Childress Clinic And Hospital Open House, Anniversary Celebration Well Received

A crowd of over 200 persons jammed the Childress Clinic and Hospital in Goldthwaite Sunday afternoon to help commemorate the hospital's 20th anniversary and to observe the opening of a new wing. The clinic, under the direction of M. A. Childress, first opened its doors here in 1959. It has been added on to several times in the ensuing years. The latest addition is a

1400 square foot section of doctors offices, examining rooms and waiting room. It houses modern equipment for medical care and treatment.

Dr. Childress was honored with two presentations (see photo above) during the celebration. He opened his practice in Goldthwaite in 1948.

Guests from all over Central Texas attended the affair, voicing their appreci-

ation to Dr. Childress for his work here and their best wishes for the continued success of the hospital. Many area physicians were in attendance also, several of which attended the clinic's first open house in May of 1959.

Currently there are four doctors on the staff and about 70 other employees, making the clinic and hospital one of the largest economic boosters to Mills County.

Vanishing Texas

THE COUNCIL HOUSE FIGHT

On January 9, 1840, three Comanche Indians rode quietly into San Antonio. It was not an uncommon sight; the Comanches knew San Antonio well, and none had dared molest them there. These three sought out re-haired Texas Ranger Henry W. Karnes and offered him a proposal no one had hoped to hear; the Comanches, they said, wanted peace.

Karnes thought immediately of the bloody raids of 1838 and 1839, freshest of which was the Webster tragedy on Brushy Creek. He knew the Indians had a number of captives, and he told them that no treaty could be signed until these were brought in. The Indians said they were prepared to do that. They told Karnes they would return in twenty days, bringing the captives with them.

Karnes had no faith in their promise, but he alerted Texas Secretary of War Albert Sidney Johnston, who sent three companies of infantry under William S. Fisher to garrison in San Jose Mission.

General Hugh McLeod was to treat with the Indians. He was a West Point officer, just 25 years old, and much impressed with his office of adjutant general of the Texas Army. President Lamar added the title of inspector general on March 1, while McLeod was in San Antonio. William G. Cooke, quartermaster general of the Texas Army, was to assist McLeod.

The Indians did not come in when they promised, and it was not until March 19 that they put in their appearance. Sixty-three Comanches, including a number of women and children, came to the council. But they brought with them only a single captive, ragged, ill,

vacant-eyed Matilda Lockhart.

She was just 15 years old and had been captured 18 months earlier while picking up pecans near her father's house.

Now she was a horror to behold; the Indians had burned off her nose and she had been stripped of every semblance of feminine dignity. Before the women spirited her away, she told of others like herself. She said the Indians meant to bring them in one at a time in order to get a bigger price.

Having seen the battered, ruined child, McLeod was already in a black mood when the Texans and a dozen chiefs sat down to talk inside the council house.

McLeod did not mince words, but immediately demanded of Muguara, the head chief, "Where are the prisoners you promised to bring in to this talk?"

Muguara replied calmly, "We have brought in the only one we had; the others are with other tribes."

A heavy silence followed. Muguara smirked, then leaned forward and said coldly, "How do like the answer?"

McLeod ordered a company of soldiers into the room, then ordered the interpreter to tell Muguara that he and his men would be held captive until the other white prisoners were brought in. The interpreter at first refused, saying the Indians would fight, as they were fully armed. McLeod repeated the order. The interpreter moved near the door, delivered the order, and leaped outside.

A number of citizens had gathered in the plaza, where they were watching as Indian children shot at coin targets a man was setting up for them.

When McLeod's intentions were made known to Muguara, the chief instantly screamed out a war whoop,

perfectly and immediately understood by those outside. The children turned their arrows on the man who had been setting up coins, and he was the first to die.

The Indians inside the council house had little chance, and were shot down in a pile. Among those who died inside was the father of Shanaco, who took revenge in countless Texas lives.

