

Happenings Along Bull's Creek

Langford Blackwell history of settlers on Creek goes back to one of the earliest families to arrive in the area that was to some called Mills County. It was the family of James (Jim) Bull who braved the wilderness and settled along a creek south of Goldthwaite in that creek would someday be named after him. It was years before the Bulls had close neighbors, but their experiences along the creek were many and dangerous.

Allee Bull Long, a daughter to Jim Bull, and of Bowie Long, told stories of her early memories as a child and Bowie reared them for posterity. The stories give a very description of life on Bull's Creek and the surrounding area.

LONG'S STORY, AS TOLD BY SON BOWIE: This wild and untamed territory was roamed by wild animals. This was the days of wire fences and open range, and with lush grasses, provided a veritable paradise for day-settlers.

Of the people lived in houses, as lumber was so scarce to procure because of the wild animals. So, mother's first house was built of logs with the bull separately from the other part of the house. The house was done in a large way in the usual pioneer style.

Furniture was mostly made and especially do I remember Mother's description of the beds. It seems they were made of split springs, so used ropes to weave a netting which took the weight of the springs. On this they first placed a filled mattress, then a feather filled with feathers placed on top. In summer came, the house was air conditioned - but by modern methods. It was by simply punching out the air between the cracks. Then, because the weather became cold, mortar was made and the house was once again filled. Mother recalled that a cloud came up in the and the wind blew, rain and children came out of every bed that pushed against the wall. Her father, Robert Bull, a cowman in the early days and she remembered the of the roundups when her father was out for days helping the cattle; and she recalled the cattle herded into corrals where they were branded. Those were the days for the Bull children who peeped through the to watch proceedings go inside.

On those days the Indians still making forays into part of the country, but for the purpose of the horses; however, occa-

sionally a family would be massacred.

One evening an alarm was spread that Indians were somewhere in the vicinity of Granddad Bull's home. Now, Granddad had a favorite cow pony he called "Stockings", so when night came Stockings was brought to the house and a rope was tied to his halter. The other end of the rope was brought through the logs of the cabin and tied to Granddad's bedpost. It was thought that surely the Indians would not be able to steal the horse without waking Granddad in the process. Can you imagine the surprise when the Bull family awoke the following morning to find old Stockings gone? The Indians had crept up to the house sometime in the night, cut the rope, and made off with Stockings. How did they do it? Where was the faithful watch dog? Well, such were the ways of those stealthy, cunning redskins.

Now, Granddad Bull was somewhat wrought up over the loss of his favorite cow pony, so a band of cowboys quickly assembled and picked up the trail of the Indians. After riding almost all day, the cowboys sighted the Indians and a herd of stolen horses. Soon the cowboys were crowding the Indians so closely that they were forced to leave the horses to make a getaway.

When Granddad came up to the herd there was old Stockings and the favorite pony was recovered.

The first little school in this community was called Bull's Springs School, District No. 9, and was a one-teacher school created in 1899 from a part of Nabor's Creek district, according to the records of Raymond Williams. The building was located on Bull's Creek, four and one-half miles southwest of Goldthwaite. The name of the school was changed to Bull's Creek in 1916 and operated until the years of 1916-17, with Lyda Johnson Walton as the last teacher. In 1917 the school consolidated with Fairview to form Cedar Knob and the Bull's Creek school was torn down to help build that school. A few teachers were Russel Mullin, Rube Wrinkle, Mamie Kelly Palmer, Edna Miller, Monie Harris, Mabel Smith and Bonnie McPherson.

Bull's Creek flows through much of the southern part of Mills County and empties into the Colorado River. People living in the community and along the creek through the years have been Mr. and Mrs. Frank Smith, parents of Brian Smith of Goldthwaite; Mrs. Callie Shaw and her family, Jim and Susie Rudd and their children, Jaunita (Davis) and Omar; the John Forehands, the Davenport, the John Burnetts, the Burdetts, the Carl Julius Kauhs family, Jim Caraway, P. K. Caraway, the John Parkers, Sam McLeans, Woodrow Long, the Albert Herfords, the Browns, Willie and Robbie Smith, the Alex Millers, Pink Taft family, the Clifford Doggetts, the Cleo Warrens, Otis Carothers, August Kauhs,

Carl and Wilma Kauhs, the Henry Morris family, Ray Eubanks, the Bruce Burnetts, the family of C. A. Womacks who lived on the place where so many camp meetings were held in the early days; the Deers, the Varnells, the Hoss family, the Shoates, the Cam Williams, Lloyd Laughlins, B. F. Rainey, Harry Oglesbys, Luther Ray Rudds, Kenneth Ferris, Gertrude Kauhs, and two old timers - the Marvin Weatherbys and the Bishops.

