Confederate Reunions July 4

With the 4th of July so near, the old Confederate reunions held in Mills County long ago are remembered with nostalgia by all who attended. A vivid description of the Reunion held at Williams Ranch in 1898 has already been printed, but many Reunions followed, each was a little different to the other.

In 1901, a Confederate Reunion was held in Center City, a thriving town in the eastern section of the county. People came to this gala event from far and near in wagons, buggys and on horseback to honor the old veterans of the Civil War.

Many members of the Jeff Davis Camp No. 117, of Goldthwaite, were there, as well as veterans from surrounding counties. They arrived early—wagon load after wagon load of people came off the hill to the west, arriving from Goldthwaite and communities beyond.

They came from all directions and gathered under the old liveoak tree that stands in the center of the square. Plans for the day included a brass band from Goldthwaite, several speakers to deliver orations; old soldiers were to be recognized and at noon the entire group planned to form a parade, led by the Confederate Veterans, with flags flying high and march up the hill to the north to a brush arbor by the combination edge, church and school building, built especially for the occasion.

No plans were made for lunch, so everyone brought their own. After the noon meal, speeches were made, followed by a play that the entire crowd looked forward to. It was entitled "Uncle Tom's Cabin", and a stage had been especially built under the arbor for the performance.

The play cast rehearsed for weeks and had it perfected. Remembered names of those in the play were Florence Langford, Alta Hamilton, Marjorie Graves, Josie House and Florence Welch, from Center City - Willie Hawkins, also from Center City, played the part of the owner of Uncle Tom, a slave; Garrett Townsend of Star as cast as Uncle Tom. Alma and Leatrice Trent were members of the cast; other young men and women of Goldthwaite had roles in the play, but their names were unavailable.

Shortly after the opening ceremony and the welcome, the sky darkened and a black cloud formed in the south-west. As the morning wore on and more and more people arrived, the rains came and fell in sheets. An electrical storm that followed was terrifying, and all present had to take cover.

The Masonic Lodge Hall was so full of people there as standing room only; children cried for lack of a place to sit. All available benches had been carried earlier to the brush arbor for the convenience of the play audience.

The Carter Hotel, as well as all other buildings on the square, were as crowded as the Lodge building. Rain fell for three hours; finally, just before 3 p.m. the torrential downpour stopped.

Members of the play cast ventured onto the stage under the wet and dripping arbor, but to no avail, because the 1901 Confederate Reunion was called a failure.

(This account was given by Mrs. Lottie Carter Langford; she was there and remembers that her family lunch on the way home in their covered wagon.)

Another Confederate Reunion took place in Goldthwaite in 1905; all Reunions

were held in Goldthwaite after the Center City failure.

Mrs. Flora Gatlin Bowles vividly described the 1905 reunion in her book entitled "A No Man's Land Becomes a County", and I will quote part of the narrative.

"The annual Reunion of the United Confederate veterans held July 4, 1905, was the greatest meeting and had the largest crowd of any meeting ever known in Mills County. Veterans from all the central counties attended, and thousands of visitors augmented the crowd, reinforced by the well organized Jeff Davis Camp No. 117 of Goldthwaite. The meeting continued for three days. The Confederate Reunion Camp Ground and Auditorium was located east of the railroad tracks on the old Lampassas highway.

On Sunday night before the opening of the reunion, Rev. D.I. Harralson, Chaplain, dedicated the spacious auditorium at the camp ground. He delivered an eloquent address from the text, "Am I My Brother's Keeper?" Rev. Harralson was a minister of great popularity.

On Monday, all day, covered wagons of people from a distance arrived and went into camp. At 4 P.M., Cong. Col. James Slaydon spoke; during the oration a cloud came up; a terrific dust storm ensued cooling the humid atmosphere.