The Indians outside the council house tried to run away after firing a single volley of arrows, but it was no use; San Antonio was full of soldiers and Indian fighters that day, and the slaughter was spontaneous and complete. Only one among the Comanches, a renegade Mexican, escaped.

When it was over, 35 Comanches lay dead in the streets, three women and two children among them. The others were taken captive.

Four Texan Civilians were killed, as was Lt. William M. Dunnington and two privates of the First Infantry. Eight Texans were wounded, one, Matthew "Old Paint" Caldwell, by one of the soldiers.

One of the captive women was released to tell her people that the Comanche prisoners would be traded for white prisoners, but the woman never returned. A rumor reached San Antonio within a few days that the Comanches had tortured to death 13 white captives in retaliation. They eventually brought in "three or four" captives, who were traded for the 26 captive Comanches.

The Comanches then returned to their camps on the high plains, where they plotted an incredible reprisal unlike anything yet planned and executed by plains Indians.

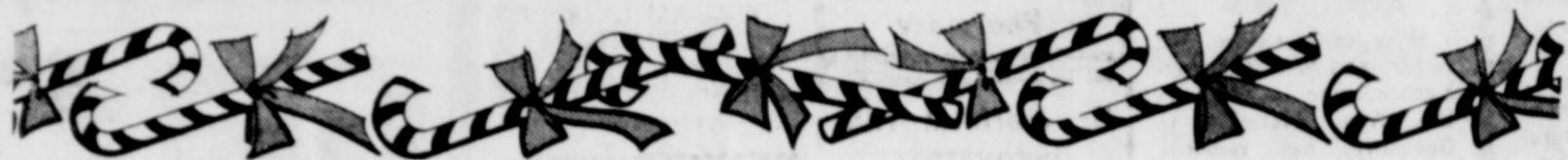

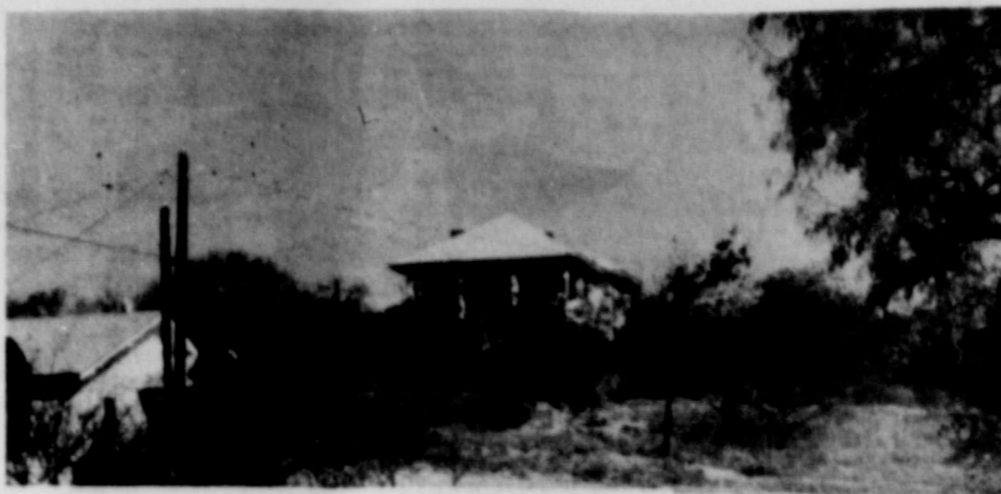
Road); and Mrs. Judy Beavers, 512 Third Street.

