1979 Mills Co. Deer Season Off To Above Average Start

After recovering from the initial shock of the annual migration of hundreds of deer hunters, Mills County native pastures provided some of the best deer hunting in the state of Texas on opening weekend. The cooling rooms of Mills County Locker were swelled with deer and turkey on Monday, attesting to the "above average" harvest of game here. "There weren't any tremendous horns taken opening weekend," Game Warden Benny Schriver told the

Eagle Tuesday. "The hot weather keeps the big ones back in the thick cover," he added. Temperatures reached the seventies during the afternoons, the hottest opening days of deer season in many years. "The take was bountiful, with lots and lots of turkeys killed," Schriver said. "All the wildlife is in excellent shape due to range conditions in Mills County," Schriver commented. The excellent spring rains gave the trees and brush a good start

before the hard and hot summer set in. The deer are primarily browsers, usually preferring green brush and leaves to grass. Several cases of killing deer at night and shooting from public roads were handled by Schriver on opening weekend. Quail season opened this past weekend also in Mills County and a bountiful and healthful crop of birds was found by the hunter. New bag limits are in force this year, giving a hunter 16 birds per day, or

48 in possession for a three day limit. The quail seem to have followed the deer and turkey in their growth and physical well being, as they are in fine shape. Billy Whitt of Goldthwaite brought the first deer into the locker plant on Saturday morning. It was a fine six-pointer. He arrived at the locker just after 8:00.

Pecan Show Here Dec. 5th And 6th

The Mills County Crops & Livestock Committee has scheduled the annual Mills County Pecan Show for December 5-6, 1979. Our pecan crop is very good this year and we are hoping for a large number of entries in this year's show.

All entries are due in the County Agents' office by 4:00 p.m. on December 5, 1979. All entries will be processed beginning at 6:00 p.m. on the 5th, and judging will be done at 9:00 a.m., December 6th. All Show activities will take place on the second floor of the Courthouse.

We wish to encourage all owners, as well as commercial growers, to participate in the show. Very often, homeowners produce the best pecans because of the extra care given to trees.

A sample entry consists of 50 pecans of the same variety from this year's crop. The sample should be submitted in a brown paper bag labeled with the producers name, address and variety of the pecans. If you do not know the variety of your pecans, we will identify them for you. You may enter as many samples as you wish.

All entries become the property of the Mills County Pecan Show. Let's all enter and participate in this year's Show.

Many Kills Made — Predator Problem Brings Influx Of 'Troubleshooters' To County

Texas Rodent and Predator Animal Control personnel have accounted for numerous coyote eliminations in the past three weeks, according to Kirby Lilly, an agent for the state organization.

Using traps most of the time, and doing a little early morning calling, Lilly, along with Charlie Williams, and Mills County trapper Hammond Humphries have handled seventeen coyotes since November 1 in Mills County. The most recent have come from the Caran area, where six of the predators were taken off the A.G. Carr place.

Lilly and Williams are troubleshooters with the agency, pointing to the seriousness of the predator problem for Mills County ranchers. These men are sent in to an area because of a large number of complaints of predator incursions and slaughtering of livestock by the coyotes and bobcats.

Lilly has also taken two coyotes each off the Pat

Davis place and Floyd Daniel place. Humphries has accounted for seven predators this month, with several coming off the Walton Daniel ranch, west of Goldthwaite.

Mills County ranchers with evidence of predator problems are urged to contact either Humphries, County Extension Agent Danny Long or Mills County Judge Jamie Ledbetter. These men and their respective offices can handle the communication with the trappers. The groups will be most happy to assist the ranchers with their predator problems.

A helicopter will be deployed to Mills County in January for use by the trapper force to further aid in the curtailment of the predator situation. The leaves will have fallen off most trees and brush and this will facilitate the operation of the helicopter in thick areas of the county.

Persons are urged to contact County Judge Ledbetter if they desire to

contribute to the local trapper fund, to keep the program in operation. It is also advisable for landowners to allow the hunters on their land so large areas of the county can be worked, eliminating spots where the predators could concentrate without being flushed out.

For the Goldthwaite Eagles and the Cross Plains Buffaloes, the 1979 football season was cut about 5 minutes short.

Trailing 36-22 in the fourth quarter, the Eagles decided to forfeit the game to the Buffaloes. It will go into the record books as a 1-0 victory for Cross Plains.

The confusion began with the Eagles holding a 16-8 lead midway through the second quarter. Cross Plains halfback Eddie Jackson broke loose on a 26-yard run, but fumbled around the Eagle 5-yard line. After a big scramble, the Eagles recovered the ball. However, the Buffaloes were given the ball because the Eagles were penalized for intentionally advancing the ball. The Buffaloes scored on the next play to tie the game at 16-16.

"The officials wouldn't come explain the ruling to me," Eagle coach Joe Winchell stated. "That's a common practice among all officials." In the second half, the tension thickened. "We felt like every call

would go in their favor," Winchell continued. "All of our penalties were called by the referee on our side of the field. That official was more interested in spite than calling the game. We asked the officials to change sides." The officials didn't change sides.

"I felt like we didn't have a chance. The officials were controlling the outcome of the game. The officials had become a factor in the game no matter how well we played," Winchell said.

A school board member came to me and said that they thought, in an effort to avoid any violence, that it was best for our school and football team to forfeit the game.

Winchell said, "Is it a 100 percent agreement of the school board members and fans?" The board member said that we consider it in the best interest of everyone.

