

The "Boom" Of The Twenties

"The Bubble Burst"

October 24, 1929, will always be remembered as the day the bull market died. It was on a Thursday and the market on Wall Street opened with a feeling of gloom. It didn't really happen in a single day. The structure of the market had been shaky for months. At times cracks formed in its financial structure, but each time the market appeared close to the danger point the cracks filled and there was a rebound postponing the imminent crash.

Most investors failed to recognize the danger signals until one day, late in October, 1929, the crack once again opened and the bubble burst; the whole crazy structure of the stock market came tumbling down.

It took a dozen years - a great depression and the eve of a war before the economy was back to normal.

When the big bull market ended, billions of dollars were lost in paper profits. Little investors - the barbers, grocers, the clerks, tailors, school teachers and many others who played the stock market with every penny they could scrape together, saw their dreams vanish. Rich men, banks and investment companies lost huge sums - paper profits on Wall Street turned into monstrous losses almost overnight.

In cities and towns across the nation people who were affluent and financially well fixed suddenly dropped into debt. A few sent themselves hurtling through high windows to their deaths on the street below rather than see the future.

The terrible crash on Wall Street triggered chain reactions that rocked a happy and prosperously nation. Just the year before President Herbert Hoover said, "In no nation are the fruits of our accomplishments more secure - I have never feared for the future of our country."

What would soon be known as "Black Thursday" was not felt in Mills County the day after it happened. The succession of tumbling calamities gradually led their way into every county, every city, every town and individual everywhere. The Wall Street crash of 1929 was to be intensely and endured by all.

To this day, the mention of Black Thursday makes people shudder with memories that followed.

There had been considerable selling on Wall Street several days before Black Thursday, Oct. 24, 1929, and prices had tumbled sharply. The margins had gone. This meant that the price of stocks had fallen so low they no longer offered recent collateral for loans had been made to purchase them. If owners of stocks did not raise more money the stocks would be taken from them by the banks and brokers to protect loans.

Many speculators, by Monday, were not able to get more cash. Most brokers wanted to sell and few were willing to buy, so prices continued lower and lower as the day wore on.

The year struck the big speculators and little ones alike, said the New York Times.

Usually, before the day had passed, brokers had thrown their stocks into the pit for whatever they would bring; the tapes fell hours before. At the close a few showed slight recovery, but the more speculative issues, most often had fallen 25 to 30 percent.

Friday and Saturday, Oct. 25 and 26, trading was

heavy on Wall Street, but stocks stayed steady; when the market opened on Monday, stocks again dropped and on Tuesday the bottom fell out. Allied Chemical fell 35 points, American Can fell to 16, AT&T was down 28 points and so on through the list. It is estimated that a billion dollars in paper values vanished on the New York Exchange in a week.

Financiers still spoke of a coming upswing and a few brokerage houses urged people to buy on the big sell off. Many moneyed men had pooled their funds on Thursday to try to close the widening crack, but all was lost by Tuesday and their support was no longer in evidence. The bankers and the rich were thinking of nothing but saving themselves. Many institutions faced ruin.

No following day on Wall Street was as bad as Black Thursday and Terrifying Tuesday, but prices steadily fell. By Mid-November, the total paper loss was over 20 billion dollars.

"Depression" is a terrifying word - it is a word spoken with fear and dread; but nobody in Mills County expected a depression to follow the Wall Street crash; and if there was one they did not believe it would touch their lives to a great degree. But as the months wore on what would later be known as "The Great Depression" gradually intensified and settled slowly among them.

West Texas Blood Services is a non-profit organization that is affiliated with national blood organizations and along with supplying the blood needs for Mills County resident directly, can supply blood indirectly to anyone in the United States. Dan Connally, chairman of

EAGLE TO BE EXEMPT FROM STATE SALES TAX

Many Texas Newspapers, including the Goldthwaite Eagle, will be exempt from State Sales Tax effective August 29, according to the State Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The new law H.B. 694 reads effective August 29, 1977: "Sale of newspapers, whether sold or distributed by individual copy, are now exempt from the Sales Tax." The bill defines the exempt newspapers as "a publication printed on newsprint whose average sales price per copy over a 30-day period does not exceed seventy-five cents and which is printed and distributed periodically at daily, weekly or other short intervals for the dissemination of news of a general character and of a general interest."

The Eagle will not be taxed on either single copy sales or annual subscriptions, effective with the issue of Thursday, September 1, 1977.

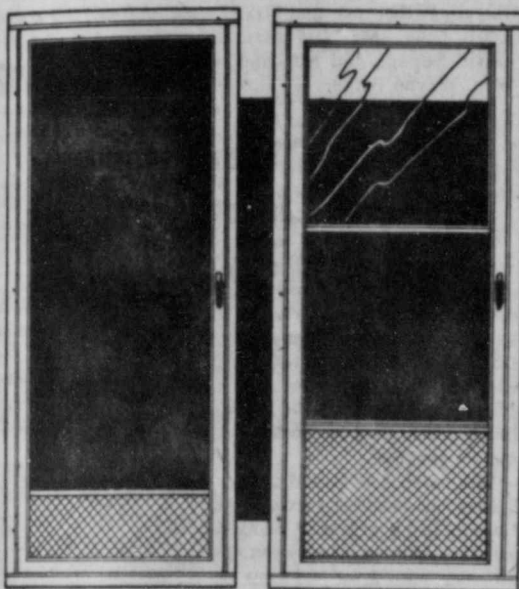
