# Through The Years At Big Valley

The first postoffice was located in the Woods Miller home. Later a store was built east of the Barker Curtis place which was to be known as the Jarrott place on the east side of Prescott Creek. The post office was then moved to the store.

The postoffice was discontinued in the early 1900's when a rural route was established. Various people operated this store. They were W. H. Oglesby, Will and Audrey Duesy, Joe Walker, Dan Long, Harry and Lona Oglesby, who operated the store for twenty-two years, and C. A. Page, who was the last owner. The store was permanently closed in 1969.

Another store was located near the J. J. Cockrell place. It began operation about 1920 and was kept open for about ten years by several different men: Pittman, Harbin Gillentine, and Paul Cockrum.

Jack Smith built a gin in the early 1900's, and it was located just west of Prescott Creek and south of the Jarrott place. Neil Miller operated it at one time. Mr. Eubank bought the gin and later sold it to Walter Fairman about 1912, but the gin soon ceased operation.

In the 1870's and 1880's mob violence was present in Mills County, as well as surrounding counties. Several lives were lost in or near Big Valley before the mobs were quelled. Hugh Smith, a citizen of the community and grandfather of Hugh Forrest Smith, left home one morning on his horse to tend his stock. Later in the day his horse came home with blood on the empty saddle - the gun still strapped to it. Mr. Smith was never again seen or heard from. No trace of him has been found to this day.

For the most part, people of Big Valley were peaceful and law abiding. Most lived by "The Golden Rule" to the best of their ability. Walter (Pete) Nelson was Justice of the Peace about 1900. He was called "Squire Nelson" and performed wedding ceremonies as well as performing his duties to keep the peace.

One evening in early January of 1901, he was asked to perform the wedding of Bill Trobridge and his bride to be - "Miss Willie". His pay was two and one-half bushels of "sweet taters". The correspondent to The Goldthwaite Eagle from the Big Valley community, in writing of the wedding, stated that "Bill and Willie went away happy. Long may you live, happy may you be - as many be your joys, as there was 'taters' in the fee."

On the eastern side of the community flows Prescott Creek which begins as a little rivulet northeast of Big Valley and winds its way to the Colorado River. Beautiful little Patterson Park is located on the west bank of the creek beside Highway 16, at the bridge. Perhaps, in the long, long ago, some little girl named Mary once waded in this little brook and played in its crystal clear water.

Big Valley is the gateway to San Saba County. The first bridge that spanned the Colorado River was built near the Ford Bridge on the Colorado River. One of the early teachers was Miss Sibby Nelson. Schoolhouse was abandoned and a new school built Lower Big Valley Cemetery about 1919. The second building was later torn down and the present building (High School) was erected. The school was also used as a church for members of the church of Christ.

School bus was purchased for consolidation of the two communities in 1924, and it was the first one purchased in the area. Hoyt Cockrell was the driver; later drivers were J. Johnson and Elzie Duesy. Baptist Church was organized in 1884 at its present location just north of the Upper Valley Cemetery. There were twelve charter members - Woods S. Millers, the Barker Curtis family and Arizona Robertson were some of the original members. The first preacher was Rev. Medlin. The present rock building was built about 1940 because of necessity and convenience, a little village was established in the Valley. In early days, the nearest store was Williams Ranch, the town of San Saba was more distant. The roads were unpaved - some of them were just beaten paths.

Several doctors lived in Big Valley at various times. Some of them were Dr. Hugh P. Pond, Dr. J. B. B. McNutt, Dr. J. B. B. McNutt, Dr. Pond and Dr. Stark. There was a dry goods and grocery store, a postoffice, a gin, and later years there was a telephone system.

## Eagles Rally Over 'Dillos In Season Opener

The Goldthwaite Eagles began their 1976 football season in grand fashion last Friday night defeating rival San Saba by a score of 21-14.

The Eagles dominated the first half completely, leading at intermission 14-0. Scoring in the first half was quarterback David Miller on a short run outside right end. Jim Smith added the kick to make the score 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The next time the Eagles got hold of the ball halfback Mike Williams raced 57 yards over right tackle for the touchdown. Williams showed exceptional speed in out-distancing all San Saba defenders. Again, Smith's kick was good for the extra point.

Before halftime ended, the Dillos threatened, but Miller intercepted the pass to thwart the drive.

The Eagles scored again in the third period on a fifty seven-yard pass from QB Miller to Jett Johnson from 7 yards out. Smith's kick was good, making the score 21-0 with 8 minutes left in the quarter. From this point on, the Eagles seemed to falter as San Saba rebounded via the air lanes.

