

Five Arrested Here Tuesday Following Traffic Complaint

Possession, Burglary Charged

Mills County police officers spent most of the day Tuesday handling one case, involving five persons, three women and two men.

In the final analysis nine different charges were levied in Mills, Lampasas and Brown Counties.

Involved were Patricia and Betty Tennie of Bangs, Lagenia Smith of Brownwood, and Lloyce Daniels and Curmett Randle of Houston.

The suspect vehicle was stopped near Goldthwaite due to reckless driving due to a complaint from James "Buddy" Morgan of Goldthwaite, Texas Highway Department foreman. He contacted local police officers via radio.

Arresting officers were Highway Patrolmen Ronnie Rush, Bobby Wilcox and Deputy Sheriff Ronnie Wetterman.

The following charges were filed from this one traffic stop:

- Three charges of possession of marijuana.
- One charge of possession of a controlled substance.
- Operating an unregistered vehicle.
- Displaying a fictitious license plate.
- Driving on the wrong side of the roadway.
- Due to merchandise found in the car, a 1964 Chevelle, a charge of felony theft of over \$200 but less than \$10,000 was filed in Lampasas County. This involved two television sets and a quantity of drugs.
- A drug store burglary in Brown County was allegedly cleared, as charges are pending in that county.

Mills County Judge James Ledbetter heard guilty pleas from two of the marijuana cases, and fined them \$200 plus court costs of \$56 each.

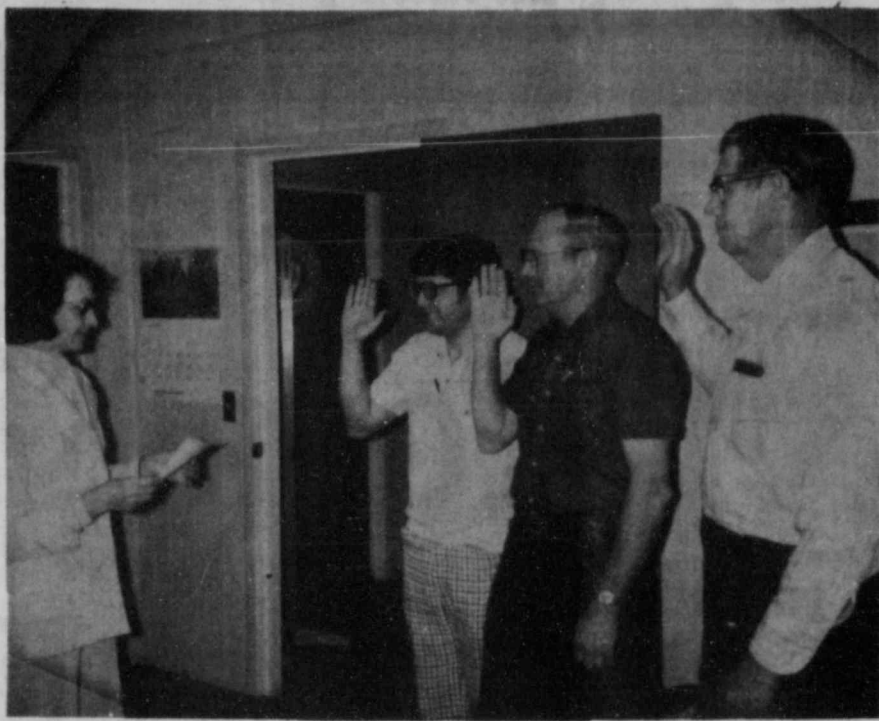
A guilty plea for possession of a controlled substance, a Class A misdemeanor, resulted in a fine of \$300 and \$56 court costs for still another of the group.

The driver of the vehicle was fined \$100 on the series of traffic charges.

City Boosts Water Rate; New Aldermen Sworn In Thursday

\$1.00 Per Month Water Hike

The Goldthwaite City Council met last Thursday night and voted to increase the minimum water rate by \$1.00 per month.

The new rate is \$4.50 per month for the first 2500 gallons and \$1.50 for each 1000 gallons after that.

In the unanimous decision, the council reviewed existing water problems and solutions, which have to be met in order to meet state standards, hence the increase.

The council reviewed water rate structures in other cities surrounding Goldthwaite before making the decision.

