

General Election Set Tuesday, Nov. 7th

The General Election will take place in Mills County on Tuesday, November 7th. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Mills County voters will cast their ballots in the twelve (12) voting boxes. This includes the absentee voting box. The voting precinct, locations, and judges are as follows:

Precinct #1, Baptist Youth Center, Robert Butler; Precinct #2, Senior Citizen Building, Ray Standley; Precinct #3, Mount Olive Baptist Church, Mrs. Glen Love; Precinct #4, Center City Methodist Church, Walter Tubbs; Precinct #5, Star School Building, Maurine Soules; Precinct #6, Zion Lutheran Church in Priddy, Earnest Kohler; Precinct #7, Democrat Church, Mrs. Cleo Hodges; Precinct #8, Community Center in Mullin, James D. Mays; Precinct #9, Goldthwaite High School, Myra D. Holland; Precinct #10, Big Valley Baptist Church, Mrs. Jack Davis; Precinct #11, Ridge School (House in Ridge, Mrs. Glenn Nichols; Precinct #12, Absentee, County Clerk's Office, Mrs. James Knight.

The absentee voting box is already open. Absentee voting will close three days before the election.

The candidates in the U.S. Senators race are Robert (Bob) Krueger, Democratic Party; John Tower, Republican Party; Luis A. Diaz DeLeon, Raza Unida Party; and Miguel Pendas, Socialist Workers Party.

Candidates for U.S. Representative, 11th Congressional District, are Marvin Leath, Democratic Party and Jack Burgess, Republican Party.

In the governor's race, candidates are John Hill, Democratic Party; Bill Cle-

ments, Republican Party; Mario C. Compean, Raza Unida Party; and Sara Jean Johnston, Socialist Workers Party.

Bill Hobby, Democratic Party; Gaylord Marshall, Republican Party; and Andrea Doorack, Socialist Workers Party, are the candidates on the ticket for Lieutenant Governor.

The Attorney General post candidates on the ballot are Mark White, Democratic Party; Jim Baker, Republican Party; and Agnes Chapa, Socialist Workers Party.

For State Treasurer, the candidates are Warren G. Harding, Democratic Party; and Derrick Adams, Socialist Workers Party.

The office of Railroad Commissioner is being contested by Mack Wallace, Democrat; and Jana Pellusch, Socialist Workers Party.

Democrats and Republicans are the only parties running for the office of Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term). They are John H. Poerner, Democrat; and James W. Lacy, Republican.

Those unopposed on the ticket for offices are Democrats Bob Bullock for Comptroller of Public Accounts; Bob Armstrong, Commissioner of General Land Office; Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner of Agriculture; Joe R. Greenhill for Chief Justice, Supreme Court; Franklin Spears for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1; Sam D. Johnson, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; Charles W. Barrow, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3, (4 year unexpired term); and Robert M. Campbell, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4 (2 year unexpired term).

Also unopposed on the Democratic Party ticket are Wendell A. Odom for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; Sam Houston Clinton, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2; and W.C. (Bill) Davis for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3.

Also on the Democratic ticket, Stan Schlueter is unopposed for State Representative, 43rd District; Mrs. Warren B. (Laura) Tynes, unopposed for member of the State Board of Education, 11th District; and John C. Phillips, unopposed for Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 3rd District.

On the local level, James Ledbetter is on the ticket for County Judge; Walter A. (Toby) Bryant for District and County Judge; Dee Harris - County Treasurer; W. G. (Bill) Bishop - County Commissioner, Precinct 1; Lewis D. Watson - County Commissioner, Precinct 2; Hawley B. Jernigan - County

Commissioner, Precinct 4; Ernest H. Thorne - Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1; and Anna Lou Schlee - Justice of the Peace, Precinct 6.

Congressional and Gubernatorial Candidates Represented —

Candidates Address Farmers & Ranchers At Farm Bureau-Sponsored Event

About sixty people were in attendance for the "Meet the Candidate" program Saturday night hosted by the Mills County Farm Bureau and sponsored by four counties - Mills, Lampasas, San Saba and Comanche.

Congressional candidates, Jack Burgess and Marvin Leath, were there to represent themselves, and gubernatorial candidates John Hill and Bill Clements were represented by Ben Sudderth and Omar Harvey, respectively.

The candidates and their representatives drew numbers for their place to speak, then each had six minutes before time was called. They then had one more minute to sum up. The audience wrote down questions, and then there was a question and answer period. Then the candidates and their representatives were given a final two minutes to sum up.

MARVIN LEATH ...Democrat

Marvin Leath, Demo. candidate for U.S. Congress, spoke first.

"I've spent most of the last sixteen years as a country banker in and around the Falls County area, and I would say that during that period of time, probably 80% of my business has had to do with agriculture in one way or another. I've given a great deal of thought down through those years as to how we might begin to solve and approach the solution to some of those problems that have figured into agriculture for so long, but that have become so much more critical recently.

Anyone who thinks that the farmer, and particularly the row crop farmer, can compete in our economy under the same set of opportunities as the banker or the gas distributor, or any other business for that matter, just simply has not looked at the facts as they really are. In the economic poker game, the farmer is most always playing against a stacked deck.

