Antelope Gap - Scallorn

 The train whistled loud and as it drew near the tiny depot of Antelope Gap and the old box-car that was used as a depot. The train didn't stop there - just when some wanted to go some- where by train and flagged the train to stop.
 One night, many years ago, Mr. Queen was doing just what he was doing now, standing in the middle of the tracks swinging his arm back and forth, signaling the train to stop. The big engine bore down upon him and we will never know what really happened and why he didn't have time to jump. We do know that his lantern went out in the breeze and he was hit by the train and killed. Such tragic happenings do occur in life in Antelope Gap, but they often happen in peaceful little communities. In the long, long ago, when the country was sparsely settled, many animals roamed the countryside, especially deer and antelope. There was a gap in the mountain in the community that lies in the southern part of the county and early settlers saw great herds of antelope; white patches on their hips flashed a farewell as they passed through the gap each evening. That was their natural trailway; thus the community was called Antelope Gap.
 The community was quite alive in the early days of this county, and was originally part of Lampasas County. There was the usual small schoolhouse, a post office, two general stores, a hotel, and an old box-car and platform which served the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad as a depot.
 In the early history of Antelope Gap there were no churches and the little school building was used when circuit riders came for early-day ministers through the community. A Mr. Barry built the old hotel and was naturally known as "The Harry Hotel", a two-story structure with rooms for rent upstairs, while a store, post office and dining room were on the first floor. Winter Stevenson later operated the business.

In 1905 the little school burned and an empty store building, built by a Mr. Adams, was used until another could be built. The school was always known as the Minor School District and came to Goldthwaite in 1937, then consolidated with Lometa in 1943. Some of the teachers were Sally Reeves, Mae Stockton, Rothe Goldman, Addie Hudson, Rosie Keese, Roy Simpson, Snow Reid, Nanny Nelson, Muriel and Thelma Linkenhoger, Minnie Jenkins, Myra Kuykendall, Harley Hanes Black, Marvel Ford, Fields Hines, Freda Hines, and the last teacher, Lloyd Laughlin.
 In 1912, when so many stockmen and area ranchers were shipping their cattle by rail to markets north and the old cattle drives had come to an end, the railroad built a spur and stock pens about two miles north of Antelope Gap. The post office was moved to that location and the name of the little village was changed to Scallorn.
 The name "Scallorn" was for "Gid" Scallorn, who was foreman of the old C - Ranch when it was owned by the Ware Brothers. Uncle Gid, as he was affectionately called, is remembered for many things, but one thing in particular comes to mind when his name is mentioned. He was a bachelor and all household chores were his to do alone. It is told that he put the cream for making butter in a half-gallon fruit jar, tied it to the back of his saddle, and went out to ride the fences or round up cattle. When he returned home, the butter was churned.
 In 1914, a new Baptist Church was built beside the post office. The post office and general store were first operated by Mr. and Mrs. Talley; then John H. Kuykendall ran the post office, general store, and barber shop until the early 1930's. C. H. (Cap) Black was the first section foreman for the railroad at Scallorn.
 Early families living in Scallorn were the Robert Evans, the Cap Blacks, Gus Forde, Ed Ringers, Winter Stevensons, Joe Morgans, Tom Elliotts, Sam Kuykendalls, Tom Huffstutlers, "Dem" Forde, D. J. Smiths, Frank Hines, T. J. Laughlins, C. H. Hortons, Luther Jernigans, W. W. Say-

lors and Brian Ware.
 Later came the Lamar McLeans, Henry Bristers, Buck Schulers, Johnny Crawfords, the Harris family, the Varnells, P. R. Jordans, C. H. Blacks, Layton and Theresa Black, Dutch and Rena Smith, the Lloyd Kings, the Weddells, the Bill Hightowers, the Bill Bishops, the James Hortons, the Wayne Henrys, Flo and Dick Hughes, and the Thomas E. Winters.
 The early settlers had to depend on each other for so many things; there has never been a community in the county or any other place for that matter where neighbors are better, more fun has been had, and life is enjoyed more than Scallorn. The Baptist Church is still active and the community known early as Antelope Gap, now known as Scallorn, thrives today.