THE OATH of office was administered to new councilmen Charles Conradt, and Allen Moreland. Also sworn in was returning councilman Tom Cody Graves. City Secretary Mildred Taylor read the oath to the councilmen. This ceremony was conducted after the canvassing of the election results of the recent council election.

The first item discussed by the new council was a general note of thanks to Loy Long and Felton Wright, retiring councilmen, for their endeavors in serving the city in the past years.

City Manager Dale Allen presented the council with his overall plan on city tax revenues for the coming year.

Citing ease of operation and simplicity as his motives, Allen suggested that the city move into a complete 100% market value method of evaluating taxes.

IN THE PAST, the city has rendered on the basis of 100%, but then figured the evaluation by multiplying by a set figure, and using a \$1.50 tax rate per \$100 valuation. Last year the city used 13% as its evaluation figure.

Under Allen's plan the city would actually use the full 100% figure to determine the taxes, and vary the rate accordingly to meet budget demands.

If the method had been implemented last year, the tax rate would have been about 20 cents per \$100 valuation. This would have resulted in the same actual amount of dollars paid in taxes.

The chance of error is greater in the way the taxes have been figured, Allen said, and the cost of collecting the taxes would be lessened.

Following much discussion of the matter, the council voted to implement the new plan for the 1978 taxes, and to completely drop licensed vehicles from the tax roll. They were included this past year on a trial basis, and the amount of tax revenue generated was not sufficient to warrant continuance of the tax.

MAYOR HARPER reported that he has been unable to get firm commitments on persons to serve on the board of equalization for the coming year. He said he will continue to work on the

board.

The council resumed discussion of the water problems of the city. It was noted by the City Manager that there is a severe water leak somewhere in the distribution system, causing the city to lose about 30,000 gallons per day. A direct passage of the water into the sewer system is suspected to be the main cause. The CM was requested to see to the problem.

The condition of the off-channel storage tanks near the Colorado River was discussed. Several of the councilmen made a trip to the site last week and again noted the serious erosion of the side walls. The council is exploring several avenues of securing grants or matching funds to help in the renovation of the two reservoirs, and the increasing of the city's filtering capacity to meet current and expected needs.

THE TURBIDITY level of the water, used by the State Health Department as a guide to safe drinking standards, has been properly controlled since the city switched chemicals used to treat the water.

With a commercially sold mixture, the water was continually reaching a level over the minimum. With the new method of chemical treatment, the city's water has been consistently below the line.

The council was advised of a new rate for extension phones from General Telephone Co. The new rates will actually decrease from \$1.50 to 85 cents per extension, per month.

THE BUDGET for 1977-1978 was reviewed by the council. With the third quarter just completed, the overall budget is running at about 90% of collections and about 87% on the disbursement column.

The operations at the city's sanitary landfill came under

scrutiny by the council. It was noted that a letter had been received from Clyde Cockrum, voicing disapproval of the burning at the landfill on windy days, and without adequate supervision. A recent fire escaped the pit and burned off some pasture near the Cockrum home, which is adjacent to the landfill.

It was concluded by the council that the fire was not started by authorized city personnel, and that a renewed effort would be made to insure that no unauthorized burning and dumping would be done.

A complete schedule of the hours of operation of the landfill is published on page 4 of today's Eagle. Strict adherence to this policy will be held by the city and its employees.

IN OTHER Council matters:

- The council tabled once again the second reading of an ordinance that would grant an increase to the Goldthwaite Cable Vision Company, that serves the citizens here.
- Approved the regular quarterly treasurer's report as presented by CM Allen. The complete report, listing the current status of all city controlled funds is printed on page 8 of today's paper.
- Unanimously approved the paying of the bills and the regular monthly operations report of the city. The operations report showed the city to have collected \$56,156.95 and disbursed \$61,604.28 for the month of March. The purchase of a large number of supplies for city operations in coming months was cited as the main reason for the deficit.
- Reviewed service capabilities of Lone Star Gas Company. It was brought to the attention of the council that a gas leak has been noticed for several months in one portion of downtown, and has repeatedly been

County Receives Jail Grant In The Amount of \$20,700

For the past four months, County Judge James Ledbetter has been working with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards to formulate a plan for renovation of the Mills County Jail.

Recently, members of the Commission have recommended action on variance requests for the jail. The Mills County jail, originally built in 1887, has been given permission to resume operation with low ceilings. In his correspondence with the Commission on Jail Standards, Judge Ledbetter pointed out that raising the

ceilings to the required eight foot height would necessitate a dismantling of the jail which would ruin its historic value.

