The Country Doctors

July 18, 1928

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and
Gentlemen of the Mills County
Pioneer Club:

Having been requested to
write a paper on the Pioneer
Physicians of Mills County, I
have had to call to my
assistance my old friend, Hon.
P.H. Clements, for some data
concerning the earliest physi-
cians that practiced medicine
in what is now Mills County.

In 1878, Dr. T.H. East came
from the Indian Territory and
located at Williams Ranch. He
seemed to be a man of
mystery. He was a federal
soldier and no one ever knew
much about him. He and his
family lived on Brown's Creek
in what is now known as the
Weston or Gatin pasture. He
was arrested in connection
with the hanging of two
negroes at Williams' Ranch.
After being in jail for a while,
he was released and soon
moved back to the Indian
Territory, in 1878.

Dr. Dodd located at Center
City and practiced there
during the years of 1879 and 1880.

Dr. G.W. Jones, a refined
and educated gentleman, lo-
cated at Center City and en-
gaged in practice of medi-
cine during the years of 1880,
1881, 1882, 1883 and 1884.

The first physician to make
a permanent home in Mills
County was Dr. Hugh P.
Smith. He first located in Big
Valley, and after practicing
there for a while he moved to
Goldthwaite in 1885. He
continued to practice until
from old age and ill health he
was forced to retire. He spent
the rest of his life here, and his
body now reposes in the
cemetery nearby.

Dr. J.B.B. McNutt came
from Missouri and located in
Big Valley. After remaining
there for a few months he
moved to Goldthwaite in 1885.
He continued to practice in
Goldthwaite until about 1896,
when he sold out and moved
away.

Dr. J.A. Morris and Dr. J.E.
Holden practiced medicine at
Williams' Ranch from 1883 to
1885. Both moving to Gold-
thwaite when the town was
established.

Dr. Montgomery practiced
medicine on Pompey Creek
during the years of 1887, 1878
and 1879.

Dr. Paxton came to Will-
iam's Ranch in 1874 and
practiced there for several
years.

Dr. M.C. Brockenbrough
came from San Saba County
and located at Williams' Ranch.
He remained there for a
season and moved up to
Blankett Creek, near the
Blankett Springs Schoolhouse.
He practiced there until the
town of Mullin was estab-
lished. He practiced at Mullin
until 1896 when he was
appointed Light House keeper
at Quintana, Texas. He re-
mained at his fort of duty until
death called him home.

The first physician to locate
in Goldthwaite was Thos. J.
Pugh, and his wife was the
first teacher in the Gold-
thwaite Public School. Dr. Pugh
is now 82 years old, and he and
his good wife are now spend-
ing the remaining days of their
lives at Hearne, Texas.

Dr. Carpenter, who also was
a merchant, practiced medi-
cine in Big Valley for a while.
He then moved to Goldthwaite
and died in 1888. His wife was
M.s. Sue Weatherly.

Dr. J.D. Kirkpatrick located
at Mullin in the early nineties
and practiced there until his
death in 1903.

Dr. W.D. Alldredge was
located at Ridge in 1895. He
afterwards moved to Mullin
where he remained for about
two years. He then moved
away and is now located at
Andrews, Texas.

In 1893 Dr. Myra Everly,
first woman doctor, came to
Goldthwaite.

On Monday morning, Nov.
22, 1896, the writer of this

paper arrived in Mullin, mov-
ing there from Pottsville,
Hamilton County. At that time
the following physicians were
at Goldthwaite: Drs. A.W.
Barton, J.H. Logan, M.L.
Brown, J.P. Sharp and H.P.
Smith.

In 1896, that grand old
Christian gentleman, Dr. J.D.
Caloway, was living on his
farm and practicing medicine
in the North Brown and
Trigger Mountain commu-
nities. Later he moved to
Goldthwaite and continued to
practice until he was called
Home to receive his reward.

Dr. J.A. Matthews located
at Mullin in 1898 and after
remaining there for some
time, moved away. He is now
living at Mathis, Texas, hav-
ing retired.

Dr. A.B. Clay came to
Mullin in 1903 and practiced
there until his death.

