General Election Set Tuesday, Nov. 7th

The General Election will take place in Mills County on Tuesday, November 7th. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Mills County voters will cast their ballots in the twelve (12) voting boxes. This includes the absentee voting box. The voting precinct, locations, and judges are as follows:

Precinct #1, Baptist Youth Center, Robert Butler; Precinct #2, Senior Citizen Building, Ray Standley; Precinct #3, Mount Olive Baptist Church, Mrs. Glen Love; Precinct #4, Center City Methodist Church, Walter Tubbs; Precinct #5, Star School Building, Maurine Soules; Precinct #6, Zion Lutheran Church in Priddy, Earnest Kohler; Precinct #7, Democrat Church, Mrs. Cleo Hodges; Precinct #8, Community Center in Mullin, James D. Jays; Precinct #9, Goldthwaite High School, Myra Holland; Precinct #10, Big Valley Baptist Church, Mrs. Jack Davis; Precinct #11, Ridge School House in Ridge, Mrs. Glenn Nichols; Precinct #12, Absentee, County Clerk's Office, Mrs. James Knight.

The absentee voting box is already open. Absentee voting will close three days before the election.

The candidates in the U.S. Senators race are Robert (Bob) Krueger, Democratic Party; John Tower, Republican Party; Luis A. Diaz DeLeon, Raza Unida Party; and Miguel Pendas, Socialist Workers Party.

Candidates for U.S. Representative, 11th Congressional District, are Marvin Leath, Democratic Party and Jack Burgess, Republican Party.

In the governor's race, candidates are John Hill, Democratic Party; Bill Cle-

ments, Republican Party; Mario C. Compean, Raza Unida Party; and Sara Jean Johnson, Socialist Workers Party.

Bill Hobby, Democratic Party; Gaylord Marshall, Republican Party; and Andrea Doorack, Socialist Workers Party, are the candidates on the ticket for Lieutenant Governor.

The Attorney General post candidates on the ballot are Mark White, Democratic Party; Jim Baker, Republican Party; and Agnes Chapa, Socialist Workers Party.

For State Treasurer, the candidates are Warren G. Harding, Democratic Party; and Derrick Adams, Socialist Workers Party.

The office of Railroad Commissioner is being contested by Mack Wallace, Democrat; and Jana Pellusch, Socialist Workers Party.

Democrats and Republicans are the only parties running for the office of Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term). They are John H. Poerner, Democrat; and James W. Lacy, Republican.

Those unopposed on the ticket for offices are Democrats Bob Bullock for Comptroller of Public Accounts; Bob Armstrong, Commissioner of General Land Office; Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner of Agriculture; Joe R. Greenhill for Chief Justice, Supreme Court; Franklin Spears for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1; Sam D. Johnson, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; Charles W. Barrow, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3, (4 year unexpired term); and Robert M. Campbell, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4 (2 year unexpired term).

Also unopposed on the Democratic Party ticket are Wendell A. Odom for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; Sam Houston Clinton, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2; and W.C. (Bill) Davis for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3.

Also on the Democratic ticket, Stan Schlueter is unopposed for State Representative, 43rd District; Mrs. Warren B. (Laura) Tynes, unopposed for member of the State Board of Education, 11th District; and John C. Phillips, unopposed for Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 3rd District.

The Goldthwaite Eagles travelled to Bangs last Friday night and came up short in the District 10-A game 41-6.

The Eagles, falling behind quickly in the game by giving the Dragons several possessions from deep in their own territory, showed some nice improvement in the game.

The tally was 28-0 at the half, so owing that the locals played the Bangs team 13-6 in the second stanza of the encounter.

The Eagles lone marker came in the fourth period when big fullback David Livingston crashed over from the ten yard line.

Pass blocking was very much improved for the Eagles, but a tight Bangs secondary held quarterback Jett Johnson to 5 out of 14 for only 29 yards total and one interception that was run back for a touchdown.

The loss gives the Eagles a district record of 0-3 and a season mark of 0-6.

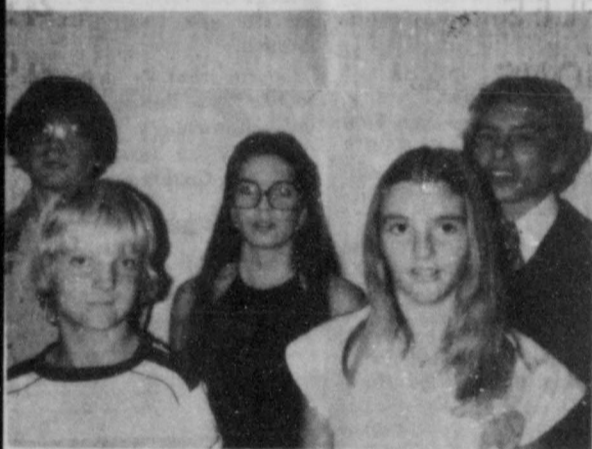

The folks believed in hobgoblins of all kinds, and fairies too. They expressed it in poems and songs, many containing lines like, "...run children run!"

Bogies (from whence we get the term "Boogie-man") were known to sit on just about all the fence posts. (Today they play dominoes).