There is a little cemetery in the pasture known as the John Parker pasture where many of the early settlers of the community are buried, especially members of the Shaw family.

All extra point conversions except one were good for the hometown squad.

In the Eagles' running game Coronado racked up a total of 61 yards; Welch, 39; James Green, 25; Humphries, 22; Mike Erwin, 16; Scott Ward, 10; and Keith Williams, 9.

Good blocking on offense was exhibited by James Green, Jason Gibbard, Johnnie Duncan, Carson Padgett, Coy Hammond, Eddie Welch, Charles Davis, and Lester Saathoff.

This was the best performance of the year by the defense.

Interceptions were made by Williams, Hammond, Coronado, Saathoff and Welch.

Coy Hammond did an extra fine job of punting during the game. Coach Buck Smith made the following statement about the game, "Offensively and defensively the JV did a fine job of executing the fundamentals. The boys proved that hard work and determination pay off. All the Junior Varsity players have worked hard and shown great determination throughout the season."

The Junior Varsity record now stands 2 wins, 2 losses, and 1 tie.

Eagles Downed In Third Dist. Game, Play DeLeon Fri.

It was wet, with a cold north wind blowing, and the breaks of the ballgame did not favor the Eagles Friday night at Ranger. "They (Ranger) are a good football team that do a lot of things and do them well," said Coach Brister after

the ballgame Friday night. They were big, outweighing Goldthwaite's line by nearly 20 lbs. a man. "We played good football but just couldn't put it together," said Coach Brister after seeing the film of Friday night's game. A key

injury to halfback Tim Spradley in the Bangs game slowed the dominant Goldthwaite running attack which normally gains about 200 yards or better on the ground.

In the first quarter, Ranger took the opening kick-off 54 yards, with fullback Louis Hernandez crossing the goal line from the 3 yard line. He also kicked the extra point.

In the second quarter, the Eagles and the Bulldogs battled between the 20 yard marks.

In the third quarter, Ranger scored first, with Hernandez scoring the second touchdown. He missed the extra point. Then Goldthwaite took over after the kickoff and on an option play to the right sophomore quarterback Jett Johnson fooled the Bulldog defense and kept the football, carrying it 71 yards for the Eagle touchdown. Jim Smith attempted the extra point but the kick was partially blocked. Then Ranger quarterback Mike Hernandez took the Bulldogs 58 yards, scoring the third touchdown himself. Louis Hernandez kicked the extra point.

In the fourth quarter, Goldthwaite and Ranger battled between the 20 yard marks again. The final score was 20-6.

In the fourth quarter, quarterback Jett Johnson suffered a blow to the head and senior quarterback David Miller took over. On an attempted pass play several seconds after Miller released the ball, he was hit and suffered some severely bruised ribs. It is questionable whether he will be able to play Friday night when the DeLeon Bearcats attempt to invade Eagle field.

Senior Mike Williams had a good night running once again, with 85 yards on 17 carries. Junior cornerback Mike Lee had a good night on defense, intercepting two Bulldog passes.

Council Approves "Energy Cost Adjustment" Effective Immediately

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session on October 7. Routine bills were approved for payment. The September Operations Report (regarding City finance) was approved. Acting City Manager Allen reported the tax rolls are completed for the City and Water District. The Council received Manager Allen's report on a study of the past eight months' sale of KWH electricity compared to KWH purchased by the City. The study showed a 7.2 percent to 10.9 percent line loss for a loss of 1.5 to 2.3 mills per KWH. After discussion, the Council unanimously approved a 1.5 mill "Energy Cost Adjustment" to be added to customers' billings effective in October, 1976.

Mayor Harper opened sealed bids for cost of new pickups, as specified by the city. Bids were from Saylor Chevrolet and Landrum Ford. Low bid from Saylor Chevrolet for a full-size vehicle in the base amount of \$5,054.39 is accepted.