Dr. R.H. Jones located at
Mullin in 1904 and has
continued in the practice of
medicine with the writer up to
the present time.

About 1907, several physi-
cians came to Mills County;
Drs. J.M. Campbell, Joe B.
Townsen and W.B. Everett
all locating in Goldthwaite
except Dr. Townsen, who
moved to Star.

Dr. W.W. Fowler was at
Goldthwaite for some time. He
is now located in Dallas.

About 1910, Dr. H.E. Brown
entered the medical field,
associating himself with his
brother, Dr. M.L. Brown. He
remained at Goldthwaite until
1910, when he moved to
Houston and died there in
1918. Dr. M.L. Brown moved
to Brownwood in about 1916
and practiced there until his
death.

Dr. S.A. Lowrie came to
Goldthwaite in about 1908 and
remained there until 1927. He
is now at Post, Texas.

Dr. Brooking and wife, both
physicians, located at Star,
several years ago. After re-
maining there for a while he
moved to Goldthwaite, Mrs.
Dr. Brooking remained at Star.
Dr. Snodgrass located at
Star in about 1918. After
remaining there for a while,
moved to Hamilton.

Dr. W.E. Brown came to
Mullin in 1919 and practiced
there until 1927, when he
moved to Blankett, Texas.

Of the physicians mentioned
above the following have
answered the last roll call:
Drs. A.W. Barton, H.P.
Smith, J.H. Logan, J.D.
Kirkpatrick, J.P. Sharp, M.L.
Brown, H.E. Brown, M.C.
Brockenbrough and A.B. Clay.

The old country doctor is
almost a thing of the past. No
more will the sound of his
galloping steed, or the rattle of
his saddle bags cheer the heart
of that anxious mother, as she
claps her darling babe to her
throbbing breast, as she
watched its life slowly passing
away at the midnight hour.

Now in the near future it will

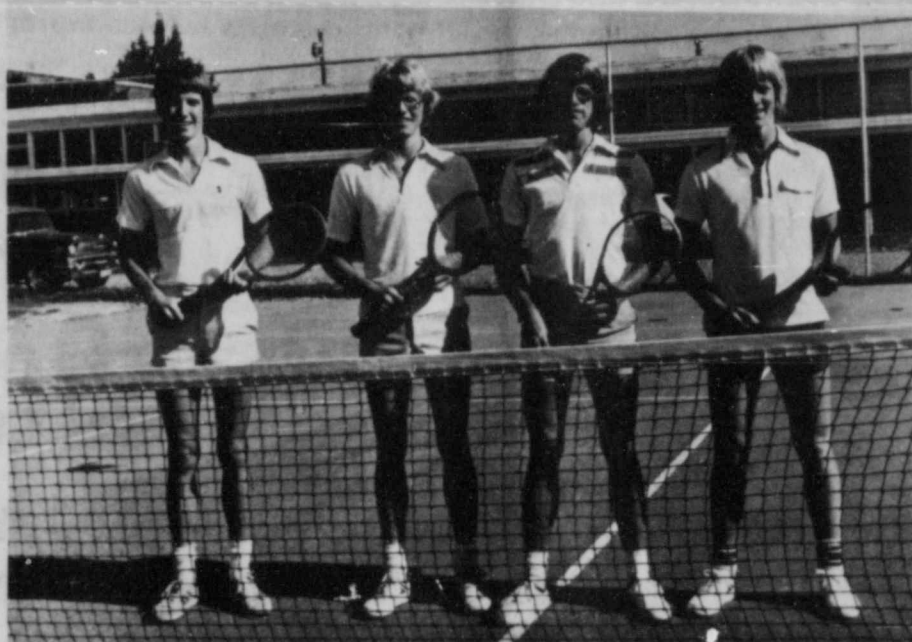

Boys Qualify For Regional Tennis Competition

Goldthwaite High School's
four Regional UIL Tennis
qualifiers—Rick Welch, Sing-
les; Eddy Welch, Singles; and
Kip Welch and Rodney Scott,
Doubles; competed in the
Region 2 High School Boys
Tennis Meets in Stephenville
on April 28th and 29th.

