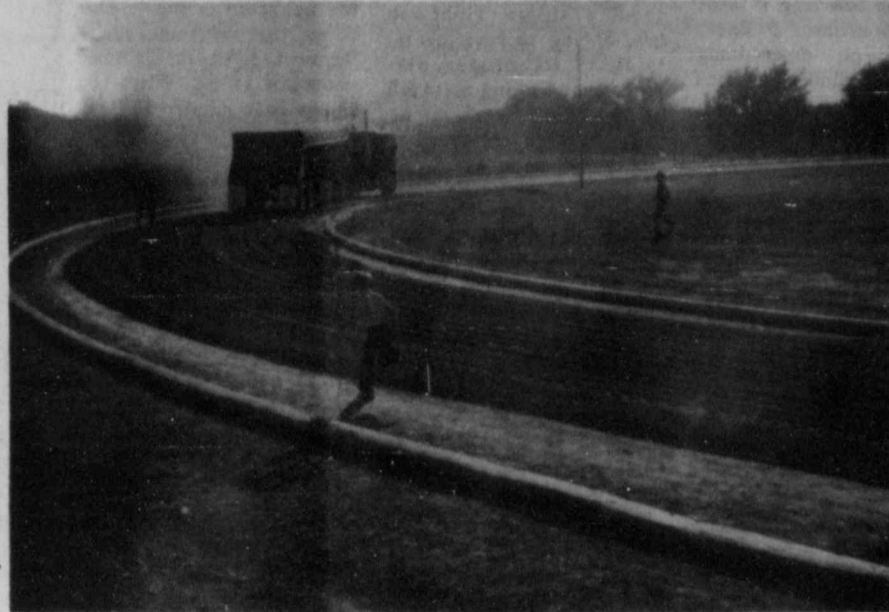

## Telephone Service Growth Indicates Increase Here

The percentage of telephone growth in Goldthwaite in 1977 as compared to the 1976 gain exceeded the record growth of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, according to Bill Drennan, Brownwood division manager.

Goldthwaite gained 57 telephones in 1977, a 67.6 percent increase over the 34 gained in 1976. At the end of

1977, Goldthwaite had a total of 1404 telephones and 900 main stations. The exchange gained 17 main stations

(which could be equated to customers), a 70 percent increase over the 10 netted in 1976.

United Blood Services of West Texas (same organization with a new name) is the non-profit group that draws and processes the blood used in this area and west of us. Connally also stated that this organization's main purpose is to see that the people covered by their program get the blood they need when they need it. If anyone has any questions about blood needs, call him or the local hospital.

Public hearings on proposed changes in the hunting and fishing regulations are scheduled throughout North Central Texas March 13-16.

March 15 -

10 a.m., Comanche, at County Courthouse, Comanche.

2 p.m., Mills, County Courthouse, Goldthwaite.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is seeking comment from the public on some of the proposed changes which include:

- no protection of spike bucks.

- increasing the Panhandle antelope season.

- separate the mule deer and whitetail deer regulations.

- increase the number of counties in which spring turkey seasons will be held.

- make quail seasons more uniform throughout the state by opening the Possum Kingdom area the Saturday nearest Nov. 15.

For the first time the department will be asking for comment in selected counties in the Hill Country and Edwards Plateau concerning the possibility of holding whitetail doe-only hunting seasons.

# The Mills Minister

With the pressures of holding down 2 or 3 jobs, family life, church and community activities and a host of other responsibilities, at times it is easy for a person to feel like an elephant on a see-saw; tipping right and left, hoping to keep everything in its proper perspective and trying not to fall on its face.

To avoid such a catastrophe it is important for us to learn to keep a balance in our lives. We sometimes ask ourselves, "What are my priorities and what are my goals?" There are many things that demand our attention. But are all of them essential? Do they all bring to us a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction? Is this really how we want to spend our time, our energies, our lives? How does one determine their priorities?

When we have no clear goals and when we do not establish priorities we are easily swayed by passing events. It is easy to be pressured by stresses that cause imbalance in our lives. We need to establish some goals; some long range and some short-term goals. Sometimes our goals are like new year's resolutions; often unrealistic

or too hard to attain. They are soon forgotten. Clear goals help us to make decisions for the present and for the future.

