# Eaglettes Take 3rd Place In Lampasas Tournament

The Goldthwaite Eaglettes defeated Leander 65 - 30 in their season opener on Thursday. Sheila Vaughan led all scorers with 14 points, followed by Ruth Ann Johnson with 13, Melanie Vaughan 10, Angela Beavers 8, Carrie Gray 7, Cynthia Berry 4, Stephanie Landrum 4, DeAnna Henry 3, and Dedra Long 2.

Ruth Ann pulled down 11 rebounds and made 3 steals; Melanie had 9 rebounds and 4 steals; Angela had 6 rebounds and 1 steal; and DeAnna had 5 rebounds and 4 steals.

The Eaglettes braced themselves for second round play against the always tough Lampasas team. In the past three years, Goldthwaite has played Lampasas 6 times with each team winning 3 games. The margin of difference in six games has been 10 points.

Friday, Lampasas jumped to a 20 - 10 first quarter lead by hitting 10 of 12 field goals. Goldthwaite could only connect on 4 of 12 field goal attempts and 2 of 4 free throws. This quarter proved to be too disastrous for the Eaglettes to overcome.

Ruth Ann went on to connect on 6 of 10 field goals and 10 of 11 free throws for a game high of 20 points. Melanie threw 3 of 9 field goals and 2 of 5 free throws for 8 points. Angela made 3 of 6 field goals and 4 of 6 free throws for 10 points. Cynthia and DeAnna scored 4 points each, while Sheila contributed 3 points.

Ruth Ann cleared the boards 9 times and accounted for 3 steals and 4 assists. DeAnna had 6 rebounds and 2 steals, followed by Melanie with 5 rebounds and one steal, Cynthia with 4 rebounds and one assist, Angela with 5 rebounds and 3 assists, and Sheila with 3 steals and 5 assists.

With 31 seconds remaining, the score was tied 48-48. The Eaglettes missed the go-ahead shot and Lampasas cleared the board. Lampasas scored, and Goldthwaite turned the ball over. Lampasas stalled the ball, and Goldthwaite fouled in an attempt to steal the ball. Lampasas went to the free throw line sinking both free throws to clinch a 52-48 win.

Those who saw the game saw the best game of the tournament. Goldthwaite will re-match the 3-A Lampasas Badgerettes on December 28th, 3:00 p.m. in the Goldthwaite gym.

The Eaglettes defeated Copperas Cove for third place - 43 to 34.

Ruth Ann scored 17 points, got 8 rebounds, made 5 steals and had 4 assists. Melanie scored 9 points and had 6 rebounds and 2 steals. Angela scored 7 points, had 8

rebounds, 2 steals and one assist. Sheila scored 7 points, had one steal, and 2 assists. Cynthia scored 2 points, had 5 rebounds, one steal and one assist. Tina Studer scored 1 point and had 1 steal. DeAnna had 6 rebounds.

Youth activities during the convention will include the Discussion Meet finals on Sunday, Nov. 26. The State Talent Find contest will be the same evening. The District Farm Bureau Queen will participate in the State Queen Contest on Monday night, November 27.

All homeowners and commercial pecan growers are encouraged to enter samples in the Mills County Pecan

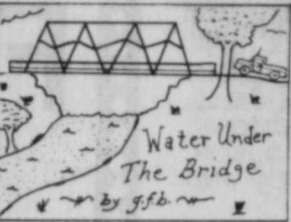
Show set for November 27 and 28.

All samples should be submitted to the County Extension Agent's Office no later than 9:00 a.m. on November 27, 1978. Processing of entries will be conducted on the 27th and judging will be held Nov. 28th.

A sample entry consists of 50 pecans of the same variety from the 1978 crop, submitted in a paper bag and labeled with the growers name, address and the variety of the pecans. If the

variety name is not known, it will be classified during judging. There is no limit to the number of samples each grower may enter. There is no charge and the show is open to all growers, both homeowners and commercial regardless of race, color, sex or national origin.

The small producer and commercial pecan grower are encouraged to enter the show.

The class meets at the Mills County State Bank Community Room at 9:30 each Sunday morning, and is open to all denominations.

