These levers were about  
seven inches long, about  
one-half inch in circum-

on the ends for about an

Model T drivers had to  
maneuver the steering  
wheel, the two levers, the  
horn and the emergency  
brake with just two hands, so  
all fingers were sometimes  
used.

To start a Model T and set  
it in motion, a driver first  
turned on the ignition, then  
set the two levers, the spark  
and the gas, just right. Then  
the brake was set and he  
went to the front of the car to  
spin the hand crank, and  
hopefully the engine would  
start.

were necessary at adjusting the gas and the spark before the motor fired and started. If it failed to start at all, the driver often jacked up a rear wheel which made starting easier. Adjusting the gas and spark correctly was most important. If the car was given too much spark, the T could turn vicious, backfire, reverse the motion of the crank and break an arm. This was an instantaneous thing, and many arms were broken before the cranker could jerk his arm away.

When the motor started, the driver stepped on the running board, bolted over the sham door (doors on the driver's side of the T did not open), and attained his seat under the steering wheel. The gear was put in low position, the gas lever pulled down and the brake released, the T was off with a sudden lurch.

After the car gained sufficient speed to keep the motor running, the gear was put in high then the Model T gave another lurch and was off and running.

In the days of the Model T Ford, people never heard of whiplash, but I wouldn't be surprised if some of those that were around in the 1920s and are complaining of arthritis in the neck, aren't actually suffering from a long delayed whiplash due to the sudden jerks of the Model T.

There was no battery on a T and the lights ran on magnets and if one drove too slowly, the lights dimmed and speed had to be picked up to brighten them.

Drivers of Model Ts carried with them, without fail, a tool box—among the contents of this box could be found a jack, a hand pump (if one wanted the best he bought a "Golden Rod" pump), some bailing wire, pliers for tinkering with the spark plugs, a long steel lever for prying off flat tires, plenty of patches for the innertubes and certainly a good supply of boots for the tires. All these items were necessary because a Model T seldom went many miles without a flat tire.

Tires weren't quite as big as a man's arm; they carried 60 lbs. pressure and the entire wheel was a permanent fixture with wooden spokes. When there were flats, and there were many, the tire was prized off the rim, the innertube removed and the puncture fixed with a patch that was glued on after the rubber had been roughed up with a rasp around the puncture. Of course, it paid to carry an extra innertube or two in case of a blowout.

Never has one small inconvenience aroused a good man's temper so violently as flats on a dusty hot day, a freezing cold day, or in the middle of the night when almost all the fixing had to be in darkness. I have known good, even-tempered men to become so upset when they had flats that they threw tire tools as far as they could send them - then walked to gather them up and continue with the fixing.

A great worry with Model T owners was the danger of the radius rod dropping down. If that rod happened to come loose and drop, the driver was helpless as to what happened next - all he could do was slam on the brakes and hope. Another danger that plagued drivers was the possibility of the steering wheel coming off. If a driver put the brake on hard and at the same time pulled hard on the steering wheel, he occasionally found himself steering thin air - again he had no choice but to slam on the brake and hope.

Young men of the T days had a saying they used when they found a long, smooth spot on the dirt roads. It went something like this—"Ear'er down boys, and let'er go", and with that remark the driver pulled both levers down as far as they would go and the old T did its best, sometimes reaching the phenomenal speed of 20 or 30 MPH if they were going down hill.

Many strong, young women learned to drive the Model T; however, basically they were a man's car, but ladies learned to drive them, too. It wasn't uncommon to see a young woman control the steering wheel with a left elbow or forearm - leaving the right hand free to work the levers, hold the baby on the front seat, or slap at the kids in the back seat. It was difficult for the deepest chug-hole or sandbank to jerk the steering wheel from those young women's grip.

Many farm girls picked cotton or hoed corn all day - came home, cleaned up a bit, powdered their nose and went for an evening drive in the boyfriend's Model T.

When Henry Ford had the brilliant idea of building a Model T automobile, the world was beginning to recover from the horrors of World War I, prices were soaring and so was Mr. Ford's fabulous car of the 1920's. It revolutionized the industry - they will always be remembered as the car of all cars. (All rights reserved)
