#### FELLOWSHIP—MORE THAN TOGETHERNESS

Often when we think of church fellowship, we think of ice cream socials and church dinners. However, fellowship is much more than these functions. It is more than meeting together, although this is a vital part of Christian fellowship.

Have you ever experienced the feeling of being alone and yet crowds of people were surrounding you? In such a situation there was togetherness but no fellowship. In the truest sense of the word, fellowship involves relationships. God desires us to have fellowship with Him and with one another and He makes possible this fellowship.

Our fellowship with one another must be built upon our fellowship with God. We have a relationship with God only by accepting Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour. Then we must daily pursue a deeper understanding of God to intensify our relationship with Him. Only upon this foundation is one able to build lasting and fruitful relationships with other people.

Christian fellowship involves individuals in a re-

ciproc relationship; that is, each member of the relationship must contribute to that relationship. This is why fellowship with God must be the starting place.

True fellowship among Christians produces genuine joy within the church. Unity of the church comes about as a result of true fellowship and spiritual growth takes place.

Fellowship is more than togetherness—it involves genuine love and concern for each other, made possible only through one's own experience of genuine love and concern in a living relationship with God. It is a biblical concept which must take a significant place in our lives if we are to realize God's fullest potential for us as individuals and as a church.

As these summer months are upon us and vacation time draws near, let us not forsake the fellowship of other Christians. Rather let us seek fellowship wherever we may be and draw strength and enrichment for our own lives from each other.

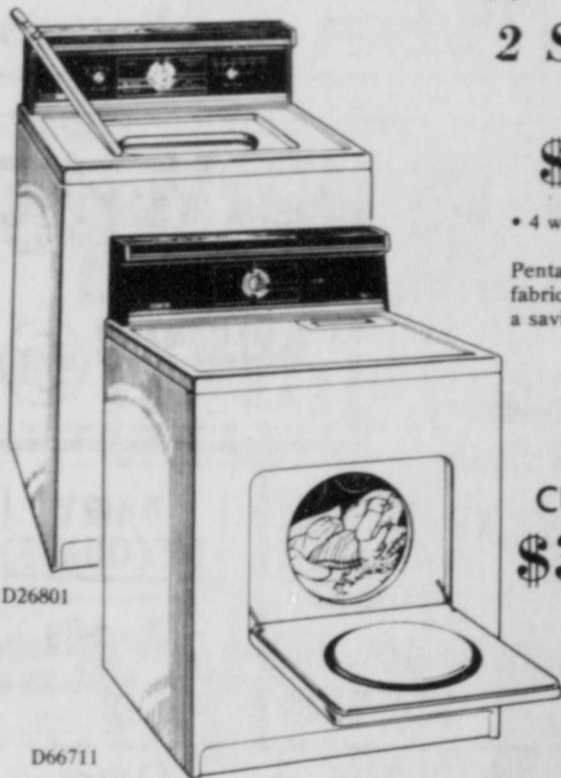

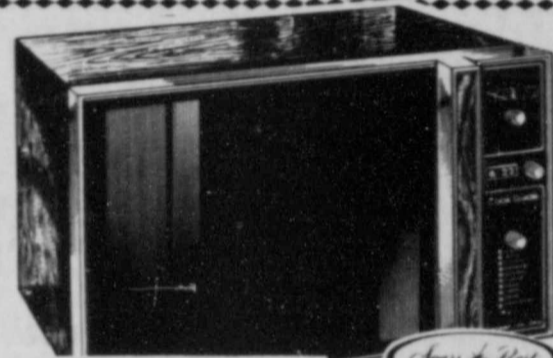

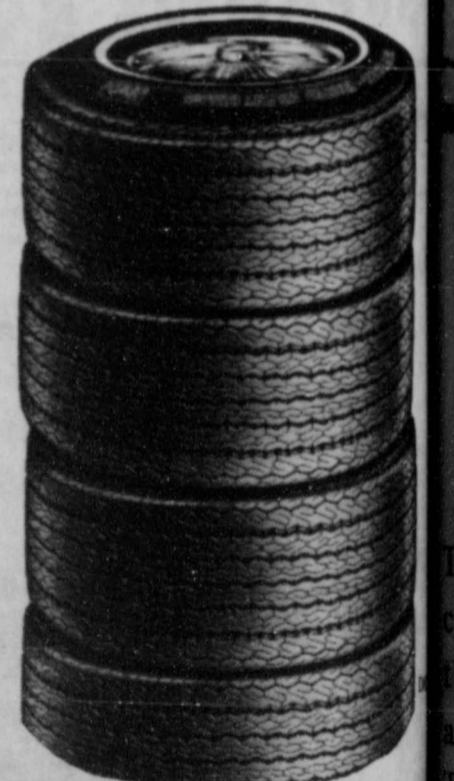

# Recognition Important Aspect Of Texas S & G R Assn.

The greatest recognition received by most of the people involved in the sheep and goat industry comes when an unexpectedly high-priced sale allows them to pay off their current pickup before the engine falls out. Not even the livestock seem to appreciate the man who carries them through a cold, hungry winter on a warm feed sack.

It could be this general lack of recognition that has

prompted the industry to reward the achievements of some of its own members, as well as those who play supporting roles. At any rate, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has for years acknowledged those whose efforts have aided wool and mohair producers.

Particular attention is given to youths, especially those whose club work has demonstrated their interest in sheep or goats.

Youth awards include those for top 4-H wool and mohair judging, state level; top FFA performance related to sheep or goats, state level; superior achievement in 4-H clothing design and construction using wool and mohair, and exceptional sheep and wool, Angora goat and mohair projects, county level.

