

Mama's Flowers

Where bolls of cotton covered fields like snowflakes; a low blue mountain range could be seen in the far distance, sometimes jutting into the blue October sky; where cottonwood trees had turned gold along the creeks and there was a sense of distance, space and time going on forever—that was the farm.

Where Scissortails darted around dirt stock-tanks; a little white church stood beside a dusty road; Sparrows lined the edges of barn roofs, played in trees and hunted desperately under feed troughs for food; where slatted wagons waited in line at the cotton gin and cool October winds kept the colored post-oaks leaves casually moving about—that was the farm.

Since early spring Mama had battled the elements for her flowers - the zinnias, four-o'clocks and old maids; in the spring she battled the storms, in the summer it was the droughts and heat, and when fall came she dreaded the frost.

Early in the year, when the first sign of spring settled in for sure, Mama went to the feed store one Saturday afternoon and replenished her supply of flower seed. She had saved seeds from dying zinnias the year before and two packets of seeds waited in the kitchen cabinet drawer; the Raleigh man had given them to her last January when she brought cough syrup. On a warm spring day, when everything was just right, Mama went into the yard to start the long summer battle of making the flowers grow.

Each flower bed, most of them round in shape, was carefully encircled with small rocks to ensure saving every drop of precious water carried in buckets from the well. When Mama's flowers came up and bloomed the yard resembled a patchwork flower-garden quilt pieced together with brown domestic.

The hardpacked brown dirt in the yard was swept daily with a broom until it glistened in the noontime sun. The closest Mama ever came to being her complete self was when she watered her flowers. It was then that she seemed to turn her back on her duties - the baskets of peaches waiting on the back porch to be peeled and preserved; the two tow sacks of masting ears Papa would bring in tomorrow from the field to be shucked, silked and canned; the stack of dampened clothes waiting in the wicker basket to be ironed.

She always watered in the late afternoon and I can see her yet - a medium height, full-bodied woman, in her flour sack apron with her bare feet in worn canvas shoes, her split-bonnet still on her head even tho' the sun was almost down - her back to the rest of the world as she carried bucket after bucket of water and lovingly watered her flowers. She bent slightly forward as she picked and pulled at spent blossoms and dying leaves. This was her one hour of privacy and reflection as she watched the little rivulets of water soak into the thirsty ground

around the flower roots.

In the back yard the trumpet vines grew in profusion around the water-tank tower and the trickles of water that ran over the top of the tank kept a cool damp place for Spot, the yard dog, to take his noontime nap.

Just after noon was the time for resting in the hot summer months on the farm - then the daily chores were once again resumed. Papa wouldn't dream of being caught napping in the middle of the day, so he pulled his favorite old rocker up in front of the open window, pulled off his high-topped work shoes, propped his stockinged feet on the window sill to catch the south breeze, and was soon fast asleep.

If a stranger had driven up to our front door on the farm just after the noontime meal, he might have thought no one was home. There were long lengths of time when life seemed to stop and nothing moved anywhere. The only thing that looked alive were Mama's zinnias and old maids growing side by side, straight and still, as if they were soldiers standing at attention.

But if one had looked closely he would have seen the dirt-dauber working at a frenzied pace under the eave of the porch with his little ball of mud adding another room to his house. The honey ants could have been seen marching in rows, one after the other, down the sidewalk, up the steps and onto the porch floor - then into the bedroom window. They resembled pioneers going west tackling every porch-floor crack and crevice as if they were crossing the Snake River of the Rocky Mountains. There seemed to be no end to them.

Aunt Mae came to visit us once and became so exasperated with the honey ants that she tried to stop them by smashing them, one by one, as they came through the kitchen window. She worked for more than an hour, yet they continued to come. Aunt Mae had a different name for these little creatures, but we children were only allowed to call them honey ants.

They often invaded the dining room table, the kitchen cabinet or the pie-safe and Mama had to set the legs of all the kitchen furniture in cans of water to keep the ants out of the food.