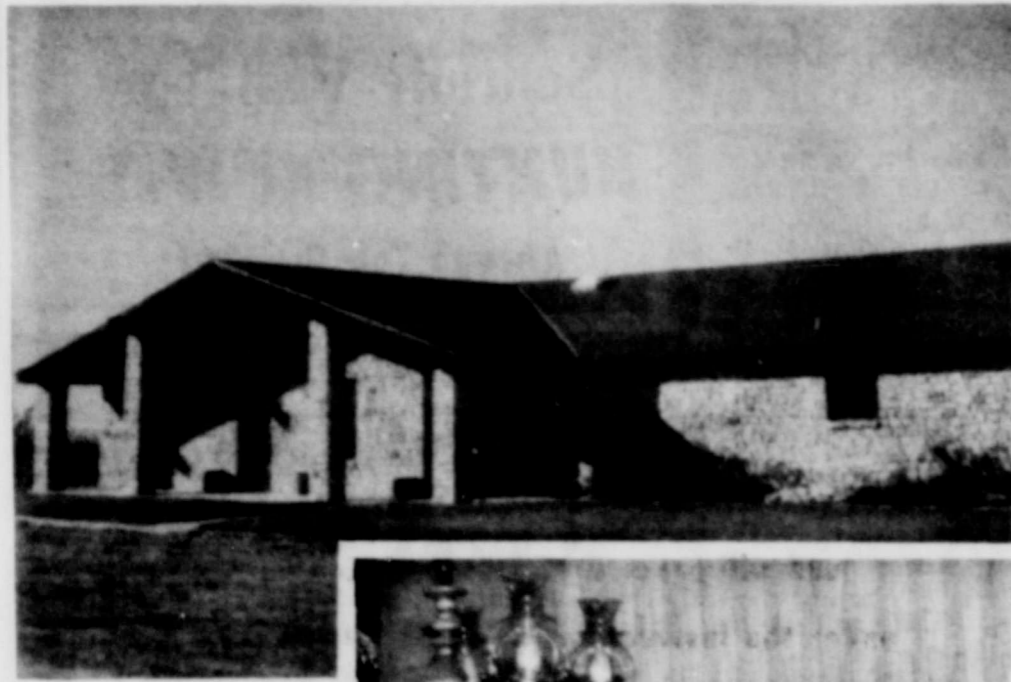

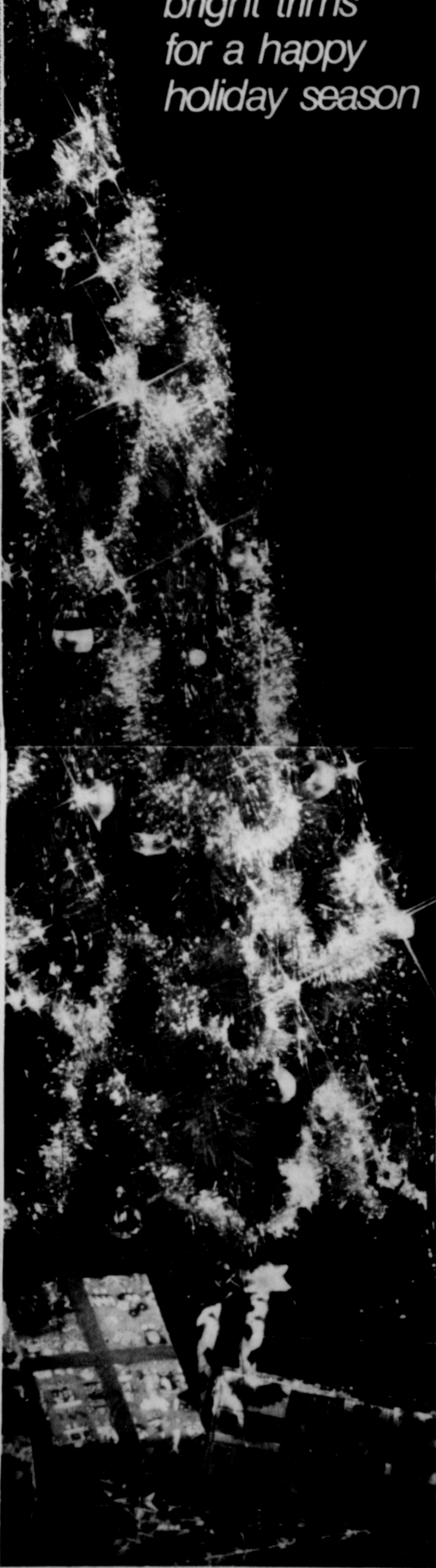

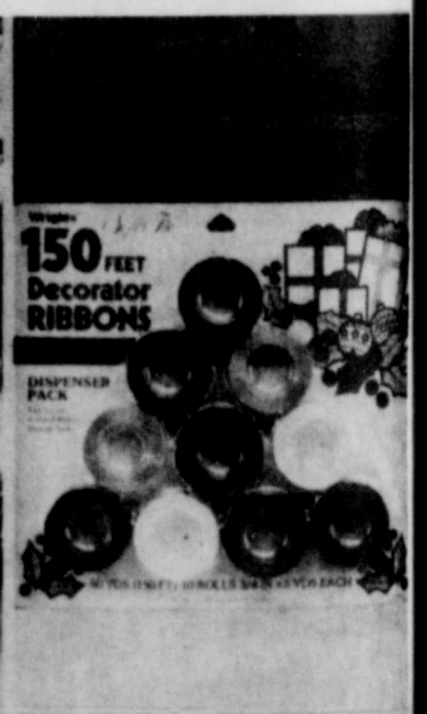

Increased Agricultural Output May Make Texas Number One

AUSTIN—Increased agricultural production in Texas, coupled with decreases in output in the other two leading states, are helping to push the state toward the number one position nationally, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

California and Iowa, the two states above Texas in national rankings, began 1979 with lower percentages in production, Brown said. "Texas, on the other hand, is expecting to harvest the largest crop of cotton since 1949 and will lead the nation in pecan production this fall. With relatively high production in other commodities, Texas may well be No. 1 in 1979," he added.

Brown noted that Texas, already ranked third in agricultural production, is first in 16 categories in agriculture. Texas also leads in the number of farms and ranches with 159,000, and

agricultural land, 138.7 million acres.

Ranchers in Texas placed the state first in all major categories of cattle production with 13.9 million head. The 2 million head of cattle on feed, slaughter numbers and beef cows were also first for the state. Only in cash receipts of \$4.6 billion was the state second in cattle designations.

The state is also the leader in wool, mohair, and cotton production, as well as the number of sheep and goats.

Two vegetables are in the top category, cabbage and fresh spinach. Other Texas fruits and vegetables are in second place: grapefruit, cantaloupes, carrots, bell peppers, onion, watermelons, pecans, white corn, and honeydew melons.

"Being No. 1 in production is one thing—and being No. 1 in profit is another," Brown commented. "The American agriculture industry is the envy of the world, and it must remain that way."



