

# The Truckers

Hartal Langford Blackwell interview with Adelaide and Robbins)

Whenever there is an auction there must also be trucks to haul the livestock to and from their destinations.

The trucking industry was pioneered in Mills County long before auction rings came into being. John Witty of Star had one of the earliest trucks in the county, and hauled livestock from farm to farm over roads that were only trails. No roads were paved or very often paved. He once said he made his money fixing his own trucks than he did hauling livestock.

But the industry was actually pioneered here by Everett Land, Lindsay Kettle of Star and Slim Hurst of Star. Land and Kettle had the Railroad Commission permit issued in Mills County.

Hurst followed closely and with his permit. He owned a bobtailed truck at the time as did Kettle and Hurst. Soon trailer trucks were on the market and Everett bought a 26 foot one—a great step in the progress of trucking. It could be driven into previously impossible places and was much easier on the driver. He purchased a 26 foot trailer-truck and that was an improvement. As a comparison—Butch Schuman and several others in the county own 50 foot trailer trucks today.

Other truckers in Mills County are Cecil Williams, Shorty Guman, Sonny Robbins, who was first a driver then a mechanic, and Houston Loudamy. Drivers for the truckers are most important. They had to be honest, dependable and good drivers on the road. They were more important to the trucker than the truck itself.

The following men were early drivers: Willard and Arvin Williams, Houston Loudamy, Sugar Featherston, Shorty Guman, Sonny Wilky, LeRoy Miller and Billy Harold Anderson. Joe Bennett also owned a truck for a while and W.C. (Dub) Dellis was for him.

At the beginning of the trucking business there were no restrictions, other than getting a license and a Railroad Commission permit—but time changes all that—now restrictions and regulations are unbelievable. Regular intervals, but at an increasing time, books of the truck owners are checked by the RRC Commission for mileage rate charges, which are regulated by the commission. The truck book must be kept and must be marked off for every stop—even fifteen minute coffee breaks. There are other worries and problems for truckers, such as permits for crossing state lines and extra taxes charged by different states for various reasons.

At this time has improved the industry as well as the trucks. Long sleek livestock trucks

driven today by Butch Schuman, Don Geeslin and John Smith can be compared as equally an advancement with time to Everett's bob-tailed truck, as the Model T is compared to the shiny new automobiles we drive today.

# City Council Has Meet; Oppose LCRA Rate Hike

On April 7th the Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session in the City Hall. Mayor J. D. Harper, called the meeting to order. Alderman Felton Wright was absent.

Minutes of the March regular and special meetings were read and approved. The paid bills for March were reviewed and approved. CM Allen presented the March operations report and quarterly treasurers report.

Budget percentages were given as follows:

Mr. John Arthur and Mr. Buddy Morgan from the State Highway Dept. attended the meeting to discuss traffic control in the city. Mr. Arthur, referring to Texas traffic manuals and code, explained that a second 3-light signal would not be approved by the Dept., but, according to Arthur's interpretation, could be erected by the City. Approaches to the signal at 4th and Fisher were discussed and Arthur felt the State Dept. would approve and install warning signs. Arthur is to conduct a "use count" on the current signal and if it meets standards of traffic, the State will assume responsibility of the signal device (maintenance and/or replacement).

Mayor Harper presented his nominations for the 1977-78 Tax Equalization Board: Sonny Robbins, Normalee Robertson, and Del Barnett. The Council, by unanimous vote, ratified the appointments. The Council discussed its charge to the Board and concluded that (a) review of Real Estate value and renditions should be made, (b) consideration should be given to personal property taxation for mobile homes, all licensed vehicles, 10 per cent of actual value of business merchandise, inventory, machinery, furniture & fixtures. Value standards for automobiles will coincide with those established by the

School District.

Council reviewed reports from the Election Judge as to the April 2 Municipal Election. It was shown that 66 persons voted as follows: Mayor J. D. Harper, 66; Alderman Bridges 66; and alderman Charles Childress, 63. By unanimous vote, the Council canvassed the election, declaring the persons duly elected. Secretary Taylor administered the oath of office, prescribed by State law, to Mayor Harper and Aldermen Bridges and Childress. Retiring Alderman Carter withdrew from the meeting amid plaudits from the council.

Alderman Loy Long was unanimously elected as Mayor Pro-Tem and regular meeting date for the council will remain the first Thursday night at 7 p. m. of each month. Per Diem payment for councilmen was not changed, remaining at \$10.00 for regular and \$5.00 for special meeting attendance.

Ordinance number 228 was read for the council regarding stop signs and other traffic control signs for the Central Texas Council of Governments. The ordinance was approved on an emergency basis as necessary for public safety.