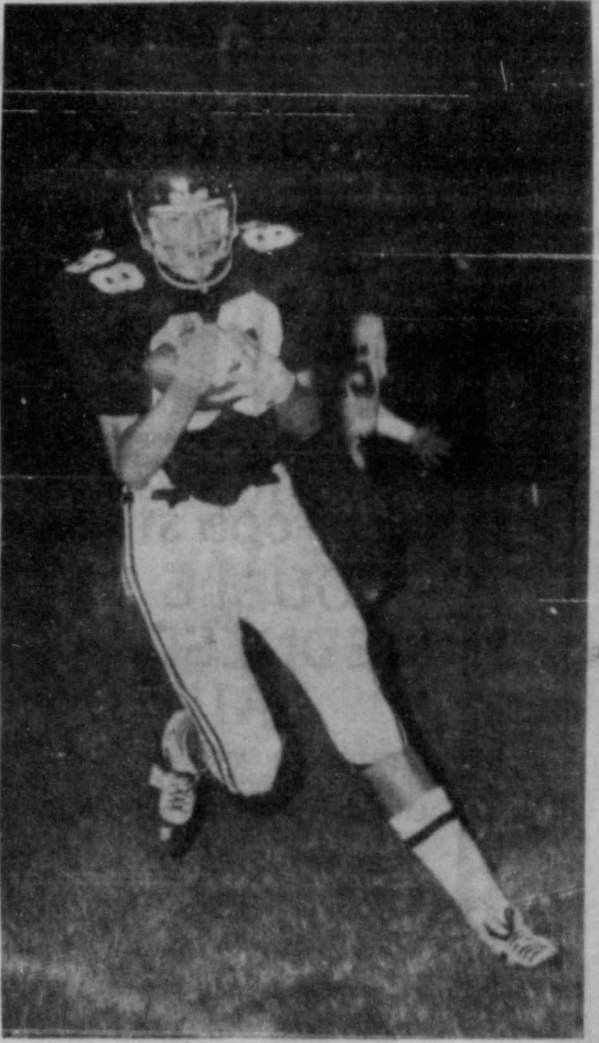
Some "short snorts" gathered around Mills County following the opening of the 1978 deer season:

## Highway Patrol Investigates 13 Traffic Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 rural traffic accidents in Mills County during October, 1978, according to Sgt. Smith, supervisor for this Highway Patrol Sergeant Area. These accidents resulted in no deaths and 7 injuries.

The total rural traffic accidents for Mills County for this year is 102, which have resulted in no deaths and 37

injuries. The twenty-four counties that comprise Hwy. Patrol Dist. 6-B have had a total of 5054 rural traffic accidents this year which have resulted in 182 deaths and 2579 injuries. This compares to 4859 accidents, 148 deaths and 2572 injuries reported during this same period last year.

### G. H. Tiemann 90th Birthday; Open House Sat.

There will be an open house to honor Mr. G. H. Tiemann on his 90th birthday on Saturday, November 25, 1978, from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m., at the Zion Lutheran Church Parish Hall in Priddy.

Mr. Tiemann has been a long time resident of Priddy. His parents came from Vestfeld Germany in 1881 and settled in Washington County, where G. H. was born in 1888. He had four brothers and four sisters.

G. H. spent his first 14 years in Washington County. Here he attended school in a one room schoolhouse. The school was held in the church with the pastor being the teacher. He says he never got a spanking, but he did have to stay in several times for throwing love notes to his girl friend, Minnie Drucehammer. G. H. does remember one fight. He and his friends had to walk about 3 miles home each day from school, and one afternoon he and Roy Stegemoller's daddy got into a fight and G.H. hit Mr. Stegemoller over the head with his dinner bucket - and he ruined his dinner bucket.

After the Galveston storm, the family moved to Priddy in 1902. The furniture was moved in box cars and most of the family came by passenger train, but G. H. and his brother, Fritz, drove to Priddy with a wagon and team, moving all of the stock the family possessed.

Wonderlust took hold of G. H. after he moved to Priddy and he spent a couple of years in Copperas Cove with the William Meyers and then moved to Wichita Falls for a year. Meanwhile, Minnie Drucehammer and her family moved to Priddy. G. H. and Minnie had been corresponding through letters and in 1911 G. H. moved back to Priddy to marry his childhood sweetheart. To this union were born four children - Freida (deceased), Eleanor (deceased), Edna (deceased), and Pete. His wife of 54 years was taken from him in 1965. He now has 11 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

In 1915, G. H. took his young family to Eden for four years. He said he made 65 bales of cotton in 1919. He sold the first bales at 14 cents a pound and the last 35 bales brought 35 cents a pound. With a little money in his pockets, he moved his family back to Priddy, where he went into the ranching and farming business. After three years of raising goats, sheep and a few cattle, the bottom dropped out of the market and Mr. Tiemann lost all the money he had and he went gray headed overnight.