We no longer have a farm problem in this country; we have a farm crisis. Farm income, between 1960 and 1975, went up less than 150%, where in that same period of time, debt on farm real estate went up 425%. Debt on farm machinery and equipment went up 380%; operating expenses went up over 300%. Two-thirds of our farm families today could not stay in business if they did not have outside, non-farm, income.

The farmer is really the only business man that I know that stands to lose 100% of his investment. He has no way to control production. He cannot market his product 12 months out of the year. He does not have

control over that marketing, because he's at the mercy of a few people who buy those commodities, and at the mercy of the Federal Government, who, in most instances, sets the policy for that market.

Farmers want control over their own destiny, not at the mercy and whims of the Secretary of Agriculture or the Secretary of State, which is so often the case. I totally agree with that philosophy, and I'll work diligently to help farmers achieve that goal and have that opportunity."

BILL CLEMENTS ...Republican

Omar Harvey, who was Bill Clements campaign manager in the primary election, was the second speaker:

"Bill Clements is what this country is all about, when you come right down to it. He started in the depression with nothing. He got a football scholarship to SMU and soon dropped out and went out to the oil fields and started working day labor - roughnecking, to help his family meet the bills. As things got a little better, he borrowed some money in 1948, and bought two old, used, broken down, drilling rigs. And from that very humble start, Bill Clements built the largest drilling contracting company in the world. He's a drilling contractor; he is not in the ownership, exploration, and production of oil. In 1972, Bill was asked to go to Washington as Deputy Secretary of Defense. He served in that position for four years. In that job, he excelled in every way that can be measured. He is a man of very wide and good experience - business experience, business budgetary control, and personnel management.

Quoting from Bill Clements, Harvey said, 'Depressed farm income is a serious problem with farm production costs continually being driven upward by government - caused inflation and over-regulation. The long range solution to this problem can best be met through a vigorous exportation policy rather than through government regulations and restrictions. If true net profits are to be long lasting, they must be achieved through prices obtained in the market place and not prices dictated by the government.'

Bill Clements strongly urges that every possible means be used to increase the exportation of agricultural products. He recognizes that farmers and ranchers need some immediate relief while these long range goals are being met.

One of the greatest problems for farmers and ranchers has been the increased burden

of taxation. Bill Clements testified before the Special Session of the Legislature advocating the Proposed Constitutional Amendment which would allow agricultural land to be fixed at productive value or market value whichever is the lower.

I think it boils down to this: How long have we been asking, when will a man of recognized business experience - a successful and experienced executive give his time and talents to serve the people of our state and country? Bill Clements is that kind of man. It would be a shame and real tragedy for this state if we pass up the opportunity to have a man of his capabilities in Austin."

JOHN HILL ...Democrat

Ben Sudderth, former State Representative of this district and a former county prosecutor, and senior member of his law firm in

Comanche, was the third speaker. He represented John Hill.

"John is the finest man in the state of Texas. He's the finest man in politics that I have ever known, and I've been knowing politicians, and being around them and associated with them for the greater part of my life.

John's father was in the oil tank cleaning business. John cut his teeth from the time he was a teenager crawling in oil tanks when the temperature was 110 degrees and cleaning that oil out of those tanks. If you think that won't make you appreciate a dollar, then you haven't had the experience that John has had. Everything that John has, he's made; he's made it the hard way.

In 1966, John was appointed Secretary of State. He went to Austin and immediately severed himself from all business connections so he could devote his full time. He

Jody Conradt To Address

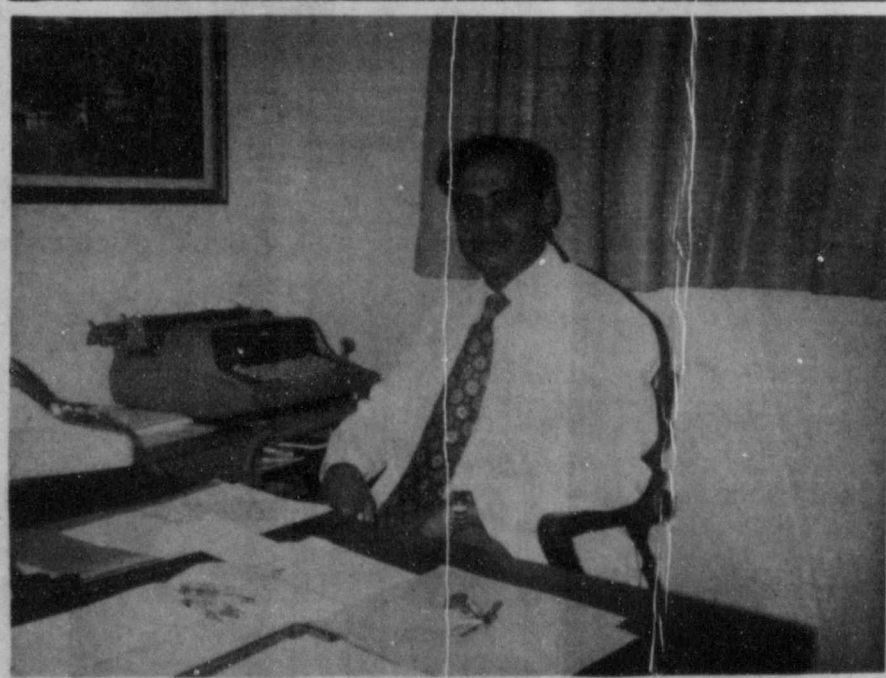
Lions Club November 7

Executive Committee Of CTCOG Approves 6 Grants

The Executive Committee of the Central Texas Council of Governments met Thursday, October 19, 1978 in Belton and approved six

grant applications totaling \$2.5 million. Included in the applications were four from the Central Texas Manpower Consortium asking for a total

of \$2.2 million for employment and youth service programs. The other applications included one from Burnet County Juvenile Probation Office asking for \$30,350 from the Texas Criminal Justice Division for probation services; and one from the Hill Country Community Action Association Inc. requesting \$266,283 for a full-year, part-day Headstart Program. The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare would be the funding agency.