## LCRA SEEKS RATE INCREASE

City Manager Allen showed documents from the Lower Colorado River Authority, supporting the wholesale power company's request for a rate increase. Company notice of the rate increase claims an average increase of 8.6% to customers, however, CM Allen computed a 23% increase to the city electric users.

This is the case of a large number of city customers and a coalition of such cities and electric cooperatives has been formed to combat the increase. In the interest of the citizens of Goldthwaite, the council approved the expenditure of \$124 to participate in the "30 Mayors Special Fund" group in this matter. This money will initially be spent for legal fees in the opposition to the rate

increase.

The council is on record opposing a rate increase to LCRA because "rather than the 8.6% rate increase as stated through public notice, our figures show a 23% increase to the people of this city."

Manager Allen noted a minimum increase of \$686 or a maximum of \$3018 could be expected to the city if the new rates are accepted. A comparison of electric rates for cities nearby was shared by Allen. (See chart accompanying this article.)

## SAFE DRIVING MONTH SET

Alderman Tom Cody Graves suggested that May be set aside as Safe Driving Month in the city for the following purposes:

1. That all citizens be made aware of traffic signs (many new ones have been installed throughout the city.)
2. To remind Senior Citizens of transportation services available for their use.
3. Encourage the Sheriff and Texas Highway Patrolmen to stop minor vehicle drivers and

# Commissioners Set Public Hearing On County Redistricting

The Mills County Commissioners' Court set Monday, May 9, as the date of a public hearing on the proposed new precinct and voting box boundaries for the county.

The new proposal stems from the court adhering to the Texas law on the subject, which states that commissioners be elected by voters of their precincts, and not at large as they are presently elected. The proposed boundaries are on file in the office of County Judge Herbert Faulkner, and anyone wishing to view them may do so. However, official action must come from the public hearing.

The new lines will call for ten voting boxes, at various points throughout Mills County, and miles of road will be better equalized.

## ANNA LOU SCHLEE NAMED JP

The commissioners unanimously voted to appoint Anna Lou Schlee of Priddy to fill the unexpired term of Troy Williams, who died last month. The position is for Precinct 6, which covers the northern part of Mills County around Priddy. Seven applications were received by the court, of which Anna Lou was selected.

In other Commissioners' Court business, the returns of the recent county and school district elections were

canvassed and approved as submitted.

The commissioners divided \$36,000 in recently received taxes among the four precincts. It was divided accordingly: Precinct 1, \$10,000; Precinct 2, \$8,000; Precinct 3, \$10,000; and Precinct 4, \$8,000.

The commissioners also divided the Federal Revenue Sharing money from the last quarter. The \$8,273 was divided, giving 72 percent to the precincts; 19 percent to the salary fund; 7 percent to the building fund; and 2 percent to the library.

County Judge Faulkner said that a representative from the Texas Commission on Jails would be in Mills County on April 22 to review the jail situation here.

The commissioners passed a resolution supporting the recently passed House of Representatives bill, currently in Senate form, asking for the counties of Texas to have the authority to make ordinances. The resolution was forwarded to State Senator Grant Jones for his use. Currently counties of Texas cannot pass ordinances. Ordinances usually concern things such as sewers, streets or highways, traffic and other things dealing with the public.

The Commissioners unanimously approved the official

quarterly report of Treasurer Jewel Yeager.

The Mills County Commissioners' Court meets the

second and fourth Mondays of each month in the commissioners courtroom of the Mills County Courthouse.

# Goals Of Beef Research And Information Program

What are the goals and purposes of the proposed beef research and information program?

If eligible livestock producers vote in favor of the beef checkoff program this spring, it is designed to allow the establishment of projects for advertising, promotion, education, producer and consumer information with respect to use of cattle, beef and beef products.

Similarly, the program

would allow for the establishment and conducting of research, market development projects and studies with respect to production, growing sale, processing and distribution, marketing or utilization of cattle, beef and beef products, the Extension agent said.

The program also would include development and expansion of foreign markets.

The checkoff is designed as a self-help program, where the producer would be contributing 3/10 of one per cent of the sales of his cattle. For example, for a producer to contribute \$100 to the program, sales from his cattle would need to be \$33,333 annually.

Nearly \$40 million would be generated in the program's first year of operation, based on the assessment rate as outlined in the proposed program. The program would be administered by a Beef Board of not more than 68 members from eligible producer organizations of each state or geographical area. Texas should have a representation of about seven members on the Beef Board, to help determine how the checkoff monies would be spent.

# Pecan Workshop Thur. April 21

The Mills County Crops and Livestock Subcommittee has scheduled a County Pecan Workshop in Goldthwaite on April 21, 1977. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the County Courthouse.

