of activities throughout the day.

The day's entertainment began with a parade Saturday morning which started off amid light showers. Much hard work was evidenced in the 68 colorful and imaginative floats and the weather did not dampen the spirits of the spectators nor the parade participants.

Following the parade, everyone moved to the center of Mullin where there was entertainment to suit every taste - and food to suit every palate. The Rail Fence Saloon drew a large crowd, as well as the Variety Show which featured outstanding musical entertainment. Performers included Buddy Wilson, Bill Neely and Larry Kirbo of Austin; Dennis Thacker of Brownwood; and the Bohannon family of Lampasas. Local musicians also drew large crowds with their fine fiddling, banjo and guitar playing. Another popular attraction were the Kiowa Indians who performed dances and displayed beautiful beadwork and other Indian crafts.

The flea market featured

handwork by local citizens, antiques, plants, a fine collection of Indian jewelry, paintings by area artists and other items too numerous to mention.

Ladies in long dresses and men in beards and western attire, complete with six-shooters and rifles, added to the authenticity of Frontier Town.

The grand finale to the sun-filled day was held Saturday

night with a program entitled "Happy Birthday America", presented by Jerry DeHay. A street dance followed, with square dancers dancing to the calling of Bob Fisher of Brownwood and Dub Bass of Waco.

The "Americana" celebration was reigned over by Mullin Bicentennial Queen Lee Jackson.

Walther, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas. Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and will be used only for state and county totals. This survey is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

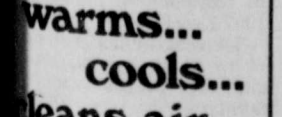

The bank sends the check you deposited to the bank on which it was drawn and waits to see if it will be paid before you are given credit for the deposit.

It is not a good idea either to give a post dated check. A post dated check likely can be cashed before you intended. This can easily put you in a position of having a bad check.
