Material Regarded as Particularly Suitable for Trunk Lines Entering Large Cities.

Study of various paving materials suitable for much-traveled highways has disclosed interesting data on granite blocks to the bureau of public roads of the United States department of agriculture. Many road builders are coming to regard this material as particularly sultable for trunk lines entering large towns and cities where there is an increasing amount of heavy traffic.

Though the initial cost of granite block construction is high, the maintenance of the pavement, if properly

ROAD TESTS IN CALIFORNIA

Over Adobe Land Concrete Is Laid on Sides With Macadam in Middle -Surface Topped.

An experiment in road construction land is being made in a section of the county highway between Bay Point and Pittsburg, in Cali-

Experience has shown that concrete roads built over adobe land results in the cracking and disintegrating of the road in a few seasons and in an effort o overcome this trouble County Surveyor Arnold is having the link of the county highway constructed in a manner tried in several eastern states

and proved successful. The concrete is laid in two separate sections, each eight feet wide with a two-foot strip through the center. In this strip is placed oil macadam which is rolled level to the surface of the concrete and the entire surface is faced with a topping.

GOOD ROADS ARE ESSENTIAL

Success of Motor Truck Express Lines Depends Greatly on Character of Highways.

The success of the motor truck express depends to a very large degree on the character of the roads over which the routes run. Bad roads increase the operating costs, and consequently the rates to patrons, beyond the point of economy. Trucks are destructive to roads unless the roads are permanently built. Therefore, the problem of improving and developing the marketing facilities for farmers through the establishment of rwal notor express lines is directly connected with the problem of permanent improvement of the highways.

MORE AND BETTER PASTURES

Problem in Coastal Plain Section of South Has Become Increasingly Important.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-

ment of Agriculture.) The pasture problem in the coastal plain section of the South must be solved to bring about agricultural utilization of these lands. The problem has become increasingly important since the high prices of feeds are more and more forcing attention to the only cheap feed-pasturage. The done a great deal of work along this line. The investigators have confirmed the bluegrass experiments, in which it was shown that heavy pasturing was much the best method

Unfortunately, say the specialists, facilities for experiments and demonstrations are wholly inadequate in attempting to work out a system of better handling of northern pastures. On the coastal plains of the South, unless the soils are much affected by drought, continue the experts, carpet grass supplemented with lespedeza makes exellent pasture. Golden crown grass is also excellent Efforts are being made, with the aid of a new stripping machine, to place carpet grass seed on he market in adequate quantity. Sev eral newly introduced grasses are promising as pasture possibilities.

SAFEGUARDING SHEEP FLOCK

Large Number of Animals Lost Each Year From Some Preventable Disorder.

Thousands upon thousands of sheep die each year from a great variety of preventable causes. The killer dog is not the chief cause of loss. He may cause perhaps 1 per cent of the deaths due to accidental causes, but the most serious losses are attributable to ignorance and carelessness upon the part of the owner or his shepherd. Among the chief causes of loss may be mentioned lack of shelter for lambing ewes and their newborn lambs. A sudden snow or rain storm coming at lambing time often finds ewes and lambs exposed, and many deaths re-

PASTURAGE CUTS FEED BILLS

Cost of Pork Production Can Be Reduced by Providing Suitable Pasture for Hogs.

Farmers can reduce the cost of pork production next year by providing a suitable pasture for their hogs, says W. H. Peters of the animal husbandry division, University farm. Most pasture grasses are rich in protein. The call for high grain rations is therefore less urgent a matter to be taken into consideration in these days of falling prices for hogs and plgs. Alfalfa and brome grass are best for growing pigs. but no matter how good a pasture is some grain must be fed if the hogs are to thrive and make profitable gains.





There is no firmly established opinion as to the derivation of the name name Reval is derived from the Danish word "reffel" (reef), as in those days the Island of Karlos, which is two or three versts from the town, was a long rocky peninsula.

Medieval and Modern Mingled. The old town is still partly surrounded by a thick wall from which rise many queer, medieval towers, the highest of which is the "Long Hermann." Then there is the "Fat (or thick) Margaritta," and the "Kick in de Keck." The latter, overlooking the town, receives its name, according to rumor, because one can peep into all its kitchens from its windows. Splendid boulevards give a modern touch to

this town, despite its narrow, oldworld, winding streets. Like Athens, it has seven gates; the Big Strand (or sea) gate; the Small Strand, or Nicholas gate; the Wiru, or Narwa gate; the Karja, or Michailoff gate; the Harju, or New gate; the Dom gate, and the Cistern gate (which the Esthonians call Nunnavarov, derived from the Nun gate, as a convent was once situated nearby).

The towers and walls are riddled before Miles is supposed to have been | with bullet marks, which date back to the times when the Moscovian czar, Ivan Vassilivitch, besieged the town. The gates are decorated with the coat of arms of the city, dating from the Danish period. Some have three light blue lines on a gold ground, surrounded with red; red and blue feathers ornament the helmet, on which rests a crown. A woman clad in a red garment holds a cross in her hands. A silver cross on a red ground is also sometimes found.

Historical Houses and Castle. Reval, as already mentioned, is one

of the few towns in Europe to survive medieval days. For one who loves historical towns, to indulge himself in admiring the wonderful old Danish and Swedish houses which ornament these narrow streets, is a real joy. The square near the castle and the market place are of peculiar historical interest; those streets known as Broad street and Long street are the principal thoroughfares and contain most of the fashionable shops and residences. Turning to the magnificent Dom-

berg, with its castle, or Ritterhaus, a new and no less wonderful vista opens before us. The castle was built in the thirteenth century by Waldemar. and was partly rebuilt in 1722. It is surrounded by walls and a beautiful my. park. Formerly, this quarter was divided into two parts, one belonging to the church, the other to the knights. On the right, the house of the nobility contains many interesting features. Unfortunately the archives. which were kept there, were lost, when, for some unknown reason, those dating from before 1590 were sent by ship to Sweden in 1710. Two out of the three ships were wrecked. The only reliable source from which one could trace the history of Esthonia has thus been destroyed.

GAVE CHANCE TO SQUARE UP

Why Many Civil War Officers Welcomed a Skirmish Not Alone for Its Own Sake.

As one who took part in the American Civil war, George Haven Putnam, a member of the publishing firm, recalled many interesting incidents in his "Memories of My Youth." He states that one of the advantages of a retreating campaign was the opportunity it gave to officers to straighten up their obligations for various articles and regimental property for which

they were responsible. He writes: "The wise officer who picks up things upon the way retains these in what might be called a reserve fund. He knows that other articles will disappear later and that it will be a convenience to have something with which to offset his account. On the other hand, if articles disappear without vouchers the commander, who has already had similar experience, makes a practice of carrying them as on hand until his command is involved in anything that could be called a fight. After such fight is over the articles will be duly disposed of in form 41 as 'lost

or destroyed in action.' "When my regiment landed in Louisiana the quartermaster and the company commanders were alike responsible for quite an accumulation of articles which had been duly utilized for the benefit of the United States, but for which they had no proper vouchers on file. The first fight-a mere swamp skirmish-was, on this ground, hailed with delight. I remember going up to the post commander with a long list of property that had been 'used up' in this very serious combat. The colonel looked at the paper rather quizzi-
