

The Way It Was  
In Mills County

Benjamin Franklin

(No. 5 in a series)

We marched directly to the Wichita Mountains, then in Indian Territory—now Oklahoma. We established headquarters and supply camp on Cotton Creek and began scouting for the Northern Comanches from that point.

The Comanches had received word through those reservation Indians that a strong force of Texas Rangers was coming in search of them. So in due time they started their women and children and all the stock property they had in the direction of Pike's Peak.

The entire tribe went north except a sufficient number of warriors whom they left behind with instructions that when the tribe had gotten out of the way to divide into squads from the Red to the Arkansas Rivers. Special instructions were given them to fire the entire line on a certain day and then go pass over the ground and refire all the water courses passing through the territory so as to burn both sides of the Canadian, Washita and other streams across their line.

This we afterward learned through the reservation Indians just as the wild tribe had learned of our coming.) This being in June, and it being very dry at the time, with the wind blowing from the south, they succeeded in completely burning the country that the rangers, being mounted and depending on grass for their mounts and pack animals, made almost a complete failure of this expedition against the Northern Comanches.

We never did find the north and west ends of that fire, though Col. Johnson took 400 men from the different companies and went in search of the west end of it. They were attacked high up on the Canadian some 200 miles from headquarters at night and lost a great many of their horses, leaving a good part of the men afoot. Those who had their horses divided time with those who did not, taking it turn about riding until they got back to headquarters.

Lieut. Gault and I received word of the necessity of our return home, so we were honorably discharged on Cotton Creek, Aug. 11, 1860. Our discharges were headed as follows: "Texas Ranger Headquarters, Near Fort Adams, an Abandoned United States Fort."

It was a dangerous attempt for two men. We were given valuable instructions by the officers and men as to how to travel, also by Plasedo and his old warriors. Plasedo said to us in broken English, "All time ride at night. No much time ride in daytime. In daytime one sleep and one guard. All the time one eye open. Maybe Conanch' no get you."

So we bid all the boys and the Tonkawas good-bye and started. The boys said to us, "We never expect to see you again." We traveled all that day and a good part of the night. After that we traveled at night only, unless absence of water on the way forced us to go on until we came to water.

The third night out, not more than twenty miles from Red River, the Texas line, at about midnight, we saw some lights kindled up to the west. They continued to kindle up until we could count thirty-two dim lights. The dimness of the lights was due to the fact that nothing except buffalo chips was available for fuel.

lights just west of us. We turned around to the east, leaving the herd to the west until we got past them. We did not see any Indians or herders. We traveled on some twelve or fourteen miles and went down off a tableland into a broad prairie.

We halted at the foot of this tableland to sleep until morning. Our rule was not to unsaddle our horses until the last thing was done. We had two horses apiece, riding one and leading one for a pack horse. When we had unpacked and had staked our horses (we carried stake pins), before we had unsaddled the ones we were riding, they began looking back in the direction we were riding from and showing signs of fright.

We had halters prepared to keep them from making any noise when in danger. We at once applied our smoother halters and stopped them from making any noise.

His ministry covered an area of 126 miles long and 60 miles wide, which included 7 congregations: Eden, Brownwood, Menard, Brady, Ballinger, San Angelo and Eola. He traveled on dirt roads and

byways of over 2,000 miles a month. He assisted in the organization of Grace Church in Brownwood.

This mission pastor was destined to ascend to the presidency of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod. He served as president from 1962-1969.

In July, the First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite will furnish an evangelistic speaker. In August, the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite will host the event.

Mr. Denton concluded his visit by expressing his appreciation to all those involved in providing Mills County with such an impressive building for its Senior Citizens.

Wood, Meeker Speakers For Baptist Summer Revival

Dr. Presnell H. Wood and Danny Meeker are returning to First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, for their summer

Revival, June 26 - 29. Dr. Wood, former pastor of the Goldthwaite church, from 1956-1961, is presently Editor - Elect of the Baptist Standard, the Texas Baptist paper. Dr. Wood came to the Baptist Standard offices following a nine-year pastorate at Park Place Baptist Church, in Houston.

Between his pastorates at Goldthwaite and Houston, Dr. Wood has pastored Crestview Baptist Church in Midland, from 1961-1968.

Presnell Wood has served the Baptist denomination well, both in Texas and the national convention. He has served as a member of the Board of Trustees of Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene; a member of the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; and President of Texas Alumni Association of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He is presently serving as Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Standard and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. He is also author of "Prophets With Pens", a history of the Baptist Standard.

Dr. Wood will be preaching twice daily during the revival.