The topics on the agenda will be of interest to homeowners with a tree in the backyard as well as the commercial pecan producers. We plan to discuss tree fertilization, insect control and prevention and pecan disease control and prevention. Other topics concerning pecan production will also be on the agenda at the discretion of the area horticulturist. You will also be given the opportunity to ask questions about specific problems you may have.

Sammy Helmers, Extension Horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service stationed in Stephenville will be on hand to present the program. Sammy is new in our District and comes well qualified. He has been serving in research at Texas A & M previous to his appointment to District 8.

We feel the program will be well worth your time and we encourage each homeowner as well as commercial producers to be in attendance.





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

If you establish an Individual Retirement Account, commonly called an IRA, the interest the account earns at the bank each year is not subject to income tax. The depositor pays income tax only after withdrawals begin.  
There are some ground rules on withdrawals that should be noted. If withdrawals are made before the depositor is 59½ years of age, a penalty of 10 percent must be paid on the withdrawal amount. After 59½ years of age, withdrawals may be made in a lump sum, or in monthly, quarterly, or annual installments. Personal income taxes are then paid on withdrawal amounts. These rates are much lower for the retired person because his income is normally less than while he was earning his living and contributing to the IRA.



## Marker Inscription

Engraved on the marker is the following:

PLEASANT GROVE CEMETERY

Named for the Live Oaks Banking Simms Creek, Pleasant Grove was settled by Civil War Veterans from both the North and South. The farm of Tom Berry (1844-1926) of Alabama adjoined this

cemetery, opened with the burial of his daughter Mary (1872-1876). Pleasant Grove

Methodist Church and a community school also stood nearby. Donations maintained the site until a cemetery association was organized in

1969. Church trustees added 15 acres to the burial ground in 1970. In over 400 graves, many unmarked, lie early settlers and their descendants. (1976)

## Pleasant Grove Cemetery Marker Dedication Held Sat.

Saturday afternoon, April 2, 1977, at 2:30 p.m., the Mills County Historical Commission, with the cooperation of Pleasant Grove Cemetery Association, dedicated an official Texas Historical Marker for the cemetery. The marker was placed at the north entrance of the cemetery. The Cemetery and Community was named for the Live Oaks, banking Simms Creek, which flows near by.

Mrs. M. F. Horton, Historical Marker and Research Committee Chairman, was Master of Ceremonies giving the Welcome and introducing guests. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Hubert Berry, great grandson of Tom Berry. The invocation was given by County Judge Herbert Faulkner. "Little Church in the Wildwood" was sung by Mr. & Mrs. Thurman Head and Mr. Glynn Collier.

Mrs. Ruth Verser Carothers wrote the history of the coming of the Wagon Train, which brought from Alabama to Texas, some of the first settlers of Pleasant Grove. Among them was her father, Nathan Verser; William Foster Horton and wife; and Tom Berry, his wife and three small children. Tom Newton Berry was a Civil War Veteran. Their children were Willie, Paul and Mary. William Horton's father Charles F. Horton, was killed in the Civil War.

"Go West Young Man", was the subject of the dedication speaker, Mr. Troy Berry, who was introduced by Mrs. Carothers. He told of the families coming to Mills County in 1874 and of the hardships and sorrows they were affronted with in settling the Pleasant Grove Community.

The Cemetery was opened with the burial of Tom Berry's daughter, Mary, in 1876. In over 400 graves, many unmarked, lie early settlers and their descendants.

A majority of the farms and ranches of Pleasant Grove are still owned by the families of these early settlers. The ranch of William Foster Horton has been in the family 95 years. It is now owned by his grandson, Ray Berry.

Elmer Horton of Corpus Christi, grandson of William Horton and Allan Horton of Waco, a great grandson, unveiled the Historical Plaque.

Mrs. Verna Hall Miller, who still lives on her grandfather Covington's place, (he was a very early settler), read the inscription on the marker.

Mr. & Mrs. Thurman Head led the group in singing "God Be With You 'Til We Meet Again".

Mr. Elam Miles, great grandson of Tom Newton Berry, gave the benediction. Historical Commission members attending were: Mr.

Julian Evans, Co-Chairman; Judge Herbert Faulkner, Mrs. M.F. Horton, Mr. & Mrs. Thurman Head, Research Committee members. Mrs. Marjorie Manuel and Miss Mae Featherston, who are on the History Preservation Committee; Mrs. Allen Campbell, Commission Chairman, was out of town. Mr. Oran Carothers, President of Pleasant Grove Cemetery Association, gave a brief talk.
