Spray For Casebearer

As best as can be determined, the spray date for pecan nut casebearer is May 24 or May 25.

The date will vary from one side of the county to the other. The best way to determine spray date for a particular orchard is to make daily inspection of trees and count 100 nut clusters, examining them for larvae entry holes. When 1 to 2 holes are found per 100 clusters, it is time to spray.

Use 80 percent wettable powder sevin and follow label instructions for mixing and handling.

The gym was imaginatively decorated and the highlight being slide pictures of students being honored flashing simultane-

ously on four screens set up at each corner of the gym. The chairman for the banquet was Win Welch, who coordinated the work of all the faculty, and many of the students, who worked diligently to make it a successful affair.

The central flower arrangement of gold daisies, bronze mums, and fern surrounding a ceramic eagle atop a gold column, was given, after the banquet, by the school to be used in the First Baptist Church services Sunday morning in honor of Kathryn Lewis, a Junior Student who is recuperating in an Abilene hospital from extensive injuries suffered in a car accident in April.

She was also given the Excellence in Teaching award for the Senior High.

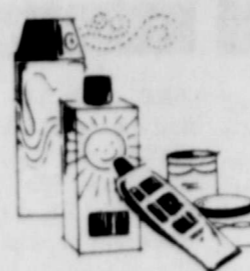

She also conducted a workshop for Dallas Association for Education of Young Children on "Effective Communication with

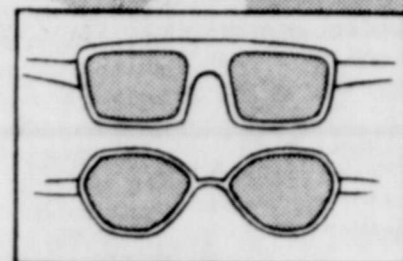