We can specifically determine our priorities by considering 3 questions—

First, "What do I think about?" Proverbs 23:7 tells us that as a man 'thinketh in his heart so is he.' The things that we think about the most are the things most important to us. What occupies your mind? Do you find yourself occupied with financial concerns, social prestige or status?

Second, "How do I spend my time?" Most people waste a lot of time. For example, the average man spends 17 hours per week watching television. Many people live dis-organized lives. There is no real planning. If you don't plan your life and your time, others will do it for you. I would rather decide what to do with my time than to have others deciding for me, wouldn't you? For some of us, time is short. Time is running out. Whatever we are going to do with our lives, we had better get after it. Remember, "Only one life, 'twill soon be past; only what's done for Christ will last."

Third, ask yourself, "How do I spend my money?" A person's checkbook is a good indicator of the priorities of their lives. If we do not set goals, and determine priorities we will find that 'easy come, easy go.' But it's not so easy coming, is it? It is true, however, that without goals we will squander our resources away and live a life of disappointment.

Have you wondered how Jesus kept a balanced life? He was very busy while He was here on earth. Somehow He had time for speaking, teaching, healing, loving and relaxing. He did all this without appearing to be flustered. How did He do it? First, He had a clear set of goals. He stated His purpose like this: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he has sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19) Still another time He set forth His goal: "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly." (John 10:10)

Then with His goals in mind, He sought His father's guidance through prayer (Mark 1:35). He planned His activities. (Mark 1:37-38). He took time for His family. He periodically relaxed with His friends. He wasn't rigid in His lifestyle. But He never deviated from His long-range goal. As a result, He lived a balanced life.

In spite of the pressures we feel, we can do the same thing. We do need to look at our priorities, think through our goals and identify specific ways to reach those goals.

## Goldthwaite Garden Club Meets With Mrs. Jernigan

The Goldthwaite Garden Club met recently in the home of Mrs. Malcolm Jernigan. Members answered the roll by naming their favorite herb.

Mrs. Jernigan, chairman of the Courthouse Plaza committee, announced that a live oak had been planted on the south side of the lawn, further carrying out the landscape plan.

Mrs. George Weddell, co-chairman of the Flower Show, stated that the show, entitled "Spring on Planet Earth" would be held April 21 in the Youth Center. Plans are being completed, the schedule will be given to the members at the March meeting. All committees are carrying out their designated work.

Mrs. Jack Elms, Presi-

dent, urged all members to take an active part in the Flower Show. She announced that the District V meeting of the Texas Garden Clubs will be held in Temple March 9. Mrs. Robert Murray, well known flower arranger and author of several arranging books, will present the program.

Mrs. Robert McCoy, chairman, announced that the Valentine Bake Sale held February 10 had been very successful.

Mrs. Jernigan invited the club members to tour her garden in the spring, when the plantings would be at their peak. The time to be announced later.

Mrs. Allen Campbell spoke on "Growing and Using Herbs". From Cleopatra and the early Romans to today we find herbs in great favor, she told the group. Shakespeare mentioned herbs often, also. Specific herbs that she mentioned and their uses were Basil, to be used in cheese dishes-chives whenever a light onion flavor was desired; Dill, both the seed and the leaves; Mint and Parsley. She told the members that all of these herbs mentioned would grow readily in this area. The harvesting of herbs should be done in mid-morning when all danger of moisture is gone. Both the leaves and the seeds should be dried in a cool, dark place. When dry they should be stored in airtight containers. Many of the herbs may be dried and used in dried flower arrangements.

Mrs. Delton Barnett concluded the program with thoughts on "Green Survival". This phrase originated with the American Nursery Society. She told of the role of plants in the conservation of energy, trees