San Saba quarterback Ross repeatedly hit receivers for nice gains and finally hit Miles in the end zone for a 34-yard touchdown pass. Ross took the ball over for the two-point conversion.

The next time the Dillos took over possession, they moved 67 yards with passes down to the three yard line where Ross swept right end for the score. A run try failed for points after. The TD made the score 21-14 at the end of the third quarter.

Fourth quarter action found the Eagles reacting better to the Dillo passing attack and they managed to keep the game under control.

Eagle Mike Williams carried the ball a total of 16 times for a grand total of 162 yards. Tim Spradley had a total of 19 carries for 74 yards, and David Miller had 7 carries for 21 yards. Miller caught two out of four passes for a total of 20 yards.

On the receiving end of the game, Jett Johnson caught one pass for a total of 8 yards and one touchdown pass. Spradley received the pignin once for a total of 12 yards. Miller also rallied for two interceptions during the Eagle - 'Dillo game.

Defensively, Miller was the leading tackler with 10 tackles, followed by Mike Williams with 9, Tim Spradley with 6, and Eddie Martinez with 5.

Outstanding offensive blockers were Martinez, Robert Berry, B. J. Truitt and Frank Barrera.

Jimmy Smith was 100 percent accurate on extra-point kicks by making 3 of 3. Smith also did an excellent job with Eagle kick-offs.

"We were real pleased with the team Friday night. They did make some mistakes, but in any first game of the season mistakes are expected. The boys worked as a team and were able to hustle and make up the losses."

