## PANHANDLE AERIAL COMPANY IS ORGANIZED

Amarillo, Texas.—A formal organization of the Panhandle Aerial Service & Transportation company was effected Monday at a meeting of stockholders. The following officers and directors were elected: Lee Billings, president; W. H. Whipple, vice president and general manager, and Carl Fuqua, Secretary-Treasurer. Directors, B. T. Ware, Lloyd Blains, R. Masterson and N. S. Locke of Miami. The company is capitalized at \$30,000.

The company plans to run a daily service aerial route between Amarillo, Wichita Falls and Fort Worth, keeping several planes here in reserve for cross country trips, etc. Mr. Whipple expects to bring to Amarillo soon, three or four of the latest model passenger carrying ships.

## HAS OFTEN VISITED SITE BUFFALO WALLOW FIGHT—

### Canadian Record.

The battles of 'Dobe Walls and Buffalo Wallow stand as sacred in the history of the Panhandle as the Alamo stands in the memory of Texas. No reveries of the Panhandle stand complete without one or the other of these two places.

Recently when Mr. W. M. Camp, a newspaperman of Chicago was in Miami looking up the records of the battle of Buffalo Wallow to preserve the site before time has effaced it completely, it came with startling clearness how rapidly time is passing and how elements are so completely obliterating the old landmarks. Twenty years ago, or even ten years ago, no resident even dreamed that the time would come when the site of the battle of Buffalo Wallow would be in question. Now the old pits from which the settlers fought the Indians have filled by the erosion of the soil and the grave has been obliterated and unless some one familiar with the place in the old days would point it out, no one would recognize the spot.

Apropos the dispute over its location; had Mr. Camp cared to have remained in Canadian he could have secured conclusive evidence as to the exact site. He made rather a hurried call here and did not secure reliable information such as he might have found on letting the purport of his visit be known.

At least one citizen of Canadian, Walter Ayers, is as familiar with the site of the Buffalo Wallow fight as if it was in his back yard. Twenty years ago he lived on his farm south of Canadian, and the farm was just one-half of a mile from the Buffalo Wallow battle ground. The pits from which the Panhandle heroes fought, the grave where one of their number killed in the fight was buried, and all the mounds of dirt were twenty years ago as clearly outlined as when they were first constructed to repulse the Indians. If Mr. Ayers has looked at the site once he has looked at it a thousand times. He has several times talked with J. W. McKinley and E. H. Fletcher, survivors of the Wagon Train Supply fight on what is now the H. M. Ramp ranch on the Washita. Mr. Fletcher owned the place that is now the Tas ranch near Buffalo Wallow. The Wagon Train Fight, only a few miles away, was fought at the same time the Buffalo Wallow fight took place. The Supply Train under the charge of U. S. army men was on the march from Fort Supply, which is located where Beaver and Wolf Creeks join north-west of Woodward, Oklahoma, to Fort Elliott, which was located at Moquette. And the men of Buffalo Wallow fight, led by scout Billie Dixon, went out from Fort Elliott to meet them. The Indians attacked the supply train and surrounded Dixon and the men, under the charge of a sergeant from the fort, before they could join the supply train. One man was killed at Buffalo Wallow and one severely wounded before the Indians gave up the siege.

The idea advanced some time ago that a historical society be formed for the purpose of gathering the early incidents, tragedies, and folk lore of the Panhandle should be taken up and followed until an organization is perfected, and then the history gathered and preserved.

The battle of the Buffalo Wallow was fought only forty-five years ago and yet its location has almost been lost to the history of the Panhandle.

The time of year to locate the site of Buffalo Wallow is in the late winter when the grass and weeds are off the landscape and there is very little covering the soil. When the grass

## OLD ORDER PASSES

Today is the Twilight of the Belted Earl.

British Aristocracy, for So Many Centuries Secure in its High Place, is Feeling the Ground Slip Under its Feet.

In one of the old Plantagenet houses of England the belted earl and his ladyship live in one corner of the castle. The rest of the fine old mansion is closed, William Allen White writes in Collier's. The servants needed to run the house are no longer available. Money will not hire them. Their men have been commissioned in the army because the earl's son—who had a right to sit at the foot of the throne and who had also the blessed privilege of hearing the king by ancient right address him as cousin—the earl's son lighted one cigarette too many on the parapet, and when he and his kind from Eton and Harrow went out, commissions in the army fell to the cook's son and the housekeeper's son and the parlormaid's brother and chambermaid's sweetheart, who, being commissioned, promptly took their women-kind out of service. They are feeling what they never felt before, these domestic servants of the nobility—the spur of ambition.

