City Council Passes Rate Hike Readings

Two rate increases were approved by the Goldthwaite City Council at its regular meeting last Thursday night. The primary item in the first reading by the council was a rate ordinance to be adopted. The increase would raise operating revenues of Lone Star for Goldthwaite in the amount of approximately \$3.00. The primary item in the second reading is a new "customer charge" of \$3.00 residential and \$6.00 for commercial gas users. The charge would be levied on any gas is counted. The Star says this will set the regular cost of meter reading and bookkeeping. The council instructed gas company representatives to prepare a study on the actual cost incurred if a meter could be stationed in the home on a full time basis. At the present time, meter reading and repairs are handled out of the San Saba office of Lone Star. The final (third) reading of the proposed increase in rate charged local users of the Cablevision system was passed unanimously by the council. The rate will increase from \$5.50 to \$7.00 per month, beginning the first of the year. In another rate matter, the council noted that the Goldthwaite Eagle incorp. reported that the fuel charge would no longer be a part of local electric bills. The charge will be assessed in the past with the new

rates that will go into effect soon. Rates were raised to offset increases in the wholesale charges from the Lower Colorado River Authority. No provisions have been made to remove the fuel cost adjustment from city electric customers. The additional land for the operation of the city's new sewer plant has been purchased and all the paper work regarding the real estate transaction completed, according to City Manager Dale Allen. He told the council that the deal with Mr. L. B. Burnham went extremely smooth and no problems are anticipated. The city needed more land to operate the larger plant. The council discussed the status of the new sewer treatment facility. It was noted that Step II, the Plans and Specifications stage, has been held up because of several needs that have to be handled by the city engineers. The project outline must be approved by the Environmental Protection Agency before the actual bidding and construction can commence. The steps should be completed within the next two months. In other council discussion, the condition of the city's water system was again brought before the group. Following a summer run, current water supplies are more than adequate and discussion centered around

other sources of water for citizens of the city.

FIRE DEPARTMENT COMMENDED

The council commended the efficient action of the Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Department as it labored to fight the Geeslin Building fire in downtown Goldthwaite last Tuesday. The sacrifices made by this group are sincerely appreciated by the governing body, and all the citizens of the City of Goldthwaite.

TRICK OR TREATERS ALSO COMMENDED

Mayor J. D. Harper commended the youth of Goldthwaite for a very respectful and fun-filled Halloween. The lack of any acts of vandalism and mischief was appreciated by the City Council on behalf of the Citizens of Goldthwaite.

In other business, the council gave final approval to the sale of the old Dump Ground property to W. A. Cline of Goldthwaite.

Sick leave procedures were adjusted at the meeting. City employees will now be given eight days of sick leave annually and it can be accumulated to include 21 days of leave for sickness. At the present time a four-day annual leave is permissible with no build-up allowed.

Eagles Slip To DeLeon 30-22; Travel To Ranger Friday

In a battle between the big-play scoring of Goldthwaite and De Leon's ball-control offense, the Bearcats prevailed 30-22.

It was the final home game of the season for the Eagles, who travel to Ranger and Cross Plains in the next two weeks to close out the 1979 season.

The Eagles turned two big plays into touchdowns and drove 81 for another. They also cut down on mistakes, having just two turnovers and 25 yards in penalties.

But the Eagle defense could not stop the savage ground game of De Leon. The Bearcats rolled up 348 total yards, 305 of that on the ground, and scored on touchdown drives of 65, 29, 69 and 63 yards.

After the Eagles had cut the De Leon lead to one point, 23-22, with 5 seconds left in the third quarter, the Bearcats answered with a 63-yard drive that just about dashed all the Eagles' upset hopes. It gave the Bearcats a 30-22 lead with 9 minutes remaining in the game. The Eagles couldn't mount a serious threat after that.

The first time the Bearcats got the ball they drove from their 35-yard line for a touchdown. Jimmy Lewis scored from the one. Jerry Walker added the PAT and De Leon led 7-0 with 4:35 to play in the opening quarter.

The Eagles got their first touchdown on the first play of the second quarter as Tony Corona swept his right end for 28 yards to score. He was hit by several defenders, but somehow managed to stay on his feet and escape to the end zone. Fullback David Livingston ran for 2 extra points to give the Eagles an 8-7 lead. The drive was set up by a short De Leon punt from deep in their own end of the field.