The Meekers presented a musical concert at First Baptist Church, in Goldthwaite, in 1973. The Way It Was . . . A Bit Of History On San Saba Peak

One Sunday afternoon a group of teenagers from Scallorn and Rye Valley were climbing the Peak for an outing. Dutch Smith and Mack Horton decided to take the easy way up and rode a mule to the top. All went well with the young men and the mule until they reached the rim-rock edge—there the mule wheeled, downed his head and sent them sprawling to the ground below. Nothing was injured but the boy's pride; however, the young spectators enjoyed a funny show.

Once, in the long, long ago, early settlers of the area remembered the story of a fire that swept across San Saba Peak at night. Tall grasses grew over its sides and on its top; when the flames went over the crest of the Peak, the sight was spectacular against the dark sky and it could be seen for miles.

This very special old mountain called "San Saba Peak" was also a popular place for early-day Easter Sunrise Services. Rev. Billy Green Shaw, a pioneer Baptist Minister, related that he held many revival services at its base; on the last

Sunday of many of these services, the congregation climbed to the top, lunch basket in hand, to enjoy the day and scenic view as the worshipped God.

The thrill will never be forgotten for all those who climbed San Saba Peak first beheld the beautiful view below and for miles beyond. This ancient hilltop, 7 million years old, is still there for all to see and wonder about the history—was so much a part of—was a lookout tower to the Indians, a compass to the lost, and a landmark to many—today it is a guide hunters by night and a boon to our wildlife.

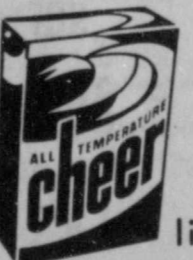

Timing of commercial pesticide applicators planned at Waco

Commercial and noncommercial applicators interested in training programs for the categories field crop pest control, fruit and vegetable pest control, and weed and brush control will have an opportunity to participate in a training workshop scheduled for July 6 and 7, 1977, at the Lecture Hall of McLennan Community College, Waco.

The initial session of the workshop will include subject matter applicable to all basic categories of commercial and noncommercial applicators, ports county Extension agent, Danny Long. Training sessions that follow will deal with category specific subject matter. ## Extension Highlights

Remove mildew from clothing immediately — and better yet, prevent it — as it can stain clothing permanently without proper attention.

Remember, mildew grows in damp, warm, dark, and poorly ventilated places.

It often leaves a musty odor and can eat holes in fabric if left too long. Fabrics most susceptible to mildew are the natural fibers — cotton, wool, linen and silk, and cellulosic man-made, including rayon acetate and triacetate.

To prevent mildew stains remember the following:

- Make sure laundered clothing is completely dry before storing in closets or drawers.
- Never store soiled clothing.
- Be sure to dry clothing that is wet or soiled before putting in a hamper.
- If possible, store clothing in a well-ventilated closet, or leave the door open periodically to prevent moisture buildup in closed areas.
- Dampen clothing for ironing only as you are ready to iron; for example, using a spray pump bottle.
- When storing clothing use a mildew inhibitor, such as paradichlorobenzene or paraformaldehyde, in the drawer or closet. These may be obtained at your local food markets or drug stores. Read instructions before using.

To remove mildew stains, follow these steps:

- Remove the stain as soon as it is discovered.
- Moisten stain with a mixture of lemon juice and salt, if the garment is washable. If not, moisten with detergent and water. Rinse and allow to dry in the

sun.

• If stain still remains, use a mixture of two tablespoons peroxide bleach and one pint hot water if fabric can take it; if not, use lukewarm water, for thirty minutes.

• As a last resort, use a solution of two tablespoons chlorine bleach in one quart water for fifteen minutes. Never use chlorine bleach on silk, wool or spandex.

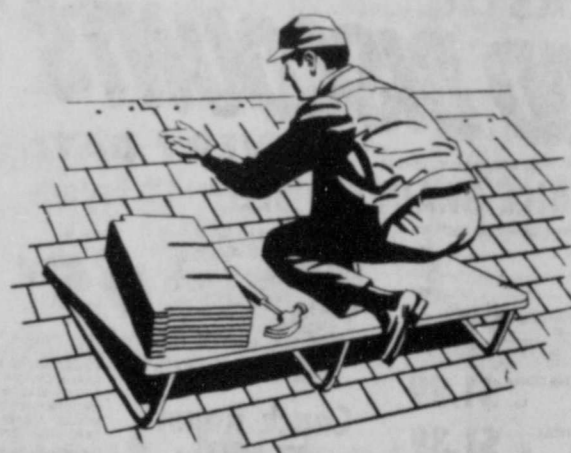
