

he Way It Was

When The Circus Came To Town

The good life for a hard-working family in Mills County the early days meant a little extra money, a house in which to live, a place to worship on Sunday and at least two square miles a day. But there was something more - a need for a type of pleasurable diversion.

The available offerings in a small county were more plentiful and variable than one might imagine today. They ranged from the lowly spectacles of animal and chicken fights to lectures and debates on temperance, politics and other debatable questions - from boxing matches to local music and voice concerts. In those days were the local brass bands, the black-faced minstrel shows with their song and dance routines and rapid-fire jokes, itinerant organ grinders, musicians and local horse races.

Nothing in this world, on this side of the Mississippi, was more eagerly welcomed than the circus when it rolled into Goldthwaite. The circus is an old tradition in Texas. The first they traveled over the country in horse-drawn vehicles and later a few came in by train. When the big circus parade rolled down Fisher Street everyone in the country was out. First came the rousing music of the circus band, then the cage after cage of wild and ferocious looking animals, lions of all descriptions, the lady riding majestically upon her throne and sleekly dressed men and women on beautiful horses - followed by lumbering elephants led by their trainers, and occasionally a few camels trailed along led by boys dressed to resemble Arabian sheiks.

At last, but certainly not least, came the thrill of the big-tongued music of the big band with sparks flying from beautifully painted sides, jets of steam escaping here and there and the musical notes escaping from the pipes of this most unforgettable of all organs which will be remembered forever.

When the calliope played, the heart of every man, woman and child thrilled at its sight. Children were enraptured by the whole spectacle. The show itself was dazzling and made the mind reel with wonder at the acts those people could perform. Actually, they aren't too different to the circus shows we view today. They were presented under the same conditions as today, had from one to three acts, wild animal acts, clowns, acrobats, jugglers, tight-rope walkers and so on. How did they use nets for safety?

There was the unforgettable act of straw, animals, salted peanuts, popcorn and perspiration. We saw Lulu, the good lady, the side-shows of the huge snakes, the Wild Man from Borneo, and there was always the strong man who challenged any local wrestler or boxer to a match. The side-show barkers and the circus band came through loud and clear the entire time.

During the first hour the circus was in town, local boys converged on the circus grounds to watch the unloading of the menagerie of animals, and at times were asked by the manager to help for the pay of a free ticket. Nothing could have been more thrilling to a boy of ten than this duty.

At one time, Mr. and Mrs. C. Evans were standing on the sidewalk watching the parade pass when Mr. Evans asked his wife, "Isn't that Julian (his son) leading that camel in the parade?" Mrs. Evans answered with, "No surely not." But it was, much to his parents' astonishment. He had been asked to lead the camel and was dressed in a velvet tunic with a fez for an authentic look.

At another time when the circus was in town, the Joe Burdicks came from the Central City community for the occasion and, upon finding seats in the bleachers, found their Al was missing. The show was in a short time and there Al, riding one of the Shetland ponies round and round the arena, as unconcerned as if he had been in the circus all his life.

The most famous circus to visit Goldthwaite was the Cole Brothers Show in 1916. Earlier, the famous Mollie Bailey and "Dog and Pony Show" came

to Mills County often, and it is said that she often donated a part of the proceeds from the show to the Confederate Veterans.

The circus, in the early days, set up the tent on the old cotton yard east of the tracks, now the present Ranchers Feed and Supply. Later they put the show on at the fair grounds just east of the Livestock Commission Company.

Paul Henderson To Retire From Highway Dept.

On July 31, 1976, Paul D. Henderson, Sr., Maintenance Engineer with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, will retire after a career that began June 1, 1929, in San Saba as a roadman.

Henderson worked throughout the counties in District 23 as a roadman, chairman, instrument man, and field surveyor. He left the Department in 1942 to work for H. B. Zachry Company doing wartime construction.

He returned to work with the Highway Department in 1943 as field surveyor in the Sweetwater Residency. He stayed in the Abilene District, filling all the titles from chief inspector to design engineer until October 31, 1964. Paul received his engineering license in January 1950.

He came back to the Brownwood District November 1, 1964, as Resident Engineer in Goldthwaite. His experience covers all phases of highway location, planning and construction. He also made the bridge inspections of the 900 bridges in the Brownwood District.

He and his wife Vivian plan to make their home in Goldthwaite.

Commissioners Vote To Leave Tax Rate Unchanged

The Mills County Commissioners Court met for its regular semi-monthly meeting Monday.

The commissioners voted to keep the county tax rate at its present 95 cent per \$100 evaluation level and also to leave property tax figures unchanged.

Commissioner Ray Lindsey moved that the county replace the four main doors of the courthouse with aluminum doors. Commissioners Lewis Watson, Hawley Jernigan and Lindsey voted for the project,

City Manager Pitts Resignation Accepted

The Goldthwaite City Council met in emergency session Tuesday night and formally accepted the resignation of Max Pitts as city manager. The resignation will become effective Friday, July 30. Pitts submitted the

document last Monday night, citing personal reasons for the resignation. He added the words "and for personal advancement" to the resignation at the meeting this week.