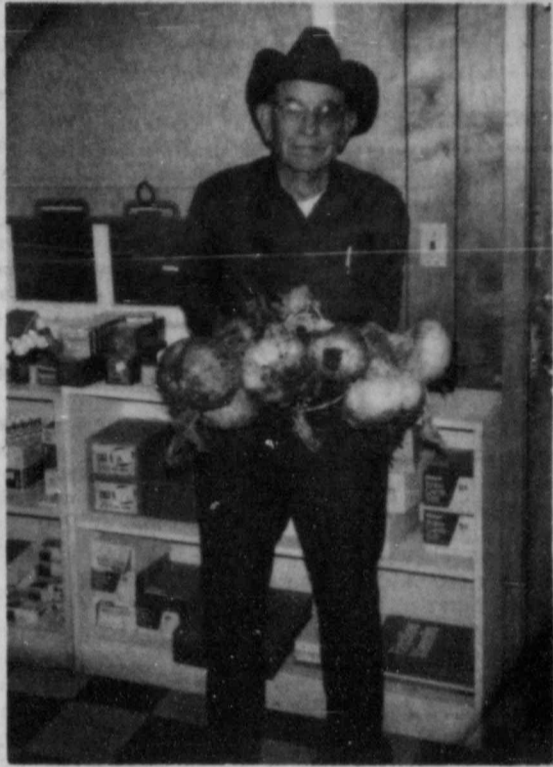
and vines providing shade in the summer, and windbreaks in the winter that help to lessen the chilling effect of the wind. Houseplants will add needed moisture to dry air in the home in the winter.

Plantings are also used to screen noise from traffic along highways, as well as to break the monotony along freeways. She also stressed the importance of plantings to stabilize the soil from wind

and water damage. Plants also are great removers of pollution from the air.

Mrs. Barnett suggested that the members of all garden clubs could do much to aid the environment by translating their knowledge into action by planting more trees, shrubs, vines, etc.