Federal Grant Approved For Sr. Citizens Center

Mills County received official notice Monday on the approval of a \$22,000 grant for the acquisition and renovation of a Senior Citizens Center.
 The notification, from the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, originated from the Administration on Aging.
 "This grant," said Mills County Judge Herbert Faulkner, "was rated priority number one on the state level. Ours was funded before Dallas and even Houston," he added. The Judge gave the program at the Goldthwaite Lions Club Tuesday night.
 The Senior Citizens Center is a joint project of the local Committee on Aging, Hill Country Community Action, Central Texas Council of Governments Planning Division and Mills County. It will be owned by Mills County, for the ex-

clusive use of senior citizens.
 Justin Hornsby, Director of CTCOG Planning, said at the Lions Club that the local application was prepared and submitted in two weeks, a project actually requiring six weeks. Hornsby credited the local output and cooperation in the grant's approval.
 Judge Faulkner showed the group the application, prepared by CTCOG. It contained data for need, site location and funds required. It also contained about 150 letters of support from local individuals and businesses. Faulkner said this carried a lot of influence.
 Since the county has received a grant for \$22,000 to be used for a senior citizen building, the people of Mills County have the responsibility of raising \$13,000 in match money. This will take all the people of the county working together to come up with this amount.
 As you consider the amount you will give, remember how much senior citizens have contributed and continue to contribute to our county. Mills County leads the state in percentage of people over 55 years of age. These are the people who have taught you and your children; they have served in places of responsibility in your county. They have kept up our economy to the extent that Mills County has less than 2 percent, least percentage in the state, on welfare.
 At the present time, we have four senior citizen centers in the county with about 245 participating in the program. All the senior citizens of the county are invited to take part

in the activities of these centers.
 Anyone wishing to contribute now may mail or bring your donation or memorial to the county judge's office, Box 483, Goldthwaite. Make checks payable to Mills County Senior Citizens Building Fund. Names of contributors and memorials will be published in the Eagle.

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United Fund Board Of Directors