So they have left the castle, and such of the servants as stay have begun to assert their rights, to manifest their self-respect. "Whatever you do," said her ladyship to her guest, "don't ring a bell!" To the question in the visitor's face the hostess replied: "If you ring a bell the servants will leave. I have only three. They have announced that they will do their work, but they forbid interruptions by bells!" The hot water appeared on schedule; the service flowed into the guestroom in its regular channel, except that fires were so low that the visitors' feet were frostitened; the meals were served on time and were well cooked. But the servants were efficient shop assistants, no longer fendal serfs. And the earl chopped the trees in his own forest with his own hands for his own fires. The meager household allowance of coal that the fuel controller gave to the earl from the mines under the earl's own lands was barely enough to heat the servants' rooms.

And as for the broad estate over which the earl ruled as an agricultural overlord six years ago—an agricultural overlord and industrial entrepreneur through his coal mines—the estate is all crumbling. The land is passing into the hands of small farmers; the old yeoman farmer, fairly well-to-do, of good old yeoman stock, going back to the Conqueror—he and his kind are taking the ownership of the land of the belted earl in 100-acre lots, and the nation, having taken charge of the earl's coal mines, may now relieve him of the burden of mine ownership as well. For the parliamentary committee by a large majority has reported in favor of the government ownership of all mines of every description.

And because the earl's son sleeps under the poppies of Flanders and his daughters are married and gone, the earl is a weary, confused old man, chopping wood in the forest to keep his old wife warm. He cannot fight the new order. No leadership is calling him. He knows that the end is coming for him and his kind. He realizes quite definitely that in a few years the castle of the Plantagenets, who were royal in the last Henry's days, probably will fall into the hands of a brewer or a draper or a stock broker, who will put in a central heating plant to defile it, debase the privacy of every bedroom with hot and cold water, and degrade the place with a wilderness of bathrooms, so that four servants can run the place on two eight-hour shifts where 100 retainers once served the baron under Elizabeth.

The millions the old earl received from the yeoman farmers for his land have been divided with the state in yearly income taxes; and now on the horizon he sees a parliamentary bill gradually approach which provides that capital as well as income shall be heavily taxed. So the old man in the forest sees even his capital unsafe, and he wonders curiously how the little gray man at Windsor feels about the prospects of succession for the genial young prince of Wales.

### Dish Runs Away With Spoon.

A chain of restaurants in this city has to purchase more than a million spoons, forks and knives every year. Others tell the same story. Some of the help, according to the management of a Wall street restaurant, must be reckoned on as furnishing their homes with "borrowed" tableware and many patrons take it for souvenirs as unblushingly as they would appropriate an umbrella on a rainy day.

A Wall street man was invited to a dinner at the house of a rich client not long ago and during the evening his hostess proudly showed him hundreds of spoons, forks and knives bearing the names of hotels and restaurants both of this country and Europe. "It took me ten years to get this collection together," said the lady, "and I didn't pay for one of them."

## ROAD BUILDING

### MOTOR TRUCKS ON HIGHWAYS

Series of Impacts Being Conducted at Arlington to Determine Impact on Roads.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

To determine the destructive effect of heavily loaded auto trucks on highways and streets, and to meet the demand for data on the design of road surfaces and foundations to withstand such heavy traffic, a series of experiments is being conducted by the bureau of public roads at the Arlington experiment farm to determine the impact of auto trucks on roads.

The most striking single development in the highway field in 1918 was the tremendous increase in motor-truck traffic. Five years ago heavy motor trucks were few in number and limited practically entirely to the paved streets of larger cities. These vehicles now comprise probably 4 to 5 per cent of the grand total of all motor vehicles and are to be found wherever traffic conditions permit profitable use. But very few roads were designed to carry any large volume of this class of traffic. Consequently, the cost of adequate maintenance was increased greatly during the year. In many places the damage due to the incessant pounding of these fast and heavy vehicles was so great as to require complete reconstruction.

### ADVICE ON BUILDING ROADS

Much Investigational and Experimental Work Done by the Department of Agriculture.

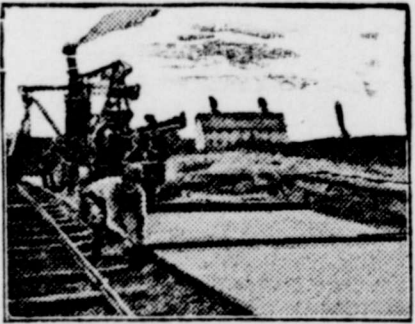
Much investigational and experimental work on road building has been in progress for a number of years and road engineers are able as a result of this work to give valuable advice as to the most economical method of building and maintaining roads for the varying conditions existing in different localities. Much of this investigational work has been done by the highways division of the United States department of agriculture and some by the various state highways commissions. No road building operations ought to be undertaken without the aid and expert advice which these agencies are willing and able to give. Taxpayers should insist upon this.