As a regional governmental council the Executive Committee has review authority over all grant applications going to the state or federal governments. The council gives either favorable or unfavorable comments on each application.

Some priority recommendations include Bell County Automated Records System Project, \$16,613; Hamilton County Investigative Unit, \$10,303; Copperas Cove Police Community Relations and Crime Prevention Unit, \$40,591; Harker Heights Juvenile Probation Department, \$1,090; Bell County Juvenile Facility, \$200,000; Mills County Jail Renovation Project, \$40,000; Central Texas Youth Services Bureau Option House, \$56,000; and Milam County Investigative Unit, \$11,815.

In still further business Thursday, the committee appointed a Human Resources Advisory Committee consisting of Mrs. Linus D. Frederick of Copperas Cove, Coryell County Judge Doug Smith, Bell County Tax Assessor Tolly Moore, Mills County Judge James W. Ledbetter, Copperas Cove City Councilman Ken Moseley, Hamilton Mayor Les Hamilton, Milam County Commissioner Lavert McKinney, San Saba County Judge Jim Baker and Lampasas Mayor James

Hoffpaur. CTCOG has recently signed a contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources to provide planning and coordinating functions in the area and the committee will be charged with reviewing those actions before they are reported to the executive committee. The December committee meeting has been cancelled.

If you're wondering when middle age begins, it's begun.