He started trading mules and horses and he again was making a little money. G.H. broke horses for sale and he

said he can remember being bucked off once or twice. He would drive the mules and horses to market and would spend the night in the wagon in the wagon yard if he could not make the trip in one day. He and a friend were in business together and at one time they had about 65 mules. "The big boys from the North would come to Texas to buy mules, so we made a little money," stated Mr. Tiemann. With the money he made he leased 600 acres of land and went back into the ranching and farming business. In 1929 he bought his first parcel of land from his brother, Charlie, for about \$7.00 an acre. He and his family worked hard and when they got one piece of land paid for, they bought another.

Mr. Tiemann says the best horse he ever had was Old Buck. Old Buck was just a good-natured riding pony. He bought Buck when the horse was a 3-year old, took him home, and put his granddaughter on his back and led the horse around the place. Buck served G. H. well for about 30 years.

G. H. Tiemann was a home body. When asked about the longest time he was away from home he said, "I went with Bill Shipp several times to take cattle to market in Ft. Worth and I was gone overnight, but I was never away from home much. I had too much work to do."

That last statement really tells the story of G.H. Tiemann. He spent his lifetime doing hard work, rearing a loving family, going to church, being a civic leader and helping his fellowman.

So his family would like for all his friends to come to the open house to honor him for a lifetime of giving.

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## Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Weekly Report

We're not quite sure what they mean, but apparently they aren't either. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service published a recent notice in the Federal Register to the effect that cost-share money will not be provided in the future for production-oriented projects.

The decision is an outgrowth of the 1979 agricultural appropriations measure, a portion of which states that assistance will not be given on practices that are "primarily production oriented or that have little or no conservation or pollution abatement benefits."

So far, however, no one is saying just what previously-funded practices will be

eliminated. The stated purpose of the Federal Register notice is to outline the decision and to invite comment.

Even after the comment period is over, ASCS says it plans to carry out the order not by binding regulations but by means of "guidelines, criteria and procedures." These guidelines are expected to be published as concrete proposals soon, with final decisions to come about the first of the year.

As long as the thing is up in the air anyway, it probably would not hurt to do a little speculating about what types of practices are likely to be ruled undeserving.

We could start with brush control — millions of federal dollars are spent annually to assist in brush control programs. Production oriented? You bet — decreased brush cover means more forage and more carrying capacity as well as infinitely easier operation. In this case, however, the conservation and pollution control benefits are just as obvious; on the most basic level, more forage is inherently desirable from a conservation standpoint and also helps reduce stream and river pollution by cutting back on erosion and runoff.

Fences, stock watering facilities (pipelines, wells, tanks, etc.)? Most definitely production oriented, all of them. At the same time, though, each offers definite conservation and pollution abatement benefits, particularly when they make it possible to improve grazing practices.

There are other measures eligible for cost-share assistance, but the odds are each has its role to play for conservation (or it wouldn't be there in the first place, right?) and pollution abatement (in itself an integral part of conservation). In the end, the fellows who will have to draw up the guidelines have a thorny job in front of them, assuming that they look at each practice objectively.

The Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association suggests that they be given as much constructive help as possible. 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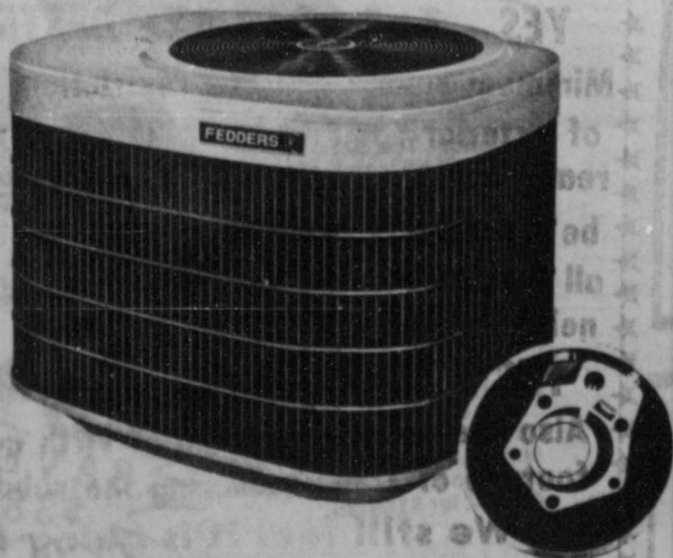

Highlight of the occasion was the unveiling of Clark's portrait, painted by Muriel Havran, a student of the world renowned portraitist Dmitri Vail of Dallas.