"Okay," Winchell said. So the game ended in a forfeit with about 5 minutes left to play.

"No," was the answer senior split end Kenny Saathoff gave when asked if he wanted the game to end. "The guys weren't fighting

that much," he added of the violence aspect of the game.

Junior fullback David Livingston stated, "I would've played. I've never been on a team that forfeited. I didn't know what was going on." However he added that there were "a lot of bad shots (during the game)."

It was a frustrating way to end a frustrating season for the Eagles, whose final season record is 1-9.

The first half was a rock 'em, sock 'em affair that ended in a 22-22 tie.

The Eagles began the scoring late in the first quarter. Livingston blocked a Cross Plains punt and, after a wild scramble, teammate Kenny Saathoff recovered in the Buffalo end zone for six points. Quarterback Ted Tucker passed to halfback Jeff Stephens for 2 extra points to give the Eagles an 8-0 lead.

The Buffaloes took the kickoff and drove 63 yards for their first touchdown. Eddie Jackson scored on an 8-yard run and added two extra points to tie the game at 8-8.

The Eagles answered with a 73-yard drive to regain the lead. From midfield, Tucker

passed 32 yards to Saathoff. On the next play, halfback Tony Corona raced 18 yards to paydirt. Livingston ran for the extra points and the Eagles led 16-8 with 7:33 remaining in the second quarter.

Again the Buffaloes came back. Quarterback Duane Hutchins' 2-yard run concluded the 65-yard drive. Jackson again ran for two points to tie the game for the second time.

Bart McFarland returned the kickoff to the Eagle 46-yard line to give them good field position. Fine runs by Corona and Coy Hammond and a Tucker pass to Stephens put the Eagles at the Cross Plains 12. Tucker then repeated the earlier pass to Stephens for the TD. The Eagles led 22-16 with 1:40 left in the first half.

It took the Buffaloes only 9 seconds to produce a third tie.

After the kickoff, two 15-yard penalties by the Eagles gave the Buffaloes a first down at the Eagle 25. On the first play, Hutchins threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to split end Tan Flippin to tie it at 22-22.

The Buffalo defense held

the Eagles. Cross Plains got the ball back and moved to the Eagle 29 before lack of time forced them into a 47-yard field goal attempt. Although it was unlikely that they could've made a field goal from that distance, Chris Boykin removed all doubt by blocking the attempt.

The third quarter was a defensive standoff until the Buffaloes returned an Eagle punt 50 yards to the Eagle 5-yard line. Halfback Mike Clark scored from the two as the Buffaloes enjoyed their first lead of the game at 28-22.

After an exchange of punts, the Eagles got the ball on their own 43. However, two 15-yard penalties forced them back to the 32. A punt that netted no yards and another penalty on the Eagles gave Cross Plains the ball at the Eagle 22.

Seven plays later, Jackson scored the touchdown and the extra points as the Buffaloes increased their lead to 36-22 with 6:19 left in the game.

The Eagles got the ball back, threw an interception and were penalized 15 yards after the interception.

Two plays later the game came to a sudden end.

Of his team's effort Winchell stated "Our kids played as good as we could play. It's a shame the seniors had to finish like that."

The Eagle seniors are ends Bart McFarland, Kenny Saathoff and Coy Hammond; linemen Carson Padgett and Johnny Derrick; and halfback Jeff Stephens.

"If our win-loss record came on effort by our kids, we would've been 8-2 this season. I don't feel like a 1-9 record was a true indicator of our team," Winchell concluded.

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

Q. I thought Chamber activities were supposed to help our county. How would a play-off here help?
A. When people come to a game, they have to eat [money to our cafes], some spend the night [money to our motels], they buy refreshments at the concession stand [money to the local booster club], and make use of a fine facility without too much trouble to the community. Perhaps a regional game will pick Goldthwaite for a play-off. It's an excellent opportunity to promote this area and pull in out-of-county money.

Q. Two weeks ago you wrote about the Priddy Quail Fest in January and asked for "land donations." I forgot what exactly you meant.
A. I meant could you donate the use of your land for two days to help the Priddy School boosters in their big quail hunt. You are protected by a written agreement, and because the demand is so great, land is needed. Call the Chamber Office, 648-3619, for details. Two days is really not much to ask. Won't you help?

Q. Well, I'll think about it.

After Viet Nam the good old American boys have become somewhat skeptical. The British lads aren't all eager beaver to dash off to faraway lands to whip out their Webleys and charge some hyped-up clam-headed enemy.

They are busy with strikes at home.

The world has changed. The enthusiasm for medals has waned. (Who invented medals anyway?) "Our Boys" no longer aspire to resemble something in uniform from the operetta, "The Student Prince", a costume reserved for shahs with antiquated ego-ideals and African despots who added light bulbs on strings to this kind of sartorial splendor.

Perhaps it is for the best. The philosophy of America of "I'll get mine" has overwhelmed the glory ego trip. The grandeur of those officers who whipped out their Webleys in great acts of self-sacrifice is tinged with doubt about its Gestalt in today's scheme of things.

This new encumbrance of lethargy is practical. Unless Borneo tribesmen, head hunters, show up in canoes and attack Lompoc, California, in which case we'll step on their lips, we'll remain adamant, busy getting ours.

There is great promise for the world in avoidism. Now then you whip out your Webley, let us hope it is only to show it to a fellow collector.