Eddy Welch won his first
match with a 6-1, 6-2 victory
over the Coppell High School
entrant. He lost his second

match to Gary Gardner of
Junction, the eventual 2nd
place finisher in the tourna-
ment, 2-6, 2-6. Gardner was a
State Tournament contender
last year.

Kip Welch and Rodney Scott
won their first match 6-1, 6-1
over the team from Moody.
They won the second match by
6-3, 6-3. In the semi-finals
they lost to the eventual 2nd
place team from Aledo, 6-0,

6-0. In the third place game
they won by a score of 6-3, 5-7,
6-4 over the team from
Whitney. Kip and Rodney are
Alternates to the State Tourna-
ment.

Rick Welch won his first
match 6-1, 6-0, and his second
match 6-4, 6-0. In the
semi-final game, Rick lost to
tournament winner, Tim Lem-
berg of Junction 6-7, 6-7.
Lemberg was a State finalist
last year.

Coach Brister made the
statement, "It's a shame that
the two best players had to
meet before the Finals. Rick
and Lemberg were as evenly
matched as any two players
could be, in what may turn out
to be the State championship
match. As it turned out, only
Lemberg gets to go to the
State Tournament, with Rick
as the Alternate. We are very
proud of all our players and
expect to have Kip, Eddy,
Rodney, and a couple more
excellent players back to the
Regional Tournament next
year."

Proposed Mills Co. Commissioner's Precinct Lines



The Mills County Commissioners Court has proposed new precinct boundaries for the county to better equalize the population of the county.

The new lines will insure that each of the four precinct will have as close to 25% of the registered voters as possible, according to Mills County Judge Herbert Faulkner.

If approved, these boundaries would go into effect on January 1, 1978 and can be changed, pending the movement of population each year in July if necessary to keep the proportions equitable.

Precinct 6, the west precinct at Priddy, has not been changed and will remain in the exact state as before the proposed reorganization.

PUBLIC HEARING SET MONDAY

A special public hearing on the proposed redistricting plan will be held in conjunction with the regular Mills County Commissioners Court meeting on Monday, May 9, beginning at 2 p.m. in the Commissioners Courtroom of the Courthouse.

At this time requests from voters concerning the new lines will be heard by the court, and any changes may be recommended at this time.

The voting procedures will return to the regular method of electing after the redistricting process is complete. Each precinct will elect its own commissioner, changed from the present at large method.

CITY LINES CHANGED

Precinct lines that run through the city limits of Goldthwaite are the most drastic changes in the redistricting. This was necessary to equalize the voting population.