Two minutes later, the Eagles got another "Sudden six" as defensive end Kenny Saathoff stretched out his 6' 7" frame, intercepted an option pitch by De Leon and raced 56 yards to paydirt. The PAT was blocked but the Eagles held a 14-7 lead.

The Bearcats began to rally later in the second quarter. Lewis scored on another one-yard run but the attempt for 2 extra points failed and the Eagles still led 14-13 with 1:35 left in the first half.

An Eagle pass was intercepted by the Bearcats on their own 35, just two plays after the kickoff. They completed two long passes to advance to the Eagle 22 but three more passing attempts fell incomplete. So the Bearcats called on Walker, who drilled a 40-yard field goal with 3 seconds remaining in the half. De Leon 16, Goldthwaite 14.

The Bearcats put together a 69-yard drive late in the third quarter. Clynt Taylor's one-yard run capped the drive and Walker's kick made it 23-14 with 2:31 to play in the third quarter.

That's when the Eagles put together a fine 81-yard drive to trim the De Leon lead to one. Quarterback Ted Tucker passed 28 yards to end Brent Dennis and later threw a 12-yard completion to Saathoff to spark the drive. Corona, on a near carbon copy of his first TD, scored on another 28-yard run as he again broke several tackles along the way. About the only difference was that he rounded

his left end instead of his right. He also ran for 2 extra points as the De Leon lead was trimmed to 23-22. Corona was the leading rusher for the Eagles with 130 yards on just 12 carries.

The Bearcats came back with the 63-yard drive to move in front by eight points, 30-22.

The Eagles couldn't pull any more "tricks" out of their hat, and had to settle for another close loss.

Linebacker Livingston was outstanding on defense for the Eagles. Carson Padgett, Jeff Stephens and Coy Hammond, who intercepted another pass, also played well.

The Eagles travel to Ranger Friday for a 7:30 p.m. game with the Bulldogs. Like the Eagles, the Bulldogs are 0-8 for the season, so something has to give. Ranger lost to Cross

Plains by a score of 69-6 last week.

Meeting Participants Tell Judge New Jail Needed

A show of hands at the conclusion of a public meeting last Tuesday night voted unanimously that Mills County should build a new jail.

County Judge James Ledbetter called the special session to discuss the alternatives to the jail situation.

He cited three things that could be done: "Remodel the present facility, build a new jail, or do nothing."

Remodeling was explained to the group as being costly. An estimate of \$157,000 was received by the county to do the job, only on the upper jail portion. It did not include any work on the living quarters.

A set of plans were presented by Judge Ledbetter, which were prepared by a firm that specializes in building jails. The cost of the entire structure was approximately \$184,000 to the county, excluding land costs. This plan was just a sample, but it was pointed out that it could quickly be adapted by Mills County to handle needs here.

The most pressing problem presented by the participants was the matter of continuing costs of operation of a new jail and the initial capital outlay. The upkeep, maintenance, and actual manpower needed to operate a new jail is extremely hard to arrive at, according to Judge Ledbetter, because of so many variables. At the present time, the Brown County Jail is used for all prisoners handled here. They are transported back and forth by Sheriff's Department officers. The per day cost and mileage is borne by the county.

"Many times a jail sentence may be advisable, but not given," Ledbetter said, "because of the problems associated with a jail that is 37 miles away. A new jail here probably would handle more prisoners than does the current methods," he added.

It was the consensus of the group that a new jail was needed, and that the County would have to take care of the increased costs in a manner that would best suit all sides of the proposal: taxpayers, commissioners, judge and sheriff.

The Commissioners Court will dig deeper into the situation at its meeting Monday.

GISD Trustees Discuss Policies

The Goldthwaite School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday night at the High School Building.

The group spent a lot of time discussing the school policy concerning directives in the event of alcohol use by students in connection with school activities or on school property.

The policy handbook states that students can be expelled for three days, and be excluded from extra-curricular activities for six weeks, or other punishment as deemed necessary by the school officials. This paragraph in the handbook came under scrutiny by the board. This item was left as it was written following the discussion.

However, the board changed another section in relation to punishment, deleting the phrase "for the remainder of the school year" for students to represent the school in various activities, including sports.

Several students were expelled recently and suffered loss of extra-curricular privileges, and the board wanted to review the policy to make sure it was written properly and according to

the actual intent of the board.