The Texas Jail Standards Commissioners' action will be ratified at the next meeting when a quorum is present. Upon ratification, this will be the first county in the state given permission by the Jail Standards Commission for renovation of an existing facility that will meet standards.

Judge Ledbetter has also received information that Mills County will be the recipient of a \$20,700.00 grant from the Office of the Governor's Criminal Justice Planning Commission.

It is the intention of the Commissioners' Court to have a county jail facility that will comply with standards at the lowest possible cost to the citizens of Mills County and still retain its historic value.

Fifth In A Series

Excerpts From "A No Man's Land Becomes A County"

LAW ENFORCEMENT (Williams Ranch)

Prior to 1887, what is now known as Mills County was the fringes of four different counties: namely, Brown, Comanche, Hamilton and Lampasas. It was an outlaw country by unanimous consent.

The law enforcement officers were content in the four above mentioned counties to let it be so as long as the mobs then raging did not overstep their bounds. The sheriffs of the four counties thought it better "to isolate a disease than to scatter it." The officials of each county expected to keep a light reign on the fringe of their county by striking a fair balance.

The first peace officers in Williams Ranch were W. S. Marshall, Justice of the Peace, and Asbury Collins, Constable; W. W. Queens was deputized as peace officer in 1883 by W. N. Adams, Sheriff of Brown County. Mr. Queen had the distinction of being the first deputized law officer on record of the early environs of Mills County.

There was no jail or calaboose in Williams Ranch. Mr. Queen had a large iron hook stove to which he chained his prisoners with shackled hands and feet to the leg of the stove until he

could carry them to the jail in Brownwood.

There being no place for confinement of law breakers was a great handicap to the Constable, Mr. Collins, Indian Jim, a half-breed, and the last Indian on the Ranch, was a law enforcement problem to Mr. Collins. Jim was always on a drunken spree, yelling and disturbing the peace of the village at night until some people could

not sleep; finally one night Mr. Collins, as a last resort, nailed Indian Jim up in a large dry-goods box for the night; but during the "wee hours" Indian Jim awoke dreaming he was buried alive; there was a disturbance sure enough when he began kicking, pounding and screeching to get out of the box of death - as he thought.

USDA Released Wool

Incentive Level For 1977

USDA has released the wool incentive level for the 1977 market year.

The level is 37.5 percent, or a 37.5 cent payment for every dollar's worth of wool sold during the 1977 market year. Had it not been for the diligent efforts of industry leaders such as former Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Assn. president Bill Pfluger, the payment would have been zero.

Incentive levels are based upon the difference between the average price of wool marketed during the year and the official wool support price. For much of the past decade, support prices have been frozen at 72 cents. It

took a great deal of bush beating, hand shaking and good old country jawboning by industry leaders to unfreeze the freeze and allow support prices to rise the way they were originally designed to do.

It might put all this into a little better perspective to note that the official U.S. average wool price in 1977 was about 72 cents - the same as the old frozen support level. This means, of course, the producers are 37.5 cents per dollar of sales better off than they would have been without the help of the National Wool Growers and the TS&GRA.

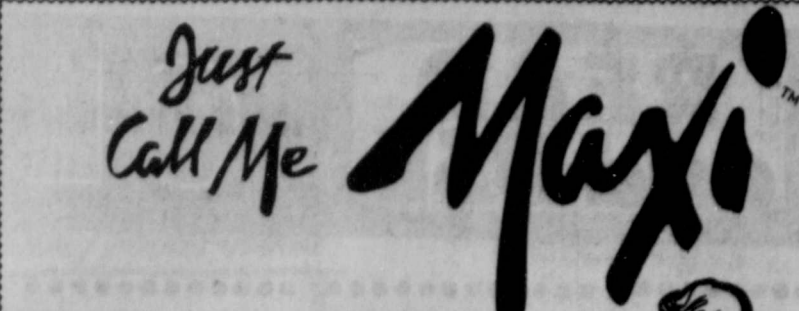

- Set April 24 as the date for the annual Revenue Sharing Budget hearing, and May 4 as the regular budget hearing of the City. Legal notices to announce these meetings will be published.
- A water line to the Boykin addition (Chapparral) is being constructed.
- The city spent a lot of hours working on the new track for the Goldthwaite schools. This involved the use of the maintainer, roller, and the electrical crew for the installation of the lights.
- The city crew has begun a program to patch holes, following a cold and icy winter.
- Discussed a proposed street along the Raymond Pope property on the western edge of the city limits. A well in the right of way and other complications have to be dealt with before the street construction can begin.
- Park maintenance drive will be discussed at the next meeting.