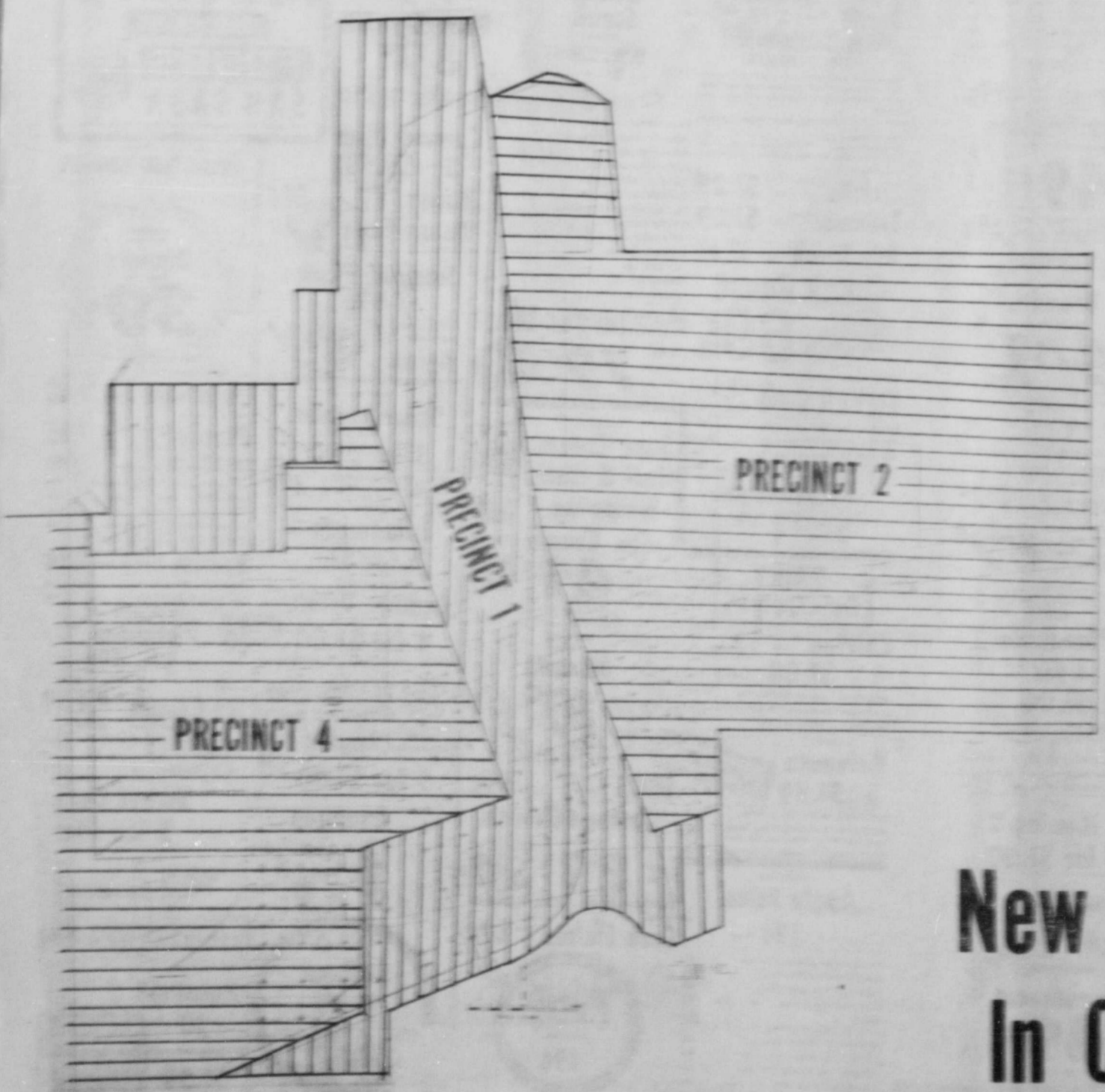
Precinct four will enter the city down the center stripe of Highway 36 to McIntosh Street. It will run north to Sixth Street and then east to Reynolds Street. It will then run north to Little Street and then west to Cline Street to the Elementary School. The line then runs west to Earl Street and then south to Hanna Valley Road, and then west to Hanna Valley.

The eastern boundary of Precinct 1 will enter the city limits on Eighth Street, at the housing units of the City. It will travel west to the Santa Fe Railway and then north to the Underpass.

Precinct 2 will have all the city limits to the east of the afore-mentioned line.

COMMISSIONERS INVITE VOTERS

The commissioners wish to invite anyone who would like to voice their opinion about the redistricting plan to attend the public hearing on Monday. County Judge Faulkner states that this is a sincere effort to secure the "one man - one vote" proportions here in the County.

Program On Pesticides

Mills County producers are advised that certain pesticides will be restricted and available for use, legally, only under the supervision of registered applicators.

The classification of certain pesticides as restricted-use pesticides, and the requirements for certification are each requirements of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA), as amended and is scheduled to be fully implemented on October 21, 1977.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators, on a county basis, who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in accordance with federal law.

The term "private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses, or supervises the use of, any of the pesticides classified for restricted use for purposes of producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer.

The program established by the Texas Dept. of Agriculture provides three options for certification of private applicators to include:

- (1) Completion of an approved training program conducted by a qualified person.
- (2) Submission of a completed questionnaire to the Texas Dept. of Agriculture, following review of self-study material, and
- (3) For emergency situations, a single-product, single-purchase, single-use certification, available through the TDA.

Two certification training programs have been scheduled in Mills County.

