Tables Gas Increase Request —

City Council Proceeds With Sewer Project

ALTHOUGH actual construction may be some months away, the new sewer treatment plant plan was approved by the Goldthwaite City Council Monday night.

The plant and the accompanying new lines and repairs, has been on the drawing boards for over six years, feeling the effects of "red tape" and engineering snafus. The bids on the project's construction will probably be opened

near the end of the year, with the first nails driven about the first of March of 1980.

This report was given the city fathers by Sammy Martin, representing Rady and Associates of Fort Worth, design engineers for the project. He presented the site drawings and all the pages concerning the compliance with government regulations.

ESTIMATED COST of the

entire proposition was set at \$660,000. This includes \$610,000 for actual construction, \$40,000 in closing engineering costs, and \$10,000 in inspection fees. A federal government grant program is supposed to stand good for 75% of the amount, leaving the local coffers to come up with about \$160,000. Part of the city's share can be made up in the use of equipment and manpower, Martin said.

The city voted to sell general revenue bonds to handle the bulk of the share locally when the planning

for a new plant was undertaken.

THE NEW plant would greatly increase the capacity and quality of sewer treatment for the city. At the present time, the city cannot discharge the waste water from the sewer plant into any public stream, and it must be used for irrigation purposes. Using the new plant next year, the water may be discharged directly into any stream that is handy because of its small amount of polluting materials.

The present system was built about 40 years ago and was designed to handle a lesser amount of sewage from about 500 people. It has greatly outlived its capacity.

LONE STAR Gas company had a representative at the meeting, presenting the utility's request for a rate increase.

The council tabled the request, pending further investigation.

According to the rate increase proposal, the entire method of figuring the bills will be changed, using a "customer charge" of \$3.00 monthly as a base charge. This would not be a minimum charge, and gas usage would be added to this amount each month. The \$3.00 would be billed if no gas was used. Under the present rate governing ordinance, the gas company does not charge the customer when no gas is used.

Lone Star is seeking a 9.52% return on its investment here, according to the proposal. The report says that only a 2.2% return is being made. The raise would bring in \$23,147 in new revenue.

ACTUAL GAS costs under the new structure would be less than at present, but due to the \$36 annual cost increase across the board, the income would be greater. It was the consensus of the council that the increase would be placing a heavier burden on the small user, and less on the large user. The gas should be paid for by those who use it, according to this consensus.

IN OTHER business, the council handled the following items:

• Heard from Mr. Grover Maddux of Goldthwaite concerning the charge levied to him for a \$150 sewer hook-up. This "tap" charge

is out of line, according to Maddux. He cited the presence of the line running across his property and that other cities do not charge so much, as his reasons for opposing the charge. Mayor J. D. Harper said that the charge figured on the basis of local operating costs and maintenance of the sewer system in Goldthwaite. The council took no action on the matter.

• Approved the regular monthly operations report of city business. The bottom line showed a balance of \$17,957 in the operations for July. This is due to the double electricity bill paid in June, and none was paid in July. Total collections for the month were \$63,711 and disbursements ran to \$45,734. City Manager Dale Allen presented the operations report.

• Opened the sealed bids on a 1963 International truck chassis. The high bid of \$455 from Ernest Jackson of Goldthwaite was accepted by the council. Three bids were presented, the Jackson one being the highest.

• Voted to approve the Emergency Operations Plan, as submitted by the Texas Highway Department, in cooperation with several local agencies. The plan considers measures to be used in the event of natural disasters, tornados, train derailments and others. It outlines what to do and where to go in the event of large accidents. Local Highway Department supervisor, Buddy Morgan was a key person in the compilation of the manual.

• Mrs. Roy Wilkins was nominated by the Goldthwaite Garden Club as a representative on the Library Board. She was nominated by Mrs. Hazel McCoy, president of the garden group. Mrs. Wilkins replaces Mrs. George Reese who resigned.

THE COUNCIL heard the regular monthly City Manager's report. It contained the following items:

• New personnel has been hired in the garbage department, due to vacancies. Personnel changes were discussed in the electric department, and to the clerical staff in the city office.

• Water has been hauled to Leonard Bros. Farm near Goldthwaite, for drinking water use. There will be no charge for the water, due to many past favors extended to the city by Leonard's. The farm has aided the city's pumping ability at the Colorado River on many occasions.

• Presented an update on the tax assessing and collecting for the future of the city. A county-wide appraisal board will probably be established and the city would not need a certified tax officer. A special meeting is planned for August 23, at 7 p.m. in the County Courthouse for all the taxing bodies of the county to get together to discuss the problem. The meeting will be attended by many of the city officials.

• The purchase of .66 acres of additional land at the sewer plant location was brought to the attention of the council. The increase will be necessary because of the larger plant to be built next year. The land is presently surrounded by ranching property controlled by Glenn Miller and L. B. Burnham. The ranchers "trade" the land for watering rites and water lines and pumps. This arrangement has worked well.

Hay Show Entries Wanted By Agent

The Mills County Crops and Livestock Subcommittee met recently and scheduled the first Mills County Hay Show, which will be October 10, 1979.

Entries for the show will be due in the County Extension Agent's Office on September 19, 1979. At this time, protein samples will be taken from each bale and each round bale sample for analysis. Actual judging of the sample entries will be conducted on October 10, Dr. George Alston, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will judge the show.

The only cost to producers entering the show will be a three dollar protein analysis fee. We wish to encourage all producers to enter the show. It is not necessary that you have excellent quality hay to compete. It is hoped that this activity will be educational, competitive and enjoyable for the producers.