Monday night the welcome address was made by Attorney R.L.H. Williams, of Goldthwaite. Tuesday was the glorious 4th of July, early trains brought in a great many visitors; fully a coach load came in from Mullin. By 10 o'clock the members of the Jeff Davis Camp and sons of the veterans had assembled on the Goldthwaite square for the march to the camp grounds; a few of the veterans wore old Confederate uniforms and were escorted by a brass band from Brownwood.

When the band played "Dixie", the Rebel yell sounded and many of the old veterans threw their hats enthusiastically in the air; some gave out in the march, but friends placed them in conveyances which accompanied the marchers.

An enlarged picture of Jeff Davis, the President of the Southern Confederacy, was borne in a large frame at the front of the marchers and around it was draped the Confederate flag; also the United States flag and a large Confederate flag were wafted on high, side by side in the southern breezes, in the line of march. For some of the veterans this would be their last march to the tune of "Dixie".

The speaker of the day was John J. Cox of Temple. He held the audience spellbound; Mr. Cox had made many speeches before juries and on other occasions in Mills County, but never had he completely captivated the crowd as he did on this occasion.

At 2 p.m., Rev. J.T. Farris, pastor of the Methodist Church in Goldthwaite, spoke and at the close of the service, it was announced that Dick Perkins, an ex-slave and a citizen of Brownwood would talk. The crowd was agape, as the sight of a Negro was unusual to some of the people of Mills County and doubtless a few had never seen a Negro. He came because of an earnest invitation by some of the veterans of the Civil War.

The program for Tuesday night was under the auspices of the sons and daughters of the Confederacy and R.H.H. Taylor, Master of Ceremonies and Commander of the Camp. Singers of Goldthwaite and a string band rendered pleasing music that Friday night for possession

Screwworm Cases Mark Best June In Texas History

The screwworm outbreak in Texas as July began has been equalled only one other time (1971) in history, says Dr. James E. Novy, assistant veterinarian in charge of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program.

As June ended, Texas had gone one full week without lab identification of a screwworm sample. The last known case, from Val Verde County, was identified June 23. That reached the lab after 13 screwworm free days.

Only eight Texas screwworm cases were recorded during June... best record

ever for the month. They brought the year's total to 30, compared to 2,306 in June of last year and a total of 4,274 by June 30.

A new tool has been added to the "Mission 77": Stamp out Screwworms" campaign with installation of a toll free 1-800-292-5816 telephone line. This will make it easier for producers to call program headquarters about incoming samples, and to discuss eradication procedures, says Novy.

Two of the 4-man "task forces" appointed to search for a suspected leak of fertile flies from the Animal and

Plant Health Inspection Service insectary did find, and close, several places where fertile flies were escaping.

"These holes can be attributed, primarily, to age of the facility," says Novy. "The fact no more screwworm cases have been found near the insectary is good proof the problem is solved," he commented.

Jail Handles Five Persons Over July 4

Five persons were placed in the Mills County jail over the long July Fourth weekend, by the Mills County Sheriff's Department.

Four of those jailed were charged with driving while intoxicated and another for disorderly conduct, according to Sheriff H.G. Brooks.

Two men were arrested Friday night for possession

of marijuana; however, they were not jailed as they posted a cash bond and were released to return Tuesday to appear before the Mills County Justice of the Peace. The pair were stopped on a routine traffic violation by local highway patrolmen, and the marijuana was seen in a plastic bag between the seats of the car.

District 8 4-H Horse Show Scheduled For Goldthwaite

The 1977 District 8, 4-H Horse Show will be held in Mills County.

The show will begin at 6:00 P.M., July 8, 1977, and will conclude on the evening of July 9th.

This is an annual event involving 18 counties. The public is invited to attend. The show will be held in the T.A. Head Arena, north of the Elementary school in Goldthwaite.

Free Immunization Clinic Set At Senior Center July 28th

Immunizations that give protection for measles, polio, lockjaw, whooping cough, diphtheria and German measles will be given FREE at the Senior Citizens Center, at Highway 84 and Old Priddy Road on Thursday, July 28, 1977, between 1:30 and 3:00 P.M.

