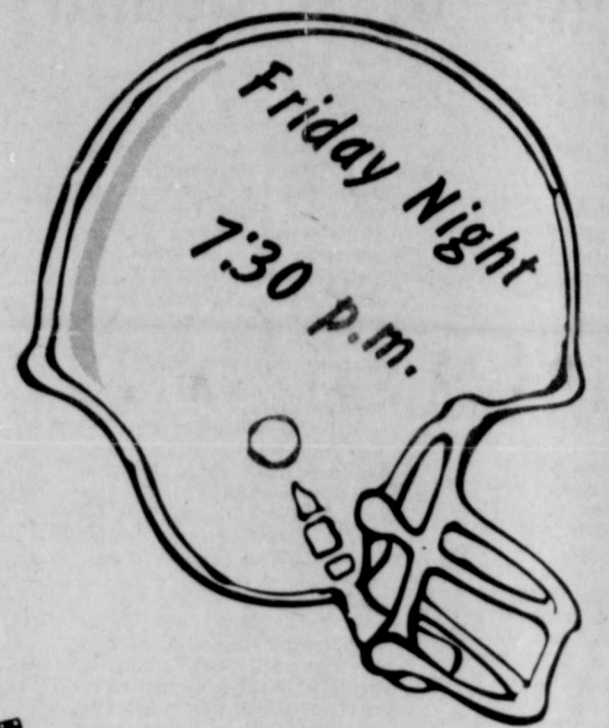

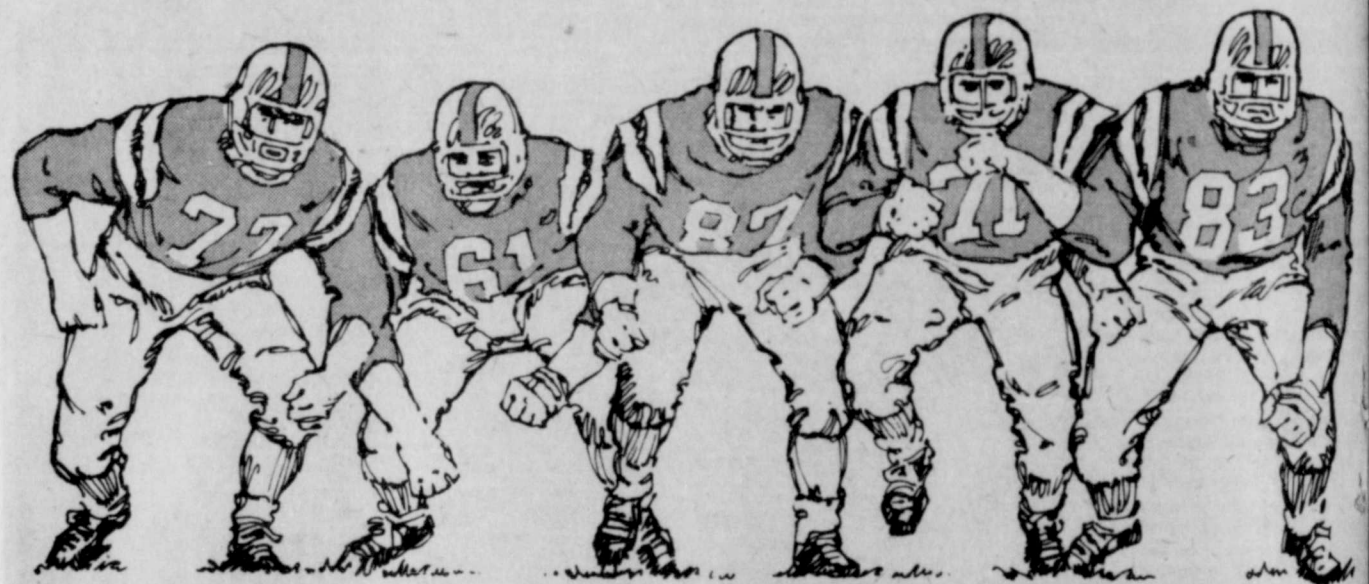

From The County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

The Mills County Crops and Livestock Committee will again sponsor the third annual Mills County Pecan Show on November 22-23, 1976. Homeowners and commercial growers are encouraged to participate.

A sample will consist of 50 pecans taken from the same variety and submitted with the participant's name, address, and pecan variety printed on the outside of the bag.

We hope to have a large number of homeowners enter this year's show. Your samples may be turned in at the County Agent's Office any time from now until November 19, 1976.

Any farming operation requires planning, and this is particularly true when it comes to applying fertilizer. Fertilizer applications should be based on soil test, and fall is a good time to take soil samples for testing. Containers and instructions for submitting soil samples are available at the County Extension Office. Based on a soil test, a sound fertilization program can be developed for the coming crop year.

Such a program will be increasingly important in the months ahead. Under present economic conditions, low yields are not profitable and fertilization, at least with nitrogen, is generally necessary for profit-

able yields. Yet, the need for each plant nutrient and its potential profitability should be closely evaluated.

With current high production costs, uncertainty about farm prices, and other risks in crop production, farmers must study their fertilizer needs more closely than ever to make sound management decisions.
