The Goldthwaite Eagles punched their second half bid in District 10-A basketball with a 54-22 trashing of Cross Plains Tuesday night, Jan. 23. The Eagles posted a 6-1 record and finished second to powerful Dublin in the first half. The Eagles had little trouble with the Buffaloes as they sprinted out to a 25-10 halftime lead and jacked it to 36 after three quarters. Jett Johnson tossed in 23 points to pace the Eagles. Kenny Saathoff added 9 while playing only about 1 1/2 quarters. Score by Quarters: 13-4, 25-10, 40-16; 54-22. They then began to relax and the Dragons began to score. Bangs outscored the Eagles 14-5 during the rest of the game, but time ran out on the Dragons and the Eagles claimed a 44-38 victory. Kenny Saathoff led the Eagles in scoring with 17 points and in rebounding with 14. Johnson added 12 points and Jeff Stephens grabbed 9 more rebounds. Ed Welch was credited with a fine defensive effort. With the win, the Eagles are now 2-0 in the second half of district competition and 19-7 for the season. The second half looks like a

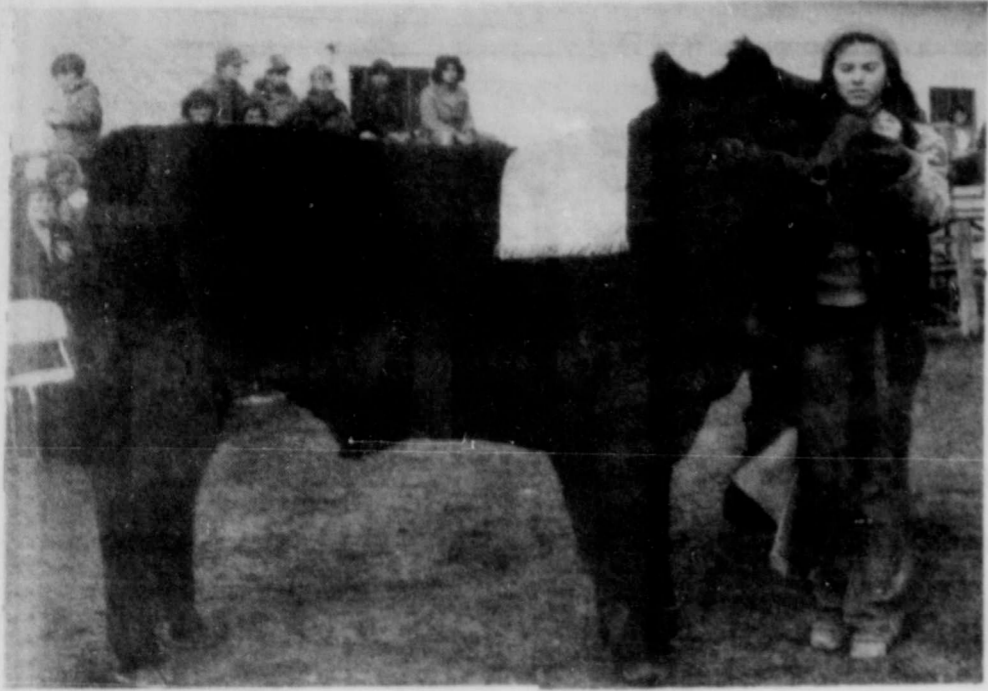

Farm Bureau Sponsors Fire Prevention Demonstration

Anything will burn and nothing is fireproof. This fact was brought out by David Bohac, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau. Waco, in a graphic animated fire prevention demonstration held January 29, 1979, at Goldthwaite Jr. High School, at the High School Auditorium.

The three things needed to start a fire - air - fuel and heat, brightly illuminated as Bohac plugged in the parts of his fire triangle board, using the flashing "FIRE" sign. He defined fire control as he removed, (one at a time), the three parts.

The audience witnessed the burning of steel (steel bolt); the loud shotgun-like explosion of one drop of gasoline and they say the burning burn inside the wall and in the attic of Bohac's model house.

With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes

both inside and outside the house and around the farm, Bohac gave applicable prevention and control suggestions. For fire control, he pointed out that many fires in the home, vehicles, equipment and other buildings can be extinguished while in the incipient stage; provided you have a U/L approved extinguisher of the correct size and type. "Recharge each portable extinguisher after each use", he added.

This very educational fire program was brought to the school under the sponsorship of the Mills County Farm Bureau. Sammy Padilla assisted Bohac as Junior Fire Marshall.