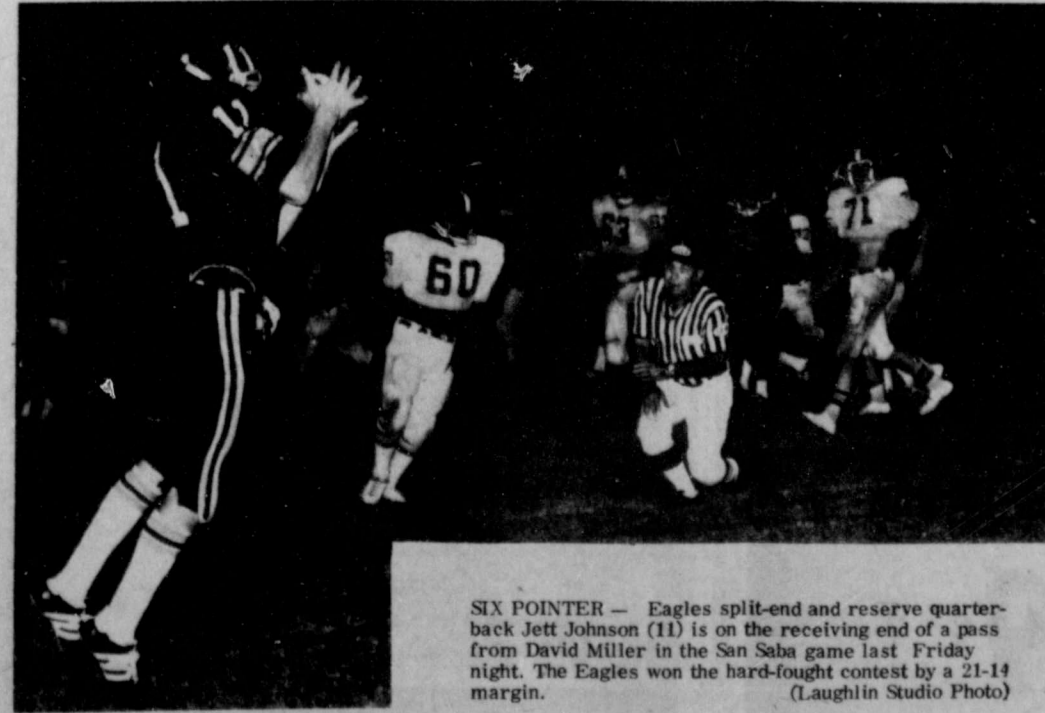

**Extension Highlights**

BY JUDY BEAVERS  
Mills County Extension Agent

It's the season to be wary - in buying jar lids for canning. Consumers will see a variety of new jar lid closures this year and should use only known good quality closures and jars. The shortage of jar lids in 1974 and '75 has encouraged the entry of several manufacturers into the production of jar lids - this year's supply will double from two billion lids in 1975 to four billion in 1976.  
Southern states receive the first shipments due to their early canning season. And larger shipments will arrive as the bulk of canning is underway.  
Manufacturer's directions should be followed closely to insure a good seal. If lids fail to seal or are defective in any manner, write directly to the manufacturer. His address should be on the package.  
To be considered safe, jar lids must make and hold a seal. Test by checking for a concave appearance the day after canning or by pressing the center of lid. If it will not move, the jar is sealed.  
Also, if there is a clear ringing sound when the center of the lid is tapped with a spoon, the seal is good. Lids should be checked again before use.  
Home canning jars can last ten years or more if used and stored properly.  
It's a good practice always to use standard home canning jars which have the name of the manufacturer on the side of the jar. These are mechanically shock-resistant to withstand minor bumps against other jars and the pressure required to process low acid fruits, vegetables and meats.  
Homemakers should be cautioned against using packers jars, such as empty mayonnaise and pickle jars. These should not be put in the pressure canner because they are designed for one-time packing and for foods which are not pressure processed.  
In packing jars, be careful not to let objects such as knives