The state-level FFA award includes \$75 to help finance a trip to the national FFA convention. State-level 4-H winners receive a \$100 savings bond.

A special youth award is the Bryan Hunt Memorial Scholarship, established in 1975 by the family of the late Bryan Hunt, Sonora. It is intended to provide assistance to deserving students majoring in agriculture and from the main sheep and goat areas of Texas who would not be able to attend college without financial aid.

The Hunt Scholarship is presented at the TS&GRA Annual Convention, as are the remaining five major awards. The most coveted presentation made annually by TS&GRA is the Fred Earwood Memorial Award. Created nearly a decade ago through contributions of friends of the late Fred Earwood, the Earwood Award is given annually to a person whose contributions to the industry exemplify

Earwood's own dedication and efforts on behalf of sheep and goat producers.

Remaining annual awards include those for outstanding county agent, outstanding vocational agriculture teacher and outstanding news reporting, weekly and daily papers.

## Cotton Acreage

AUSTIN--Dramatic increases in cotton acreage, a result of strengthened prices, are being reported in some areas across the state, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"Some counties that haven't seen a cotton plant in four or five years are reporting acreage," said Reagan V. Brown, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, explaining that increased prices, plus a weakening grain market have rekindled interest in the crop.

Cotton planting throughout the state is only four per cent completed at this time, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Service, compared to a three-year average of 11 per cent.

The most increase is in the Winter Garden area, Brown said, where growers are expected to plant 30,000 to 40,000 acres this year, compared to only 4,000 acres in 1975 and 12,000 acres last year.

The cotton planting deadline in the Lower Rio Grande Valley has been extended to midnight, April 15, after wet weather deterred planting activity in the area. Producers for the rest of the Valley and most of the Coastal Bend have until April 20 to complete their planting.

Wet fields have also delayed grain sorghum planting in the past few weeks, but producers have been taking advantage of recent fair weather to step up activity. Planting is 43 per cent complete, compared to 45 per cent this time last year and a three-year average of 38 per cent.

## Behind The Energy Fraud

Belmont, Massachusetts — There are only two basic ways to confront a shortage. The first way is to produce more goods, and the second is to accept a reduction in consumption.

Under normal conditions, any shortage will quickly result in a voluntary redirection of effort in order to fill the need. The promise of economic reward is the only stimulus required. That promise is so compelling, in fact, that it will even lead to the creation of substitute products, some of which turn out to be more practical and even more economical than those they replace.

Shortages in a free society are always looked upon as opportunities. As a result, they are always short-lived and relatively inconsequential. But when free men are deprived of the ability to deal with shortages either by producing or by improvising, then shortages worsen and become the rule, not the exception.

### Is Energy Really Scarce?

The United States is supposed to be in the grip of an energy shortage. Yet various experts in the field insist that our nation is sitting on a huge sea of petroleum and natural gas. Thomas P. Medders Jr., president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, told a Senate Committee in 1972 that our recoverable resources "are in the order of 100 years' supply at present rates of U.S. consumption of both oil and gas." A 1972 Senate Interior Committee Report reviewed numerous projections of recoverable oil and concluded that Mr. Medders had significantly underestimated our potential reserves.

Besides oil and natural gas, the U.S. is richly blessed with coal deposits. The most conservative estimate indicates that we have a 400-year supply at present rates of consumption. "We've got coal coming out our ears," says Bureau of Mines chief Dr. Thomas Falkie. And we lead the world in the use of nuclear power and in nuclear technology.

The truth is that the widely publicized shortage is contrived, artificial, and as phony as a nine-dollar bill.

### Government Created the Shortage

What's going on is deadly serious. Government, mostly in the name of over-protecting birds, fish, air, and water, has so impeded the workings of the free enterprise system that a shortage of vital fuels has resulted. Laws, edicts, executive orders, and judicial decrees have restricted domestic drilling, blocked offshore drilling, delayed the Alaska pipeline, mandated wasteful anti-pollution devices on autos, and put a price ceiling on natural gas that has inhibited production. When coal and nuclear substitutes were offered by the free enterprise system, government outlawed much of the use of coal and is now harassing nuclear power producers to an early death.

In any discussion of "the energy crisis" by national leaders, we the people get blamed, not the government. It is we who must cut consumption, and because we won't do so voluntarily, we must be forced to do so with taxes, restrictions, and controls. The government, which created the problem, now insists that a huge increase in its power is the solution.

The free enterprise way to handle a shortage is to produce more goods. The controlled society way, the Communist or Socialist way, is to increase taxes, controls, and restrictions, all of which lead to less production — and to total government.

The next time someone tries to tell you that America's leaders have brought about the energy crisis deliberately in order to make the U.S. a Communist or Socialist state, please listen carefully. Your help is needed to put an end to this sinister scheme.

## 77 Onion Crop 'Crying Shame'

AUSTIN—The 1977 spring onion crop will most likely have everyone in tears — both the consumer and the producer — since this year's harvest will be almost half that of 1976, according to reports from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Cool, wet weather throughout the winter months have slowed crop development and normal cultivation for weed control, and have slashed yields in the Lower Valley, Laredo, and San Antonio Winter Garden

areas. This year's crop, which should go on the market this week, is the smallest since 1966.

A total of five million 50-pound sacks are to be harvested, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, compared to 9.7 million sacks last year. Prices are already reflecting the shortages, with onions selling for \$18 per 50-pound sack and \$14 to \$15 for medium onions.

Marketing experts predict that prices will remain at that level throughout the season, possibly rising even higher.
