

Down On The Farm

NOTE: life on the farm before the turn of the century was quite different and much more difficult than it was three decades later in the 1930s and afterward. Bowie Long wrote the following: "It is truly amazing when we bring to mind the vast changes that took place during the lifetime of people such as my mother, Mrs. Alice Bull Long, who was born in 1872 and lived as a child near the Colorado River. I think that perhaps there were greater changes through that period than in the lifetime of any other generation in the history of the world; they lived from ox wagon days 'till the beginning of the Space age."

'THE HUMAN WELL'

A few years ago, while visiting the old home place of my Grandfather Bull where my mother was born and grew up, I went again to look at the old "human" well. The old well had furnished water - not only for the Bull family, but for many of their neighbors. At the time of my visit the well was still in use, which meant that it had probably been used constantly for eighty or ninety years. The well was hand dug; hence it was called a human well by the old-timers. Of course, they had no well

drilling machinery to use in those days so the tools were a pick, shovel and a windlass with buckets. After the well had been dug too deep for the dirt to be pitched out with a shovel, the windlass and buckets were used to remove the loose dirt as it accumulated.

Looking down into the well, it appeared to be approximately fifteen feet deep and four or five feet in diameter. It was walled from top to bottom with rock, and the rock wall extended some four or five feet above the surface of the ground. A large sand rock was placed over the top of the wall for covering and then, of course, a round hole was cut in the center for passage of buckets of water in and out of the well as they were hand-drawn.

Above the top of the well was a pulley through which the well rope was passed. The two buckets were used with one tied to each end of the rope; thus acting to counter-balance each other. While one bucket filled with water was being drawn up, the other was going down, helping to lighten the load for the person drawing water.

Mention of the old well always brought pleasant memories to my mother, as it was in the vicinity of the old well that the Bull children spent many happy hours playing beneath the beautiful shade trees, and wading in the cool water of the creek that flowed nearby. How wonderful it was to have a nice cool drink from the "Old Oaken Bucket" drawn up fresh from the depths of this old well.

It was here on the creek near the well that the big early-day Fourth of July celebrations were held for many years. The activities and enjoyment of these occasions I have heard my mother tell about make quite another story.

It was there, sitting on the well covering, that Dad and Mother did much of their courting as they sat "spooning" in the moonlight; it was there they became engaged to be married.

Deer Season Off To Good Start

Hunters were pleasantly surprised over most of the North Central Texas area on opening weekend, according to Texas Parks & Wildlife Department personnel. Wildlife Biologist Joe

Stevens, operating weigh station in Hamilton County, said that Saturday, Nov. 12, was the best opening day he could recall in the past few years. Hunter success was good. Bucks had better than

average horn growth and the majority of the deer were in "good" body condition. He contributes this to some recent rain in the area and a good acorn crop, but suggested this condition could not possibly last through the season, so hunters should take their deer early as possible.

Turkey hunting, on the other hand, started a little slow according to wildlife biologist Larry Holland, who is stationed in Brownwood. Holland was quick to add, "There is nothing alarming about this because most hunters are intent on taking deer first and then start hunting turkey. We have a good population of birds, a very liberal season and hunters really have something to look forward to."

The wide variety of hunting seasons and bag limits of Texas requires the sportsman to check the new 77-78 Texas Hunting Guide. These guides are available from all license deputies and TP&WD offices and contain valuable information on hunting rules and regulations along with license requirements.

Blood Banks throughout the entire nation, as well as ours are working very hard to stay on a voluntary basis. The blood bank program is an ideal system with several areas pooling their supply and drawing from it as the need arises.

Everyone between 18 and 65 (17 with parents consent) years of age and in good health can donate. It takes about 20 minutes and is one way to get a quick and free checkup for your blood, blood pressure and temperature. This is a gift to your fellow man you can not give any other way. The time and place for the blood drive will be at the Youth Center from 12 noon till 6 p.m. on Wednesday, November 23.

Funeral Held In Terrell

Floyd F. Henderson, a Terrell, Texas resident, died in a local hospital late Sunday morning, November 6, 1977. Funeral services were held Tuesday, Nov. 8, with interment in Oakland Memorial Park Cemetery.

Mr. Henderson, a son of the late John F. Henderson and Eva Neal Henderson, was born in Comanche, Tex., on Nov. 29, 1899. He grew up there and later lived in Pottsboro, where he graduated from the public schools. He attended Howard Payne College and North Texas State College and taught in the public schools of Brown, Mills and Hamilton counties for a number of years.