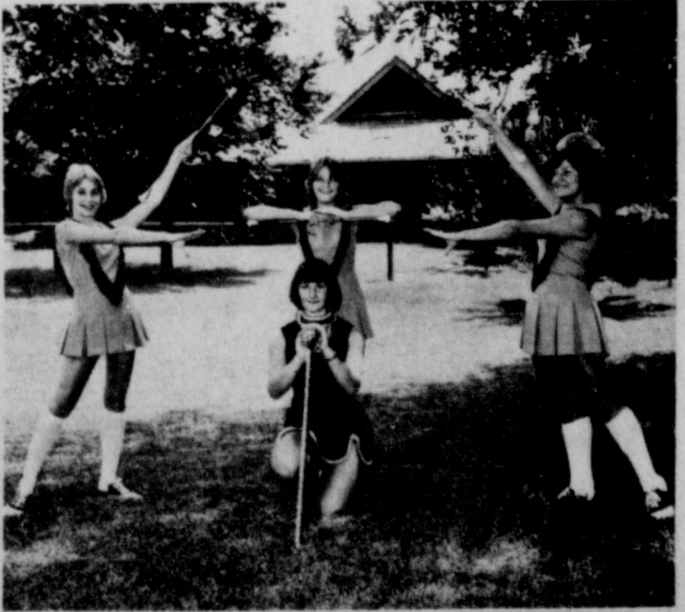

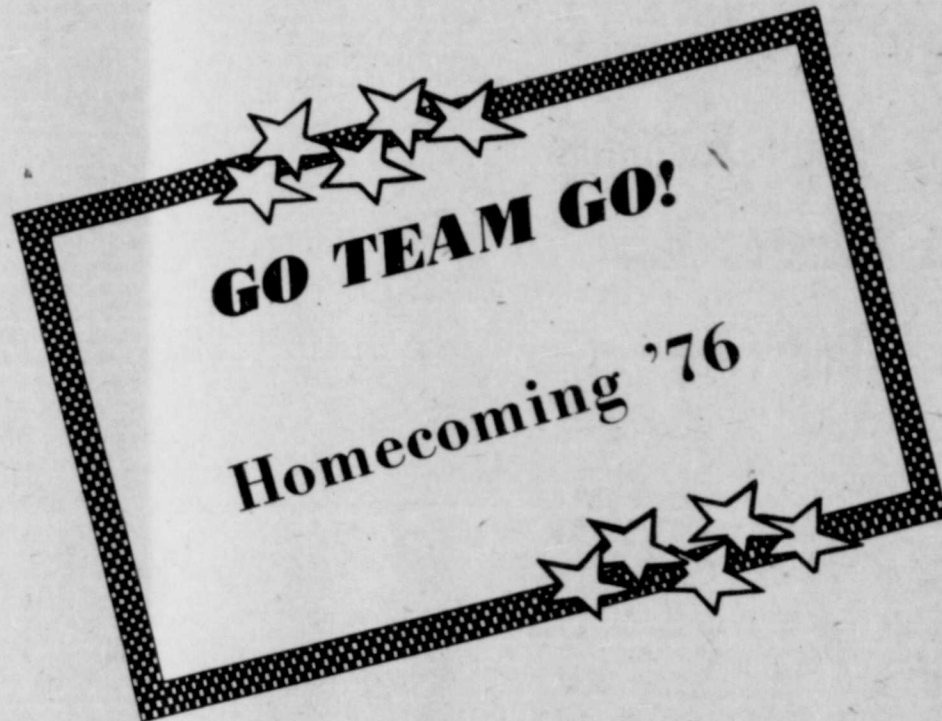

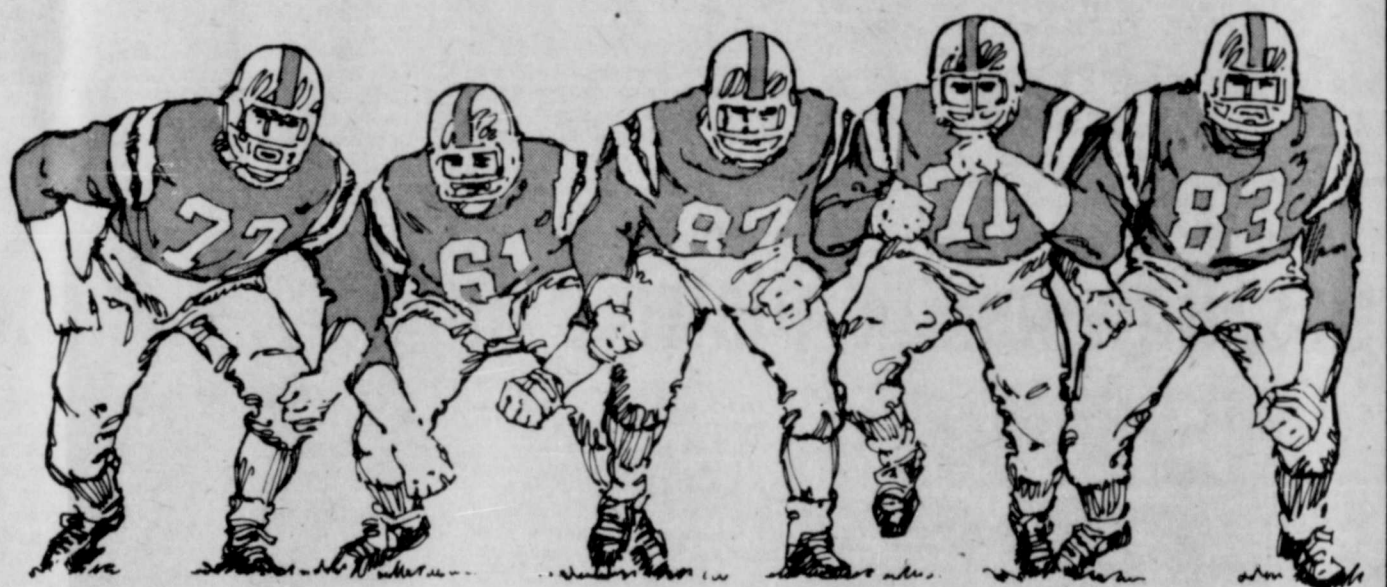

The Consumer Alert

by John L. Hill
Attorney General

AUSTIN - If you're shopping for carpeting this fall, you're treading into an area that's filled with chances for misrepresentation. Our Consumer Protection lawyers advise choosing the firm you do business with carefully in order to avoid consumer problems.

It's a good idea first to begin comparing advertisements for carpeting in your newspaper. Check the wording of the ads, though, because low prices at one store may not tell the whole story. Does the price include installation and padding? If not, the total price when these are added may be even more than at a store where they are included in the advertised price. This is not necessarily deceptive, however, since some firms contract out their carpet installation and therefore keep the prices separate.

Be sure that all the ads you are comparing show the price per square yard, which is the usual industry guide. A few firms may quote a price by the square foot, which makes their prices seem lower. Ask them to tell you what the price would be if converted to per square yard, so you will be able to make an accurate comparison.

A firm may advertise, "We'll carpet three rooms for you with a well-known carpet brand for only \$160, padding and installation included!" But when you investigate further you may find that the carpeting is a factory reject because of flaws, that the padding is of poor quality, and that the only three rooms you can get carpeted for that low price are two hallways and a bathroom. The salesman may then point out that they have a much better grade of carpeting that they can make you a special deal on - and it's only \$12 per square yard, plus

padding and installation. Watch out! This is "bait and switch," a deceptive sales tactic which is against the law, our attorneys say. Don't deal with anyone who practices such tactics. Instead, notify our Consumer Protection Division if you suspect "bait and switch."