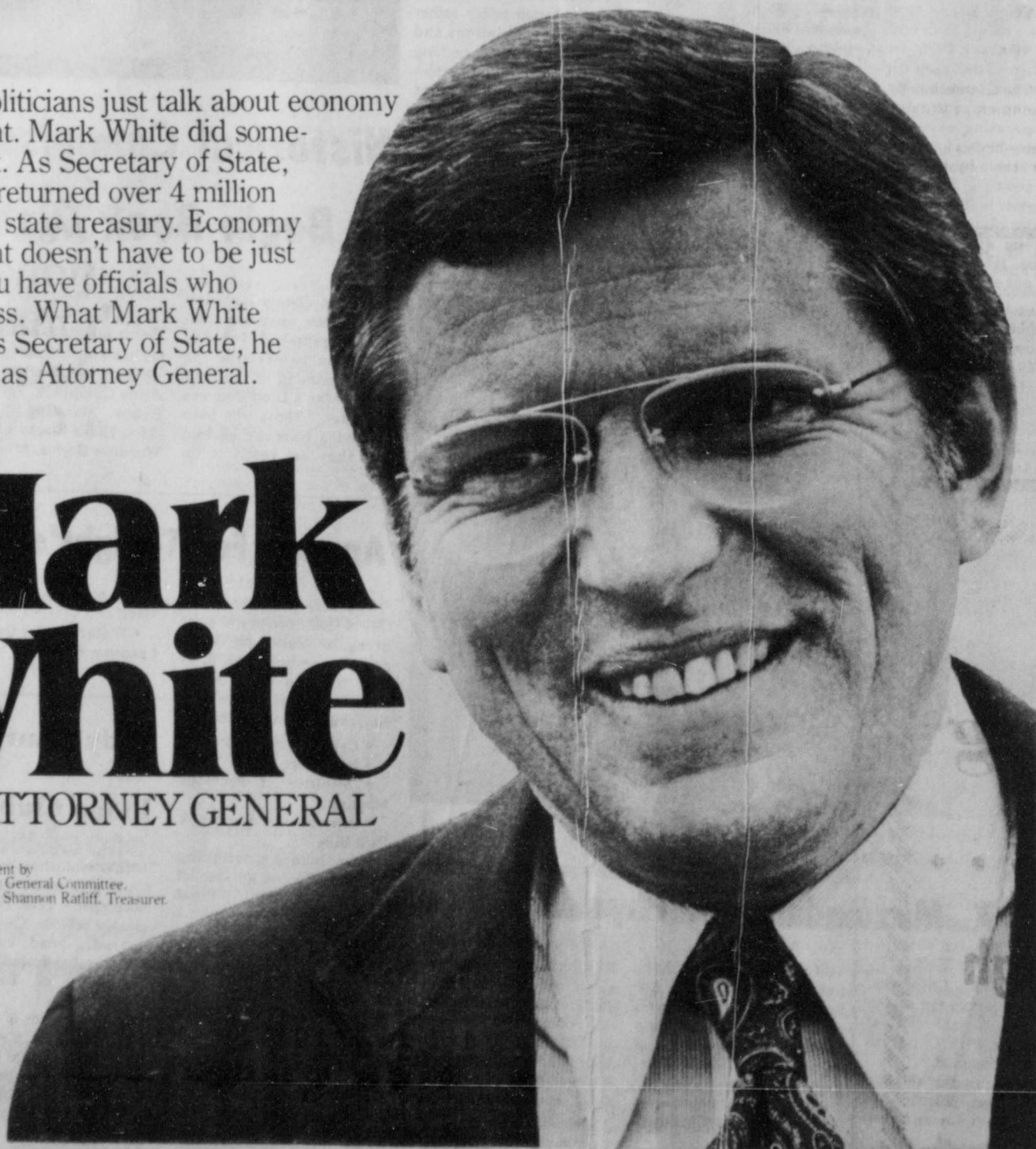

Annie Brim's Prized Quilts On Display Here

In 1968, Mrs. Jim (Annie) Brim entered two quilts at the Texas State Fair in Dallas - one in the quilt division and the other in the bedspread division. She won first place blue ribbons on both.

Mrs. Brim's family has graciously placed these quilts on display in the Mills County Historical Museum changing case, along with many other pieces of her delicate needlework. Mrs. Brim's daughter, Mrs. R. L. Steen, Jr., is displaying various pieces of her mother's crochet, including quilts, a very old piano scarf and a beautiful ecru tablecloth.

Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Steen, Sr. and Mrs. Jim Brim were early day settlers in Mills County and played an important part in the

founding of the City of Goldthwaite. Mr. Steen owned and operated Steen Hardware for many years and became well known in this area because of his ability to tool leather. The store is now owned by his son, R. L. Steen, Jr. Mr. Brim was a mechanic and automobile dealer in Goldthwaite in the days of the Overland car.

Included in the Steen and Brim displays are old family and business pictures, hand-tooled leather by R. L. Steen Sr., an electric light bulb still burning after fifty-two years, a camphor bottle used by Mrs. Steen's grandmother, Mrs. I. M. Ward, and Mrs. Ward's family Bible over seventy years old.

The changing artist case, now featuring watercolors by Mrs. Charlie McLean, will

change at the end of this week and show oil paintings by Mrs. Floyd (Jo) Spradley. Mrs. Spradley has taught art in Goldthwaite for several years.

For an array of landscape color from spring flowering bulbs such as crocus, snowdrops and winter aconite,

planting must be done this fall.

Except for tulips, spring flowering bulbs should be planted in October and November so they have ample time to develop a good root system. In Central and South Texas, tulip bulbs should be refrigerated at 35 to 40 degrees F. until mid-December for longer stems and good flower development.

For best results, plant bulbs in clusters around tree trunks and shrubs in a natural woodland setting or rock garden. Grouping bulbs of the same color together in mass plantings produces the most effective landscapes.

The general rule is to plant outdoor bulbs so the top is below the surface as about twice the diameter of the bulb. They should be planted in well-drained soil of average fertility to achieve blooming over a period of years. Bulbs prefer a sandy loam soil in a sunny area.

A few choice bulbs can be set aside for indoor forcing. Crocus, grape hyacinths, daffodils, tulips and hyacinths are good for indoor use. Bulbs should be potted as soon as they are available in equal parts of soil, peat and sand on top of one inch of gravel. The tips of large bulbs should be showing above the surface while small bulbs should be barely covered with soil.

Store newly potted bulbs at 40 to 50 deg. F. for six to ten weeks, then place them in a cool semi-lighted location. Gradually move them to a sunny location for good growth and color. Most bulbs will be flowering in January, and pre-cooled or pre-treated bulbs may bloom by Christmas.

Chris Smith tacked on one extra point conversion.

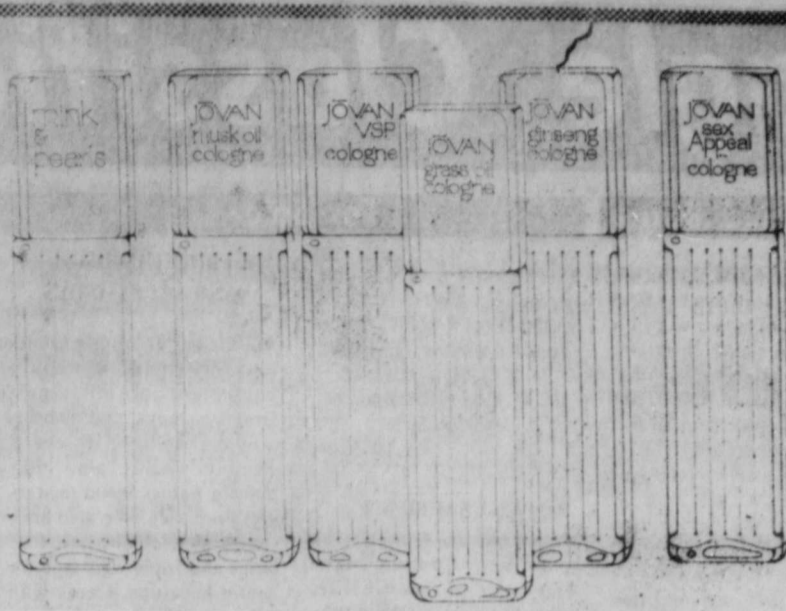
The 6th, 7th, and 8th grade team was also victorious, defeating Richland Springs in a close 47-44 decision.