He later worked for Little & Sons in Goldthwaite before joining the B&J Sales Company in Terrell. He had been a resident of Terrell for more than 44 years.

He was married to Nora Elma Ross on June 5, 1920. Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. James Springer and Mrs. James Crouch, both of Terrell and Mrs. John Vance of Rockwall; six grandchildren; five great grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Will Roberts of Lamesa, Mrs. Audrey Gent of Corpus, and Mrs. Bill Steitle of Kerrville; one brother, Hulon Henderson of Lamesa; and a number of nieces and nephews.

Dear Mr. Bridges,
I am writing to report that one of the Goldthwaite Eagle's oldest readers and contributors is still following the news of the Mills County area as reported in your pages. I refer to my grandfather, Mrs. Anna L. Burkett Jackson.
Mrs. Jackson was born 94

years and 7 months ago at the Williams Ranch community near Mullin. Her parents, Joseph L. and Della Catherine (Pyeatt) Burkett, were early pioneers of central Texas, having moved here as small children with their families. Mr. Burkett was a blacksmith and farmer, and served as a Peace Officer in the area before Mills County was organized.

Mrs. Jackson grew up and attended school in the Williams Ranch community. After graduation from the Mullin High School, with the encouragement of Mrs. Eli Fairman of Goldthwaite, she earned a teaching certificate by state examination. She taught for a year at the Williams Ranch community school, where she earned a salary of \$25.00 per month, and paid \$5.00 per month for room and board Monday through Friday with a nearby family. Her second year of teaching was at the Lone Grove community school, where she earned \$40 per month, the "top" salary in the entire county.

Mrs. Jackson remembers reading both the Goldthwaite Eagle and the Mullin Enterprise. She served as an "indirect" contributor by transcribing reports and "letters-to-the-editor" to these newspapers for her father in the last years of the last century. Mr. Joe Burkett was an educated man, but he asked his daughter to write while he dictated for two

reasons: first, he felt that she, having attended school, had a better "hand" than he; and second, in this way he tried to encourage her interest and participation in community affairs.

Mrs. Jackson has several living brothers and sisters in the Mills County area—Edgar Burkett and Birdie (Mrs. W.H.G.) Chambers and Gladys (Mrs. B.A.) Hodges in Goldthwaite; and Mac Dell (Mrs. T.D.) Goodwin in Blanket, Texas.

In 1901, Miss Burkett married Mr. William L. Jackson of Goldthwaite. After farming for some years in Mills County and central Texas, they moved their family to Lubbock in 1923. Mr. Jackson passed away in 1954 in Lubbock. She has four living children: J. W. (a retired Professor at Texas Tech University and farmer) in Lubbock; Arthur Dale (an attorney) in New York City; Stella B. (Mrs. W.G.) Jaynes (a retired librarian and teacher) in Linden, Texas; and Callie Ree (Mrs. George B.) Cooper (a retired teacher) in Albuquerque, N. M.

A picture of Mrs. Jackson's father, and contributions from her family appear in the book "Mills County - The Way It Was", edited by Hartal Langford Blackwell under the auspices of the Mills County Historical Commission, and published by the Eagle Press in 1976.

Although living elsewhere, Mrs. Jackson kept up with Mills County news, events, and personalities. She returned many times (and hopes to do so again), attending the Burkett Family Reunions (held annually since 1937), and visiting friends and family. She participated in the Williams Ranch Centennial Celebration, held at the site of Williams Ranch in May of 1975.

In late 1976, Mrs. Jackson left her home on her son's farm east of Lubbock, where she had been living alone, and now resides with her daughter and son-in-law, (George B. and Callie Ree Cooper) in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Mrs. Jackson is alert and active, and eagerly looks forward each week to the arrival of the Eagle, as she has since it began publication 82 years ago.