The establishment of an annual endowed Don Clark Scholarship for a student in the School of Agriculture at Texas Tech was announced. Established as an encouragement to 4-H & FFA youth, showing at the State Fair of Texas, to further their education in the livestock industry of Texas. The scholarship is a first for the State Fair of Texas.

Clark, a native Texan from Cross Plains, whose livestock career began as an FFA member and a member of the high school livestock judging teams, received his BS degree in Agricultural Education at Texas Tech University in June 1949.

During his four years in Mullin teaching Vocational Agriculture, he started helping Future Farmers interested in showing purebred livestock at the major livestock shows of the state. He found this to be his first love. This brought him to Dallas as the assistant manager of the Livestock Department of the State Fair.

When Ray Wilson, Managing Director of the Livestock Department, retired in 1973, Clark was named to this position which includes promoting and advertising the Pan-American Livestock Exposition, Junior Livestock Show, Horse Shows, State Fair Rodeo, Agriculture, Poultry and Youth activities.

He has developed new breed promotion programs and brought national shows to Dallas. The latest event on the drawing board to be featured in 1978 is a "milk derby" for the five dairy breeds. Producing dairy cows will be competing not only on volume of milk produced, but quantity of protein and other nutritional component yields in relation to body weight of the competing breeds.

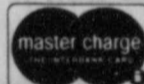

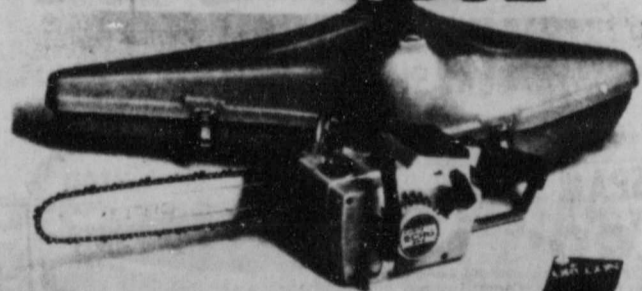

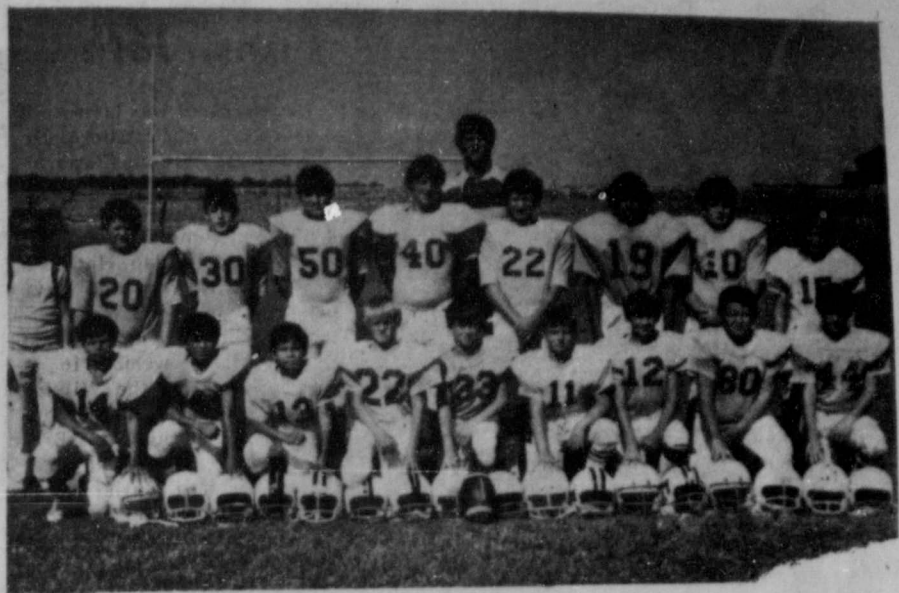

## Services Held For Mrs. Lois Calvert

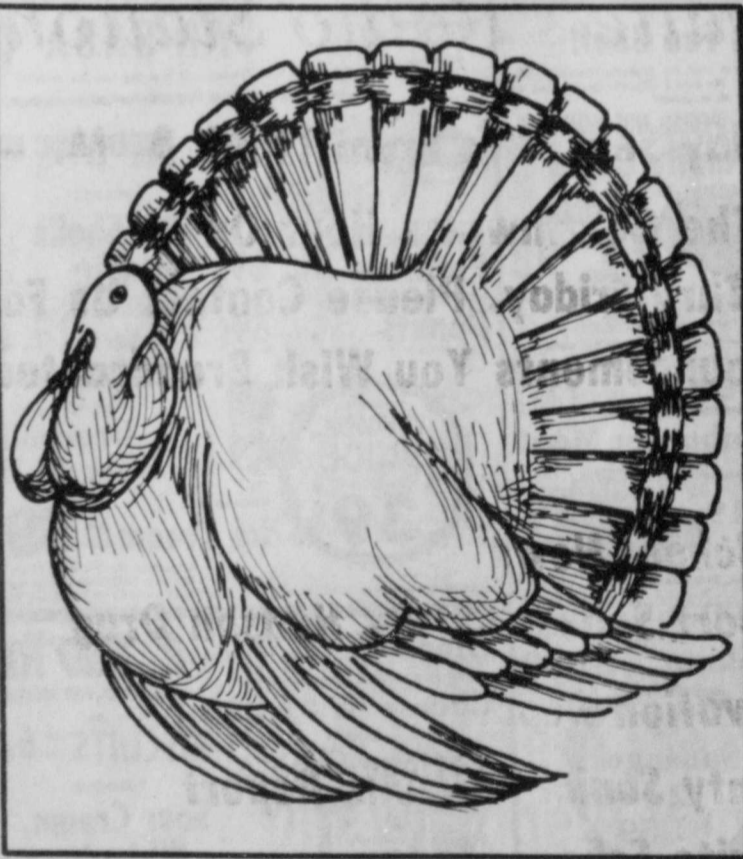
Mrs. Lois Allen Calvert, of Houston, Texas passed away Thursday, November 16, 1978 at Houston.

# State Capitol Highlights

**AUSTIN**—New Governor-elect Bill Clements this week began working on plans for taking over the state chief executive's office in January. Clements upset Democrat John Hill in the general election for the most monumental Republican gain of the century at the statehouse level.

Republican U.S. Sen. John Tower also edged back for another term. Tower and GOP State Chairman Ray Barnhart of Houston hailed the Clements victory as the harbinger of a two-party Texas.

"It's now respectable to be a Republican in Texas," commented Barnhart. "More Republicans will be elected next year—especially at the court-house level."