Pitts has accepted employment as the city manager of Rockdale, Texas at a salary of approximately \$3,000 a year more than he received with the City of Goldthwaite.

The council then went into executive session to consider the future of city operations. Upon completion of the session, the council voted to have Mayor J. D. Harper and Mayor Pro Tem Loy Long as overseers of city operations beginning Monday, August 2. No city manager or acting city manager was named.

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Draper, Kincheloe Given Probated Sentences Monday

District court was convened in Mills County on Monday to consider the case of Allen Draper of Priddy, charged with theft of property.

District Judge Don Busby fined Draper \$250 plus \$57.50 in court costs and assessed a seven year probated sentence to Draper for the charges.

Draper must also make restitution of \$875.05 for 24 head of lambs to Melvin Schwartz of Priddy; \$105.84 to Ray Priddy for seven head of ewes; and \$950 to Herman Kopp for a trailer. Total restitution was set at \$1929.89.

The district court also heard the trial of Joyce Kincheloe, accused of burglary of a building, carried over from 1975. She, along with her husband who is still at large, have been charged with the burglary of Head Electric and Yarbrough's of Goldthwaite.

She was assessed a ten year probated sentence and was told by the judge to make restitution in the amount of \$6734.12. She is to make \$50 per month payments on the restitution for two years and thereafter \$100 per month until it is all paid. Probation officers will oversee the payments.

Mills County sheriff's officers stated Tuesday that a warrant has been issued for Billy Wayne Kincheloe's arrest, but at the present time he remains at large.

**Zone 3 Landowners To Conduct
Election Saturday, August 14**

Landowners of Zone 3 of the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District will hold an election on Saturday, August 14, 1976 in the Community Room of the Mills County State Bank. Zone 3 is in Mills County and

consists of that area north and east of U.S. Highway 84, including the area between the Pecan Bayou and U.S. Highway 84 north and west of Mullin, Texas.

Eligible voters must be owners of land within the subdivision and be actively engaged in the business of farming or ranching. Under the community property laws of Texas, the wife of a landowner also owns land and is entitled to vote and hold office.

Soil and Water Conservation District Directors serve a term of five years.

The position of a director on local boards is becoming an even more important job than in the past to local landowners and landusers. With the passage of several environmental laws involving soil, water and plants, local units of government, especially conservation districts, will be in a position to exert considerable influence in the implementation of these environmental laws.

You are urged to vote in this important election. Hubert Meyer of Mullin, Texas presently represents the landowners of Zone 3 on the Brown-Mills SWCD Board.

Ribbon Winner**

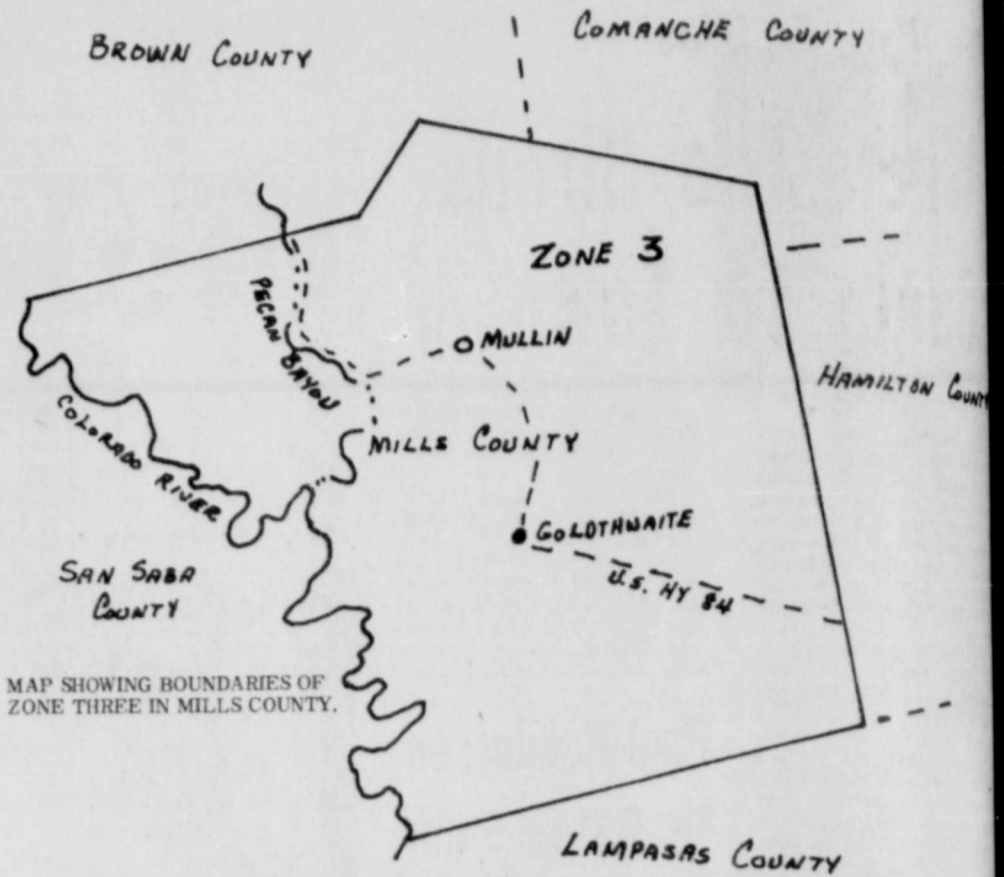

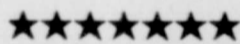

Rudd Long Presented Medal For Bravery

On July 20, 1976, President Ford presented the Young Americans' Medal for Bravery to Rudd McClellan Long, 17, of Fort Worth in ceremonies in the White House Oval Office. The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Long of 3900 Springbranch in Fort Worth, was cited for saving the life of Clay Yandell, then 10, on June 7, 1974, after the boy became wedged underneath a piece of concrete in a rain-swollen drainage ditch near his home.