### COMPACT SURFACE OF ROADS

Excess Water Successfully Removed By Use of Piece of Pipe, Operated by Two Men.

A simple method for compacting the surface of concrete roads and removing excess water has been evolved by an engineer, B. F. Batchelder, of Ravenna, Ohio.

After striking off the surface with a template, according to Mr. Batchelder's plan, a piece of ordinary gaspipe, operated by two men, is used as a roller. After the excess water has come to the surface, another trip up and back with the roller removes all the

water and leaves the surface in good condition for further finishing if necessary. A wave of mortar is carried ahead of the roller the "first time over," which fills in porous places or depressions. The second rolling removes nothing but water that is virtually clear.

This method is especially useful when using crushed stone or slag.—Popular Science Monthly.

### FIND WEAK PARTS OF ROADS

It Should Be Especial Business of Every Road Commissioner to Make Observations.

It should be the special business of every road commissioner to find the weak and susceptible parts of a road, and if there is any likelihood at all of the creation of a "bottomless pit," the saying of "a stitch in time" will apply very truthfully to the question in hand.

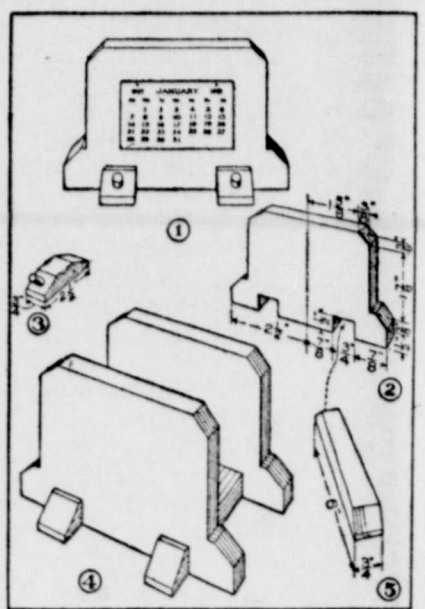
## Useful Christmas Gifts That Any Boy Can Make

By A. NEELY HALL

It requires no more time to make a useful gift than one which will be of no practical value, so why not decide, before beginning this season's gifts, what will be appropriate for those whom you wish to remember?

### Calendar-Board and Pen-Rack.

Of the smaller gifts, nothing would be better appreciated than this article for one's desk. Fig. 2 shows a pattern for the board. If you haven't hardwood, go to a carpenter. He will



let you pick a scrap from his waste pile, or will sell you a piece for a few cents. Wood three-eighths-inch thick is just right. Both sides must be cut alike, and the surest way to get them so is to draw a center-line, first, then lay off the measurements each side of this. The notches in the bottom edge receive the base blocks (Fig. 3). Bore a small hole in the beveled portion of one end of each base block, glue a peg in it to form the front of the pen-rack, and fasten the blocks in the notches cut for them.

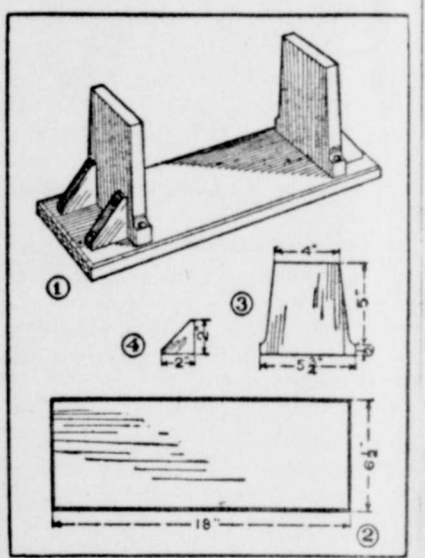
Sandpaper all surfaces, then apply some wood stain and wax. A small calendar-pad tacked to the center of the board, and fastened to the underside of the base blocks, will complete the gift.

### Postcard Rack.

The same pattern that was used for the calendar-board (Fig. 2) is required for the ends of the postcard rack in Fig. 4, and Fig. 5 shows a pattern for the base strips, which fasten in the notches in the bottom of the end pieces. Finish the wood with stain and wax.