Texas pecan producers are being kept busy reaping a whopping 95-million pound harvest during the current season, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. December 2-8 is being declared Texas Pecan Week across the state in celebration of the bountiful yield.

1/2 of Cotton Grown in Texas In 16 Counties

AUSTIN—Nearly half of the state's projected 5.7 million bale cotton harvest this year is being reaped in 16 southern High Plains counties, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Bailey, Lamb, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Gaines, Dawson, Andrews, Martin, Howard, Midland and Glasscock counties are expected to produce 2.6 million bales of cotton, a regional increase of more than one million over last year's harvest. The 1979 production is expected to be the biggest statewide in 30 years.

County yields should average 404 pounds per acre, up from 259 last year. More than 3 million acres are anticipated for harvest.

According to Commissioner Brown, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service sees this year's crop as 50 percent higher than last year's and four percent above 1977's. If figures are realized, the 1979 crop will be the largest since the 1949 production of 6.04 million bales.

Mayor Proclaims 'Texas Pecan Week', December 2 - 8

Mayor J. D. Harper has joined Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown in proclaiming December 2 - 8 as Texas Pecan Week in Goldthwaite.

Pecan Producers, Inc., local growers, participated in the signing ceremonies held at the City Hall.

With Texas pecan growers expecting the largest crop on record, the week has been set aside to recognize the harvest of 95 million pounds, part of which is produced locally.

