

# The Way It Was The Medicine Shows

As the tent-roofed stages were, they were set sharply from another place - the patent-medicine shows. No town or village was small or too far away for a nomad and his horse-drawn wagon. It was stuffed with the bursting point with his called miraculous medicines to cure everything from a cold to falling hair. When they rolled into Goldthwaite, and there were many of them, a survey of the center of town soon led them to the best location, usually on the courthouse square. There they dropped the end of the wagon, set up a sort of stage, and the show began as soon as a few gullible souls showed up.

The shows varied from a monkey, quartets, sword dances, flame throwers, jugglers to one medicine man, who had no show at all. He simply held a Bible in his hand and a human skull in the other, with a suitcaseful of medicine by his side. He immediately started telling all his listeners about Heaven and Hell and gave his audience a description of the symptoms of ailments that hastened their entry there. Pretty soon the people were aching all over, and after thirty minutes of this oratorical performance they were thoroughly convinced that their ailments were on the blink, and that their hearts were hitting the ground. The stage was set and they anxiously bought any preparations he had to offer that might delay the impending outcome of their imaginary ills. However, many medicine shows were entertaining, with a side of minstrelsy, good music, and occasionally a small band, and other shows that people enjoyed.

But while the show was in progress, two showmen were passing through the audience, handing out bottles after bottles of nostrums at a dollar a bottle. One man handed out bottles while another collected the dollars. They sold Hamlin's Food and Liver Tonic, Hamlin's Wizard Oil, Cough Balm, Bitters, Tonics, Sassafras, and The Miraculous Consumption Cure.

All those concoctions were guaranteed to cure at least fifteen different ailments or money refunded. The trick was, the same medicine man could never be found to get a refund. Generally, those pioneer souls had a temporary feeling of improvement after taking the bitter tonics - the contents contained from 10 to 55 percent alcohol.

I knew one man in the Center City community who was a good Christian person and wouldn't use alcohol in any form if he knew it. But, with the first risk norther he went to Goldthwaite and bought a case of Hamlin's Sassafras to start building himself up for the cold winter months ahead. Never did he dream, or ever know, that his wonderful tonic was laced with about forty percent of this forbidden drink.

Medicine shows were entertaining because everyone had a different show, and every medicine show man had a

different line to hand to the frontiersman. They and the small town circus are another part of our past that can never return to the way it was.

## School Classes Start Aug. 23, Registration Begins August 19

Goldthwaite Public Schools will begin classes for the 1976-77 school year Monday, August 23.

Classes will begin at 8:20 a.m. and will be dismissed at 3:30 p.m. with the exception of kindergarten which will be dismissed at noon. Parents will be expected to pick up kindergarten students at this time. They may eat in the school

lunchroom if parents so desire. Registration for juniors and seniors will be held Thursday, August 19; seniors from 9 to 11 a.m. and juniors from 1 to 3 p.m. Freshmen and sophomores will register Friday, August 20; sophomores from 9 to 11 a.m. and freshmen from 1 to 3 p.m. Kindergarten through eighth grades will register Monday, August 23, the first day of school.

Pupils who will be entering kindergarten and new students enrolling in the first grade should bring their birth certificates and immunization records.

Goldthwaite school officials urge parents of all students to feel free to contact teachers or administration about any questions or problems which may arise. The administration of Goldthwaite Public Schools is working for the betterment of each individual.

School officials remind that discussing problems with the administration can solve the problem - talking with others often makes it worse.

## Kincheleo Arrested In California

Police officers in Auburn, California, arrested Billy Wayne Kincheleo Tuesday and are holding him for Mills County authorities, Sheriff H. G. Brooks told the Eagle Tuesday.

Kincheleo is wanted here for burglary of a building, resulting from burglaries in 1975 in Goldthwaite.

He was apparently stopped on routine highway or traffic violations and his name was run through National Crime Information Center where the warrant from the Mills County Sheriff's Office was found. He was being held under \$15,000 bond, issued by 27th District Court Judge Don Busby.

Kincheleo is being held pending voluntary extradition from California to Texas. If he doesn't respond to the voluntary arrangement, he will be asked to be returned under regular extradition channels, via the Governor's office.