During the actual judging on October 10, Dr. Alston has asked that producers be allowed to watch the judging and hear comments on the different samples.

Records Set At Angora Show And Sale Recently

The Texas Angora Goat Raiser's Association held its annual show and sale at Rocksprings two weeks ago, and it turned out to be a dandy, from all points of view.

The show witnessed an array of quality animals with the final judging coming in the sale, where records were set in every department.

The top buyer at the sale was G. W. Townsend of Bay City, who owns a ranch near Rocksprings. He bought 16 bucks for \$9,900. Other top buyers were: E.J. McElroy, Pecos, 11 goats, \$9,400; Fort Terrett Ranch, 6 goats, \$8,750, and Bill Karnes of Sonora, 10 goats, \$4,650.

The prices for the bucks averaged \$624, with the top ten averaging \$1,345, and the top twenty averaging \$1,097.50.

The does averaged \$472, with the top ten averaging \$787.50.

The total number of animals sold was 124 bucks and 30 does.

Ronald Beard of Goldthwaite was a buyer at the sale.

David Watters of Goldthwaite is the secretary-treasurer for the organization.

Watters said the interest shown in both aspects of the event, the show and the sale, was at a high pace the whole time, with breeders and buyers equally getting what they wanted in the

goats. The high prices and the wide range of the buyers, some from as far away as Missouri, were evidence to the success of the show and sale.

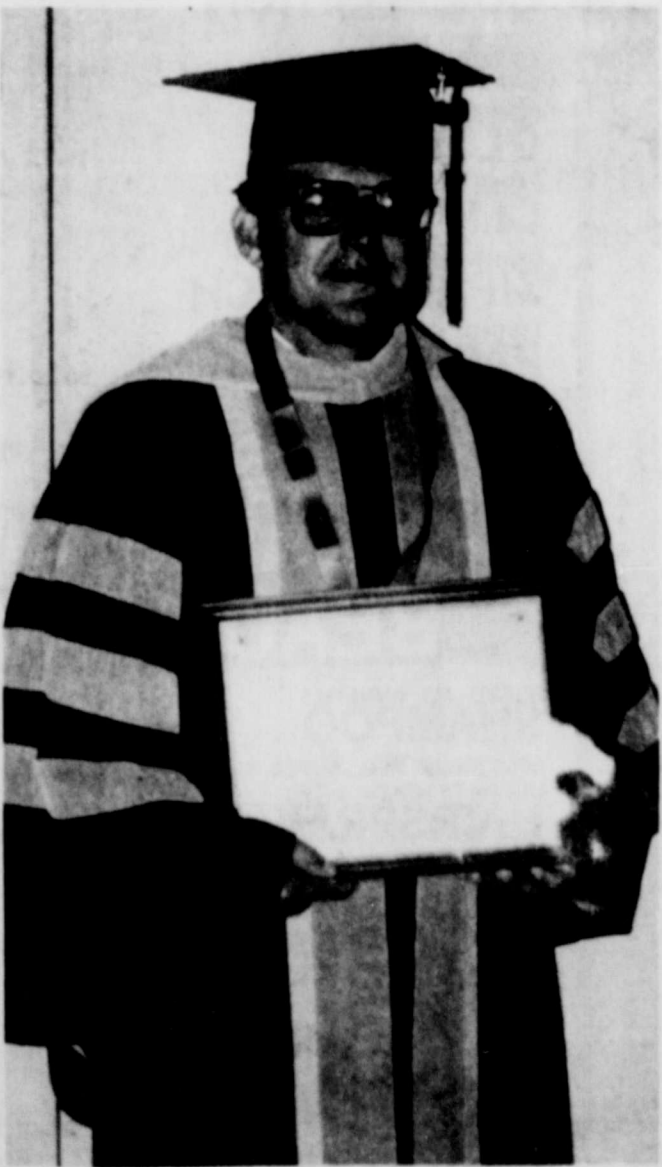
A team of program specialists from the Texas ASC Office, headed

If you haven't made your gulf coast fishing trip to date, you better start some plans. The King fish start to thin out as September and our first shipment of oil from Mexico arrives. I hope the officials in charge of this Mexican gas and oil exchange come up with a more feasible mode of transporting the next shipment. The Coast guard isn't getting very good yield from this first one.

The Summer and first

issue of the Cen-Tex sportsman featured a Texas coast fishing article (Big Mac Attack) that ended with a King fish being brought to gaff and plans for a July trip.

That trip started Friday, July 20, around 11:30 p.m. and as Tom Buford and I drove off the Port Aransas Ferry at 4:30 the following morning, I made a comment pertaining to the number of boats and unusual amount of activity during this time of the morning. We launched the boat and soon discovered our fishing trip had fallen right in the middle of the Port Aransas out-board fishing tournament. We stopped to get bait and inquired about the tournament with intentions of entering. But with a \$17 entry fee per person and 500 entries already on a growing list, we considered our chances slim to none and headed out. After two days of drift fishing, color change, trash line, oil rigs and shrimp boats, we had 256 pounds of King fish to clean but before we did clean them we made the mistake of weighing our four largest to compare with the tournament's entries. They weighed 40 1/4, 32, 23 1/2 and 22 pounds.

Just for the records the first and second place fish in the Port Aransas out-board fishing tournament King fish division were 37 and 24 pounds respectively. Needless to say, neither Tom or I spoke much of the tournament on the trip back to Brownwood.

August is the best month for off-shore fishing in the Gulf.