The proclamation calls upon "all citizens to celebrate the bounty of our land and indulge in consuming delectable foods made more savory with Texas pecans." (To most Texans, that translates to "Have some pecan pie this week.")

Pecans are a native food which were eaten by the Indians and named so because the word "pacan" meant "hard to crack." Not all pecans on the market today still fit that definition; with the new varieties have been developed soft shells. Outlets selling pecans in bulk often offer nut-cracking services also.

Commissioner Brown stated that the TDA is cooperating with the pecan growers of the state in broadening the market for the large crop.

"When you have a commodity that is as tasty as pecans, marketing them in Texas is not a hard job. We just have to let consumers know that there are good supplies at prices competitive with other nuts," Brown said.



With the largest recorded Texas pecan crop, some 95 million pounds, hitting the markets this season, pecan pie lovers have an ample, reasonably-priced supply for their favorite dessert. The Texas Department of Agriculture home economist provides an easy, delicious version of the well-known Texas treat just in time for holiday baking.

TEXAS PECAN PIE

Crust:
 1 1/3 C. all-purpose flour
 1/2 tsp. salt
 2/3 C. shortening
 3 T. water

Mix flour and salt together, add shortening and cut into flour with fork or pastry blender. Add water and mix gently with fork in stirring motion. Gather pastry into a ball and place in pie tin. With tips of fingers, spread pastry along bottom and sides of pie tin, shaping with a high, fluted edge. Makes one 9-inch pie shell.

Filling:
 1 1/2 C. brown sugar, firmly packed
 1/2 C. granulated sugar
 1/4 C. water
 2 T. all-purpose flour
 1/2 tsp. salt
 2 eggs
 1/2 C. evaporated milk
 1 1/2 C. pecan halves
 3/4 tsp. vanilla

Combine first five ingredients in small bowl and mix well. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add evaporated milk and mix well. Stir in pecan halves and vanilla. Mix well and turn into unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Cook in preheated 400 degrees F. oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees F. and cook an additional 35-40 minutes, or until filling is puffed in center and is well browned. Let pie cool before cutting.

TS&G Industry News Re: Bobcat Pelt Exporting

What they lack in reality perception, they more than make up for in fanatic tenacity. The Defenders of Wildlife has once again gone on the warpath in defense of the poor, cuddly bobcat.

Defenders filed suit in a Washington, D.C. federal court Nov. 8 to block export of bobcat pelts. Not only did they file, they got their injunction, temporary at least. In an ironic twist, the suit is directed specifically at the federal Endangered Species Scientific Authority, something of a Defenders stepchild.

In a move that has some of Defenders' more suspicious opponents wondering where the truck came from, the injunction was reportedly issued the same day the suit was filed. That sort of thing is not known to happen often these days, suggesting that the activist group did a very careful job of judge-picking. The same judge was expected to decide December 3 - 5, whether to let the temporary injunction lapse or make it permanent.

Specifically, defenders charged that ESSA has allowed bobcat pelt exports without sufficient scientific evidence that such export will not threaten bobcat survival. In a total reversal of basic American legal principles, ESSA is charged with proving the harmlessness of export before allowing such export to proceed. This legal aberration is to be perpetuated in the Defenders suit -- the activists have been required only to make their accusations, and it will be up to ESSA to prove its innocence.

Another irony is that state-level game and fish agencies find themselves going to bat for ESSA. The two have been at odds since ESSA's creation because the federal outfit has used the export ban threat to coerce state management agencies into changing their rules and regulations, something the U.S. Constitution says no federal bigwig has the authority to do. The states now find themselves defending ESSA's usurped authority against an even more outrageous attacker.

Wildlife experts are in general agreement that bobcats are by no stretch of the imagination endangered by export, mange or sunspot activity, and most are confident of their ability to "prove" the species' general good health before any rational inquisitor. Some are

not as confident of convincing the omnipotent federal judge of this, however, considering how quick she was to jump at Defenders' initial request for an injunction.

