County Jail Topic Of Public Hearing Tues.

A public hearing is scheduled for October 30, 1979, at 7:30 p.m., in the District Courtroom of the Mills County Courthouse, to go over all the alternatives, financial, site and construction, concerning the Mills County Jail with any interested tax payers. Whatever decision is made at this meeting, or at a later date, could involve between \$200,000-\$300,000 expenditures out of Mills County funds.

All interested people with any ideas or comments are urged to participate in this hearing.

"If you care how your taxes are spent, here's an

opportunity to voice your opinion." County Judge James Ledbetter said.

The Commissioners Court was presented a bid of \$157,000 to refurbish the top of the present jail structure at a meeting last week. This figure was "much too high", according to County Commissioner Bill Bishop.

The tremendous expense of remodeling apparently

does not present a practical picture, as a totally new facility seems more feasible.

County jail prisoners are now kept at the Brown County Jail, with the mileage of Sheriff's Department vehicles and a daily fee to Brown County to be met. This method is not practical because of the distance and the expense incurred to the county treasury.

Lone Star Gas Proposal Taken; Rate Increase Groundwork Laid

The Goldthwaite City Council held a special called meeting Monday to review proposals made by Lone Star Gas Co. prior to granting of a rate increase to the gas utility.

A compromise agreement was discussed, with three varied structures.

The council agreed unanimously to accept proposal "A", which, if implemented, would give Lone Star a 10% increase in operating revenue.

The proposal centers around a \$3.00 customer monthly charge and a \$6.00 monthly charge to commercial users. This would be paid before any gas charges are assessed. The actual rate for the gas consumption was \$2.4975 per thousand cubic feet in the winter, and \$2.2475 per thousand cubic feet in the summer.

The proposal will be put into ordinance form and submitted at the regular

council meeting on November 8.

Lone Star had been asking for a 9.52% return to investor from the Goldthwaite system.

United Fund To Cystic Fibrosis

The Mills County United Fund has allocated \$100 to Cystic Fibrosis health centers to help with the research of this, the most serious lung-damaging disease of children. This disease is an inherited disorder, occurring when a child receives a gene for cystic fibrosis from both parents. Every five hours a child is born with this disease.

The symptoms include recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain, and a clubbing or enlargement of the fingers. This disease is still incurable, but often the lives of children are lengthened to mid-teenage.

Cystic Fibrosis primarily affects the respiratory and digestive systems. Most patients must take daily medication, including antibiotics and enzymes.

Donations to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation are used in two fields. C.F. was first discovered and diagnosed in 1936, thus it is a relatively new addition to the medical research field, so a portion of the budget goes for this. Research is carried out here in Texas at Baylor Medical School in Houston and the University of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston.

The second major area is the funding of C.F. Centers. There are 115 in the U.S. Those located in Texas include centers in Temple, El Paso, Austin, San Antonio, Dallas and Houston. These centers are staffed by physicians and other health care personnel. Many of the centers also accept patients suffering from asthma, chronic bronchitis and other lung diseases.

Carr's Cafe Written Up In Dallas News

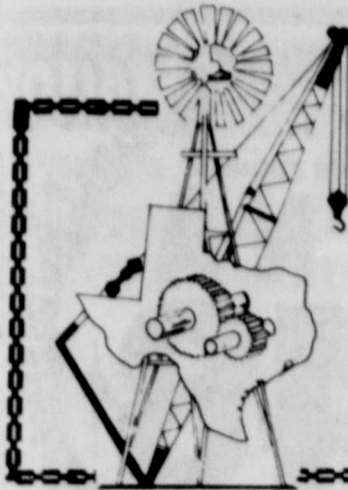

the Service's field staff. All of the estimates published by the TC&LRS are based on the data provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This cooperation provides the necessary data which is, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate estimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions.

Each farmer and rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

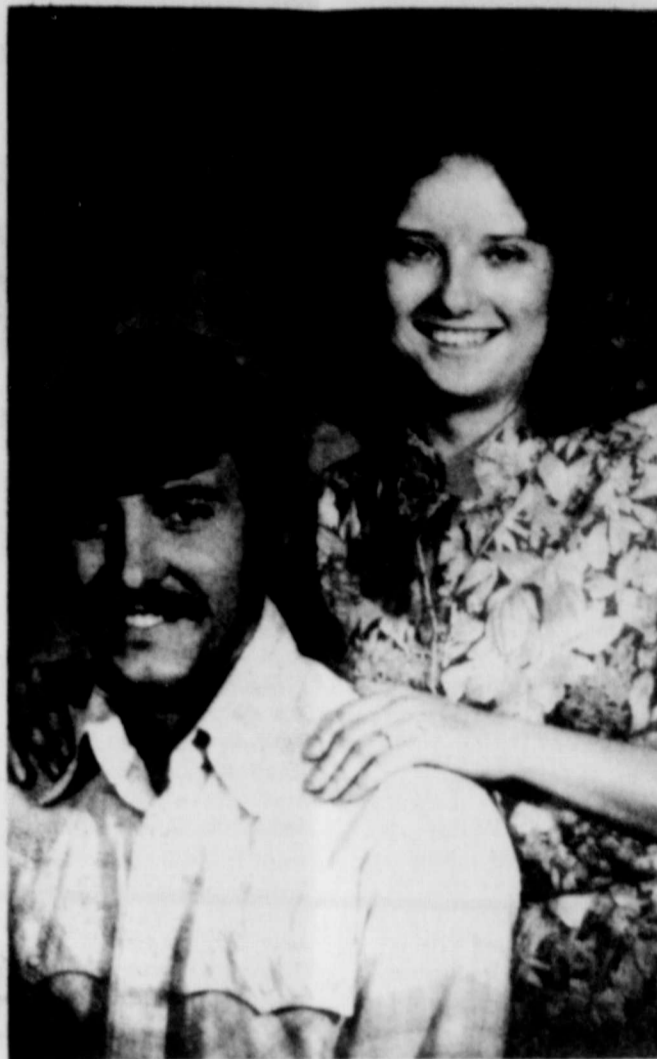

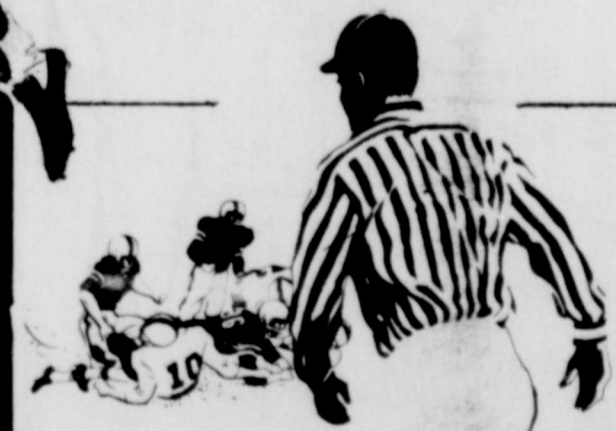