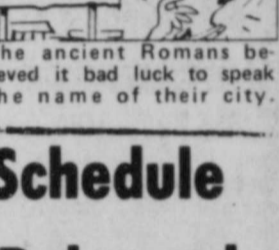

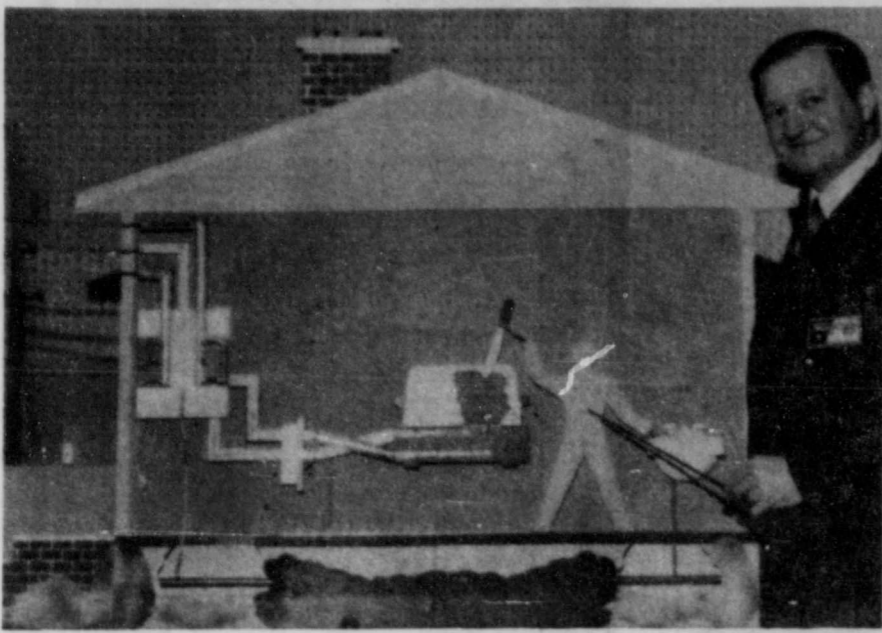

was presented November 9 at the Priddy and the Goldthwaite Schools, under the sponsorship of Mills County Farm Bureau.

Goldthwaite, Priddy Pupils Hear Program On Hazards

Sudden-death hazards were animated by Joe L. Smetana, Waco Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau as part of a graphic electric shock prevention demonstration held November 9th, at Goldthwaite and Priddy Schools.

The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Electricity is always seeking ground. Unfortunately the human body can complete the electrical circuit. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Smetana achieved the animated effect of electric shock to the human body, via arm-to-arm and arm-to-foot with the use of a special plastic figure representing man - the "Misuser" of electricity. The plastic man, several household appliances and portable power tools have special wiring and bulbs that actually light up - producing the animation.

With each sequence of accident producing events, both inside and outside the

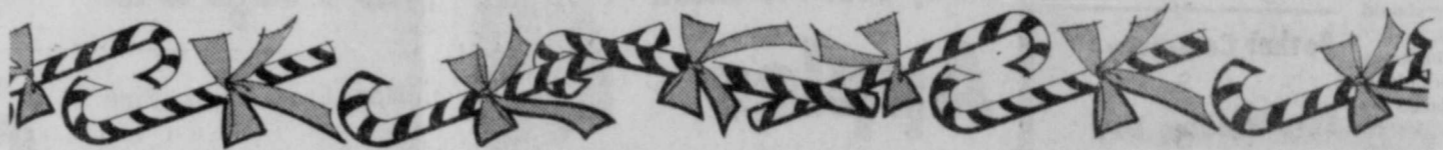

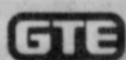

Texas Food and Fiber

Many Texans view the Texas Department of Agriculture as being only interested in farming and ranching. This image, let me quickly point out, is not correct.

We are interested in our farmers and ranchers. But the Department's interest is much more inclusive than just this vital segment of the population that makes up Texas. Many of the Department of Agriculture's duties and responsibilities are consumer-oriented and are of concern to urban and rural dwellers alike. In fact, 53 percent of the Department's budget involves consumer matters.

To assure consumers an opportunity to be heard, the Department has personnel who handle complaints from consumers who feel they have been cheated or treated unfairly. In cases not concerned with departmental regulatory duties, the Department refers the complaint to the appropriate state or local agency.

A recent example of this resulted from the widespread publicity given when the federal Food and Drug Administration announced plans to ban saccharin from use. A lady in Alpine was confused when she purchased a carton of ice cream. The carton included saccharin in its list of ingredients, but there was a sticker on the carton which stated, "Contains no saccharin."

A survey showed that such stickers appeared on the same brand of ice cream in several cities. Personal

contact with the company revealed that during the saccharin controversy the company omitted the artificial sweetener but used previously printed cartons.