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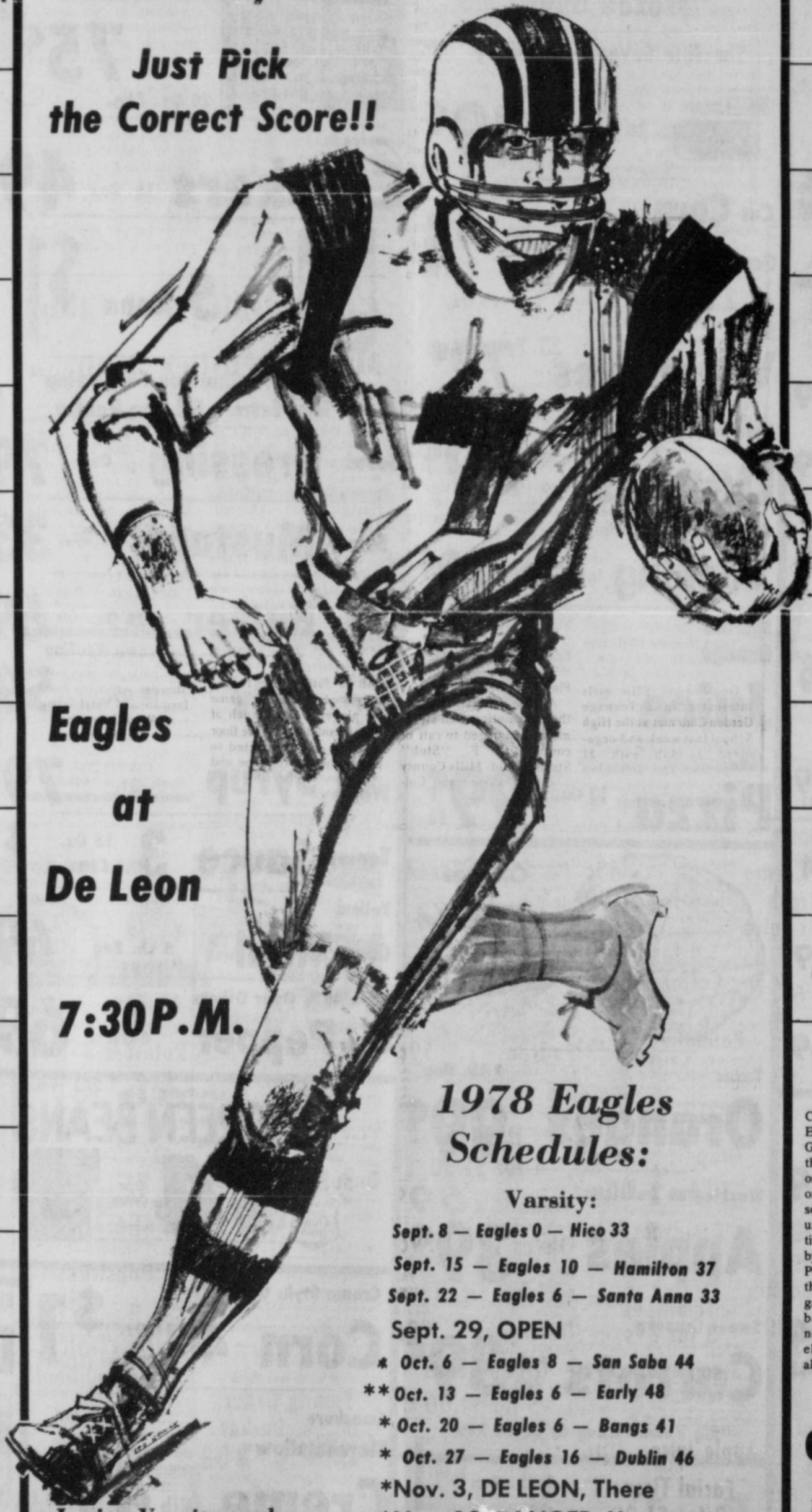

Sheep & Goat Raisers Industry News

Good-neighbor stock hauling deals can get a fellow in trouble. Out of necessity, many gooseneck trailer owners have been hauling stock part-time for pay. The necessity is often that of helping neighbors whose loads can't attract a bigger rig, combined with the necessity of getting enough service out of the gooseneck to justify its cost.

Whatever the reason, a lot of these good-neighbor haulers have recently found themselves paying out considerable premiums to their local peace justices because the man who patrols the highways discovered that they had no legal permit to haul for hire.

These permits, known as Specialized Motor Carrier Certificates, are issued by the Texas Railroad Commission and are not to be had on a whim. Many would-be haulers who've tried to get them have given up on the often difficult and expensive

endeavor and either quit hauling or resigned themselves to paying fines.

It's not that the permits themselves cost so much -- a total of \$25 for filing fees and \$11 per vehicle for registration -- in fact, that expense is as little as a tenth or twentieth of what some fines have reportedly cost.

The real expense comes in, apparently, when an application is protested by already established haulers. Answering a protest means appearing before a hearing examiner in Austin, proving the public necessity of the desired permit, etc. A certificated hauler must also carry RRC-approved insurance, maintain certain records and follow established rate tariffs.