But while the GOP captured one prize it hadn't been expected to get, its gains were modest in congressional places and the state legislature, and Jim Baker lost his bid for the attorney general's office.

Tom Loeffler, young Kerrville rancher-attorney, defeated Democrat Nelson Wolff of San Antonio in the 21st congressional district.

Dr. Ron Paul, who once held the 22nd district seat briefly, ousted Democratic incumbent Bob Gammage of Houston.

The GOP's legislative gain totaled only three seats. Actually there are four new faces among the Republican House delegation in Austin, but a new GOP representative, Dr. S.L. Abbott of El Paso, lost to a Democrat.

### Judges Named

About the time U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen recommended lifetime appointment of 10 Texans to federal courts, Gov. Dolph Briscoe named nine to Texas state appellate courts.

Briscoe appointed Henry Doyle of Houston, James Warren of Huntsville and Jim Wallace of Houston to the First Court of Civil Appeals; Spencer Carver, Charles Storey and Joe Bailey Humphreys of Dallas to the Fifth Court of Civil Appeals; and George Miller, Paul Pressler and Felix Salazar Jr. of Houston to the 14th Court of Civil Appeals.

Nominated by Bentsen for the new federal judgeships were Barefoot Sanders of Dallas, Gabrielle McDonald of Houston, Mary Lou Robinson of Amarillo, James De-Anda of McAllen, George Kazen of Laredo, George Cize of Houston, Norman Black of Houston, Robert Parker of Longview, David Belew of Fort Worth and Ted Butler of San Antonio.

The nominations add up to the largest number of federal judgeships ever picked at a single time in Texas history. An omnibus court bill signed last month created 117 new federal district benches over the country.

### Guards Move On

There is a 60 per cent turnover among Texas prison guards, in part because of low salaries and lack of promotion opportunities, Texas Research League said in a new study.

The League suggested better pay, improved training

and a chance at supervisory jobs might curb the exodus. Texas has 11 inmates per guard in its prisons, while the national average is five-to-one. During night shifts, a single guard may be watching several hundred prisoners.

Most correctional officers in prison units are paid about \$848, and have little chance of advancing to supervisory ranks.

### Courts Speak

The State Supreme Court held the attorney general cannot file suit to knock out state agency decisions which they view as illegal.