### Book-Rack.

The book-rack in the illustration is made of wood five-eighths inch thick.

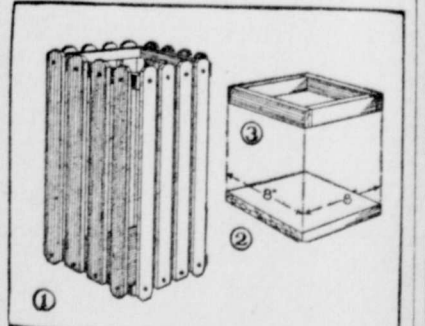


First, prepare the base board by the pattern of Fig. 2, then the pair of ends by the pattern of Fig. 3, then two pairs of brackets like the one in Fig. 4. These seven pieces are all that the rack requires. Be careful to get the sides of the end pieces symmetrical. Bevel the edges of the base-board.

Use round-headed blue screws for assembling the parts, and place these in the positions indicated in Fig. 1. A coat of stain, then one of wax, and a button of felt glued to the underside of the base at each corner, will complete the bookrack.

### Waste-Basket.

An 8 by 8 inch board, for a base (Fig. 2), four strips out of which to make a frame of the same size as the



baseboard (Fig. 3), eight laths to cut in half for side strips, a few finishing nails, and 32 round-headed blue screws, are all that you need for the pretty waste-basket shown in Fig. 1.

Plane the laths smooth, trim off their ends and bore holes a trifle larger than the screws, near the ends. Screw the side strips to the base edges, four to a side, then prepare the top frame of the form shown in Fig. 3, and screw the upper ends of the strips to it.

Wood stain and wax, or two coats of paint or white enamel may be applied, to finish the woodwork.

### GAMES FOR CHILDREN AT CHRISTMAS TIME.

It may be for a Christmas party, or for the family gathering, that you will need ideas; for either, the following games will furnish fun for young and old alike.

#### The Game of Tip.

This old English game requires the use of enough assorted Christmas candies, nuts, raisins, and other dainties, to make a small pile upon a table; also a pair of sugar tongs. One of the party is chosen, who must retire to another room while the remaining players decide upon one of the dainties in the pile to be known as "Tip." The chosen person is then recalled, and with the tongs removes pieces from the pile, trying to avoid the piece named Tip, of which, however, he does not know the location. All pieces removed belong to him, unless he removes Tip, when all must be returned to the pile, and the turn passes to the next player, who retires to the other room while another Tip is named. A player may pass his turn when, after drawing several pieces, he wants to



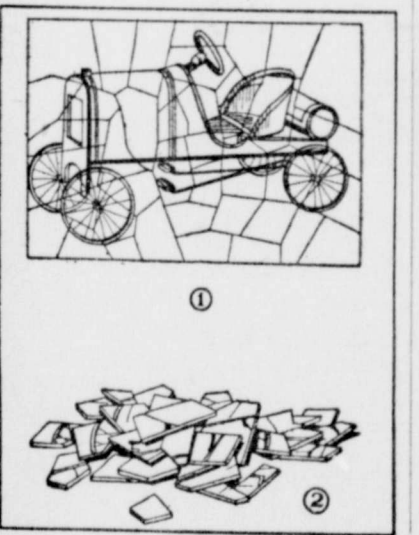
avoid the possibility of losing them through drawing Tip. The game continues until the pile disappears.

#### A Fill-in Game.

For a laughter-producing game there is no peer. A poem is selected and copied upon paper, with each noun omitted and a line drawn in its place. Then the nouns are copied upon small cards, one upon each. The cards are dealt, an equal number to each player, and a player is chosen as reader. The reader reads the poem, pausing at each space, and the players fill in, in turn, a noun from the cards in their pile. The nouns will seldom come to their original places, and the result will be a ridiculous mix-up.

#### Sliced Toy Puzzles.

From advertisements cut pictures of toys, and paste these upon pieces of cardboard; then with a sharp knife slice the cardboard into irregular pieces as indicated in Fig. 1. Place the parts of each picture in an envelope by itself. When ready to play the game, give each player an envelope, and direct him to put together the parts so as to make the picture of the



toy. At the expiration of a given length of time, direct an exchange of the toys.

#### Acrostic Place Cards.

An original idea for the place cards for the Christmas party is to prepare them in the form of letters from Santa Claus, with the names and addresses of the guests worked out in acrostics, as is suggested on the two specimen envelopes in the illustration; and have the guests find their places by interpreting the inscriptions upon the envelopes. The first envelope illustrated reads, "Miss Lillian Cook, 415 Adams Street," the second one, "Mr. Harry Underwood, 518 Bell Avenue." Some of the addresses may be harder to make



into acrostics; others will be easier. Making them will be fun; deciphering them will afford several minutes of keen enjoyment.