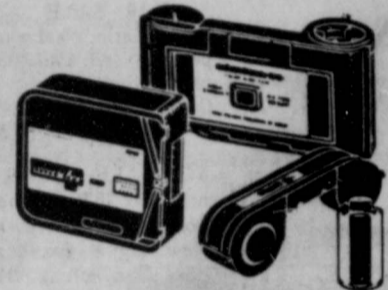

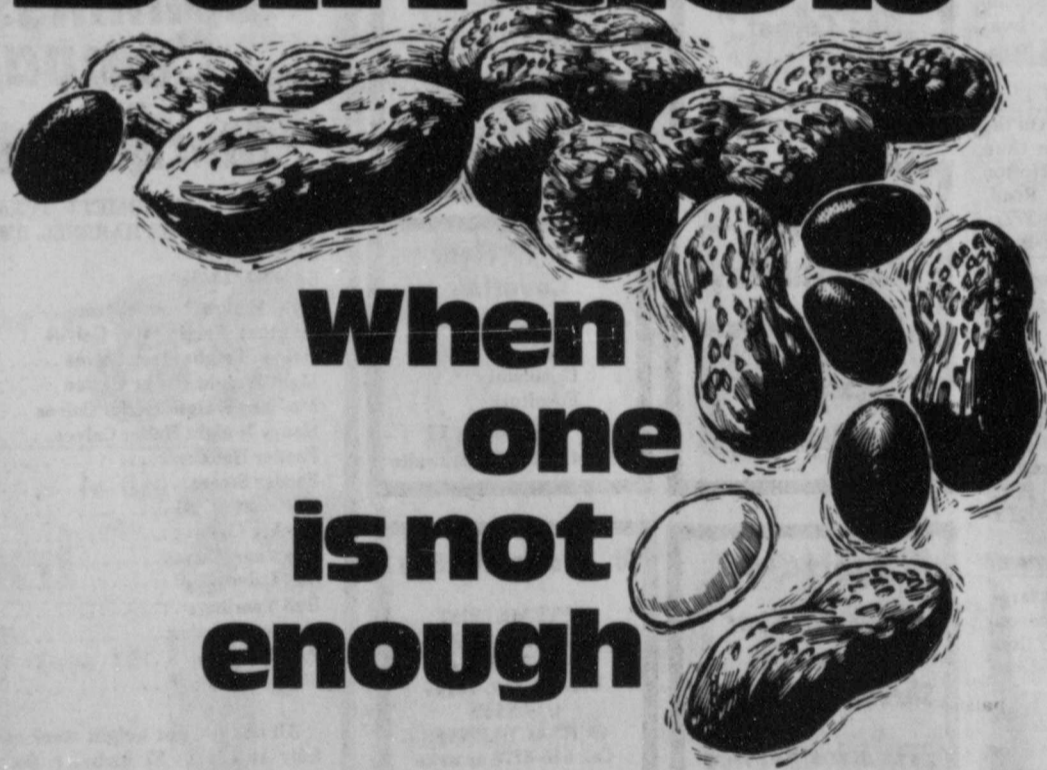

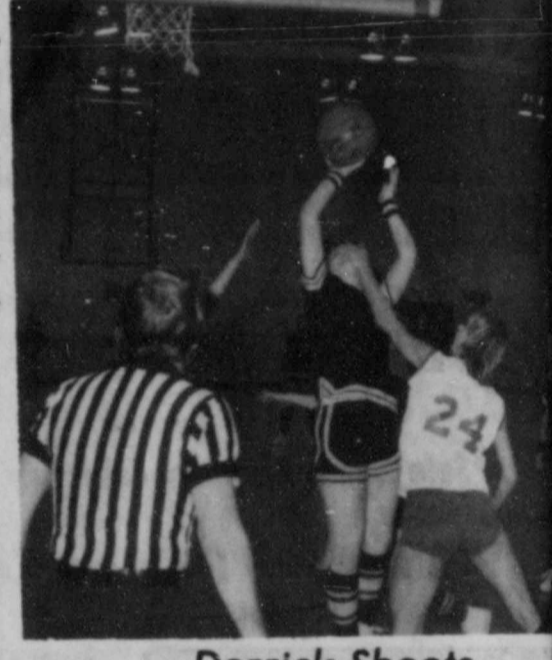

Extension Agent Report —

# Lime Important Factor In Quality Forage Production

It is estimated that four million acres of pasture soils in Texas is deficient in lime. Forage growth and quality, as well as profits, can be restricted on this acreage. I think we often tend to neglect the fact that extreme applications of nitrogen can increase acid conditions in the soil, resulting in less than optimum production circumstances. This is not intended to influence a reduction in nitrogen applications, as nitrogen is most surely the greatest needed soil nutrient for maximum forage growth

and production and without adequate amounts of nitrogen, forage quality and yield will certainly be minimized. What we wish to bring to the attention of producers is the fact that there are conditions, either natural or induced, which can create acid conditions in our soils to the extent that forage production will not reach expected levels even though adequate or surplus nutrients are supplied. When soil elements such as hydrogen and aluminum are in excess, as opposed to other elements such as calcium, potassium and sodium, an acid condition

results. This element imbalance is often caused by such practices as the removal of bases by growing forage plants, weathering of soil minerals, leaching of bases an ammonium nitrogen fertilizers. Soil acidity is measured and expressed as the PH level. A PH level of 7 is neutral, while a PH level below 7 is acid, and a PH level above 7 is basic.

We think it appropriate to mention that certain crops can tolerate moderate degrees of acidity or alkalinity without severe results, but this is dependent upon the type of forage grown. Extreme deviations in soil PH levels should be of primary concern to forage producers.

The next question would naturally be - What do we do about extremely acid soils? The answer lies in applications of lime. When sufficient lime is added to acid soils, the acid is neutralized. This generally permits better forage growth and better utilization of other fertilizer nutrients applied.

Soil pH levels can be determined through a soil test. The soil test will not only give recommendations of needed levels of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, as well as the present levels of these nutrients in the soil, but it will also give the soil pH level and this level is an excellent management tool for producers of good quality forage.

If you have not yet had a soil sample analysis on your pastures, now is the time. Most soil testing labs will be swamped with samples during the next few weeks, and delayed results will be common if you wait too long.

We have soil sample instruction sheets and boxes in the county extension agent's office free of charge. If you would like to have this material, come by, call or write and we will be happy to provide what you need.

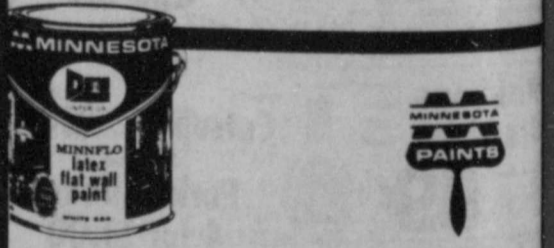
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