The matter of a petition to

be presented was removed from the agenda due to the absence of Mrs. Lena Lindsay.

The Council received a letter petitioning the City for annexation into city limits from Schusters of Texas. The Council voted to accept the petition and encourage Mr. Schuster to proceed with boundary change formalities.

Mr. Nathan Carothers requested the City move a light pole situated on the southwest corner of Fisher and 5th Streets, at the location of Gulf Oil Distributorship office. Mr. Carothers offered to pay for the new pole and cost of digging the new hole. The Council instructed Manager Allen to work out an acceptable solution, leaving the caution light at that intersection.

Among reports or comments by Councilmen, Dr. Tom Graves asked for some relief from a sewer lift station smell and commented street sweepers. Mr. James Carter recommended the sidewalk be completed on the west side of Parker Street, between the

locker plant and Head Electric, and commented Dale Allen as Acting City Manager. The Council concurred in both recommendation and commendation.

Dale Allen reported on city work projects, summarized as follows:

+ State Highway Department will dig deposit trench at land fill in exchange for caliche to repair FM 574.

+ Jimmie Huffman cannot work for City due to his retirement plan restrictions.

+ Dozer repair cost \$5160 for track rollers.

+ Fence repair at land fill site to commence soon.

+ Grant proposal for off channel water storage has been filed by Rady Associates on behalf of Goldthwaite.

+ General maintenance work projects completed this month included water line leaks, clean and repair ball park, fence and gate secured on city water pump.

The Council unanimously approved an additional benefit to employees through the Municipal Employees Retirement System for disability due to service connected injury. Ordinance No. 221 makes this benefit available to employees effective this month.

The Fire Department recommended a portable pump be installed on the older truck on a cost-share basis with County, City and Fire Department. Estimated total cost is \$2,000. The Council agreed to one-third cost share program.

The meeting adjourned at 10:01 p.m.

The Mills Minister

It's time to pray, America! This is the theme of a host of religious leaders in America in this pre-election period. The thrust is: The urging of all Americans to pray for America and the elective process in America. This non-partisan effort on the part of all of us could change the course of history.

These prayers are not intended to be for any particular candidate to win at any level of government. They are intended to be a plea to God to make His presence known in every decision they make. It is also a plan for these leaders to listen.

This prayer effort is not without precedence in Holy Scripture. James 5:16b says: "The prayer of a righteous man has great power in its effects." And we cannot escape our obligations to pray by saying we are not righteous men but sinners. The first part of verse 16 says: "Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed."

We need a great healing in America and in the world - the healing that changes persons into God-fearing and God-following Disciples. And the only way we'll get there is for us sinners to pray for each other. If God must wait till we are all righteous in our own eyes before we pray, his ears won't hear much.

Perhaps this would help. Paul speaks of all persons in the household of faith as saints. This is contrary to our feeling that only good (almost perfect) people are saints. We are all saints because we are called of God to serve Him. It's time we were rid of the excuse - "I'm not good enough" - and begin to be God's people. The very fact that he has signed us up in His army means we are declared o.k. to do his work. So, let's get on with it.

In the elective process of America I see four types of need: (1) Clear-cut disciples of God as politicians, (2) God's people declaring who shall rule at every level of government by voting, (3) God's people working for a chosen, God-fearing candidate, and (4) God's people keeping informed and feeding in moral and ethical principles to their elected officials all the time. This is getting involved in helping this world move closer to being God's world in its behavior.

May God's Grace and Peace be with you.



Extension Highlights

As Halloween nears, safety comes to mind — especially costume safety. Here are some tips for parents to make children's "trick or treating" safer this year:

— Consider using make-up to decorate the face rather than wearing a mask which may block vision.

— Sew or glue reflective tape on both front and back of the costume, be creative and incorporate the tape into the costume design.

— Check labels or packaging on purchased costumes for flame retardant finishes. Children may be exposed to many direct sources of fires such as lighted pumpkins, colorful candles or open fires for toasting marshmallows.

— For home-sewn costumes, select fabrics that have a flame retardant finish. Or apply one at home — aerosol or home made. But remember that the commercial aerosol may not be effective on all fabrics, so check the aerosol label.