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)**

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)**

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

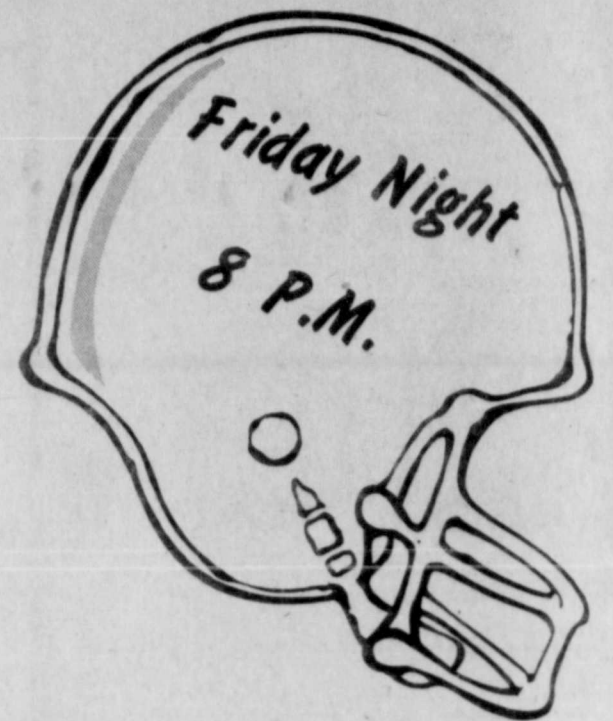

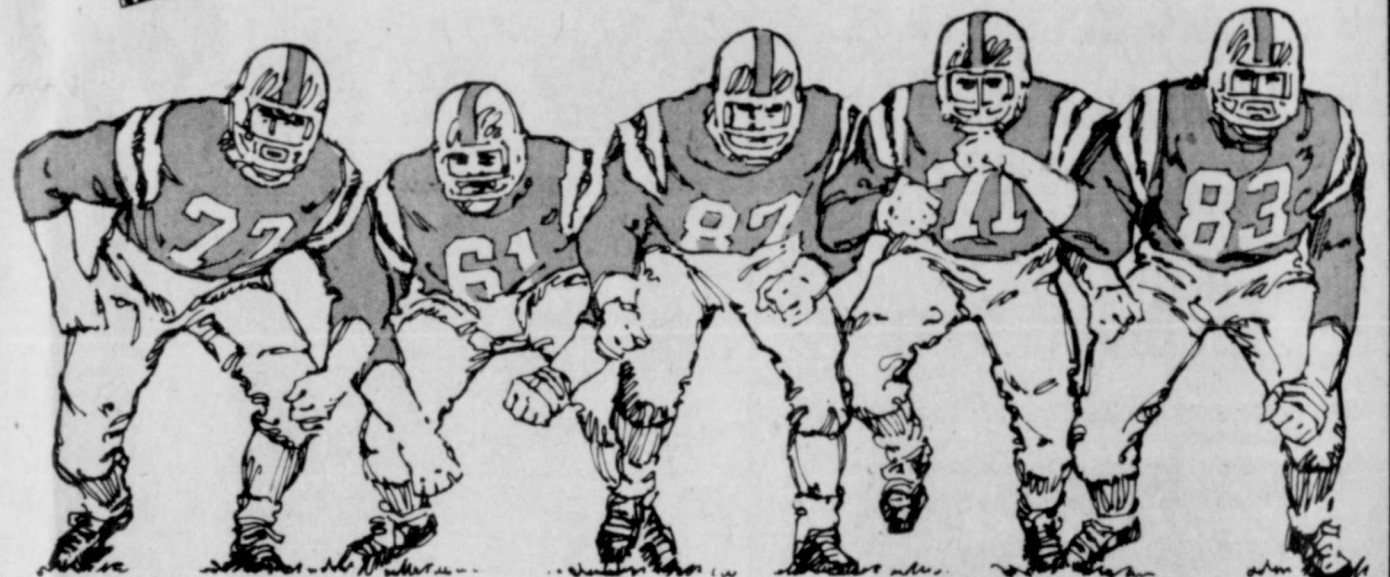

Valley. The Lunsfords lived in the valley many years, but moved to California in their 'golden years'. Before there was a bridge of any kind to cross the Colorado River, the road led to Warren's Crossing and on into San Saba County.

Big Valley had its weather and climatic problems at various times - such as the 1888 blizzard and the 1886-1887 drought. Those close to the river were fortunate since the Colorado furnished water for them and their stock - until the river became dry.

Several other times, when droughts plagued the Valley, the river was a boon to the settlers. However, the Colorado has not always been a friend to the people.

In 1900 there was a terrific overflow which did much damage. In 1936 the most devastating flood of all time occurred - destroying crops, inundating many homes in the Lower Valley, and it washed Jim Dennard's house several miles downstream.

Again, in 1941, the river was on a rampage. Ismael Long and family had moved to San Saba County from Big Valley - living just across the river from the Oglesby place. Late in the evening, on June 7, 1941, he and his nephew, Henry Wallace Long, attempted to rescue some sheep between a slough and the river. They did not return and early the next morning their bodies were found - they had drowned. Their horses with saddles on were also found - unharmed. No one knows, or will ever know, how this tragedy happened.

There was a telephone switchboard in the home of Will Griffin for several years. Mr. Griffin and wife Jimmie Weaver Griffin were the operators.

Big Valley produced many useful citizens - sons and daughters who became members of many honorable professions. The Valley produced three doctors - Dr. Daniel Nelson, Dr. W. S. Bickham and Dr. Herndon Nelson.

People of Big Valley are proud of the Cockrell Nursery, one of the finest in the area, operated by Hoyt and Iva Cockrell.

A large part of the lower Valley ceased to be home to many people in the early 1940's when Leonard Brothers bought vast acres of land along the river and planted a huge pecan orchard - now under the management of Elbert Hoffman. Lovely large pecan trees now grow over much of this productive valley that was once home to scores of people. Pecan orchards also belong to Dr. Robert H. Johnson, a former Goldthwaite boy, and to Cockrell Nursery.

Even though only a few people are now living there, they still have high ideals and integrity - they are esteemed citizens of Mills County.

The following quotation from Samuel Wordsworth's poem expresses the sentiments of most, if not all, of the Big Valley people:

"How dear to my heart are the scenes of my childhood. When fond recollections present them to view! The orchard, the meadow, the deep tangled wildwood, And every loved spot which my infancy knew."

**From The County Agent**

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

The pecan weevil is a late-season pest of pecans. In years when severe infestations occur this insect can destroy a large portion of the pecan crop. Feeding of adult weevils causes the nuts in the water stage to drop. After the kernel has hardened the nut is susceptible to egg laying and attack by the developing larvae. During most years the major loss is due to larvae damage, which completely destroys the kernels.

The adult is a brownish weevil about 1/2 inch long. The female's snout is as long as the body; the male's snout is somewhat shorter.

Weevils normally appear in greatest numbers during late August and early September. After nut kernels have hardened, the females chew a hole in the shell and deposit her eggs in little pockets in the nuts. Eggs are not deposited in nuts in the water stage. Creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads hatch and feed inside nuts during late summer and fall, completely consuming the kernel and ultimately attaining a length of about three-fifths inch.

Upon reaching maturity grubs

chew a hole about 1/8 inch in diameter in the shell, emerge from the nut and drop to the ground in late fall and early winter. They burrow 4 to 12 inches into the soil and construct a cell.

Most weevils remain in the larvae stage within the soil cell for about 8 to 10 months, or until the following late summer or fall when pupation occurs. Other larvae do not transform to pupae until the second year. Adults appear during late summer following pupation. The entire life cycle requires from 2 to 3 years, and most of this time is spent in the soil.

Frequently, certain trees in orchards are more heavily infested than others, apparently because of differences in adult preference. Begin checking your trees now if you have not already started, because even though you may not find the larvae feeding the presence of any adults will warrant control to prevent egg laying in the water stage.

Control recommendations include 2-3 lbs. of 80 percent WP Sevin mixed with 100 gallons of water.