### MORE GOOD CHEESE DISHES.

The list of cheese dishes in the customary literature of our country are variations of a comparatively small number of general types.

**Macaroni and Cheese.**—This is a dish which takes the place of meat and when a few hard cooked eggs are added makes a most sustaining dish. Butter a baking dish and add a thick layer of cooked macaroni, sprinkle with rich cheese, cover with a rich white sauce, finish with buttered crumbs and bake in a hot oven. A bit of onion, fish or chopped vegetables may be added to give variety.

**Cheese Omelet.**—Beat two egg yolks until thick and lemon colored, add two tablespoonfuls of hot water and salt and pepper to taste. Beat the whites until stiff, then add one cupful of grated cheese. Put a tablespoonful of butter into the omelet pan; when smoking hot pour in the egg mixture and cook until well done on the bottom; set in the oven and finish cooking.

**Welsh Rarebit.**—Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter, add two tablespoonfuls of flour and when well blended add one cupful of hot milk; cook until smooth and creamy. Add one cupful of grated cheese, salt and pepper, stir until the cheese is melted, serve on toast or crackers. Half a cupful of chopped olives may be added if desired.

**Cheese Balls.**—Beat four eggs until light, add one-fourth cupful of milk, one-fourth of a cup of flour, three-fourths cupful of grated cheese, salt and pepper to taste. Form into balls and fry in deep fat.

**Celery and Cheese Salad.**—Select celery stalks with deep grooves in them, wash and wipe dry. Mix a small cream cheese with salt, finely chopped pecans and add a spoonful of cream. Fill the grooves in the celery stalks with cheese and chill. When ready to serve cut stalks in small sized pieces for serving.

**Cheese Soup.**—To a quart of hot milk add a slice of onion and cook fifteen minutes. Remove the onion and add two tablespoonfuls each of flour and butter well mixed. Cook for five minutes until smooth, add a cupful of grated rich cheese and serve as soon as it is melted.

A small sized dish mop is the ideal convenience for washing milk bottles.

### SWEETS FROM HONEY.

Honey is becoming more and more popular, and a back yard garden, a hen for each member of the family needs to make the living complete, a hive of bees, to furnish sweets.

**Honey Blanc Mange.**—Moisten six tablespoonfuls of cornstarch with one-fourth cupful of milk, add two cupfuls of boiling milk and cook eight minutes; then add a dash of salt, one-half cupful of honey. Mold in cups and serve sprinkled with chopped nuts and sugar and cream.

**Honey Candy.**—To one quart of honey take six tablespoonfuls of butter, two tablespoonfuls of vinegar and boil until it hardens in cold water. Flavor with two teaspoonfuls of almond and lemon mixed, add a half teaspoonful of soda, pour into buttered pans to cool. Mark off in squares before it gets too hard.

**Butter Scotch.**—Take one cupful of butter, two cupfuls each of sugar and honey, and a teaspoonful of vanilla added before taking off. Boil ten minutes, pour into buttered tins to cool and mark off in squares.

**Cracker Jack.**—Boil together one cupful of brown sugar and one cupful of honey until it hardens when a drop is added to cold water. Remove from the heat, add one-half teaspoonful of soda and all the puffed rice, wheat or popcorn that can be stirred into it.

**Honey Fruit Cake.**—Warm one-half cupful of butter, add three-fourths of a cupful of honey, one-third of a cupful of apple jelly, remove from the heat; add two well beaten eggs, one teaspoonful of soda, a teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of grated nutmeg, all sifted with four cupfuls of flour. The soda is dissolved in a tablespoonful of water. Add one-half cupful each of currants, chopped orange peel, and raisins, one-fourth cupful of water and one-fourth teaspoonful of salt. Bake in a moderate oven.

Honey strained and mixed with chopped fruit and whipped cream makes a delicious dessert. A fine cough medicine is made of one part horseradish root, grated, and two parts of honey.