The first will be held on May 10, in the Goldthwaite High School Auditorium, beginning at 7:30 P.M.

The second training program will be held May 17, in the Priddy High School Gym, beginning at 7:30 P.M.

Participants must be present promptly at 7:30 p.m. when the program begins and remain until the completion of the entire program, in order to complete certification requirements.

The first will be held on May 10, in the Goldthwaite High School Auditorium, beginning at 7:30 P.M.

The second training program will be held May 17, in the Priddy High School Gym, beginning at 7:30 P.M.

Participants must be present promptly at 7:30 p.m. when the program begins and remain until the completion of the entire program, in order to complete certification requirements.

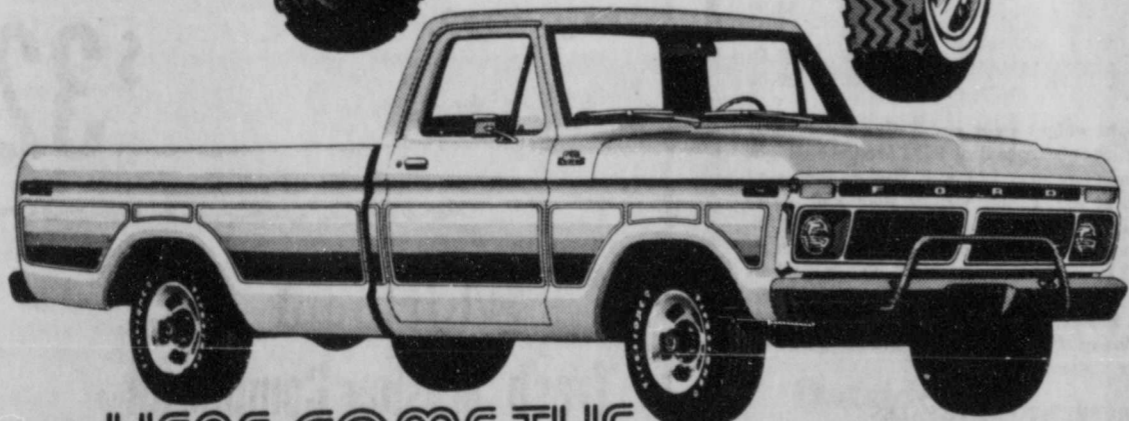

Then the mother can have a seat in the lobby and wait with agony for the nurse to bring the sad news that the life of her darling one is about to take its flight and join its maker.

And, to the old family doctor who has proved true to himself, his patient and his God, he need have no fears. "For when the one great Scorer comes to write against his name, it matters not whether he won or lost, but how he played the game." and when his sun is sinking behind the western hills, his steps tottering, his eyes bedimmed, his form bent under the weight of many years, and his temples adorned with hoary locks of many winters, then he can lie down on his couch, wrapped in the mantle of "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter into that rest promised to all that hold out, faithful until the end."

NOTE: (By Hartal Blackwell) Other doctors mentioned in the above article and have passed on are DR. Jones, Dr. Herrington, Dr. Brooking and Mrs. Dr. Brooking, Dr. J.M. Campbell, Dr. Lowrie, Dr. Hutchison and Dr. Sherwood Owens.

Following Dr. Herrington's paper of 1928, the following doctors have practiced in Goldthwaite:

Dr. Mills in the early 1930's; Dr. J.J. Stephens in 1935; Dr. Ruel Slaughter in 1938; Dr. M.A. Childress and Dr. Chas. Smith in 1948; Dr. Bob Trotter; Dr. D.C. Cruzcosa in 1963, and Dr. Douglas M. Dennis in 1972.

Two early physicians not mentioned in Dr. Herrington's paper were Dr. Sherwood Owens of Center City community and Dr. Elam Horton, both practicing in the 1800's. There was also a Dr. McQuary in Goldthwaite in 1914. I am positive of this fact, because he attended my mother at my birth.

Early osteopath doctors here were Dr. Boone, followed many years later by Dr. R. Glynn Raley.

An early Chiropractor was Dr. Swanger, remembered here by many. He was followed by Dr. C.C. Sadler, then Dr. E.J. Stanford.