Children who were immunized against measles before their first birthday have only limited protection unless they receive a booster vaccination.

Adults also need booster vaccinations against diphtheria and tetanus every ten years throughout their lives, since these diseases can be

as devastating to an adult as to a child. Tetanus, or "lock-jaw", is frequently fatal.

Make certain that your immunizations and child's immunizations are up - to - date by attending the public health clinic or contacting your private physician. Please bring a record of past immunizations if you attend the public clinic.

There will also be a free diabetic and blood pressure screening at this clinic for persons of all ages.

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Independent Cattlemen's Group Attend School Finance Hearings

Members of the Independent Cattlemen's Association will be in Austin July 7 and 8 to attend public hearings at the State Capitol on the public school finance bill.

T.A. Cunningham, president of the association, stressed to the members this week that any citizen who is tired of escalating property taxes should attend these hearings.

During the special session, which begins July 11, legislators will pass a compromise public school finance bill. House members during the regular session included property tax relief in their version of the bill. But the Senate version called for higher taxes. The conference committee compromise provided for agricultural use values based on figures from the Governor's office. Ag use values must be maintained in public school financing.

Cunningham said that any Independent Cattlemen's Association member who wishes to testify can do so. "Elected state officials must be told the problems of agricultural landowners," Cunningham noted.

The hearings will begin at 9:30 a.m. July 7 and will be held on the floor of the House of Representatives chamber.

Beef Referendum Chairman Informs Cattlemen

MASON—The Texas Research and Information Committee on the Beef Referendum chairman, David Kothmann, this week urged 275,000 registered voters in the upcoming Beef Referendum to be aware of all the provisions within the Act and Beef Order before they cast their votes from July 5th thru 15th. He stated that only a reported 11% of cattle producers had registered to vote throughout the nation, and their vote will determine whether the other 89% of the cattlemen will be subject to the mandatory check-off assessment and the enforcement thereof, or not.

Mr. Kothmann said that the full extent of the enforcement provisions of the original Beef Act have been omitted in the publicity given to the Beef Referendum, and therefore the cattle and beef producers are unaware of the Federal government's role in the issuance of rules, regulations, orders, and penalties involving violators or suspected violators. According to Sec. 18 of the Beef Act, all producers or slaughterers are subject to investigation by the Secretary of Agriculture if he determines whether any of them have engaged or are about to engage in any acts or practice which constitute or will constitute a violation of any provision of the Act, or of any order, rule or regulation issued under the Act.

The purpose of the Texas Research and Information Committee on the Beef Referendum is to expose the enforcement provisions to the cattle and beef producers to provide them with a full knowledge of what is being voted on in the Beef Referendum. It is said that the voters will be voting only on the Beef Order, but with their vote on the Order, cattlemen will either accept or reject the Federal enforcement provisions in the original Act passed by Congress, and any future rules and regulations put forth by the Secretary of Agriculture that he feels is necessary to carry out the provisions of the original Act.

Mr. Kothmann said that the promotion of the Beef Referendum without the full explanation of the Federal enforcement and investigatory powers above it has been extremely unfair to the cattle and beef producers. The Committee has found through discussions with producers across the country, that since the Beef Order does not explain the enforcement and investigatory authority of the Secretary of Agriculture and the Justice Department through the Federal courts, that very few cattlemen are aware that it exists. Some have been promoting it with the idea that "it is not a government program" because they did not know the facts.

"The Texas Research and Information Committee on the Beef Referendum," says Mr. Kothmann, "is dedicated to telling all cattlemen what the law says, and does not pretend to opine. The facts are in the law." He further stated, "The Committee is not against the promotion, research and market development of cattle and beef, but it should be a free, voluntary program, not controlled, regulated or enforced by the Federal government and the Secretary of Agriculture."