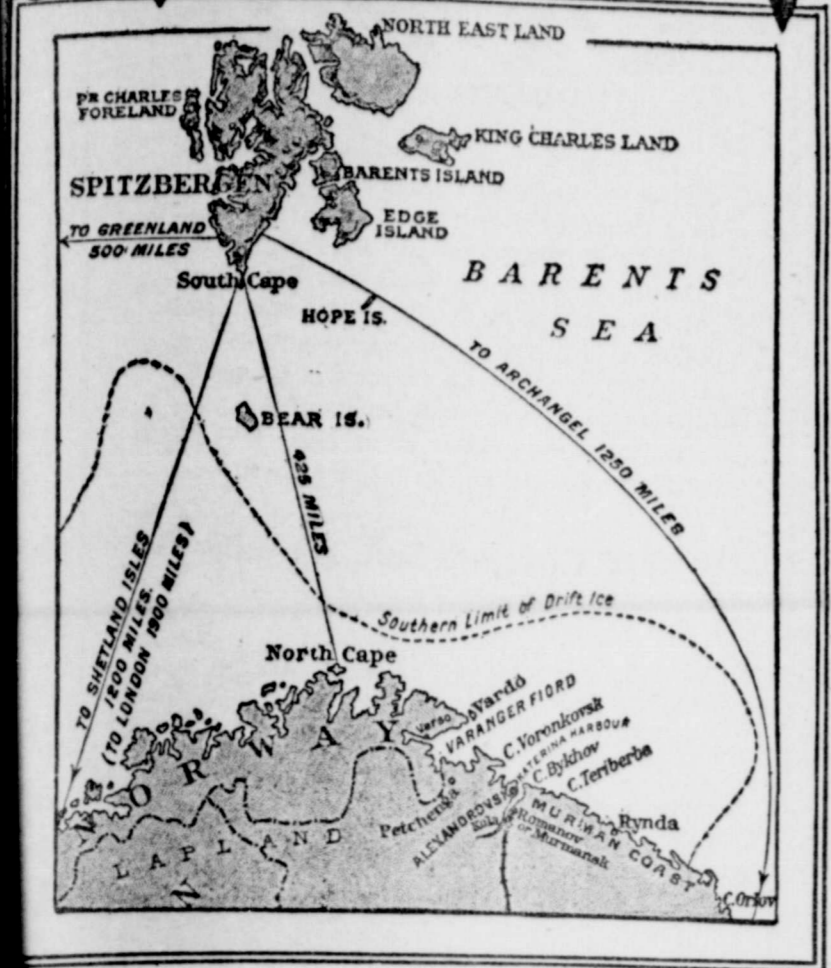

# SPITZBERGEN



In 1596 two Dutchmen, Barents and Heemskirk, discovered Spitzbergen, and were immediately followed by British explorers. A fisherman—Poole—was one of them, and he was the first man to see coal in Spitzbergen. In 1804, two British explorers were Fotherby and Baffin, who sailed to Spitzbergen on behalf of the well-known company of London merchants known as the Muscovy company. Carrying them a royal warrant, they eventually and definitely annexed Spitzbergen in 1814 to the British crown in the name of King James for himself and successors. So it is Spitzbergen yet by right of succession, whatever the successive heads of the British government have been will be, since the reign of James VI of Scotland and I of Great Britain, the property of King William III of Great Britain.

In 1914 Britain consented to sit at a conference table, convened by other powers, at Christiania, to discuss in a way the government of Spitzbergen should be organized, because of increasing commercial development by enterprising miners and hunters of various nationalities—British, Norwegian, and Swedish. There had been an understanding at which Russia, Norway, and Sweden only had sat, and at which I understand, Britain had refused to consent to sit, or at all events to sit as an international authority. But in 1914—the tercentenary of the British annexation of Spitzbergen—the British government, which has the ancient right and title to Spitzbergen as heirs and successors of King James, took up the very general attitude of insisting, if a British delegate was to sit, that the power represented there must acknowledge that Spitzbergen was terra nullius, or No Man's Land, and not forcing British rights upon it, but also refusing to admit the right of any other power present to sit by right or title whatever. This was sitting in Christiania in 1914. Besides Britain, the United States, Germany, Russia, Holland, Norway, Sweden and Denmark sent delegates, but when the conference was dissolved without result, and Spitzbergen is, and remains, terra nullius. This is quite in spite of other unauthentic reports that have recently appeared.

**Shall Rule the Island?**  
What will next happen it is impossible to say, but it is very probable that Spitzbergen for almost a century. But certain things will happen regarding some of which were represented at the conference in 1914. (1) Germany will be allowed in the future to take whatever in the organization of Spitzbergen in spite of her bargain with Russia at the Brest-Litovsk treaty. (2) Russia is able to take a fully responsible position now with her disarmament. (3) The United States has since sold their interests in Spitzbergen to the Norwegians; Holland has historical interests, France and Britain, Norway and Denmark the three specially interested.