Another misrepresentation to be on guard against is a continuous sale. If a company advertises a "sale price" for several months, that's not really a sale. "Sale" carpet prices advertised over such a long time become the company's regular prices. Check carefully, too, if you notice an ad for a special sale on "high grade" commercial carpeting "left over" from a commercial installation. Sometimes this may just be some of the company's regular carpeting, and not a commercial remnant. In addition, much commercial grade carpeting is not of the quality and type a person may want for his or her home.

More subtle misrepresentation can occur, too. A person shopping for carpeting should comparison shop to learn the differences in carpet fibers, backing, and construction. What one store advertises as "our top quality carpeting" may not be as good as that offered by another store. And the type of carpeting quality you need may depend on where you want it laid. If it's in a room that gets heavy traffic, you may need a better grade in order to stand up to the wear and tear but you may be able to buy less expensive carpeting for a room that gets less traffic.

So, shop around before you make a major purchase such as carpeting. And be skeptical of prices that seem too good to be true - because they usually are!

The ASC Community Committee election this year will be held on December 6th. As in the past, this election will be conducted by mail from the local ASCS Office. All known eligible voters, that is farm owners and operators, are being mailed a notice of the upcoming election and the opportunity to nominate candidates for these positions.

There are three designated communities in the county -

"A", Priddy; "B", Mullin; and "C", Goldthwaite and Star.

A slate of at least five nominees developed by petition, or in the absence of petitions by the incumbent community committees, must be prepared before ballots are printed.

Petitions are available at the County ASCS Office.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or a ranch, and be well qualified for com-

mittee work. The duties of a Community Committeeman include:

- (1) Informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of ASCS programs.
- (2) Keeping the County Committee informed of local conditions
- (3) Recommending needed changes in farm programs
- (4) Participating in community meetings as necessary.
- (5) Serving as county convention delegate to elect one County Committeeman each year.

ASCs Committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

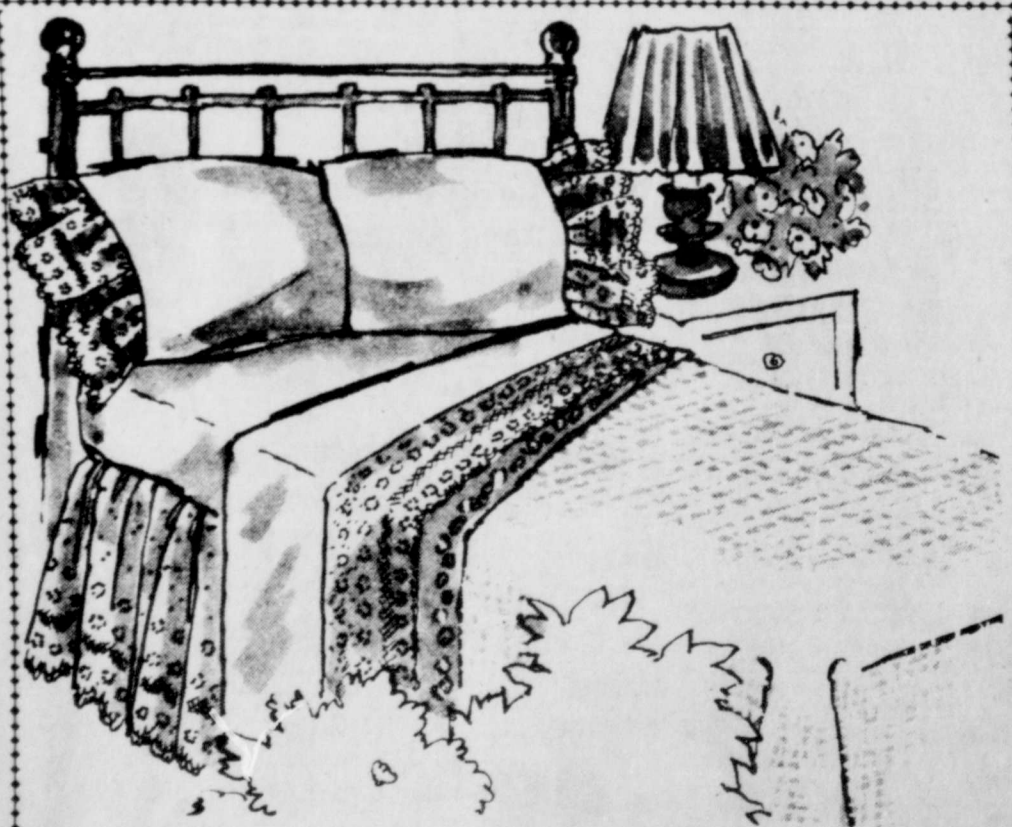