The high court affirmed a state law which requires filing of paternity suits before an illegitimate child is a year old.

It found no reversible error in a lower court award of \$12,000 in accidental death insurance compensation to the widow of a San Antonio man who was shot to death.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a probation revocation order of a Hurst man where the judge was a temporary official who had not taken the oath of office.

The same court reversed murder convictions in Palo Pinto and Harris County cases.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals found the state not immune to prosecution in a case where a Runnels County motorist collided with a

highway patrol car which pulled out to chase a speeder without turning on red lights or siren.

The Court of Criminal Appeals held police men are not required to quote people they arrest exactly when reducing their voluntary oral confessions to writing. The decision upheld the 10-year sentence of a Jefferson County man in the death of his three-month-old son.

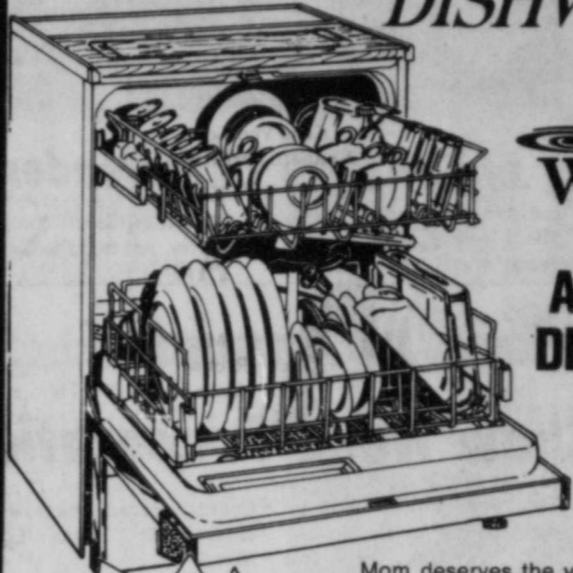

The categories will include "The Most Beautiful Tree" and "Best Overall Decoration". Awards will go to the first four places in Homes and the first two in businesses.

During the meeting held in the home of Mrs. Allen Campbell, a committee was appointed to work with the Museum in planning a planter for the Museum.

Other business transacted was the announcement of a Christmas Bake Sale to be held December 15 at the Mills County State Bank.

A Burning of the Greens is planned for December 31, at which time all residents of the city are invited to attend a bonfire, bringing their Christmas trees and other greens which

Presenting a program on "Composting and Trenching", Mrs. Delton Barnett told the group of the various methods of constructing a compost pile and the material that may be included, such as grass clippings, leaves, debris from the garden, and

garbage except for grease. Members shared ideas and experiences with the building and use of compost.

Mrs. Jack Elms spoke on "Texas Wild Flowers". She told of the many varieties, from the Oleanders of the coastal plains to the Evening Primrose of the Panhandle.

Mrs. Campbell gave gardening tips for November. She suggested that gardeners protect plants from an early frost, as often there were many frost free days after that initial frost.

Forced, potted mums may be replanted in the garden once the flowers have faded. Plant Pansies four to six inches apart in well prepared soil, keep watered and fertilized through the winter. It is not too late to plant bulbs, and is a good time to have your soil tested in preparation for spring gardening activities.

Hostesses for the meeting were Mmes. Campbell, V. Z. Cornelius, Herbert Cooke, and M. F. Stephens.

Normally, a doe deer in Texas will have her first fawn which is usually a single, when she is two years old. Then after, if food conditions are adequate, the doe should normally have twin fawns almost every year until her sixth or seventh year, when the reproductive rate will begin to decline. Triplet fawns are common, but do occur. Quadruplets have been reported.

The gestation period for deer is seven months.

According to reproduction studies, "old barren does," does that have never produced fawns, are infrequent and are no problem to deer herd management. The key to maximum production is an adequate supply of nutritious, natural food.

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## Bobcat Pelt Tagging Plan Set

AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved a system for tagging bobcat pelts taken in the state.

The tagging system, as authorized by the federal Endangered Species Scientific Authority (ESSA), will allow pelts harvested in Texas to be sold internationally.

The ESSA program allows Texas to tag an unlimited number of bobcat pelts during the 1978-79 season which runs from November 15, 1978 through February 15, 1979.

Trappers or hunters who wish to sell bobcat pelts taken in this state are required to bring the pelts to department locations which will be announced later. The animal's head also must be presented with each pelt. A limited number of the heads will be collected for research purposes and the others marked and returned to the trappers. All pelts presented will be tagged by department personnel, according to W.C. Brownice.