These three countries are justly after the rights of Spitzbergen, as well as those of other nationalities who have personally, for many strong reasons, most emphatically emphasized the British government's interest in the conference to exercise its rights as heir to the British titles as defined and demarcated by Fotherby and Baffin in 1804 for the protection of other nations who have exclusive rights there. It will soon be recognized

## STURDY AND SENSIBLE SCHOOL DRESS



Dressing the girl in her early teens for school ought to be a simple matter, easily disposed of—and it is with mothers who are gifted with good judgment coupled with the courage of their convictions. But the young person from thirteen to seventeen or eighteen is apt to be self-conscious and self-centered; she is not always willing to defer to the judgment of older heads than hers, and here is where difficulties confront the mothers. Schools that require a uniform make things easy; there is no room for comparisons where all are dressed alike, and dress does not distract the attention of the young people from their work.

There is another advantage in the uniform. It teaches the young girls that it is not so much what they wear as how they wear it, that counts; a lesson that will be valuable in after years when the matter of apparel becomes important to them. But where no uniform is required, it falls to the lot of mothers to teach their daughters to suit clothes to occupation and occasion, and to value neatness above everything else.

Sturdy materials and fast colors are required for school clothes. They

must be well made and if washable—so much the better. The school dress for a young girl, shown above, will look well in either wool or cotton goods. It has a plaid skirt and plain middie blouse, with plaid belt and neck binding. It is as good a model for school wear as one could ask; of a character that is guaranteed not to take the young ladies' minds off the intricacies of "square root," "decimals" or any of the "ographies."

"Reading" and "rithmetic" occupy the school hours of the smaller girl and play absorbs the balance of her waking hours. She rejoices in middie or one-piece frocks that do not interfere with her freedom. A dress for her school days, shown in the picture, is made of dark colored wool cloth, with a collar and inset in the cuffs of lighter colored wool, or some strong color contrast, as red with dark blue or dark gray. It is made with a straight panel at the front. The simplest sort of pattern is applied with narrow braid at the top and bottom of the panel. An excursion through the shops in search of new blouses is as intriguing as an expedition after wild flowers. Where there is so much variety and beauty to be found there is an equal amount of zest in making selections. The autumn brought variety in styles, in materials, in methods of decorating the new blouses and, for several reasons, their place in the wardrobe is increased in importance. One of these reasons is the "high cost of dressing." The silk blouse is not confined to tailored styles nowadays, but undertakes to fit a suit for many occasions. In the company of a handsome separate skirt, lovely blouses are able to face any occasion with assurance.

The overblouse and the smock style are the important new features in the season's showings. In the overblouse, two materials or two colors of one material are used to make the blouse—as crepe georgette over chiffon, or net or satin. In the smock style the blouse has a peplum and a girde, as shown in the figure at the right of the picture above. This particular model embodies several details of the mode in the flaring sleeves, the shape of the neck opening, the silk cord, and tassels forming the girde, and the management of the embroidered decoration. It is made of georgette crepe and embroidered with silk

loss. In place of silk cord and tassels, short girdles of gold or silver brocaded ribbon add their brilliancy to some of the models and gold or silver threads are introduced into silk embroidery, maintaining the season's devotion to rich, metallic decorations on about everything we wear. Another item to be noted is the inconspicuousness of fastenings; they are not apparent and leave us guessing as to how blouses are got into.

High-necked blouses are not as plentiful as others, but they are good style and favored by matrons, to whom they prove more becoming than round or "V"-shaped neck openings. A georgette blouse with high neck and long sleeves, at the left of the two models pictured, is carefully designed to prove becoming. It has shoulder yokes to which the body is gathered back and front, and a narrow plain vestee with groups of little buttons set at each side of it. Silk embroidery is responsible for a touch of rich-looking decoration, to which scintillating beads are often added in blouses for dressy wear.

## Home Town Helps

NEW YORK BARS BILLBOARDS

Edict Banishes Blemishes on Landscape—To Be Allowed Only Beside Business Buildings.

Unightly signs and billboards must not deface Father Knickerbocker's fair real estate landscape.

This is the latest edict of the zoning committee. Secretary Swan announced that the law would be enforced forthwith, whoever might be the offenders.

The city's determination to enforce this provision of the zoning resolution has been demonstrated in several instances by the revocation of permits mistakenly issued for the erection of billboards in residence districts and by the institution of suits to bring about the removal of billboards where the owners have not complied with removal orders," said he. "To bring about effective enforcement property owners who have suffered from an invasion should immediately place the matter before the superintendent of buildings on their borough.