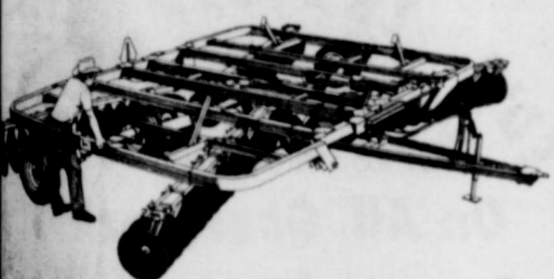

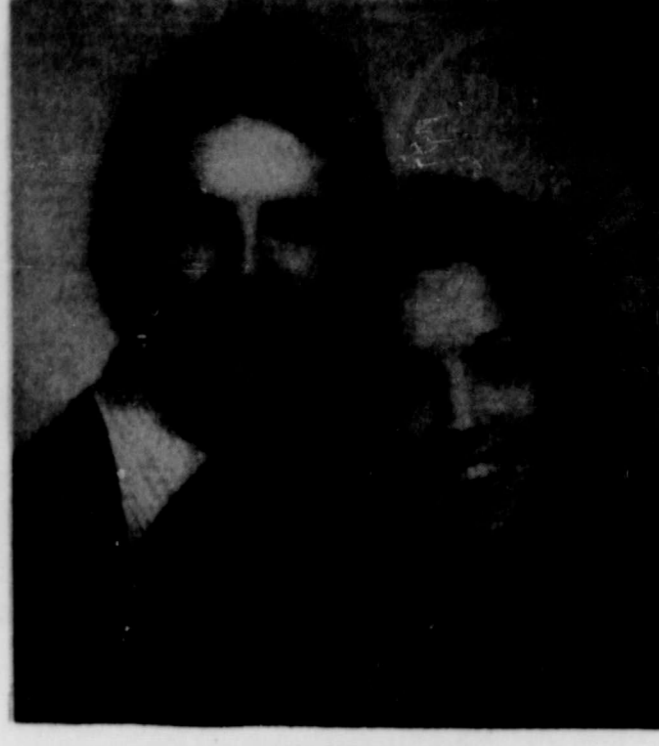

Letter To The Editor

October 1971 by an overwhelming vote of 354 to 57 in the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Equal Rights Amendment. It was followed by a state vote of 84 to 8 on October 22, 1972.

to become part of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was ratified by the Legislatures of 38 states before October 22, 1979.

view of the huge vote in favor of ERA in both the House and the Senate, 22 states ratified it in 1973, 8 states approved it in 1974, and only 3 in 1974. The big push to ratify ERA came from the American people who had a chance to learn what it was all about.

thousands of American women began a tremendous effort to stop the ratification. The offensive was led nationally by Mrs. Phyllis Schlafly, a wife, mother and author of a number of books on the issues of the day.

Congresswoman Bella Abzug seems to be the national leader of the pros. She introduced in congress the "Equal Rights" bill which would give it possible for Gay Men and Lesbians to mold the future of America's children in schools and in federally funded child-development centers. Other women leaders for the ERA include many of the most militant women's leaders in the country, such as Gloria Steinem, editor of MS Magazine; Jean Strasky, co-executive director of the National Gay Task Force; and Eleanor Smeal, new president of the National Organization for Women (NOW).

As of August 1977, a total of 35 states have ratified the Equal Rights Amendment in three states, Tennessee, North Carolina and Nebraska, have rescinded their ratification. Mr. Congressman I am presenting these facts to you so that you will sponsor legislation to rescind the vote on this important issue. Briefly, the "Stop ERA" women are informing State Legislatures and the general public what the ratification of the so-called Equal Rights Amendment means is:

Protective laws on rape and incest for women would be abolished.

Women would no longer be exempt from compulsory military service.

Various protections, benefits, and exemptions for women, wives, mothers and widows would be rescinded.

Fathers would no longer be held responsible for their children.

Sexual offense crimes against women would no longer be punishable.

If divorced wives earn more money than their ex-husbands, they could be forced to pay alimony.

ERA will eliminate co-educational schools and colleges, as well as fraternities and fraternities in high schools and colleges.

The federal government would have the power to force admission of women to military service equally with men, possibly force churches to admit women.

Police departments would be required to eliminate physical tests and to pass unqualified men to that they can be hired and promoted on a one-to-one basis.