SALE OF BUS TURNED DOWN

Because of the lack of a "good" bid, the board denied the selling of a school bus that will be replaced soon. Two bids were opened at the meeting, one for \$201 and another for \$710. The school officials hope to get over twice that amount for the bus. More bids will be taken on the vehicle, and a possible auction sale was talked about by the board as a means of selling the bus.

In other trustee matters, unanimous approval was granted for Superintendent Gilbert Davis to sign checks in emergencies. The board president and secretary are currently required to sign all checks that are issued by the school district. This new policy would be used only in emergency situations.

The board voted to submit the names of Layton Black and Gary Holcomb as the school's representatives on the Mills County Tax Board, which will meet soon to select an appraisal team to re-evaluate all of Mills County's ad valorem taxes. The group will have seven members.

Charles Childress, Mike Wilkins, Bill Michael and Supt. Davis are on that committee that selects textbooks used in the Goldthwaite schools.

- Prices charged for breakfasts and lunches to adults were raised. Breakfast prices are now 55 cents and lunches are now 95 cents each for adults.
- Organizations may use the auditorium for the showing of films for a fee of \$5.00.

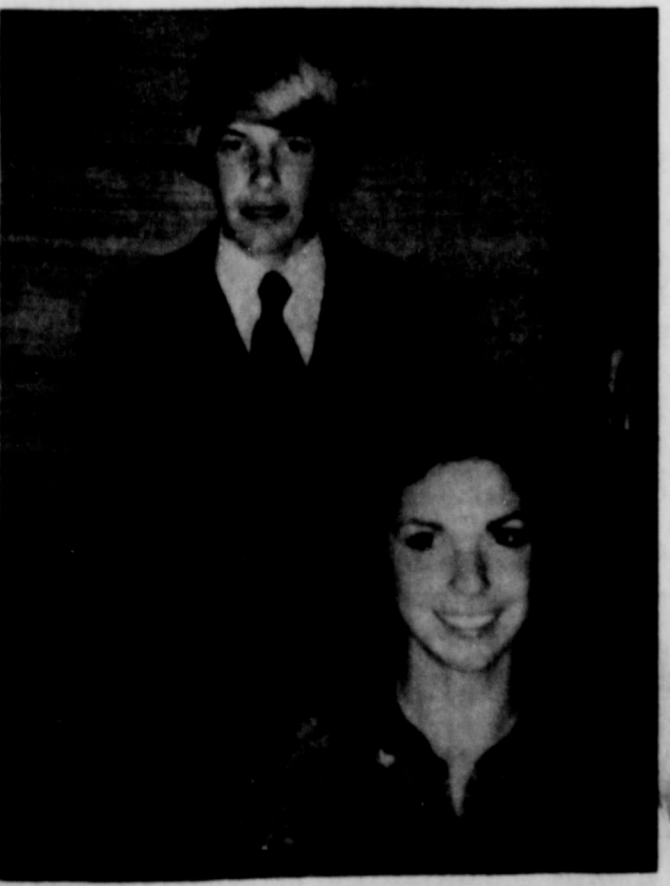
Agenda Set For County Court Session

Goldthwaite's Eagles will play in an entirely different district for the next two years, due to realignment directions from the University Interscholastic League.

Goldthwaite will be in District 7-A with eleven other teams. In 7-A East, the Eagles will play Rising Star, Lometa, Evant, Gorman and Blanket.

7-A West will include Bronte, Cross Plains, Eden, Mertzon, Miles and Santa Anna.

Most of the teams in District 10-A that are presently Eagle opponents have advanced to AA status. The League recently ruled that there would no longer be any "B" classification schools, and created a 5A class.

The Goldthwaite average daily attendance in the top four grades was 134.4 this past year. Any school with 135 or above was in Class AA, and those below were in A.

In reality, Goldthwaite has dropped a class in the rankings.

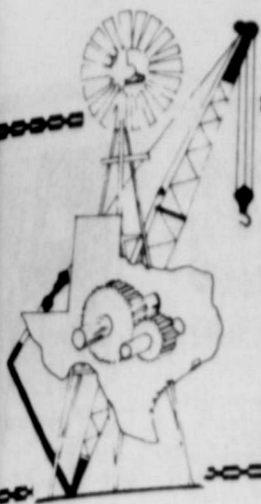

A. No! The Quail Fest is an intensive community effort on January 12th and 13th to pull in quail hunters from all over Texas. For a set fee, the hunters get two days of hunting, breakfast, a barbecue and dance, and sandwiches the last day to tide them over until they get back home.