"Instead of merely regulating the height, size and construction of signs, it frankly recognizes the fact that there is no such thing as a billboard respectable enough to rub elbows with churches, schools and private homes. When hereafter erected the billboard must go where it will cause a minimum harm—alongside business buildings and industrial establishments. Those existing before the law was passed, are allowed to continue. Commercial advertising can in no sense be deemed necessary to any of the uses specifically permitted in residential districts."

## WOULD SET OUT NUT TREES

Idea of New York Man for Practical and Beautiful Adornment of the Highways.

A correspondent writing to the editor of a New York paper suggests a thought that has probably occurred to very few persons interested in the adornment of American highways with trees, but that may be the forerunner of a new idea in such decoration, remarks the Christian Science Monitor. His suggestion, in brief, looks to the planting of productive as well as simply ornamental trees, preferably nut trees, because the "common fruit trees, having been cultivated for generations, are more or less spoiled children, requiring continued cultivation if they are to be happy." Such planting, he says, would combine the Greek idea of utility and beauty; yet his own experience with fruit trees on the border of a private estate suggests a difficulty, for the trees were ruined by the heedless way in which a miscellaneous public gathered the fruit. Nuts would, perhaps, present less temptation, and there is, of course, hope that the public, once it individually realized that beautifying the common highway was one important function of the trees, would be more careful in its treatment of them. Meantime, the setting out of any trees at all is an important step in the right direction.

## Advantage in Owning Home.

Aside from the manifest advantage of owning a house when houses are at a premium, the family which owns its own home strikes roots deeper into the soil than those who move from one part of the city to another as convenience dictates. Their children go to the same school and the same Sunday school year after year. Teachers and friends have time to grow interested in them and to make plans for their improvement or pleasure. The heads of the family take their duties as citizens seriously, because had government reacts on them directly in the form of increased taxes which they see and feel. Of course, the rentpayer pays taxes indirectly, but so many other elements complicate the rate of rentals that he hardly thinks of taxation as one of them. The home owner, too, takes a greater interest in local improvements, because he expects to stay in the neighborhood long enough to get the benefit of them. Home ownership involves responsibilities, but the man who faces responsibilities is usually a stronger man, a better husband and a better citizen than the man who dodges them.

## Beautifying the Back Yard.

Those who have sufficient ground in the rear of their city or country houses in which to plant trees, or who are planning to plant trees in ground on which they plan to build, will do well to consider the usefulness of trees that are to occupy the space before deciding just what they will plant.

Not only are apple trees, cherry and peach trees ornamental in their shape and their foliage, but they vary the year around. They are not only as decorative as the purely flowering shrubs, but they are much more lovely than the average shrub or tree in blossom time.

**URGE RED CROSS SEAL SALE OF CHRISTMAS DAY IN ALL SCHOOLS SEALS OPENS DEC. 1**

Surgeon General Blue Asks That Churches Also Join in Movement to Further Sale

Surgeon General Rupert Blue has issued an appeal to observe Christmas Seal Day in the schools and in all places of worship in the United States, December 5, 6 and 7. The appeal follows:

"Over one hundred and fifty thousand Americans die annually from tuberculosis. This is an appalling waste of life when we consider that tuberculosis is classed as a preventable disease. Moreover, because this loss of life occurs almost entirely in the ranks of the young adult population, health authorities the world over have come to consider the control of tuberculosis as still the most pressing health problem confronting them. Every year the National Tuberculosis Association, by selling Red Cross Christmas seals, raises a considerable sum of money to be used in a nation wide campaign to combat tuberculosis. This year a special effort is being made to interest school children in this work and December fifth, sixth and seventh have been designated as days on which the seals are to be sold in the public schools, synagogues and churches. Because of the seriousness of the situation, I trust that the campaign this year will be particularly successful.

The Red Cross Christmas Seal, launched in 1908 by the American Red Cross, has been issued in the name of the Red Cross since that date. In March 1919 the American Red Cross agreed to allow the National Tuberculosis Association to use its name and emblem on the usual Christmas seal. This year the Red Cross has no other part in the Tuberculosis Seal Campaign. The Red Cross Seal is a Tuberculosis Seal. Those who buy it are supporting the tuberculosis work in their own communities.

To support the programs of work outlined in the forty-eight states and insular possessions for 1920 in such a manner that results in the saving of thousands of lives may be realized, will demand the sale of at least 650,000,000 Red Cross Seals at one cent each. Teams are being formed in every community. Business men are forming sales organizations and similar bodies are being organized by former service men.