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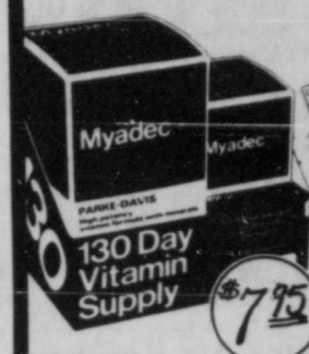
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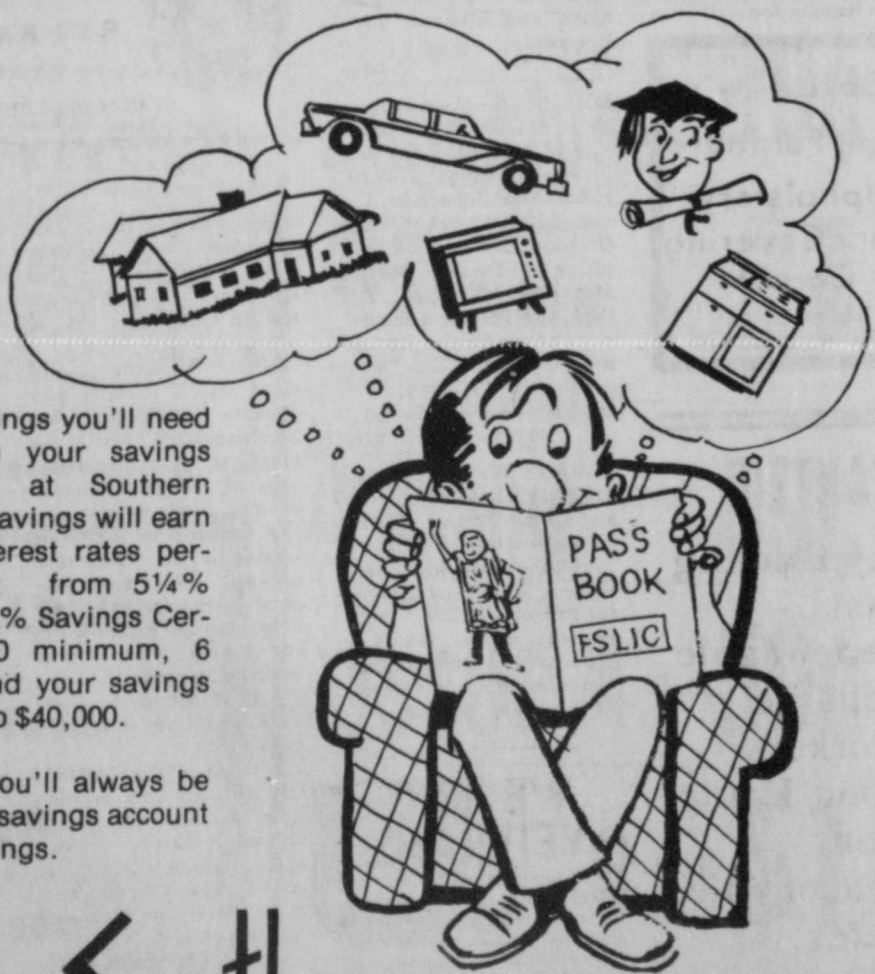

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HS Class of 1937 Holds 40th Reunion

The 40th anniversary of the Goldthwaite High School graduating class of 1937 was celebrated Saturday, June 4, by approximately 75 class members and guests at the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Berry at Lake Merritt.

Special guests were Mrs. Palmer, Mrs. Delton Barnett, Miss Love Gatlin and Mrs. Helen Saylor, who had taught most of the alumni at some time during their primary or secondary school careers.

Miss Palmer, who served as principal of the Goldthwaite Elementary School, said she had taught the class for 25 years. "I don't know whether to stress you in Latin or in Spanish," was Mrs. Barnett's comment, as she had taught one or the other of the languages to nearly everyone in the class. Mrs. Barnett taught in the Goldthwaite schools for 25 years. One of the highlights on her teaching thoroughness was the ability of Doyle Horton to quote the remarks, in Spanish, with which Mrs. Barnett ended the class period daily years ago.

