History Of Millers Grove

Millers Grove community is about four and one-half miles west of Goldthwaite on the Williams Ranch and is bounded by large liveoak small farms.
There was a little one-room house full of woodpecker in the community, and as I know it never saw a paint.
The school district was created in 1891 and was at first "Hunt" school, but in one year to Millers. The old building was torn in 1916, and later a two-story school was built three miles to the north of the first school site.
The first thing we had in our first school of special interest, hasn't been mentioned in the school histories, was a ladder that led to an over-look. On weekends the teacher appointed two of the boys as "monitors" to collect books not used over the week and carry them to the school. On Monday mornings we climbed the ladder, retrieved the books, and distributed them among the students.
The first year of school was in 1892. George McFarland was the teacher and received \$100 for the three and one-half months school term. He was a neighbor boy, and not older than his oldest brother; however, it wasn't long before they were calling him "George".
I believe we had twenty-four children enrolled that year. They were the four sisters of Mr. George McFarland - Kate, Nellie, Coreene and a brother, Willie. There was also a boy, Bessie and Ruth McFarland. Betty, Elsie and Elsie McGowan, Opal and Era Spalin, Clara, Earl and Herman Davis, Pat Fallon, Lou Shelton, Ada, Agnes, and Rex Mahan and Lou Calvin Decker and Ha...

McFarlands, the Davis family, the Wessons, Deckers, Taylors, McWhorters, Tempkins and Mahans.
I, Pat Fallon, was born in Millers Grove to Jimmy and Della Fallon on September 13, 1903. I must not fail to mention my dear old grandmother, Mary Fallon, who helped so many sick people over the community. She was considered a sort of "doctor" in the Millers

Grove community, and a better soul never lived.
Later people to lives in Millers Grove and surrounding countryside were the Holdens, the Linkenhogers, P. R. Reids, Cryers, the Spinks, the Kemps, the Colliers, the Harpers, Butch Schumans, the Soules, the Manuels, the Ritchies, Don Geeslins, and the newest comers, James and Jackie Reese and Clyde and Sue Cockrum.

Eagles Emerge With 21-8 Win, Battle Florence Friday

Even though the Goldthwaite Eagles emerged with a 21-8 win over the Santa Anna Mountaineers Friday night in non-conference play, the squad failed to play to their full capability.
Several scoring opportunities were in the Eagles' hands during the game, but the group was unable to capitalize on any of these — a fumble of the pigskin on the one-foot line; receiver overtaken for possible TD; and missed pass that would have been a six-pointer.
"We played fairly well — not to our full capability though, which we have failed to do since the season started. Friday we should have won against Santa Anna 50-0," commented Head Coach Brister.
Goldthwaite put the first six-pointer on the scoreboard during the first period of play with a 45-yard touchdown drive highlighted by Mike Williams who blasted over from four yards out.
Eagle Tim Spradley accounted for the other Eagle TD in the first half of play on a 30-yard sprint around right end. The run capped off a 51-yard drive. The score at half time was 14-0. One Eagle TD in the second quarter, a punt return by Jett Johnson, was called back due to a clipping penalty.
The third period of play was scoreless for both teams.
On an intercepted Santa Anna pass in the fourth quarter, defensive end Mike Jenkins took the pigskin 31 yards for the Eagle TD. All three conversion attempts by Jim Smith were good.

Williams was the leading rusher with 100 yards on 23 carries, followed by Spradley with 96 yards on 19 carries.
TRAVEL TO FLORENCE FRIDAY
Friday night at 8 p.m. the Eagles will play their final non-conference game of the '76 season against the Florence Buffaloes at Florence. The Buffaloes now stand 1-2 for the

season. They defeated Moody the first game of the season; were beaten by Jarrell in the second game; and last Friday night were defeated by Salado.
"We are going to try to get it all together Friday night, beat Florence, and be ready to start our conference games next week," stated Coach Brister. Assistant Coach working with the Eagles this year is John Smith.

Various Adult Education Classes Begin Here Soon

There are many types of adult education programs. One of the most popular and needed programs is the program aimed at helping the adults who did not finish high school. Teachers of these classes find out what the adult's needs are and then individualize their instruction. The student can proceed as fast as or as slow as he desires. This type of class will begin October 4th at 7:00 p.m. at the high school. These classes are free.