The council meets the first Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. in the City Utilities Building.



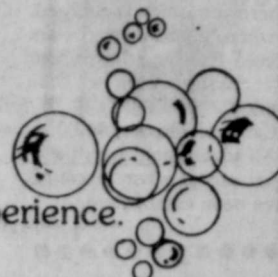

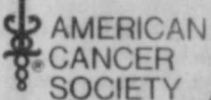

John 3:16 reads in part, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son".... Sometimes as I read this I wonder if I understand love. "What is Love?" I ask the question, and wonder where to find the answer.

I may look at nature, and see the mother skunk as she leads her five babies across the rain swollen stream to safety, the sparrow as she flutters through the grass to coax the cat away from the baby fallen from the nest, her love that overcomes her fear. Then I say this is animal or mother love.

I see the love that shines in the eyes of the young couple as I read the wedding rites, love that I realize is blind to the faults of the other, love pledged 'til death do us part. I pause a moment to observe an elderly couple, in the care center they now call home, yet the lovelight and concern still shines in their eyes, the hands still clasped in love, even though more than sixty years have passed in their married life. As Christian people we are taught to love our fellow man. We know some are harder to love than others, their skin may be black or brown, their clothes may be ragged or dirty, or their bodies may be deformed or full of sores, but they too were created in God's image, and as such are my neighbors.

The answer then is God, when we find God we find it all, for God is the answer to "What is love?" Now that I have Him, I need seek no more, I found the answer to my question. Thank you, Lord.

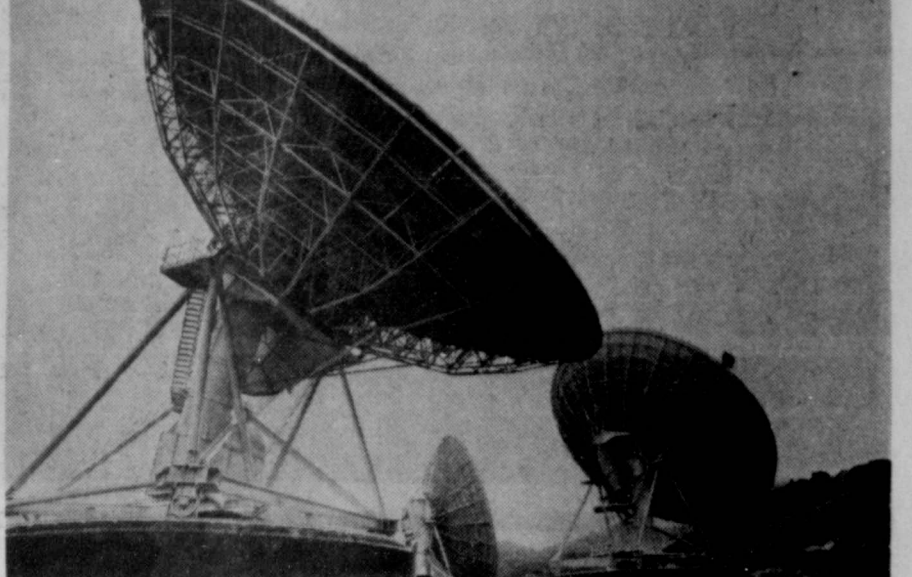

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Extension Highlights

When buying fertilizers for your spring planting, be sure you know what you're getting. Key ingredients in a fertilizer are nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

The label on the fertilizer tells you the percentage of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in the mixture, in that order - such as 5-10-5, or 10-10-10.

Buy fertilizers according to the price per pound of nutrients. For example, one pound bag of 10-20-10 is equal to two pounds of 5-10-5, but compare the prices.

Special fertilizers for use with specific plants are available, but are usually more expensive. Lawns generally do better with a high nitrogen fertilizer, while vegetables can use a little extra phosphorus.

For the best economy and efficiency, purchase fertilizers for your home or garden by the weight of total plant nutrients, not for its total weight.