The flower season came to an end when Mama's garden suffered frostbite, so she gathered her little packet of seeds once more and stored them away until still another summer; then the yard would be bright with her flowers and her daily private hour of humming, thinking and watering would be waiting for her.

Blood Bank Critically Low Bloodmobile Schedules Visit Here On November 23rd

The supply of reserve blood for the people in this area has reached a serious level, according to Dan Connally, chairman of the Mills County Blood Replacement Program. So far this year, the people in our county have used 220 units of blood while replacing only 32 units.

Connally states that this condition is of great concern in that the possibility exists of someone needing blood and it just not being available. Blood Banks throughout the entire nation, as well as ours are working very hard to stay on a voluntary basis. The blood bank program is an ideal system with several areas pooling their supply and drawing from it as the need arises.

Everyone between 18 and 65 (17 with parents consent) years of age and in good health can donate. It takes about 20 minutes and is one way to get a quick and free

checkup for your blood, blood pressure and temperature. This is a gift to your

self and you can not give any other way. The time and place for the blood drive will

be at the Youth Center from 12 noon till 6 p.m. on Wednesday, November 23.

Immunizations To Be Given At Senior Citizens Center Nov. 21st

Immunizations that give protection for measles, polio, lockjaw, whooping cough, diphtheria and German measles will be given free at the Senior Citizens Center, Hwy. 84 and Old Priddy Rd., in Goldthwaite on Monday, November 21, 1977, between 1:30 and 3:00 p.m.

Health authorities say that too many people are neglecting to obtain the essential immunizations for themselves and their children. Paul Turner, Public Health Advisor in the Immunization Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources, said that measles and rubella have rebounded dramatically this year.

Children who were immunized against measles before their first birthday have only limited protection unless they receive a booster vaccination.

Adults also need booster vaccinations against diphtheria and tetanus every ten years throughout their lives, since these diseases can be as devastating to an adult as to a child. Tetanus, or "lockjaw", is frequently fatal.

Make certain that your immunizations and child's immunizations are up-to-date by attending the public health clinic or contacting your private physician.

Please bring a record of past immunizations if you attend the public clinic on November 21st.