Another type of adult education class is aimed at the adult who needs help in speaking, reading, or writing English. These classes are particularly popular in Texas because of the many people who know only Spanish or German. This type of class will begin October 4th at 7:00 p.m. at the high school if there are 15 or more adults in this county who are interested. These classes are also free.
The third type of adult education class is aimed at helping the adult who needs to train or retrain in a skill needed to get a job. In the Goldthwaite area classes have been for those persons who need office skills or nurse's aide training. Other classes could be made available if desires are expressed to Mrs. Ben Welch at 648-3275. Announcements as to the starting dates of these classes will be coming shortly.
All of the above programs are financed by the Texas Education Agency and are free to the students.

The last type of adult education class is the class aimed at personal enrichment. These classes may vary from auto mechanics or home repair skills for do-it-yourself-ers to arts and crafts. These classes are set up by the community working together and small fees are generally paid by the students to pay the teacher. Only the director for this program is paid by the state. At the present time there is no program of this kind in Goldthwaite. However, if enough interest is shown such a program of Community Education could be set up. RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECCION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976

NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Rio Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueve el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encarecimiento de la calidad de agua y remueve el limite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la

boleto es lo siguiente: "La enmienda constitucional autorizando un incremento de \$400 millones de la cantidad de Bonos del Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán emitirse al ser aprobada por dos terceras partes de la legislación; enmendando y consolidando disposiciones de Secciones 49-c, 49-d, y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas; y revocando Secciones 49-d y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas."

NUMERO DOS EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 99)

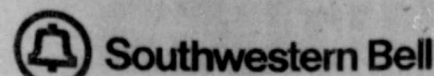

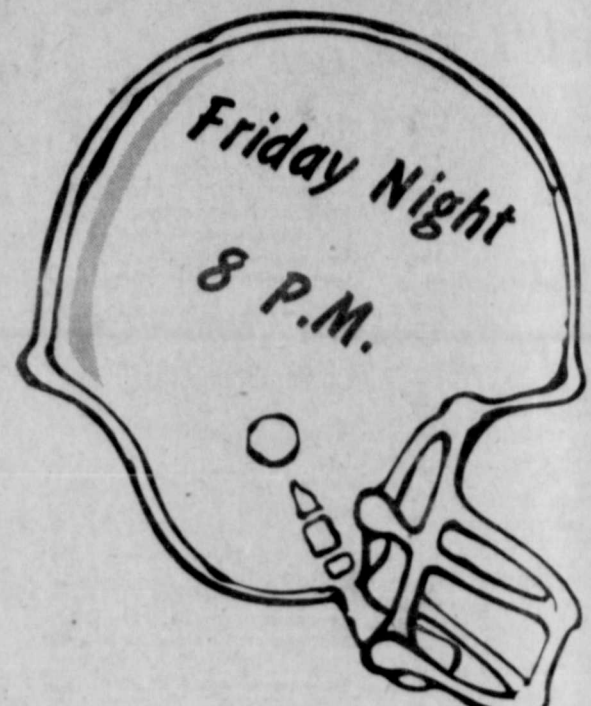

When these medallions are sold, no more will be ordered.

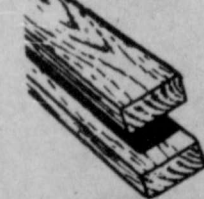

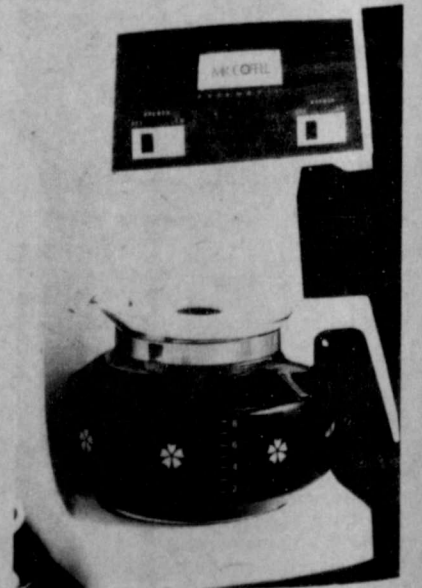