Q. You must think there are ways the other people in the county can help or you wouldn't be telling me all this. O.K. Let's have it. What can I do to help?

A. First, talk to people you know. Every family has one hunting nut somewhere in the family tree. Tell him about the Quail Fest. Call the Chamber Office for more specific information. Second, and most important, if you have land in the county you would donate for two days, call the Chamber office [648-3619]. The demand was great last year, and will be greater this year.

Q. If I have land to donate, what do I get out of it?

A. Nothing. At least no money. You will be invited to be a guest at one of the meals. You will be protected by a written agreement in terms of your property, and hunters assume full responsibility for injury and accidents, again in writing.

But as for what you get out of it, I suppose the word is satisfaction, knowing you have helped a group whose main concern is young people in the county.

Q. But my kids go to Goldthwaite Schools. It's not going to do my kids any good.

A. Oh, yes it will. Because when Goldthwaite gets busy and comes up with projects to help the youth who live in their part of the county--

and need help-- you can always go to Priddy, knock on the door, and say "Hey, you remember my land donation for your Quail Fest? Well, we've got this project" It's called working together.

County Voters Favor Two Of Three Amendments

Voter turnout in Mills County was extremely light in the Constitutional Amendment Election on Tuesday.

A total of 236 ballots were cast in the election, the smallest amount in many years in any countywide election of this type.

In Proposition No. 1, balloting in Mills County favored the amendment, with the tally being 126 for and 109 against. This amendment will provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years.

The voting on Proposition No. 2 in Mills County saw the nay votes getting the edge, 139 to 87. This amendment would provide

legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department.

Mills County voters approved Proposition 3 on the ballot, 149 to 87. This amendment would authorize the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

The Bangs game returned \$749.75 to each school. The Early game showed \$657.20 to each school.

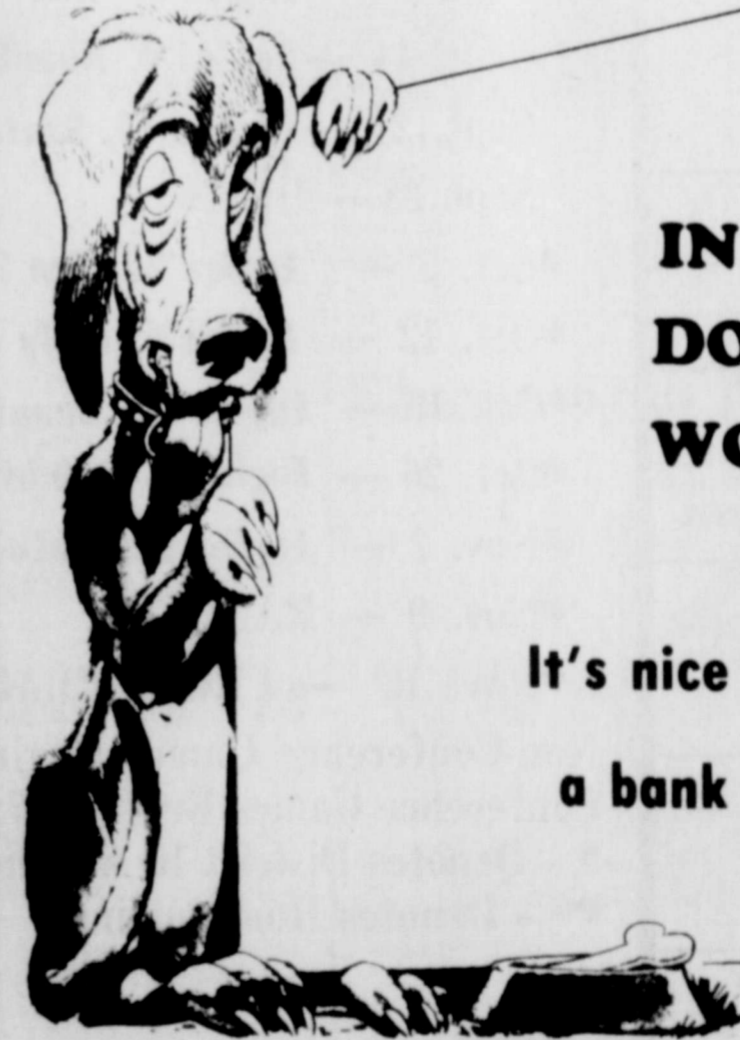