If the temporary injunction becomes a permanent injunction, it will eliminate the overseas bobcat market,

which is about the only bobcat market there is. No market means little or no incentive to trap, and the prospect of losing the predator-control assistance provided by freelance cat trappers has some folks in the sheep and goat industry a bit nervous.

One bright spot is the almost airtight certainty that ESSA will appeal any adverse decision -- after all, no federal agency worth its salt would take such a challenge to its authority lying down. At least they never did when we wished they would!

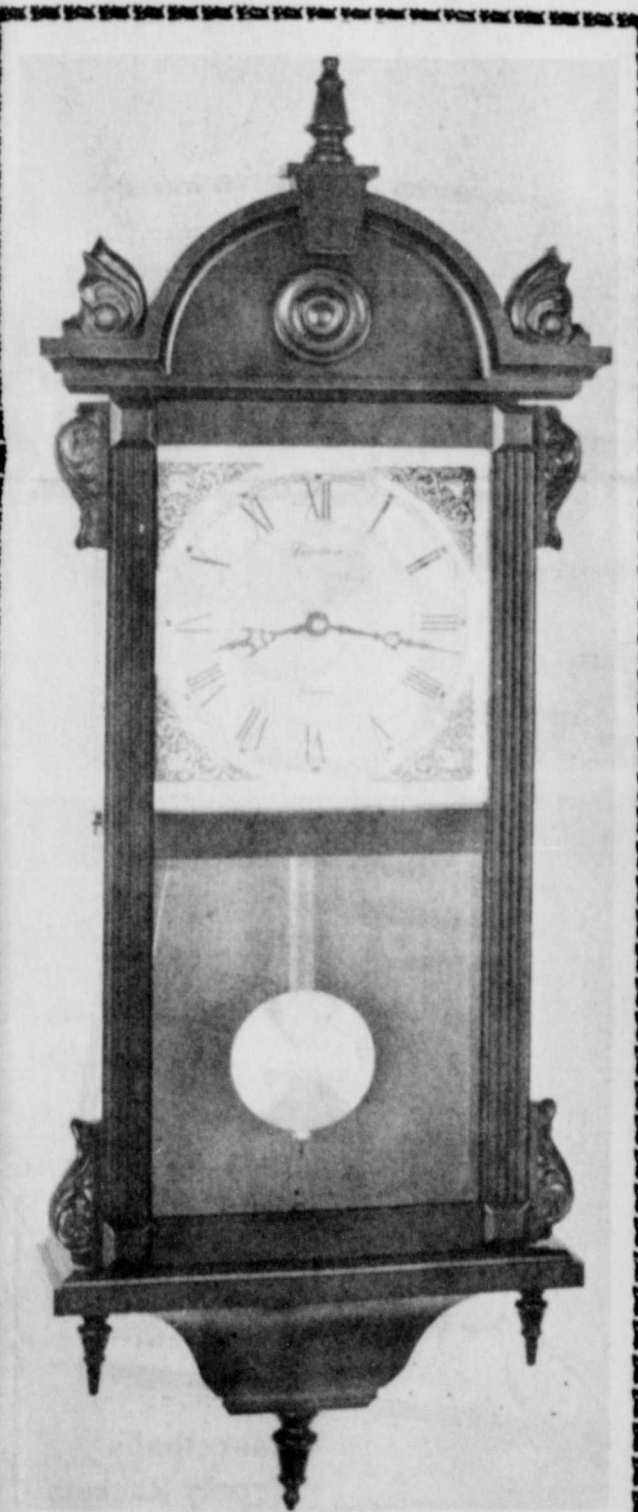

when buying pecans:

Percent Kernel - When buying inshell pecans, remember that you are purchasing kernels. A 10-lb. bag of nuts could contain as high as 6, or as low as 3, pounds of kernels. Varieties and good management can influence percent kernel.

From trees receiving excellent management, the high percent kernel varieties are Wichita, Sioux and Choctaw.

When shopping for inshell pecans, bring a pair of pliers to check the kernel. Make sure the nuts are filled out and do not have shriveled kernels.

