





Mr. Burkett was a blacksmith and farmer, and served as a Peace Officer in the area before Mills County was organized.

Mrs. Jackson grew up and attended school in the Williams Ranch community. After graduation from the Mullin High School, with the encouragement of Mrs. Eli Fairman of Goldthwaite, she earned a teaching certificate by state examination. She taught for a year at the Williams Ranch community school, where she earned a salary of \$25.00 per month, and paid \$5.00 per month for room and board Monday through Friday with a nearby family. Her second year of teaching was at the Lone Grove community school, where she earned \$40 per month, the "top" salary in the entire county.

Mrs. Jackson remembers reading both the Goldthwaite Eagle and the Mullin Enterprise. She served as an 'indirect' contributor by transcribing reports and "letters-to-the-editor" to these newspapers for her father in the last years of the last century. Mr. Joe Burkett was an educated man, but he asked his daughter to write while he dictated for two

reasons: first, he felt that she, having attended school, had a better "hand" than he; and second, in this way he tried to encourage her interest and participation in community affairs.





Sudden-death hazards were animated by Joe L. Smetana, Waco Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau as part of a graphic electric shock prevention demonstration held November 9th, at Goldthwaite and Priddy Schools.

The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt. 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Electricity is always seeking ground. Unfortunately the human body can complete the electrical circuit. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Smetana achieved the animated effect of electric shock to the human body, via are-to-arm and arm-to-feet with the use of a special plastic figure representing - the "Misuser" of electricity. The plastic man, several household appliances and portable power tools have special wiring and bulbs that actually light up producing the animation.



To assure consumers an opportunity to be heard, the Department has personnel who handle complaints from consumers who feel they have been cheated or treated unfairly. In cases not concerned with departmental regulatory duties. the Department refers the complaint to the appropriate state or local agency.

A recent example of this resulted from the widespread publicity given when the federal Food and Drug Administration announced plans to ban saccharin from use. A lady in Alpine was confused when she purchased a carton of ice cream. The carton included saccharin in its list of ingredients, but there was a sticker on the carton which stated, "Contains no saccharin."

A survey showed that such stickers appeared on the same brand of ice cream in several cities. Personal



The Consumer Alert by John L. Hill Attorney General

AUSTIN-Every consumer has seen or heard advertisements like "regularly \$10, now only \$8.99." or "Two for the price of one.'

These are types of price comparisons, a widely used and effective method of advertising, say our Consumer Protection Division attorneys.

In price comparison advertising, the merchant compares his current prices for goods or services with past or future prices or the prices offered by others in order to show cost savings to consumers.

Accurately used price comparisons can assist consumers in making purchasing decisions, since they show exactly how much can be saved on a particular item during a special period.

Most merchants use price comparisons to advertise legitimate cost reductions. A few, though, may base their price comparison advertising on inflated or arbitrary prices, which is misleading to the

For example, an ad may say "Lawn mowers reduced from \$129.95 to \$99.95-you save \$30 during our special end-ofsummer sale!"

If the lawn mowers are normally priced at \$129.95, this is an accurate and helpful use of price comparison to advertise a sale. However, if the lawn mowers always sell at \$99.95, this is misleading and illegal, our attorneys point out.

It is also misleading and illegal if the retailer boosted his price to \$129.95 for just a few days prior to the sale, because the former price at which an item is advertised must have been in effect for a reasonable time on a regular basis before the sale.

tor's list price" or "suggested retail price" and compare it with their own lower price. But, before a retailer uses such a comparison in an ad, he should find out if the list price is really the price regularly charged by the majority of retail stores in his community.

The ad could be deceptive if it uses a list price that appreciably exceeds the highest price at which most sales are made in the community. It is also misleading to use a statement such as "reduced to \$11.99" if the regular price was about \$12. because most consumers would think a "reduced" price indicated a more substantial reduction.

The Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act categorizes false or misleading statements of fact about the reasons for.

existence of, or amount of price reductions as a deceptive and illegal trade practice.

Consumers or advertisers who may be in doubt as to whether a particular price comparison is misleading or deceptive should consult attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division in Austin.