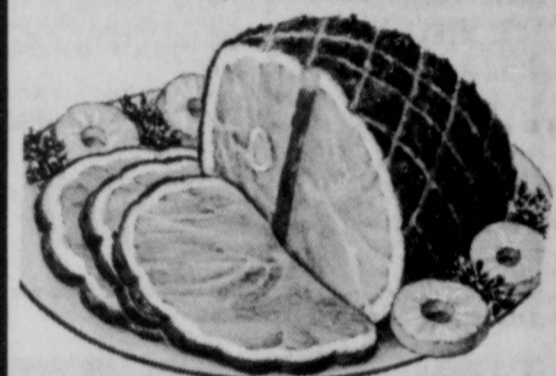

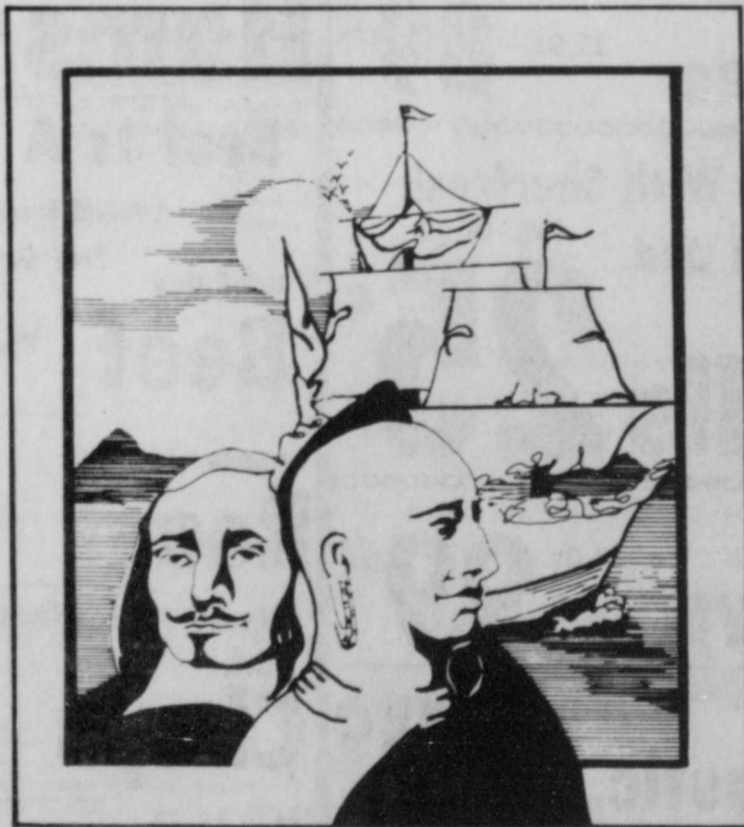

Texans, the reader sees the joy and sorrow of the lives of Anglos, Blacks, and Mexican-Americans in a small Texas county.

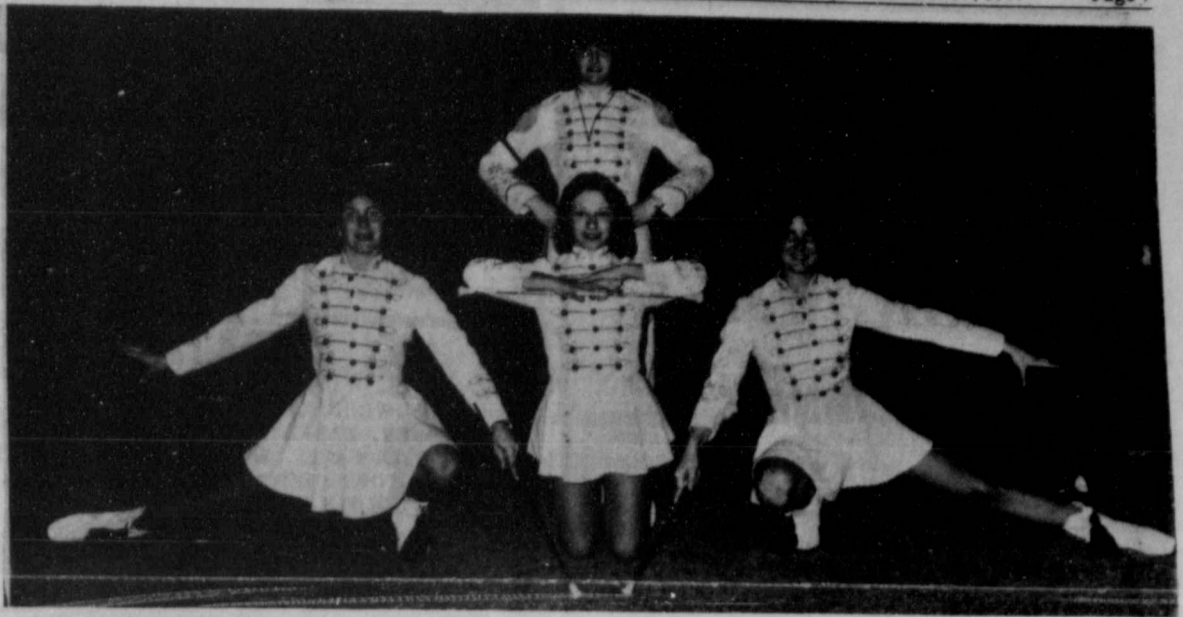
Ray Hudson Promoted By International Paper Co.

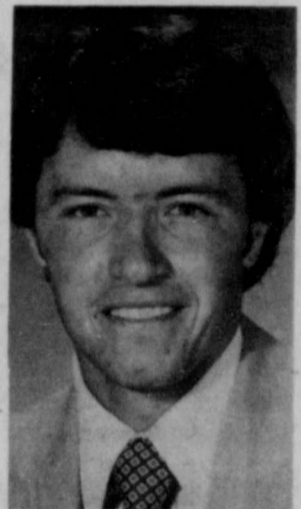