These last three items in themselves are not overly unreasonable or prohibitive, but added to the hassles and expense of battling a protest, they're enough to convince many part-time small-load haulers that fines are friendly by comparison. The end result? A lot of extralegal hauling.

Cooperative efforts by the TS&GR, the Texas Farm Bureau and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn., may be shedding a little different color of light on the subject, however. Representatives of the three groups met recently with RRC officials to seek a solution to what's come to be called the "gooseneck situation".

The outcome may not be apparent right away, because it involves no regulatory, legislative or interpretive change by the RRC. What the commission did offer was a suggestion, and it's one of those pleasant cases where a simple suggestion may eliminate the need for a difficult change.

What the RRC suggested was that prospective applicants voluntarily restrict their own hauling authority. A standard permit might

allow a hauler the right to use any size of equipment, move unlimited loads and serve a broad territory when all he really intends to do is pull an occasional gooseneck load to the local auction. It's generally best to get all the authority you can when the price is the same anyway, but such a broad request is sure to generate protest from established competition.

The RRC suggests instead that applicants specify that their authority be limited to such vehicles as gooseneck trailers and that their operating range be limited to their own local area. Other restrictions might include prohibitions against hauling to or from commercial feedlots or packing houses, limits on the number of head of stock hauled in one load and limits on the number of loads to be hauled in one day.

These limitations, again, are not mandatory, but may be handpicked by an applicant at his own choosing. In fact, he himself must request that they be applied against him. The RRC simply says that the more restrictions, the less chance of a protest; larger volume truckers know all too well that they can't service the small loads and have no logical reason to protest competition from a fellow who's been obviously restricted out of competition at his own choosing.

There are no reported plans to lower minimum insurance requirements or alter tariff compliance. The insurance coverage required, however, does not appear out of line anyway, and one RRC spokesman says special low-volume rate tariffs could be considered upon request.

In short, the situation is not perfect, but the outlook is rosier. The Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Assn. has application forms available and would be willing and eager to assist low-volume livestock haulers who wish to apply for permits.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. To Issue Antlerless Deer Permits

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for portions of Mills County on Tuesday, November 14, 1978 at the County Courthouse in Goldthwaite. Hours of issuance will be 8:00 a.m. to Noon, and 1:00 - 5:00 p.m.

(Only one day). Permits will be issued to landowners, or the landowners agent. Agents receiving permits are reminded to bring a letter of authorization from the landowner. In those areas where antlerless deer permits will

be issued the bag limit will be 3 deer - no more than two bucks. In areas not receiving antlerless deer permits the bag limit will remain 2 bucks only. Deer season opens on

November 18, and runs through January 1, 1979. P&WD biologists will be on hand at the above date and place to answer any questions that persons eligible to receive permits may have.

Energize the family's wardrobe for colder temperatures indoor and out. Winterize by wearing garments that are close fitting at neck, sleeve, waist, leg and other normal openings. Tight fitting garments are not warm because they reduce circulation as well as comfort.

wool, silk, mohair, poyesters with special comfort finishes, furs, and wool-like fibers such as many acrylics are warmest. Garments worn in light-weight layers that trap insulating air pockets are warmer than one heavy-weight garment. Full length and multiple layers of socks, mittens and

gloves, mufflers and scarves and snug hats or caps warm the extremities. Extremities such as feet, hands and the head - especially for those with circulatory problems - may feel cold faster since the body works to keep vital organs warm and may at times sacrifice other areas.

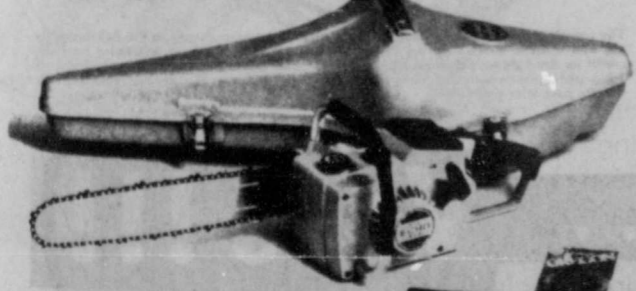
Infants and young children, older adults, the handicapped and those with cardiac and circulatory conditions have greater need when adapting comfortably to cooler temperatures.

Infants feel temperature changes more rapidly than adults and rely on adults to dress them properly.

Young children need guidance in choosing garments that don't weight them down too much to hinder posture or active movement or interfere with personal safety.

Older adults and the handicapped may not be as active and since body activity warms the body, they may feel cooler and need to dress more warmly.

Some of the topics discussed were National Health Insurance, Federal Government Health Planning, Arab Oil Interests, Cheap Food Policy, State Agencies putting a value on our local land property, the Gold Standard, FIFRA, OSHA, Increasing Exports, NEA, Deficit Spending, and Public Financing of Campaigns.

Over-The-Counter Drugs
May Cause Malnutrition--

Malnutrition can occur when people take over-the-counter drugs without consulting a doctor first.

When people self-prescribe drugs and buy them "over-the-counter," they risk allowing those drugs to interfere with the body's use of nutrients.

Some "Self-prescribers" also risk added reactions if they already are taking a doctor-prescribed drug, since many drugs are not safe when taken together.

