City Council Stalls Gas Rate Increase

Gas Company met with the be cut and emergency Goldthwaite City Council for the second time in two months trying to get an increase started for users in Goldthwaite, and they will have to come back again.

The gas company is asking for an increase in overall income by 14%, citing last year as a test year to determine the rate increase. Lone Star is seeking a return to investor gear to get the thing of 9.2%. The accountants for the firm say that currently only a 2.4% return is being realized from the system in Goldthwaite.

THE PRIMARY means for the increase in operating revenue is a proposed customer service charge. The charge, if levied, would mean that every residential customer in the city would be assessed a \$3.00 per month charge for gas service. Commercial units would pay \$6.00 per month. This charge would be assessed, regardless of any gas used and would be paid every month. At the present time, when no gas is used, a "no bill" is issued.

THE COUNCIL voted to suspend the rate increase question for another 30 days, pending the gathering of more information on the subject. It was the consensus of the council that those using the gas should pay for it, and also that the current guidelines for anti-inflation warfare are set for 7% increases, not the 14% raise as seen by the gas company. The company has not had a and the council unanimously voted to pass on first reading an ordinance granting the company a rate hike from \$5.50 per month to television use. The firm has recently undertaken major improvements to the transmission lines covering the city, and worked on the overall system to improve service.

The council discussed an emergency override system with the owner of the cable business. The override would be used in weather or other emergencies to the city, which would require communication between law enforcement officials and citizens. No matter what channel persons would be

The system would be recommended by civil defense authorities, and the cost of the equipment will be the next concern for the council. The cable television personnel would be glad to install the necessary electronic operational, according to owner Bagley.

THE RATE HIKE for the Cable Television Company could go into effect in December if the Council passes the next two readings of the proposed ordinance. The motion for the increase was made by councilman Charles Childress and seconded by Allen Moreland.

In other council matters, the group voted to approve as presented the ad valorem tax roll for 1980. The total rendered taxes for the city was \$21,620,244.