Wales had weird customs on this night of witchery, omens, and dark thoughts about the future. On Halloween everyone built a fire in front of the house. Each member of the family marked a small stone and threw it in the fire. When they went in to bed, they all said their prayers. In the morning they dug in the ashes for the stones. If any stone was missing the person who marked it would die before he saw another Halloween.

Celts were also in France. They too celebrated this night, building fires and roasting chestnuts. They danced and made merry, but were known to be rather noisy about it.

During the years of the present times the English have harmless fireside activities, cracking nuts, roasting them, and ducking for apples in a tub. (No, Alvis, you don't get IN the tub!). We've changed the New Year's Day, but we still celebrate the Eve of All Saint's Day. -- Halloween. We still have the old ghosts and goblins dashing about. So kiddies, --go out tonight and have a Druidful time!

County Extension Agent
Most shoppers say they do feel "thrifty" and "wise" when they use coupons.

Researchers say about three of every four shoppers use the simple "cents-off" coupons for savings at retail grocery markets.

They use coupons mostly with processed foods, household products and beauty products.

COUPON SOURCES

More than half of all coupons appear in newspapers.

Another 17 percent are in Sunday newspaper supplements, and 15 percent are in magazines.

Those most used come from inside packages and from direct mail.

REFUNDS

Manufacturers say that only 27 percent of all households "send in" for refunds--with such "nuisances" as saving packages or filling out forms.

However, some people call themselves "refunders", and they make a hobby of this activity--the receiving of money for their "trouble".

GUIDELINES FOR REFUNDS

For consumers who want to "try their hands" at

mail refunds, here are two guidelines:

--Save every label you can scrounge up--then be careful to send in the correct portion of a package's anatomy.

--Scan newspapers, the grocery market and packages themselves for refund offers and forms.

Home Economics Extras

(1) For young children who like to draw on walls, attach some paper to a piece of board and stand it up like a wall to draw on.

They may just like to draw on a vertical surface.

(2) When cleaning windows, use a newspaper--it does a better job of cleaning than a cloth or paper towel.

(3) For an easy-to-make substitute for buttermilk, add one tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice to a cup of sweet milk.

Then let it stand for five minutes before use.

(4) Use clear nail polish to repair small rips in window screens.

Dab on enough to create a film across the opening.

(5) If a carton of USDA-Graded eggs is labeled "large", all the eggs together must weigh at least 24 ounces.

Individual eggs may vary slightly in weight.

Local Properties Honored In Land Heritage Program, Austin

Three Mills County properties will be among those honored in the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program this year, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

County farms and ranches in the program are the Duncan Farm established in 1860, and owned by Mrs. T. E. Duncan, Goldthwaite; the E. A. Duren Home Place, established in 1878, and owned by Amy Warren Duren, Goldthwaite; and the C. C. Duren Home Place, established in 1878, and owned by Ralph E. Duren, Mullin.

The honorees have been invited to attend the Awards

Ceremony, to be held November 1, 1978, at the Joe C. Thompson Conference Center, located on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin. Dr. L. Tuffly Ellis, director of the Texas State Historical Association, will deliver the welcome, and Commissioner Brown will make the Awards address.

Brown will also present the certificates affirming the fact that the properties have been maintained in agricultural production for at least 100 years by members of the same family.

Participants will have time to tour the nearby LBJ Library before the ceremonies begin at 1 p.m. County judges and county

Historical Commission chairmen have also been invited. "These persons have been very helpful to the Department in locating the families whose land qualifies," Brown said. Over 1,200 Texas families have been honored since the program began in 1974.

In addition to the official certificate, each family will receive copies of the Family Land Heritage Registry, Vol. IV, which will contain background information on each of the some 134 farms and ranches honored for 1977-78. These will be published in January, 1979, and will also be distributed to high school and public libraries across the state.

VA Updating Present Income Information

Inasmuch as the Veterans Administration is updating income information and medical expenses, all Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non service pension will receive an annual income questionnaire card with their October check, which they will receive November 1st.

This does include those pensioners who have not in previous years received a card. This will include veterans over 72 years of age and children receiving pension in their own behalf. It is imperative according to J. D. Robertson, Jr., County Service Officer, that Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non service pension immediately contact the Social Security Administration and/or any agency from which they are receiving retirement benefits.

According to the County Service Officer, it is imperative the right amounts be reported in order that the beneficiary can receive the correct amount of pension. It is also imperative the beneficiary have with them when they bring the annual income questionnaire card to the County Service Officer, the total amount of medical expenses which have been paid during the year 1978, and which have not been reimbursed. These expenses

include doctor, hospital, dental, drugs, hospitalization premiums, glasses and cost of nursing home care.

Completion of the annual income questionnaire card will be mandatory by the recipients, or benefits will be terminated effective January 1, 1979.

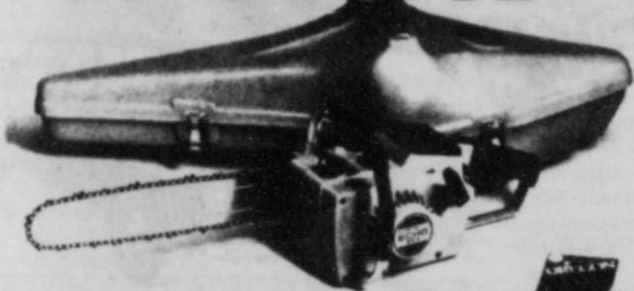