DRUGS, EFFECTS

Following are some over-the-counter drugs that do affect the body's nutritional status:

- **ANTACIDS**
These drugs interfere with the body's ability to absorb nutrients. Excessive amounts of antacids can cause a Vitamin D deficiency.

- **LAXATIVES**
These also interfere with

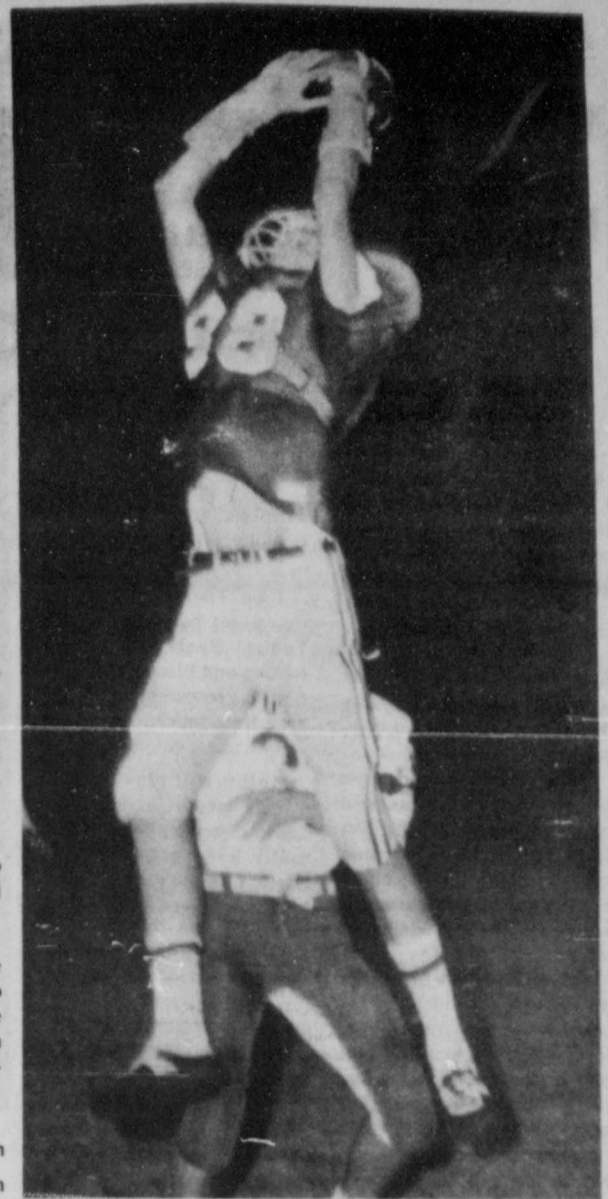
These also interfere with the body's ability to absorb nutrients. An excess of laxatives can lead to multiple nutrient deficiencies -- especially a potassium deficiency.

- **ASPIRIN**
If taken with already-prescribed sulfa drugs, aspirin can change the body's process of absorbing food.

- **APPETITE SUPPRESSANT**

These drugs, of course, can cause a loss of appetite, but they also may act as a stimulant to the central nervous system or they can cause nausea in some cases after food is eaten -- which can keep the body from using even the small amounts of nutrients that were consumed.

Also if these drugs are misused by parents who give them to children for hyperactivity, they may stunt the child's growth.

Extension Highlights

Rather than burning leaves or hauling them to the dump this fall, why not use them for a compost pile? The resulting compost will provide a good source of organic matter for potted plants, for topdressing the lawn, and for building up the soil in flower beds, shrub borders and vegetable gardens.

A simple method of composting leaves and other vegetable matter is to alternate four-to-six inch layers of vegetable matter such as leaves or grass with two-to-four inches of good garden soil. If available, add manure to the soil layer. Make the compost pile four to six feet wide and any desired length depending on material and space available.

Sprinkle a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter to hasten decomposition. Use about one-half pound, or one cupful, of any good commercial fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the

compost pile should be soil and the surface of the pile should be dish-shaped, forming a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter thoroughly before adding the soil layer. This is especially true when composting leaves as they can be extremely slow to decompose if too dry. Water the pile thoroughly when completed and add additional water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy.

Turn or mix the compost with a garden fork or shovel every three or four months. This aerates the material and speeds up the composting process. Most compost should be ready to use in six months to a year. The use of commercially available compost activators will reduce the time required for decomposition only if used according to directions.

Well prepared compost can be used anywhere peat moss is used and is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and other organic material.

today. Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the state of Texas.

Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

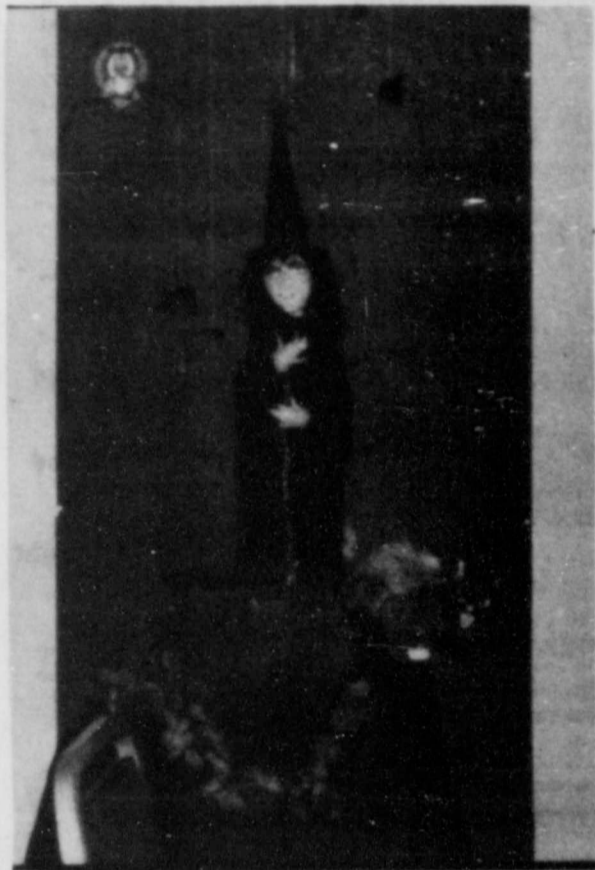

AUSTIN—The State Coordinating Board for Colleges and Universities says Texas institutions of higher education must slow their expansion and emphasize quality.

In a 142-page report, the board said no more new public colleges or universities should be established, and that some existing programs are due a critical look.

"Substantial support will have to be maintained and perhaps even increased for colleges and universities already in operation . . . if high quality is to be sustained . . ." the report stated.

The study concluded: Enrollment increased less than one per cent in both public and private institutions last year and will increase only 16.9 per cent in the next 10 years.

Student expenses at public colleges increased from \$1,972 five years ago to \$2,829 today.

State funds going to higher education increased 354 per cent—from \$676 million to \$2.8 billion in a decade.

The board further recommended that the Permanent University Fund and the state property tax should be used for renovating and reconstructing buildings. The funds are now available for new construction only. The University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M University at College Station

are now sole beneficiaries from the PUF. Seventeen state colleges benefit from the ad valorem tax.

Save \$48

The tax relief constitutional amendment on the November 7 ballot would save the average homeowner about \$48 a year in property taxes, according to Texas Research League.

The League estimated savings would vary from \$10 to \$75 annually, because of the exemption on the first \$5,000 of homestead values

from school taxes. According to the League, 15 per cent of homes would be exempted from paying any school tax, and in 50 districts 90 per cent of homes would be exempt.

Net result: a \$104 million reduction in school taxes.

The legislature also allowed the legislature to provide an additional \$10,000 exemption to disabled homeowners and those over 65, which amounts to another \$16 million a year reduction. And new tax breaks for agricultural land would cost 589 districts about \$48 million while 353 would gain \$15 million a year.

Grant Offered

Texas Air Control Board was offered a \$2 million federal grant to work up a new state plan to control pollution.

The grant would come from the Environmental Protection Agency and amounts to nearly a quarter of the total board budget. It is linked this year to the required "state implementation plan," which must be developed by January 1, and a transportation control program.

An auto inspection-maintenance program is required for areas which cannot meet federal ozone standards by 1982.

Air Control Board members have grumbled about refusing to accept strings-attached federal aid, but EPA officials predicted the grant again will be accepted.

Courts Speak

A divided Texas Supreme Court upheld its earlier decision supporting the Public Utility Commission's method of determining the telephone and electric rate base.

In another case, the court refused to remove a Houston law firm from a suit by Howard Hughes relatives against the Hughes Medical Institute's claim to be the only heir of the late industrialist.

Appeals directed the state to pay cities of San Antonio and Floresville \$611,000 in back taxes paid under protest to the Public Utility Commission.

Court of Criminal Appeals held possession of the antibiotic tetracycline is not an offense.

The same court also affirmed two convictions in an alleged murder-for-hire case in Houston.

The Supreme Court stuck with its earlier finding which denied a fired Southwestern Bell Telephone Company executive damages against the company.

The high court set a November 29 hearing on a Matagorda County woman's suit to force Comptroller Bob Bullock to issue a \$82,597 check to pay a judgement against the state in an auto accident.

New Appointments

Gov. Dolph Briscoe named A. Sam Waldrop of Abilene

to succeed Charles E. Simons of Dallas on the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

Briscoe also appointed W. O. Bankston of Dallas to the Texas Water Development Board and Zack Thomason Burkett Jr. of Graham to the Texas Industrial Commission.

Another major recent appointment was that of Judge J. W. Summers of Rusk as Chief Justice of the 12th Court of Civil Appeals.

Short Snorts

A 12 per cent decline in new Texas manufacturing plants was reported for the first nine months this year, compared with 1977.

Applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests in Texas totalled 15,779 during the first nine and a half months of 1978. The 1977 figure for the same period was 18,675.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted the

first bag, possession and minimum size limits imposed on taking of spotted seatrout by sports fishermen. Daily bag limit is 20, possession limit 40 and minimum size 12 inches.

Jerry L. Zucker of Pinehurst is new general counsel for the State Bar of Texas.

Ten applications for per-

mits to sell \$17.3 million in securities were filed with the State Securities Board last week.

Texas Ranger Sgt. Jack Dean of Waco has been promoted to captain and made commander of Ranger Company D in San Antonio.
