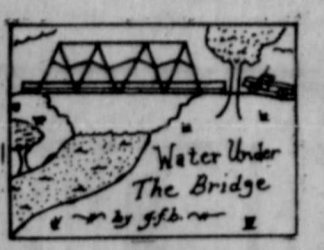

HCCAA Receives State Grant For Head Start Program In Area

Gov. Dolph Briscoe announced approval of \$82,932 Office of Human Development grant to Hill Country Community Action Association, Inc. in San Saba. The grant includes \$81,835 in new funds and authorization to use \$393 in carry-over funds for part-day Head Start, and authorization to

use \$704 in carryover funds for Handicapped Head Start. The grant is for a 12-month period that began Jan. 1, 1978, and is funded under Title V of the Head Start, Economic Opportunity, and Community Partnership Act of 1974.

The part-day program is serving 80 children from

low-income families in three centers for six hours a day for five days a week in four classes. The centers are in Llano, Goldthwaite and San Saba.

Objectives of the program are to provide educational and environmental enrichment to preschool children,

medical and dental services, and nutritional meals and snacks.

Grant processing and program liaison are through the Economic Opportunity Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

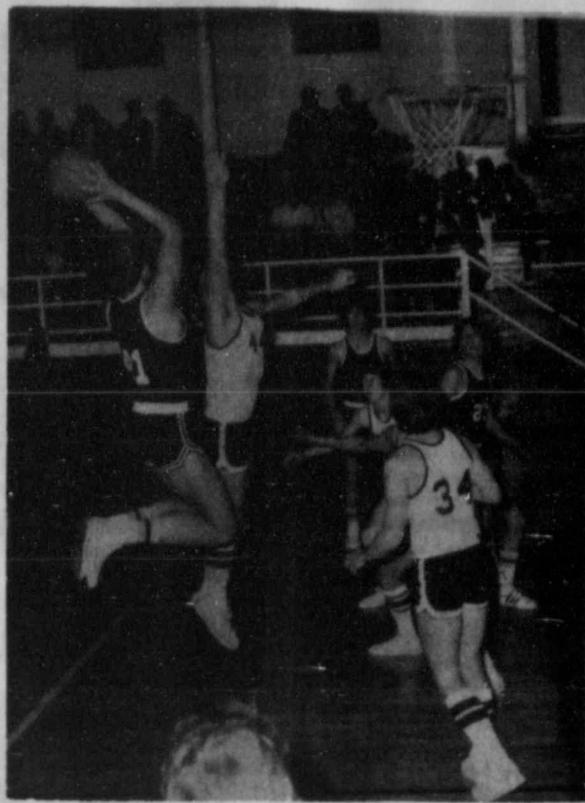

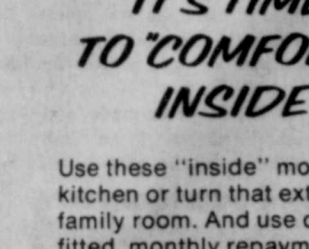