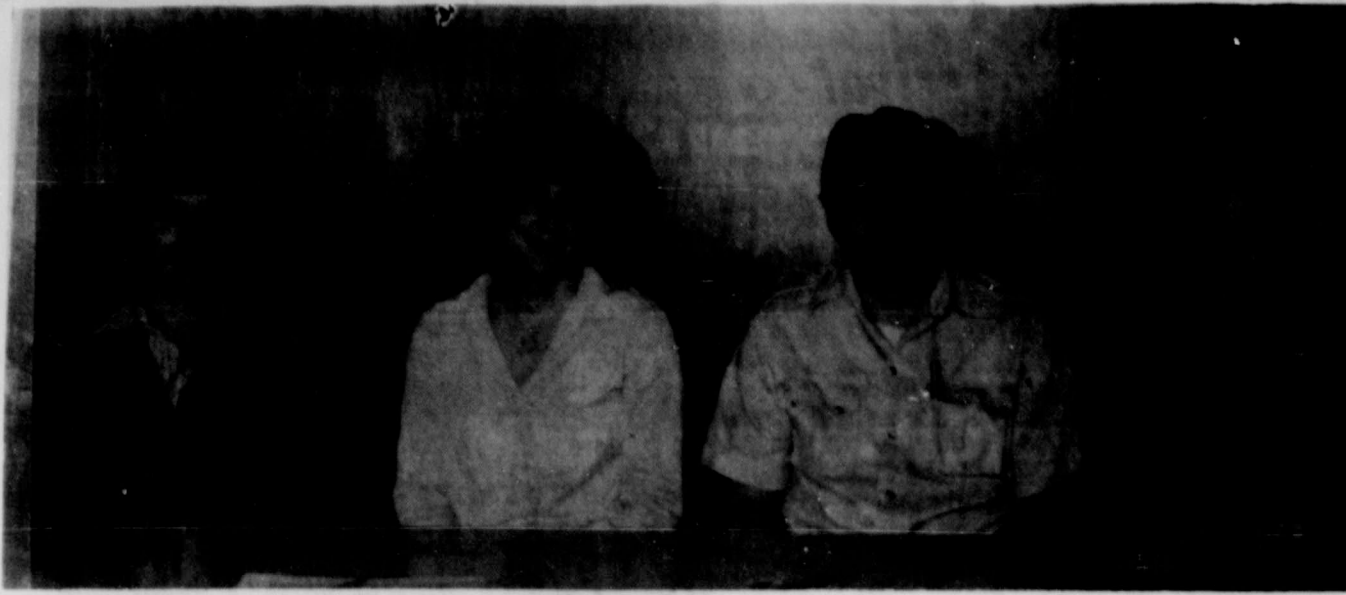

The Administration is up to the old tricks again of doing whatever it can to damage us rural folks.

President Carter has indicated that he will soon send to Congress a proposal to create a new Department of Natural Resources to replace the present Department of Interior, and a new Department of Community Development which would be built around the existing Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program.

As a part of this reorganization proposal, the u.s. Forest Service, all resource-related portions of the Soil Conservation Service, and the Rural Development Program would be stripped from the Department of Agriculture and transferred to the new Department of Natural Resources. Major functions of the Farmers Home Administration would be transferred from U.S.D.A. to the new Department of Community Development.

National policy adopted by Farm Bureau voting delegates last week at the National Convention reads in part as follows:

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture should continue to be a full cabinet level department. We shall vigorously oppose all efforts to rename it or consolidate it

with other department or agency of government. We will oppose efforts to remove any significant division or agency from U.S.D.A."

The proposed transfer of authority from U.S.D.A. would significantly weaken the Department, making it highly vulnerable to another proposal rumored to be forthcoming soon which would change the name of the Department of Agriculture to the Department of Food and Nutrition.

If the proposed transfer is approved, it is very unlikely that the new department of Natural Resources and Community Development would be as responsive to the needs of farmers and ranchers as the Department of Agriculture has been. No evidence has been presented to show that the proposed reorganization would result in less cost to taxpayers, more efficient use of manpower, or better service to agriculture.

The proposed transfer of authority, when submitted to Congress by the President, will become effective unless disapproved by either House of Congress within 60 legislative days.

We must let our senator and representative in Washington know how we feel about this false economy of creating new agencies to do the job of providing assistance to rural America.

Letter To The Editor

October 1971 by an overwhelming vote of 354 to 18 the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Equal Rights Amendment. It was followed by a vote of 84 to 8 on October 22, 1972.

It became part of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) which was ratified by the Legislatures of 38 states before October 22, 1979.

The ERA in both the House and the Senate, 22 states ratified it in 1972; 8 states in 1973; 8 states in 1974. The big push came in 1975 when the State Legislatures ratified ERA.

It is the American people's chance to learn what it is all about.

Thousands of American women began a tremendous drive to stop the ratification. The drive was led by Mrs. Phyllis Schlafly, a wife, mother and grandmother of a number of books.

Progressive Bella Abzug was the national spokeswoman of the pros. She urged in congress the "stop ERA" bill which would be possible for Gay Men and Lesbians to mold the lives of America's children.

Other women leaders in the ERA include many militant women's groups in the country, such as the National Organization for Women (NOW).

In August 1977, a total of 35 states have ratified the ERA.

Three states, Tennessee, Mississippi and Nebraska, have rescinded their ratification.

Mr. Congressman I am asking these facts to you so you will sponsor legislation to rescind the vote on this important issue.

Briefly, the "Stop ERA" women are informing State Legislatures and the general public what the so-called "Rights Amendment" means:

Protective laws on working conditions for women would be abolished.

Women would no longer be exempt from compulsory military service.

Various protections, such as exemptions for women, wives, mothers and widows would be abolished.

Others would no longer be responsible for their children.

Sexual offense crimes against women would no longer be punishable.

Divorced wives earn less money than their husbands, they could be forced to pay alimony.