The graduating class of 1937 was represented by Mrs. Saylor, its only surviving member, who told the group that she taught 31 years in Mills County and 30 in Goldthwaite. She said she had 11 descendants now in the teaching profession.

The 1937 class had 42 members, of whom four are deceased. Twenty were present at the reunion and the whereabouts of the others, except for one, are known. Responses to the invitation, except the one, Al Carter of Kountz and Mrs. Carter traveled the farthest to the reunion. Herman Reynolds took the prize as the oldest member of the class and Hazel Eakin Colvin the youngest.

Recognition was given to Wayne Doggett, who was killed in World War II, while serving as a member of the Military Unit 379 Inf. 95th Air Co. A. on November 18, 1944, in Metz, France. A tribute was paid to A.H. Smith, who was superintendent of Schools at Goldthwaite in 1937.

The class was graduated in an immediate post-recession period when times were difficult in the economic sense, and every

member of the class has achieved a notable degree of success and functioned during this 40-year period as a productive, useful member of society. None has become a public charge. All have educated their children, mostly at colleges, and these children are now active, contributing members of society. In short, the class members are among the strongest representative of the American way which forms the backbone of America in both war and peace.

It was decided to have another reunion next year, with an effort to get all the members of the class to attend. Long range plans include the celebration of the 45th anniversary in 1982. Host for the 1978 gathering will again be the Troy Berries at Lake Merritt.

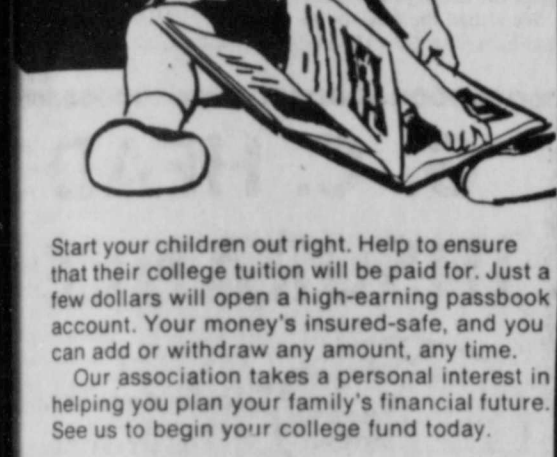

J. D. Harper spoke in favor of the proposed sale.

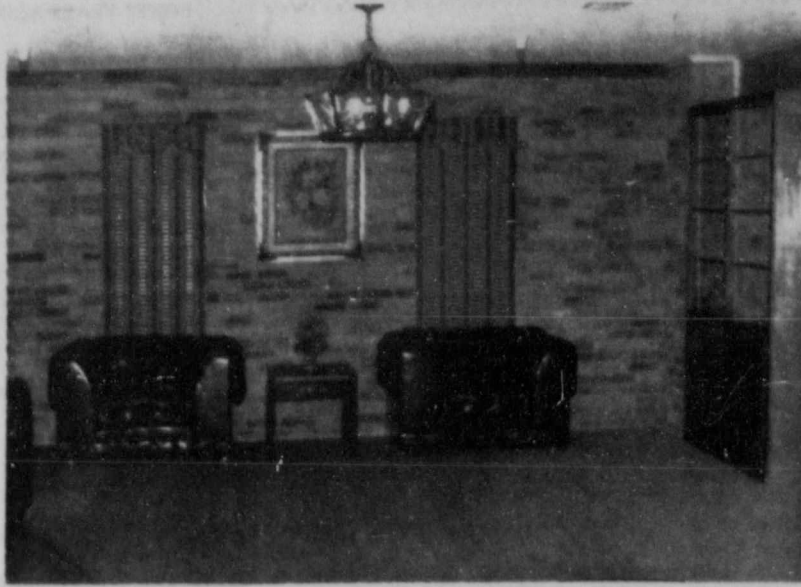
Motion was made and seconded that members be assessed \$135 each to pay off the land. Motion carried and it was agreed to make the