The following recipe is suggested for making flame retardant finish, but it is cautioned that this solution will work only on costumes made of wool, silk, rayon, or other natural fibers. It is not good on synthetics or resin-treated cottons.

Dissolve three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of

hot water and stir in seven ounces of borax (boric acid and borax are available at drug stores).

Soak the costume in this solution for about five minutes, then wring out and hang. When just damp, iron until dry.

This solution will not appreciably change the fabric, although any fabric that will shrink or discolor in water will be affected by the solution. This treatment will not fire-proof a costume, but will help it to resist ignition and spreading of the fire. It will be effective until the costume is laundered.



Letter To Citizens

To all my friends, patients, and associates in Mills, San Saba, Comanche, Hamilton and surrounding counties:

I went to the mailbox Monday and removed what looked like a newspaper entitled "Heartland". On closer inspection I saw that it was a political advertisement published by the President Ford Committee, although it said under the heading that inside were stories of campaign issues "of interest to all Americans."

Now to set the record straight, I'm a "Carter Convert", so my reading of the "Heartland" was a biased reading. There were a couple of anti-Carter points that I thought were valid, but there were many articles that really bothered me.

The main purpose of the paper was to somehow convince us that Gerald Ford is more religious than Jimmy Carter or at least that his religion is "better". Well, I've always been under the impression that a man's religion was not subject to my judgement, and I think the "Ford is moral - Carter is not" tone of the paper was in extremely poor taste.

Two points I specifically take issue with are the following:

First, according to one article Ford believes that religion "is not something to be worn on the sleeve, because it has a holy and personal side to it." I question what the "Heartland" paper was doing if it wasn't sticking Ford's religion out on a political sleeve. (Eleven out of nineteen features used religion as a political selling point.)

Second, The Ford paper makes much use of so-called Carter quotes - but many of these "quotes" lack those all-important quotation marks, and others are taken grossly out of context.

The "Heartland" probably did a disservice to Mr. Ford. We all know he's a decent man. But if he has to depend on a judgment of "which man's religion is the best" in order to get votes, then evidently he's afraid he can't win unless he can somehow cut down another obviously moral man.

I'm sure there are good reasons for voting for Mr. Ford, just as I believe there are good reasons for voting for Mr. Carter. I'm also sure that our choice for president involves two Christian men, and I like that. I just resent having a partisan political paper try to influence my vote by portraying their candidate as the "more Christian" of the two.

That's (pea)nuts.

During these troubles, you, my friends, have stood by me and Tealaine with your wishes, prayers, physical and financial assistance. I can never, by work or deed, express my thanks to all of you. I was a stranger - you took me in; my wife and I needed help and friendship - you liberally provided it. . . A book would not cover even the names, much less the wishes and kindness provided to us by work, deed and letter by you.

Some names I must mention - it has to be done. To my lodge, Goldthwaite Lodge No. 694 A.F. and A.M., and our Eastern Star Chapter 909, we must thank first for immediate physical and monetary help which helped Tealaine stay in Houston for over a month that I was there. To Tealaine's sisters for staying with us through the hours of stress. To our church, First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite, and Pastor Dan Connally for the prayers and personal help. To my office girls, nurse Flossie Gatlin and receptionist Suzette Keating - they have been without price. And to all of you good folks for your wishes, prayers and help.

Mention must be made of great help, physically and spiritual, received in Houston.

Our own Gene Saylor, Violet and Lincoln's daughter, simply adopted us in Houston. Gene was one of the last people I saw before I passed out in surgery and one of the first I knew when I woke up. I'll never forget her saying both times, "We love you; you're going to make it."

Two other old friends found us in Houston - Dr. Ray V. Mayfield, Vice President of Houston Baptist College, and Dr. Pressnel Wood, pastor of one of the larger Houston churches, both former Goldthwaite Baptist Pastors. One of

them seemed to be at my bedside nearly every day and some nights. We loved them in Goldthwaite; our love for them has to be greater now. Thank you - all of you.

At the advice of nine eminent and highly respected heart and chest surgeons, cardiologists and pulmonary disease specialists into whose hands I have placed my life more than once and whose advice I must respect, I am closing my office for General Practice of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery as of November 1, 1976. No medical practice, major or minor, will be done through my office, 1118 Fisher, until further notice, which may be never.