The size of the pecan does not necessarily prove which is the better one. Some smaller pecans which are filled out would yield more than the larger ones that are poorly filled.

Again, check the kernels before you buy.

WAYS TO USE PECANS

Texas pecans give a fancy touch to every sort of holiday taste treat. This year, say "Make mine Texas" pecans," since the Lone Star State produced its largest crop ever.

Then fancy-up the holiday season with these quick'n-easy ideas:

--Serve sour cream with pecans on meat or baked potatoes.

--For waffles, biscuits or muffins, stir pecans into blended dry ingredients before adding the liquid.

--Add pecans to meat,

poultry or seafood salads.

--Try slivered or sliced pecans in tossed vegetable salads.

--Roll ice cream balls in chopped pecans. Freeze balls separately until set.

--Use toasted, chopped pecans as a quick topping for cream pie or ice cream pie.

--Sprinkle cupcakes with pecans before baking, and skip the frosting if you like.

--For a spread on crackers or celery, add finely chopped pecans to cream cheese that has been blended with a little milk.

--Perk up your next vegetable souffle by adding finely chopped pecans along with the vegetable.

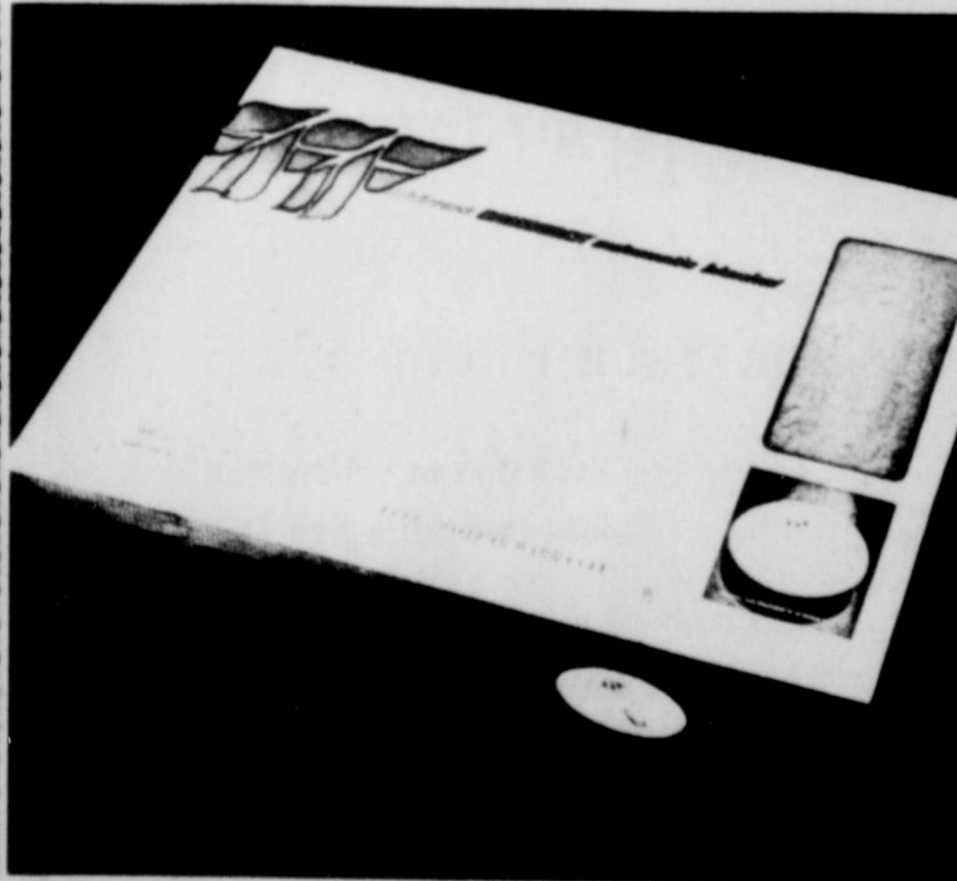
