The Fiddlers Contest will begin at 10:30 a.m. Saturday at the Pavilion at the Mills County Park in Goldthwaite. The contest will continue throughout the day until the winners are announced in the afternoon. There will be over \$750 in prize money. The fiddling and guitar accompaniment will be the best ever, according to co-chairmen, Glynn Collier and Lloyd Laughlin.

Fiddlers from all over the State and some from other states are expected for the event, sanctioned by the Texas Old Time Fiddlers Association. Four divisions, 65 and over, 7-18, 19-49, and 50-64 will be sponsored this year.

Blood Pressure Check Clinic May 26

High blood pressure is a dangerous health problem, according to the Texas Dept. of Health Resources.

The Department states that now is a good time of year to have an annual blood pressure check.

According to the medical profession this disease often has no symptoms - you can't tell if you have it or not - except by having it measured by a physician, or other qualified health professional.

If you already know you have high blood pressure, and have been given a prescription, remember to take your medication regularly.

Public Health Region 6, a branch of the TDHR, offers free blood pressure screenings as one of its public services.

Patients with abnormal readings will be referred to a physician of their choice for further evaluation.

Schlueter's Legislative Outlook

There are times when I am amazed at the cost of government. Small, insignificant practices could be eliminated in the various governmental agencies and save the state enormous amounts of cash.

The State can change procedures carried out on the local level and save millions for local taxpayers.

Rep. Dan Kubiak, of Rockdale, tacked an amendment on to the House Education Bill which reduced the public school term from 180 to 174 days. This reduction of six days will provide a savings of approximately \$4.5 million dollars to the local school districts.

Consolidation of various departments and agencies, which have overlapping jurisdictions and duties, could save taxpayers untold millions. It would provide for fuller utilization of employees and trim excess personnel from the budget.

Sen. Walter Mengden, of Houston, has a unique ideal which he applies in the other chamber. Mengden attempts to include, in every new state program, a self-destruct clause. Under his proposal every program would go out of existence after six years, unless the Legislature acted to renew the program. This approach forces the Legislature to review the effectiveness of a program and gives us a chance to view the cost-benefit relationship.

This proposal is another money saver which the State could utilize to save the taxpayers money.

There are a number of money saving ideas for government and I am willing to act on them, because they save the taxpayers money.

The past week has been one of the busiest in the House. Debate on the School Finance, Appropriations and Property Tax Bills were scheduled for the House Floor.

Committee hearings were held for pari-mutuel betting, recall of the Equal Rights Amendment and restrictions on abortions, causing most Members and their staffs to work ten to twelve hour days all week.

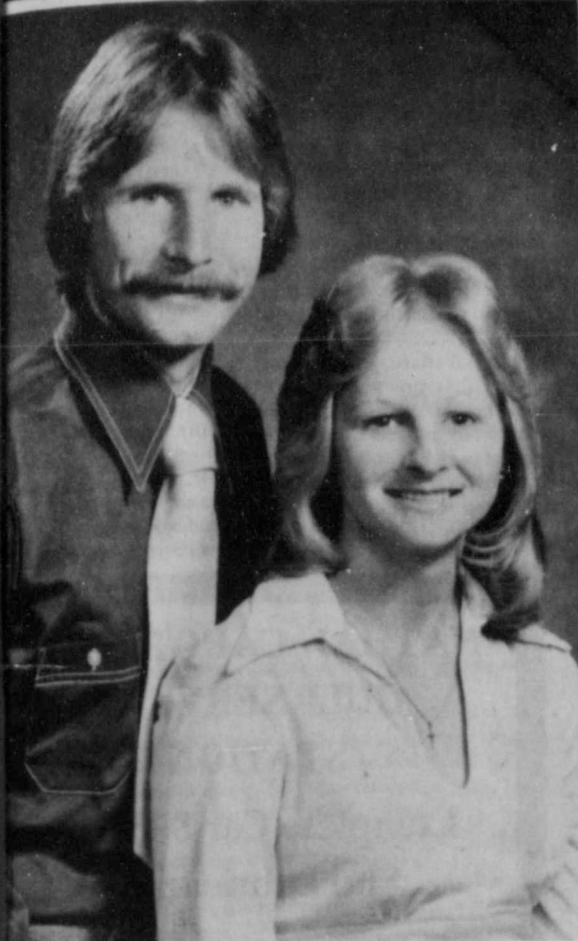

People needing help in Mills County received a total of \$757,745 in care and services—primarily for medically-related assistance—during fiscal year 1976, the State Dept. of Public Welfare says.

In its recently released annual report on welfare expenditures, the Department said the statewide total of joint state-federal programs was \$1,076 billion, with the Federal Government providing about 2/3 of the funding. Federally-financed food stamps and commodities added another \$318 million.

All recipients of welfare assistance must meet stringent guidelines, set by both levels of government, for eligibility.

Over-all, medical payments in Mills County totaled \$698,554, with \$572,459 going to nursing homes and institutions; \$40,563 for prescribed drugs and \$85,532 for all other health care.

Under Medicaid provisions, the "other" health care includes such diverse assistance as physicians' services, eye treatment, eye glasses, hearing aids, dentures and medical screening for children of needy families.

Only a fraction of the total expenditures in Mills County, \$6,466, went to Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the only welfare program in Texas which provides direct cash payments to recipients.

Statewide, AFDC payments averaged \$105.42 per month, per family. Only Tenn., Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina and Miss., all with per capita incomes lower than Texas, have smaller grants.

The disbursement for food stamps in Mills County was \$41,828 and, for commodities, \$10,897. The Federal Govt. pays the full cost of the

food stamp "bonus" (the difference between what the recipient pays and the face value of the stamps), with the Federal Govt. and Texas sharing the cost of administering the program. Surplus commodities are provided to schools and institutions to add nutrition to meals.

The Welfare Department noted that practically all of the assistance payments to the needy in Mills County are spent in the county.

To service the county, the Department maintains offices in Goldthwaite.