So, this may be so long to each other as far as medical practice is concerned; I am burning no bridges yet; but licenses will be in force. But when an eminent heart surgeon tells me to lift nothing heavier than a light book and not exert to the point of even sawing a small piece of plywood for at least a year and let my other activities be no more than these OR ELSE, I hope I still have enough sense to pay some attention.

After I have gained back some of the forty to fifty pounds I lost, when I get strength enough to more than walk across a small room or take a bath alone, I'll be home - that's Goldthwaite - to see you good people.

For the next month or so my office at 1118 Fisher in Goldthwaite is being kept open by my receptionist, Suzette Keating, for FINANCIAL transactions only and for the purpose of receiving in WRITING over your signature, any request for summary of your medical records to be sent to the ONE doctor ONLY and until January 1, 1977, will be furnished free of charge. After January 1, 1977, a charge for search, typing, etc., of around \$1.50 per typed page will be charged, or if my practice might be sold or transferred, other arrangements concerning medical records may be made. Any accounts owing to me will be gladly received and any accounts I owe, please leave bill with Suzette or mail to me in Goldthwaite.

Thanks to you all for your physical kindness; thanks to Tealaine, my wife, for her continued Tender Loving Care; and above all, thanks to Him above who knows, sees and loves us all and showers goodness, justice, and mercy upon us all much, much more than any of us deserve.

My wife Tealaine joins me in saying thanks to all.

Hope to see you all soon at home - in Our Home Town.

New Horizons Ranch & Center Open House Friday

New Horizons Ranch and Center is planning an open house Friday, October 22, 1976, and the general public is invited. The hours for the open house will be from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. The tour will include a look at the facilities and some of the programs offered and a chance to ask questions regarding the purposes and goals. All citizens in the community are urged to attend.

New Horizons has been in existence for over five years. It operates as a non-profit corporation with a license from the Texas Welfare Department. New Horizons has a capacity for 36 boys, ranging in age from 11 to 16. At the present time there are twenty-five staff members, including two masters level counsellors and four teachers. Also included are four consultants, including two psychiatrists, one Ph.D. psychologist, and a chaplain.

New Horizons is presently receiving children primarily from the Texas Welfare Department and the Texas Youth Council. The Youth Council will only place boys in this type of facility that are considered a status offender. Status offenders are those children who have only minor contact with the Youth Council for such things as truancy, runaway, or minor behavior problems. The boys are usually from broken homes with a history of school learning problems and are usually more than one year behind in school.

New Horizons does not accept boys who have been to Gatesville or even the reception center in Brownwood. The type of boys taken are those that should not be sent to a correctional institution. The welfare department also stipulates that New Horizons cannot take boys that are retarded or who might be harmful to themselves or others. The welfare department makes quarterly checks at the facility to insure that all standards for license are met.

The purpose of New Horizons is to help boys become happy and productive members of society with skills they can use to function in the larger community. Success is one of the key words used and each boy is helped to have some type of successful experience in whatever he is doing. This may include such areas as horseback riding, football, vocational training, classroom activities, fishing, on-the-job training, camping trips, etc.

New Horizons tends to use several methods to work with boys. These primarily are based on reality therapy. Also used is a form of behavior modification which stresses the use of actual money rather than a token.

The community of Goldthwaite has been a tremendous help and partially responsible for the success New Horizons has experienced. The community has been friendly toward the boys and has welcomed them into the local school system, businesses, and activities of the community. Quite often the boys find that people here are friendly and for the first time they can have a good feeling about someone they have met. On-the-job

training by several of the businesses has been a tremendous success and many of the boys are now working in other communities in the area they were trained in while here.

New Horizons is presently able to offer a high quality of care at a cost-saving to taxpayers. The Texas Youth Council facilities and other state facilities are sometimes twice to three times more expensive.

Social skills training is a very important aspect of the program. This includes such areas as learning to meet people, money management and saving, and developing interpersonal relationships. Other areas include developing good work skills and vocational training.

New Horizons plans to continue developing new facilities and programs through the coming years. Good community relations are vitally essential to teaching boys how to become good citizens. As you visit this Friday during open house, you can possibly have a better understanding of the role you play in working with us in helping boys to become happy and productive members of society.