Homeowners who use too much nitrogen on their lawns may be covering up some serious problems. Grass invaded by weeds, weakened by insects or disease attacks, or showing effects of thatch accumulation may be boosted temporarily by nitrogen fertilizer, but unless the primary problem is diagnosed and solved, applying nitrogen only adds to the problem.

Signs of nitrogen deficiency are pale color, slow growth and abundant seed-heads.

Use of slow-release nitrogen sources will reduce the spring burst of growth that follows the application of soluble nitrogen sources. Also, the effect will last much longer where slow-release sources are used. This can be recognized by the W.I.N. (water insoluble nitrogen) label on the bag.

On St. Augustine grass, specialists recommend a spring and fall application of nitrogen. Apply at a rate of one pound per 1,000 sq. ft. (12 lbs. of 8-8-8 fertilizer, or 8 lbs of 12-6-6 fertilizer) in

the spring and 2 lbs per 1,000 sq. ft. in the fall. Application of iron will be required to give St. Augustine a dark green color.

If grass clippings are removed from the lawn, an additional application of nitrogen will be needed during growing season. The grass shaded areas requires less nitrogen.

Bermuda grass lawns need more nitrogen than St. Augustine to maintain color and growth; however, rate of application should not exceed 1 lb. per 1,000 square feet at any one application.

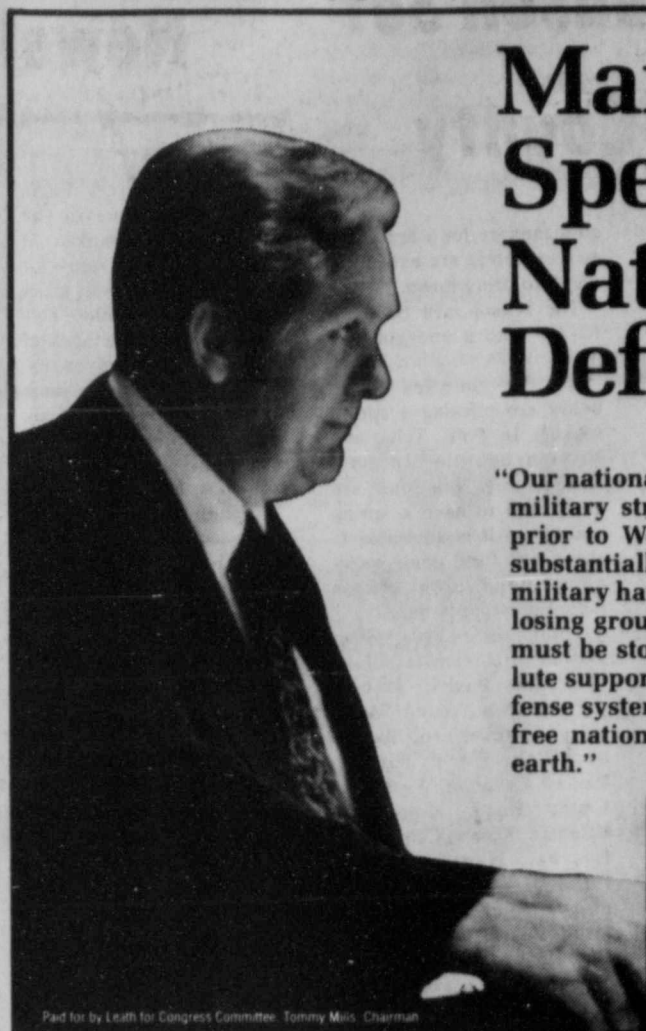

Spring Gobbler Season Set In April For Mills County

Hunters planning to participate in the spring turkey hunt should be well prepared to face one of the most elusive of all the game birds.

This spring the largest number of counties ever will participate -- a total of 49 -- in far-flung areas of the state.

Wildlife biologist Horace Gore, Upland Game Program Leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, says that generally, turkey are under-harvested in Texas and that we can take more gobblers and still maintain good brood stock ratios. Gore says the beautiful part of the spring hunt is that the turkey gobblers are more accessible at this time of year when they are moving into their breeding grounds.

"In 1977, 43 counties participated in a nine-day season. According to a statewide survey 4,600 hunters taking part in the spring season took 1216 gobblers for a 26% hunter success," says Gore.

A small caliber rifle is recommended for turkey

hunting, something in the .222 class. However, Gore says that if a shotgun is used,

he certainly recommends a full or modified choke using No. 6 shot or larger, and by