Rudd is the grandson of Mrs. Ada Long of the Heritage Home and of the late Curtis Long and the late Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Rudd. He is the grandnephew

of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Rudd and Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Fox of Goldthwaite.

An account of the courageous act follows:

Rudd, then 15, and a friend were watching several smaller children playing near the flooded drainage ditch. Yandell, one of the children, slipped and fell into the ditch. A strong current washed Yandell under a large concrete slab. His head was under water. Rudd ran to help Yandell and sent his friend for assistance. He held

Yandell's head above water simultaneously administering mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Yandell for nearly 30 minutes always in danger of being

into the raging torrent. Yandell was finally rescued when several adults arrived and pulled him from the concrete by attaching a rope to his arms. Rudd, through holding the youth's head above water and the mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, was credited with playing the key role in keeping Yandell alive.

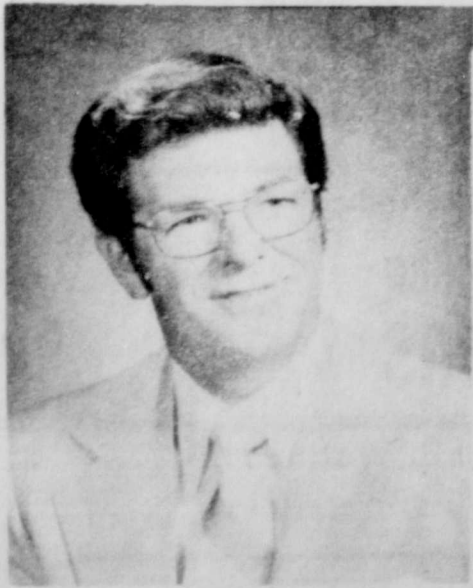

All sheep and goats are infected with stomach worms to some extent. The degree of infestation varies in relation to many factors, including continuous stocking with sheep and goats, overstocking, lack of feed, poor watering facilities, etc.

There are many kinds of stomach and intestinal parasites which attack sheep and goats but the most prevalent is the common stomach worm. It is about 1/2 to 1 1/4 inch long and about as thick as a straight pin. The worm infects the fourth stomach of the animal.

This worm is capable of laying large quantities of eggs which are passed out with the feces. Under favorable conditions, these eggs will hatch in about five days. These young larvae are extremely hardy and can exist for long periods of time before being picked up and swallowed by grazing animals. Once picked up by a host animal the larvae will mature in the fourth stomach in 25-30 days.

Symptoms of parasitism in sheep and goats are not always specific. However, certain symptoms are common - usually lack of bloom, unthriftiness and weight loss. Some animals will develop diarrhea and anemia as indicated by paleness in the mucous membranes of the eyes

and mouth. In advanced stages they may even develop a swelling beneath the jaws, referred to as bottlejaw.

There are many treatments presently on the market for the control of stomach worms. Instructions on labels of all drugs should be followed closely.

Extension Highlights

Dilled green beans offer variety to the usual methods of canning and freezing - and add a taste treat to family meals.

The recipe for dilled green beans, and many other tasty pickles and relishes, is found in B-188 "Pickles and Relishes", a bulletin which is available for 25 cents from the Dept. of Agricultural Communications, Texas A&M University, College Station, Tx. 77843 or by obtaining an order form from your local County Extension Agent.

Dilled green beans are easy to prepare and may be served at a summer picnic or other family gathering. Or stash them away for Christmas gifts.

Dilled Green Beans
3 lbs. green beans, about 3 qts.
6 cups vinegar
2 cups water
6 very small hot red peppers
1 cup salt
6 bunches dill
6 small cloves of garlic
Wash beans and remove stem end. Heat vinegar, water and salt to boiling. Place a piece of dill, pod of pepper and clove

of garlic in each jar. Pack beans in jars to within one inch of top. Pour boiling liquid over the beans. Close. Process in boiling water bath 20 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as hot jars are placed into the actively boiling water. Store at least three weeks before using.

The hot summer sun may cause some flowers to wilt and die but not the periwinkle. It actually thrives in Texas' summer weather.

Periwinkles, or vinca rosea as they are sometimes called, can be an attractive addition to the summer landscape. They begin flowering when they are a few inches tall and continue to grow and bloom until the first heavy frost.

Periwinkles come in common or dwarf varieties and produce small phlox-like flowers ranging from white to deep rose in color. The plants have glossy, dark-green leaves.
